Offered by Representative Flowers:

WHEREAS, Medicaid improves health, access to health services, and financial security; coverage lowers infant, child, and adult mortality rates and increases the use of critical preventive services, such as prenatal care; coverage also virtually eliminates catastrophic out-of-pocket medical expenditures, providing much-needed financial security and peace of mind; and

WHEREAS, Medicaid is a considerable economic boost to the Illinois economy; the State stands to lose 9,280 jobs for every 5% reduction to the Medicaid program; and

WHEREAS, The expansion of Medicaid increased economic activity by \$2.6 billion in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Illinois is in a unique transitional phase in its health care delivery system; the State is in the first year of a massive implementation of statewide Medicaid managed care for more than 50% of the Medicaid population; in addition, Illinois has elected to experiment with different models of coordinated care intended to evaluate the effectiveness of traditional Managed Care Organizations and less traditional Accountable Care Entities (hospital-led ACO models) and Coordinated Care Entities (home health models led by community-based providers targeted to special needs populations); reductions in Medicaid can result in disruption of these systemic changes; and

WHEREAS, Comprehensive health care provided through Medicaid reduces the incidence of depression, ensures that more women are able to receive important preventive services, such as cancer screenings, and decreases mortality rates; and

WHEREAS, Illinois has already undertaken significant reductions to the Medicaid program; through the "Save Medicaid Access and Resources Together Act" (SMART Act), we made nearly \$1 billion in 62 spending reductions, utilization controls, and provider cuts; and

WHEREAS, Numerous organizations, public health entities, and impacted citizens are dependent on the Illinois Medicaid program; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we do not support changes to Medicaid eligibility groups that leave currently covered people without access to comprehensive, affordable health coverage and health care; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we do not support reductions in Medicaid covered services that leave beneficiaries without access to medically necessary health care; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we do not support reductions to plan or provider rates that reduce the access that eligible Medicaid beneficiaries have to medically necessary services; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we do not support implementation of procedures that would result in the erroneous denial or termination of eligibility or services to eligible Medicaid beneficiaries.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 254

Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, Millions of families throughout the State of Illinois and the country at large depend on child care programs to provide vital services for our nation's children; and

WHEREAS, The expense of quality child care has proven to be a large burden on low income families; and

WHEREAS, Although there are many child care grants that are available to low income families, such as the federal Child Care and Development Block Grant, more can be done for these families on the State level; and

WHEREAS, Our children deserve the best child care that can be provided to them; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that there is created the Commission to Reform Child Care in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Commission shall consist of the following members: 9 members appointed by the Speaker of the House and 8 members appointed by the Minority Leader of the House; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Commission shall study current local and State provisions involving child care and make recommendations to help ensure that there are simple and fair systems to provide quality child care that is affordable for families, especially those on low incomes; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Commission shall develop a legislative and administrative agenda that would effectively address the issues surrounding child care in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the members of the Commission shall serve without compensation; the Illinois Department of Human Services shall provide administrative support for the Commission; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Commission shall make its final report to the House on or before September 1, 2015.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 255

Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, Sickle cell disease is an inherited multi-organ disorder leading to serious morbidity and premature mortality; people with sickle cell disease can start having episodes of severe pain after the first few months of life; sickle cell disease affects millions of people throughout the world, with 90,000-100,000 people in the United States and 4000-5000 people here in Illinois affected by the disease; and

WHEREAS, Without proper screening and treatment, children with sickle cell disease are 410 times more likely to have a stroke than children the same age without sickle cell disease; with proper screening and treatment, children with sickle cell disease are still 40 times more likely to have a stroke than children the same age without sickle cell disease; and

WHEREAS, People with sickle cell disease have less access to comprehensive team care than people with genetic disorders such as hemophilia and cystic fibrosis; and

WHEREAS, Because of the nature of sickle cell disease, people suffering from sickle cell disease frequently have unplanned, unpredictable, and reoccurring needs, requiring multiple prolonged hospitalizations and frequent re-admissions within a 30-day period; and

WHEREAS, Most patients with sickle cell disease have or may receive Medicare or Medicaid benefits; currently in Illinois, the 30-Day Readmission Rule affects patients with Medicaid insurance plans; and

WHEREAS, In the most recent nationwide study of 39,324 Medicaid admissions for sickle cell crisis from 2007 to 2012, 40% of patients were readmitted to the hospital within 30 days; and

WHEREAS, The University of Illinois Hospital and Health Sciences System's Sickle Cell Center cares for the largest number of adult sickle cell patients in the Chicago-Metropolitan area, providing care to 649 unique adult sickle cell patients and 239 unique pediatric sickle cell patients in fiscal year 2014; this institution has lost millions of dollars in 30-Day Readmission penalties, and of that about one-third has been attributed to sickle cell patients; and

WHEREAS, Literature shows that a 7-day, 24-hour a day center such as the University of Illinois Hospital and Health Sciences System's Sickle Cell Acute Care Center reduces hospital admissions for those with sickle cell disease; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Department of Healthcare and Family Services to waive the 30-Day Readmission Rule for those afflicted with sickle cell disease; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the Director of the Department of Healthcare and Family Services.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 263

Offered by Representative Cloonen:

WHEREAS, On April 23, 1908, Congress authorized a Medical Reserve Corps - a reserve force of civilian medical officers who could be ordered to active duty by the Secretary of War during a time of national emergency to save the lives of American soldiers on the battlefield; and

WHEREAS, What began as a strategic reserve force of 160 physicians in the 20th century, is now a 21st century operational force with an authorized end strength of 200,950 U.S. Army Reserve soldiers, including over 6,680 U.S. Army Reserve soldiers in 30 locations in the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Army Reserve has responded with honor and valor to the call of the nation in times of need with over 12,000 Army Reserve soldiers now serving overseas; and

WHEREAS, The families and employers of the soldiers also contribute greatly to their success; therefore, be it

WHEREAS, The State shall hold charter schools accountable for meeting rigorous school content standards and for providing those schools with the opportunity to improve accountability; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly seeks to create opportunities within the public school system of Illinois for development of innovative and accountable teaching techniques; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has a commitment to the mission, goals, and diversity of public education; and

WHEREAS, There is a wide variety of charter school types, practices, and levels of success achieved by those schools; and

WHEREAS, In a 2013 study of Illinois' schools by the Center for Research on Education Outcomes, it was found that 20% of charter schools perform significantly better than the traditional public school market, and 21% of them performed significantly worse; and

WHEREAS, In the 2013-2014 school year, statewide charter school enrollment has risen to 59,925 pupils within 143 campuses of 64 charter schools; and

WHEREAS, The current statewide cap on the amount of charter schools is 120; and

WHEREAS, In 2013, the statewide 4-year graduation rate among all charters was 60.4%, compared with an 84% graduation rate among traditional public schools; and

WHEREAS, In the 2012-2013 school year, only 13% of all charters statewide met or exceeded the State's Adequate Yearly Progress target for State standards in reading and math, compared with 16% for traditional public schools; and

WHEREAS, Charter school authorizers are responsible for issuing charter contracts to school boards and determining whether each charter contract merits renewal, nonrenewal, or revocation; and

WHEREAS, Charter school authorizers provide oversight and enforce accountability mechanisms to ensure quality schools; and

WHEREAS, Charter school authorizers set academic, fiscal, and managerial standards for charter schools to meet; therefore, be it
