California imposes limits of \$5,000 per year for making contributions to candidates for elective state office, or \$25,000 per year to a party for making contributions to support or defeat candidates for state office. The latter applies to contributions to a political party used for spending at the behest of a candidate for state office for communications to party members about the candidate's candidacy.
- 4. The Colorado limits listed are as last adjusted for inflation on April 1, 2007 ("D. Committee Contributions," downloaded Jan. 30, 2009 from Colorado Board of Elections Internet site).
- 5. Vermont offers full public financing to qualifying candidates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor. A candidate seeking public funding may not solicit or accept any private contributions except qualifying contributions (Vt. Stat. Ann., tit. 17, sec. 2854). The U.S. Supreme Court in *Randall v.
