Doorkeeper: "All persons not entitled to the House Floor, please retire to the gallery."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order. The Members please be in their seats. We will be led in prayer by Reverend Krueger, the House Chaplain."

Rev. Krueger: "In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, Amen. Oh, Lord, Bless this House of Thy service this day. Thomas Jefferson said I wish that not only no act but no thought of mine should be unknown. Let's pray for God's guidance. Into Thy hands oh Lord we commend our spirits, souls and bodies. For Thou has created and redeemed them oh Lord God, Almighty. Guide us and all whom we serve this day with Thine eye and Thy light in our hearts with Thy godly knowledge increasing in us more and more. We may always be found to walk and live after Thy will and pleasure through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

Speaker Redmond: "Roll Call for attendance. Evidently the G M and O or Amtrak was late so we'll have to stand at ease for about 15 or 20 minutes."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order in the regular session. Roll Call for attendance is everybody on the Roll Call? Take the record Mr. Clerk. Are there any excuses absences on the part of the Minority? Agreed Resolutions."

O'Brien: "House Joint Resolution 75, Grotberg; House Resolution 551, Getty; House Resolution 552, Getty; House Resolution 553, Londrigan; House Resolution 554, Londrigan."


Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, Grotberg on House Resolution 75 honors J. Nelson Fox known as Little Nilly on the White Sox team. House Resolution 551 by Getty honors the Flying J's varsity team of St. Jude who is in the finals. House Resolution 552 by Getty honors Mr. Michalak and Miss Ann Flens who have been married for 50 years. House Resolution 553 honors Reverend William Edward Krueger. House Resolution 554 by Londrigan honors the Albert William Hillestads. I move the adoption of the agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Redmond: "The gentleman has moved the adoption of the, Representative Grotberg for what purpose do you rise?"

Grotberg: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I wondered if we are not too pressed for time, Mr. Speaker, would the Clerk read in full the House Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "We are pressed for time right now."



Grotberg: "We are pressed for time. I would just ask all of the Members then on behalf, what's the number on that, Mr. Clerk."

O'Brien: "Senate Joint Resolution 75."

Grotberg: "Senate Joint Resolution 75, I would rise to explain it at the appropriate moment, Mr. Speaker, is now the time?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes, go ahead and explain it."

Grotberg: "Very briefly, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, could I have your attention just a moment? House Joint Resolution 75 memorializes Nelson J. Fox, the great White Sox baseball player to win the battle that he is in for his health in Baltimore at the Maryland University hospital. And we've got to hurry this Resolution through to him because he is all that ill. And I will fly it down, a friend of mine will fly it down to Baltimore and present it to him and his family on our behalf tomorrow and that was the urgency of this Resolution and unless you say otherwise all members of the House will be listed as Co-Sponsors."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection, list all Members as Co-Sponsors. You have heard the gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Resolution. All in favor indicate by saying aye, opposed no. The ayes have it. The Resolution is adopted. Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, it is awfully awfully cold in here. Can't we cut down that air conditioning a bit. I don't know whether you want icicles..."

Speaker Redmond: "I don't know who does it.."

Geo-Karis: "I wonder if you could instruct the Door Keeper to look into it because it is awfully awfully cold."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Davidson will give that his undivided attention.

Representative Shea, do you desire recognition in the Regular Session?"

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the Regular Session do now stand in recess until the hour of 3:30."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections. All in favor indicate by saying aye, opposed no. The ayes have it. We stand in recess until 3:30. We'll be in First Special Session at 2:00."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order in the First Special Session. We will be led in prayer by the Reverend Krueger the House Chaplain."

Rev. Krueger: "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, Amen. Oh, Lord bless this Special Session to Thy service this day."



I have been asked to say a special prayer for a former Speaker of this House, Jack Walker. Let us pray. Oh Almighty God who art the giver of all health and the aid of them that turn to Thee for succor we entreat Thy strength and goodness in behalf of Thy servant Jack, that his weakness being banished, he may be healed of his infirmities to Thine honor and glory through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. It was Confucious who said, "He who governs by moral excellence may be compared to the pole star which keeps its place while all other stars bow toward it." Let us pray. Almighty God we beseech You to look upon this House of Representatives, God that every member of it may be taught and guided of Thee. Bless the constituents in the Districts of each of them. Thou knowest there are several necessities. Posture every effort that is made for the advancement and betterment of life in this State that aids in the creation of Thy kingdom through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

Speaker Redmond: "Roll Call for attendance. Representative Shea."

Shea: "With leave of the House, Mr. Speaker, I move that the Roll Call for attendance of the First Special Session be the same as the Roll Call for the Regular Session."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection. Hearing none, the Roll Call of the Regular Session will be used for the Roll Call for the First Special Session. Representative Shea."

Shea: "I'll hold that for a moment. Is Mr. Washburn on the Floor, do you know?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Washburn on the Floor? Do you have any excused absences Mr. Shea?"

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Speaker, could the Journal show that Representative Mann is excused due to an illness in his family and that Representative Greiman is excused because he is ill."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections. Hearing none, the record will so show. Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, will the journal show that Representative Choate be excused for personal reasons."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Hearing none, the journal will so show. Choate. Representative Vitek, do you seek recognition."

Vitek: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to have the attention of the Members of the House."



Speaker Redmond: "Will you give the gentleman attention, please."

Vitek: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I just got good news from my former seat mate, Congressman Fary. He just recovered from his third operation and he hopes that he will be discharged from the hospital day after tomorrow, and he asks for your prayers."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider, do you seek recognition?"

Schneider: "On the calendar, Mr. Speaker, there is a motion on House Bill 3147, which was for a motion to by-pass committee. We heard that Bill in committee this morning so there is no longer any need for the motion and I would ask leave to table that motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Which Session are you talking about? I think you are in."

Schneider: "Are you in the Special Session."

Speaker Redmond: "We are in the first Special Session."

Schneider: "Sorry, I'll get back to you later."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. The House will be at ease for five minutes. The House will be in order First Special Session. Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. So that the House Members may have some idea of where we are going in the next day or so I would like to say that we have talked to the Republican Leadership and for today at the adjournment of the First Special Session it will be adjourned until 9:45 tomorrow morning. At the end of today's regular session, that will be adjourned until 9:30 tomorrow morning. The Second Special Session when it is called will be recessed until after the regular session and then we will come in at 10:00 tomorrow morning. On the Third Special Session at 2:30 we will call it, organize it, there will be introduction of Bills and then be adjourned until 10:15 in the morning. So if there is any question I hope that gives you some type of what we are about here. We will try to have the motions filed on all of the veto messages that are over from the Senate so that we may call them at the earliest practicable time and we hope that we will take care of our business in the morning so that if we have our afternoons free you can do the things that are necessary while you are in Springfield. So, Mr. Speaker, I would move that the First Special Session now stand adjourned until 9:45 a.m. tomorrow morning."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, I do have something on Second Reading and I would like



to move it to Third."

Speaker Redmond: "Would you state that again? I didn't..."

Jaffe: "I do have something on second in the first Special Session and I would like to move it to Third. It's on the Calendar, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection to moving House Bill 4 to Third Reading? No Amendments, is this the one with Amendments, Mr. Clerk?"

Jaffe: "Yes, this has an Amendment. All the Amendment does and it's been distributed now, Mr. Speaker, does that this Amendatory Act takes affect upon becoming law."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, let's go to the order of House Bills, Second Reading then. On House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 4, Representative Jaffe."

Jack O'Brien: "House..."

Speaker Redmond: "Read the Amendment, Mr. Clerk."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 4. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Jaffe. Amends House Bill #4, First Special Session, on page 18 by inserting after line 8 the following. Section 2, this Amendatory Act takes effect upon its becoming law."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "I move for its adoption, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 4. All in favor of the adoption indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Now we're ready for the... Representative Shea's motion."

Shea: "Are we all set with Jaffe's Bill, Mr. Jaffe's Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "I think so, yes."

Shea: "All right, then I move that we now stand adjourned until 9:45 a.m. tomorrow morning for the First Special Session."

Speaker Redmond: "You've heard the motion. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The First Special Session stands in adjournment until 9:45 a.m. tomorrow morning."



Representative Giorgi, do you seek recognition?"

Giorgi: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, ah... we have some distinguished guests in the gallery to my right from ah... Wyvetter Younge's District, a Myrtle Officer, Carl Officer, Francis Turell and Melvin Green and they all belong to the National Association of Funeral Directors and I wish they'd stand to be recognized."

Bradley: "The hour of 2:30 having arrived, the Third Special Session of the 79th General Assembly will come to order and we'll have the prayer at this time. We'll now have the prayer."

Reverend Krueger: "In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, Amen. Bless, Oh Lord, this Special Session to Thy service this day. I've been asked to pray for Nelson Fox, who is a patient at the University Hospital in Maryland and is in very critical condition. Watch over Thy servant, Nelson Fox, Oh Lord and those who administer to him of Thy healing gifts. As he diminishes of strength of body, may he grow in an abiding sense of Thy comfort and presence that will sustain him all the days of his life through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen. Otto VonBismark said history is simply a piece of paper covered with print. The main thing is still to make history, not to write it. Let us pray. Almighty God, we bless and praise Thee that we have wakened to the light of another earthly day and now we will thank and think of what a day should be. Our days are Thine, let them be spent for Thee. Our days are few, let them be spent with care. There are dire days behind us, forgive their sinfulness. There are dark days before us, strengthen us for their trials. We pray that You find on this day, the day which we call our own. Lord, we go to our daily work, help us to take pleasure therein. Show us clearly what our duty is. Help us to be faithful in doing it. That all we do, be done well, fit for Thine eye to see. Give us strength to do, patience to bear, that our courage never fails. When we cannot love our work, let us think of it as Thy task and by our true love of thee, make unlovely things shine in the light of Thy great love through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

Bradley: "The Clerk will read the Governor's proclamation."

Jack O'Brien: "Proclamation. Pursuant to Article IV, Section 5D of the Illinois Constitution of 1970. I hereby call and coavene a Special



Session of the 79th General Assembly to commence on November 18, 1975 at 2:30 o'clock p.m. for the purpose of consideration of legislation relating to: 1)The selection of delegates and alternate delegates to the national nominating conventions of political parties. 2)Changes to the formula of distribution aid to elementary and secondary school districts pursuant to Section 18-8 of the School Code and appropriations, therefore. Daniel Walker, Governor."

Bradley: "Roll Call for attendance. Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the Roll Call for attendance in the Third Special Session be the same as the Roll Call for attendance in the Regular Session."

Bradley: "You've heard the Gentleman's motion. All in favor say 'aye'; opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion is adopted and the Roll, the attendance Roll Call for the Regular Session will be used for the Third Special Session. Resolutions."

Jack O'Brien: "House Resolution 1, Third Special Session. Resolved as the temporary rules of the House of Representatives of the 79th General Assembly be adopted as the rules of this Third Special Session so far as the same may be applicable and that the Standing Committees of the House of the 79th General Assembly and their Membership shall constitute the Standing Committees of the House during the Third Special Session."

Bradley: "Mr. Shea, on the Resolution."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the House do now adopt House Resolution #1 in the Third Special Session of the 79th General Assembly."

Bradley: "The Gentleman moves that the House does adopt Resolution #1 in the Third Special Session of the General Assembly. All those in favor will signify by saying 'aye'; opposed by saying 'no' and the 'ayes' have it. The Resolution is adopted. Further Resolutions."

Jack O'Brien: "House Resolution #2, Third Special Session. Resolved that the Clerk inform the Senate that a majority of the Members of House have assembled pursuant to the proclamation of the Governor convening a Special Session of the General Assembly and are now ready for the transaction of business."

Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, the Majority Leader, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the House do now adopt House Resolution



#2 of the Third Special Session of the 79th General Assembly."

Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the House does adopt Resolution #2 in the Third Special session of the General Assembly. All those in favor will signify by saying 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Resolution is adopted. Further Resolutions."

Jack O'Brien: "House Resolution #3, Third Special Session. Resolved that the Journal Review Committee heretofore appointed by the Speaker pursuant to House Resolution 450 is authorized and directed to review and approve the Journals of this Third Special Session."

Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, the Majority Leader, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the House do now adopt House Resolution #3 of the Third Special Session of the 79th General Assembly."

Bradley: "The Gentleman moves that the House does adopt House Resolution #3 in the Third Special Session, Third Special Session of the General Assembly. All those in favor of the motion signify by saying 'aye', 'aye'; opposed 'nay'. The 'ayes' have it and the Resolution is adopted. Are there further Resolutions?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further Resolutions."

Bradley: "Introduction and First Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill #1, Third Special Session, Shea. A Bill for an Act to provide for the selection of delegates to the national nominating conventions for established political parties. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill #2, Third Special Session, Gene Hoffman. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. First Reading of the Bill."

Bradley: "Committee of Assignment of Bills. Introductions. Introduction, Bills."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill #3, Third Special Session, Washburn. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Election Code. First Reading of the Bill."

Bradley: "Further introductions? If not, the ah... Gentleman from Cook, the Majority Leader, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the Third Special Session of the House of Representatives now stand in adjournment until 10:15 a.m. tomorrow morning."

Bradley: "The Gentleman moves that the Third Special Session of the..."



Would you hold that for just a second? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Walsh. For what purpose do you rise, sir?"

Walsh: "I wondered if the Gentleman would hold that motion for introduction and First Reading of Bills."

Bradley: "The Gentleman yield, er... ah..."

Shea: "I held it until Mr. Washburn's Bill went in. Do you have another one?"

Walsh: "Yes, there's one more."

Shea: "How long before it will be here?"

Walsh: "Here now."

Shea: "Well, I will certainly hold it while ah..."

Bradley: "We'll hold the motion until the Bill is introduced."

Walsh: "Thank you."

Bradley: "Back to the introduction of First Reading. Mr. Walsh, have we got the Bill up here, sir? Introduction and First Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill #4, Third Special Session, Walsh, Hudson et al. A Bill for an act to amend Sections of the Election Code. First Reading of the Bill. No further introductions."

Bradley: "Further introductions. If not, back to the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea, on the motion."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the Third Special Session of the House of Representatives now stand adjourned until 10:15 a.m. tomorrow morning."

Bradley: "The Gentleman moves that the Third Special Session of the Illinois General Assembly does now stand adjourned until the hour of 10:15 tomorrow morning. All those in favor will say 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Third Special Session of the House of Representatives is, stands adjourned. The Second Special Session will reconvene at 3 o'clock. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Tell 'em we're at ease until 3 o'clock."

Bradley: "We're at ease till 3 o'clock."

Shea: "Thank you."

Bradley: "We'll come back to the Second Special Session at 3 o'clock."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order. The Members will please be in their seats. The Third, the Second Special Session of the



79th General Assembly will come to order. The Clerk will read the Governor's proclamation. We have, pardon me. Roll Call for attendance. Representative Shea, for the purpose of a motion."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the Roll Call on the Regular Session be the Roll Call of the Second Special Session of the 79th General Assembly this date."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Hearing none, it is so ordered. The Roll Call of the Regular Session will be used as the Roll Call of the Special Session. We'll be led in prayer now by the Reverend Krueger, the House Chaplain."

Reverend Krueger: "In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost. Amen. Lord, bless this Special Session to Thy service. Amen. Someone once said weeds and bad habits seem to be the only thing that grows with outside help, without outside help. Let us pray. We beseech Thee, Oh Lord, make us subject unto Thee with a ready will and evermore stir up our wills to make supplications under Thee that our Legislative efforts may be well pleasing in Thy sight, and good of, and for the good of the peoples of the State of Illinois through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

Speaker Redmond: "Committee Reports."

Jack O'Brien: "Mr. Fennessey from the Committee on Elections to which House Bill 1, Second Special Session was referred; reported the same back with Amendments thereto with the recommendation the Amendments be adopted and the Bill as amended do pass. Mr. Fennessey from the Committee on Elections to which House Bills 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of the Second Special Session were referred; reported the same back with the recommendation that the Bills do pass. Mr. Fennessey from the Committee on Elections to which House Bill 8, Second Special Session, was referred; reported the same back with the recommendation that the Bill do not pass. No further Committee Reports."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the Second Special Session now stand in adjournment until 10 o'clock a.m. tomorrow morning."

Speaker Redmond: "You've heard the motion. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Second Special Session stands in adjournment until 10 o'clock tomorrow



morning. At 3:30 we will be back in Regular Session, so... we stand... Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, are we going to ah... have any action on any of these vetoes at that time? Especially."

Speaker Redmond: "There are some of which the motions are on. We'll call those."

Maragos: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "We're at ease. The House will come to order, the hour of 3:30 having arrived. The order of ah... House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 3203. Representative Schneider."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3203. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Capitol Development Board Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Leon, do you seek recognition?"

Leon: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I have an announcement to make and I wish the Members of the General Assembly would pay attention. As you know that you had a flyer indicating that there would be an electronic fund transfer system demonstration tomorrow morning at 9:30 in Room 114. Due to the fact that the House is going to be in Session at 10 o'clock, I received assurance that sometime between 9:30 and 12:30, we will have an hour and the demonstration will take place when the House is at ease. Thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider, do you have a motion?"

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Yes, sir. Ah... Once more on this motion, I believe I'm in the right Session, House Bill 3147 did have a motion to ah... place that legislation on Second Reading, Second Legislative Day. Since the Bill has been reported out of the Committee and will be read right after this, I would move that that motion be tabled ah... with leave of the House."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Hearing none, the motion on House Bill 3147 is tabled. Introduction First Reading. Representative VanDuyne, for what purpose do you rise?"

VanDuyne: "Mr. Speaker, I rise to correct the ah... the Calendar here."



It says that ah... House Bill 3053 was ah... put on consideration postponed and I had leave of the House ah... last week to put this on the ah... hold this over to the Spring Calendar and I'd like to have that ah..."

Speaker Redmond: "Both of those Bills are on the Spring Calendar, I understand. Representative Geo-Karis, do you seek recognition?"

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, point of information. Did I understand earlier that the First Session is going to be started at 9:30 tomorrow morning?"

Speaker Redmond: "Right."

Geo-Karis: "So actually we'll be here from 9:30 on, is that right, sir?"

Speaker Redmond: "Correct."

Geo-Karis: "Thank you, sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this is an announcement regarding, this is in order to announce that the Revenue Committee will be meeting tomorrow morning at 8 a.m. in Room D1 in the State Office Building. It should be pointed out that the only business that's going to take any length of time and that should not be too long is the question of the Constitutional Amendment Resolution #35. The other matters will be discussion, but there'll be no hearings on the Se... the ah... House Bills and also there'll be Subcommittee reports, but I would like the Members of the Revenue Committee to think about when we want to meet to discuss the Constitutional Amendment and other matters before us, in December or January and rolls and coffee will be served at 8 a.m. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Introduction and First Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3205, Polk. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act in relation to the acquisition of the Illinois Mississippi Canal and the use of administration thereof as a State Park. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 3206, Polk et al. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act relating to alcoholic liquors. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 3207, Polk. A Bill for an Act to clarify the law in relation to State Parks. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 3208, Shea et al. A Bill for an Act to



amend Sections of the Specialized Living Centers Act. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 3209, Representative Kent et al. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act relating to acquisition and possession, transfer of firearms and firearm ammunition. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Committee Reports."

Jack O'Brien: "Mr. Schneider from the Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education to which House Bill 3147, 3197, and 3202 were referred; reported the same back with the recommendation that the Bills do pass."

Speaker Redmond: "The order of business, House Bills, Third Reading.

On House Bills, Third Reading appears House Bill 3131. Representative Giorgi in the chambers? Take that out of the record. 3154, Representative Taylor. Representative Taylor in the chamber? Take that out of the record. 3165, Representative Boyle. Is he in the chamber? Take it out of the record. 3162, Representative Skinner. Take that out of the record. 3163, Representative Tuerk."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3163. A Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the State Board of Education. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, House Bill 3163 is the result of a Bill that was vetoed by the Governor, reduced the appropriation. Most of you recall last spring I handled a Bill which appropriated \$186,000,000 for downstate and Chicago teachers retirement. The Governor saw fit to veto \$20,000,000 of that for ah... a number of reasons. One of which was that approximately eight and a half million of the amount was duplicative ah... in a couple of Senate Bills and since the time that that Bill was vetoed, we have gotten some additional information that there have been fewer teachers ah... retired downstate and as a result, in order to restore that portion of the funds to meet normal payouts for teachers retirement, we need a total of \$2.9 million and that's what this Bill is all about. It doesn't do anything about the unfunded liability of teachers pension. What this does is meet the normal payouts for the coming year and I would ask for your favorable support to the Bill."



Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 3163 pass. All in favor vote 'aye'. Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ah... Would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

Totten: "Representative Tuerk, now I'm working on analysis that shows that the figure for the Chicago Teachers Union should be \$644,000 rather than a million, six."

Tuerk: "That's correct. We took care of... We took care of that in an Amendment the other night."

Totten: "It has been amended to correct that?"

Tuerk: "Right."

Totten: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions? The question is shall House Bill 3163 pass. All in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 127 'aye' and no 'nay', and the Bill having received the Constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 3169."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3169. A Bill for an Act, Bill for an Act making certain appropriations of the State Board of Education. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, I'd ask leave to ah... have House Bill 3169 be returned to the order of Second Reading for purposes of an Amendment. The Amendment's been distributed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Hearing none, it will be returned to the order of Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendmen #1, Hanahan. Amends House Bill 3169 on page 7, line 3 and by inserting immediately after the period the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, the justification for Amendment #1 to 3169 is primarily that the Comptroller ah... requested this Amendment for the distribution of the Federal funds. Ah... the ah... This is specifically in the authority for vocational programs



conducted by local school districts in programs of consumer, home-making, work study as well as reimbursement for area vocational centers and community college equipment. The amounts requested are summarized as follows. Part B, \$1,068,225; Part F in the consumer and homemaking, \$792,127; and Part H on work study, \$89,700. These reimbursement claims exceeded the estimates as were appropriated in House Bill 2364 as well as the estimates contained in Senate Bill 431. Supplemental appropriations for fiscal 1975. Since neither of the fiscal year '75 appropriations provided for funds to be expended in the excess of appropriations, these Federal funds could not be dispersed from the fiscal year '75 appropriation. I move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 3169. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. House Bill 3170."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3170. A Bill for an Act to make an appropriation to the State Scholarship Commission. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, ah... House Bill 3170 was requested originally by the State Scholarship Commission to appropriate \$3,400,000 for the loan guarantees for the uncollectable loans and for payments required by a Federal reinsurance agreement. Now there is some dissention on whether or not it should go this way or by court action ah... In reviewing this Act, I feel that the pursuing of the Bill to appropriate this money so that we do not have to enter into a court decision on ah... on guaranteeing these loans that were uncollectable or repayment of these loans ah... this is all Federal funds and not one cent of General Revenue money until I move to ah... ah... to ah... adopt House Bill 3170."

Speaker Redmond: "Any questions? Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Sponsor yield for a question? Ah... Representative Hanahan, how much of this is ah... for uncollectable loans, do you know?"



Hanahan: "How much is... Pardon me."

Totten: "How much of the total dollars is for uncollectable loans, do you know?"

Hanahan: "I, I have no information on how much is uncollectable, but the \$3,400,000 is the amount the Federal government is reimbursing the State for. So I imagine it must be in that neighborhood."

Totten: "\$3,000,000 for uncollectable loans?"

Hanahan: "\$3,000,000 for... \$3,400,000, I believe is the uncollectable amount. That's the reason they requested that amount of money to expend in that area."

Totten: "Do you know what percent of the total number of loans that are made out that this would be?"

Hanahan: "I, I do not, sir. I'm sure the State Scholarship Commission could forward that information. I, I just am not privy to it right here."

Totten: "All right, thank you."

Hanahan: "I know it's scandalous whatever..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

Geo-Karis: "I ah... I'm looking for the Bill and I don't have it. Are we supposed to have that Bill on our desks?"

Hanahan: "Yes, they were distributed a couple weeks ago."

Geo-Karis: "That I don't have; but anyhow, Tom, could you just give me brief, just exactly what is the essence of your Bill. I don't quite follow you, your explanation earlier."

Hanahan: "It's an Act of making an appropriation to the State Scholarship Fund for \$3,400,000 for as much thereof as may be necessary for the Student Loan Fund to the State Scholarship Commission for distribution as the result of guarantees of loans that are uncollectable and for payments required under a reinsurance agreement with the United States Commissioner of Education and that's verbatim right from the Bill. That's all the Bill does."

Geo-Karis: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions? Representative VanDuyne."

VanDuyne: "Ah... will the Sponsor yield for a question?"



Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

VanDuyne: "Mr. Hanahan, is this the same Bill that ah... we refused ah... back sometime in the summer session ah... where some of us ah... had the idea that it was ah... sort of another give-away where, where- in these people who had ah... ah... had been granted loans to ah... further their education and now since they are out of college and were unable to ah... become profitably employed in that field and consequently were ah... unable to repay the loan. So now I know that's not very good English, but is that the same Bill we're talking about here?"

Hanahan: "No, no, this Bill is strictly Federal funds. The Bill you're talking referred to ah... General Revenue fund. This is a Federal amount of money that is given to the State and we need either an Act of the Legislature or another ah... appropriate method. In the past, it's always been that the Comptroller just distributed this money without an Act of the Legislature. Federal money."

VanDuyne: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions? Representative Hanahan to close."

Hanahan: "I urge a favorable vote ah... so that these moneys could be properly expended."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall House Bill 3170 pass. All in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 107 'aye' and 7 'no', and the Bill having received the Constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3179."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3179. A Bill for an Act making a supplemental appropriation to the ordinary and contingent expense of the Dangerous Drug Commission. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D'Arco."

D'Arco: "Mr. Speaker, at this time, I would like to take the, the Bill back to Second Reading for purposes of an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objection? Hearing none, leave is granted. The Bill will on Second Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "Amendment #2, D'Arco. Amends House Bill 3179 as amended"



by deleting Section 2 and 3 and inserting in lieu thereof the following. Section 2, this Act takes effect upon its becoming a law."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D'Arco."

D'Arco: "What the Amendment does essentially is take out the \$200,000 of State money that is involved in this supplemental appropriation of Federal money so that on Third Reading, there will be no State moneys involved at all and I would appreciate a affirm... an affirmative vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 3179 pass. All in favor... No, pardon me. Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 3179. All in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Any further Amendments?"

Jack O'Brien: "No further Amndments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 3180."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3180. A Bill for an Act making a supplemental appropriation to the Joint Committee on Legislative Information Systems. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Well thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 3180 does just exactly what the synopsis states and it will appropriate \$30,000 to the Joint Committee on Legislative Information Systems for electronic data processing services to the Illinois General Assembly. The \$30,000 will lease an inner face of part of our machine ah... our votin machine that we have up in the, up above us that we all vote on and it will provide, it will take the Roll Call from the machine and put it into the computer ah... to enable the processing and the printing of the Journal and after the Roll Call has been printed in the Journal, I know that some people are concerned, the Roll Call will at that time be erased and we will still be able to change our votes and those vote changes will be made in the Clerk's office ah... and it has been considered that ah... there will be ah... a great time saving here. I understand that every evening it takes anywhere from two to five hours to manually ah... put our names on the, on the Roll Call and this will allow it to be done ah... electronically ah... and it was... Thank you, Mr. Speaker.



It was in the original ah... thinking ah... when we bought the new voting machines and it will certainly enable us to ah... print the Journal ah... and we... If you'll recall and you're knowledgeable about the fact that last year, we were quite a ways behind in printing the Journal ah... and this will certainly ah... make it a much more rapid process and ah... in the long run will save us ah... dollars and I ask for the, your favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

Cunningham: "Ah... Representative Bradley, is it not true that this obligates the Legislature in future years to expend a like amount, appropriate \$30,000 from now on till the end of time?"

Bradley: "Well, this is a lease, as you well know and it, it would ah... obligate us."

Cunningham: "You'll remember the discussion before the Appropriations I Committee. At that time, it was indicated by the Clerk that the savings by the new system was somewhat lessened by the pernicious habit of changing votes. Ah... is it not true that if that ah... practice were eliminated, that the savings would be as much as you anticipate."

Bradley: "I'm sure that you're very correct. If we could ah... change the rules of the House, the savings would take place. Yes, sir."

Cunningham: "Well, I'm going to vote for the Bill because the arguments seem reasonable, but I think the House should address itself to that ah... reasonable position following the Senate in the abolishing the changing of votes so our mechanism would work as we had planned."

Bradley: "The ah... the only savings to ah... is not ah... just in the savings we will have by ah... with the elimination of the changing of the vote. There will be a great deal of savings if we didn't have anybody changing their vote also."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield for a quick question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

Grotberg: "Ah... Representative Bradley, I have a question. I think



it's of immense concern for every Member of this Body and I spoke to the Speaker about it ah... not too long ago and he thought something could be done. Will this make it possible for us to instantaneously recapture our voting records, our individual voting records on the individual Bills? Is there any component in here that will lead to that?"

Bradley: "How instantaneous do you mean, sir?"


Grotberg: "Well, you, you call in now for your voting record and they have to go... They can't punch it out anywhere. They have to, they have to manually look up every Bill and go back to the Journal, to make a long story short. I'm doing a constituent letter this week and I wanted to check my voting record and it took longer to check that than it did to write the ah... report. Is there a component in here for remedying that?"

Bradley: "Well, the plans right now, from what I understand it is the machine will not be programed to check individual records on so... I would have to say right now the answer to your question is, no, this would not allow you to do it instantaneously."

Grotberg: "Well, Mr. Speaker, then may I address the Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Grotberg: "Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Mr. Speaker, I think in this electronic age with the millions and millions and millions of dollars that we are throwing away on gathering of information in the State of Illinois that the Sponsor should probably hold this Bill if we're going to have further session tomorrow if it's within the time frame, move it back to Second and maybe for another \$5,000, we could get some answers to our own very important record ah... that the people are digging up and reading about us and we have a hard time getting ourselves in a hurry. It seems to me that when we go into conference sessions on the late closing of the session, it's very difficult to keep track of the final action of Bill after Bill after Bill and to be able to recapture that information is almost more important than the subject matter that the ah... the Sponsor is dealing with now in my personal opinion; and Representative Bradley, I'd be happy to share with you conversation on that subject in hopes that we could gear this thing up now even for next spring



to be able to get to work on that if it's within the framework of this appropriation to do so. I'm not, it's not a bad appropriation. I suggesting... ah... Is now a good time to spend a couple more dollars and get it done right."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Ah... in answer, in response ah... Mr. Speaker, let me say this.

I think we have the ability with the, with this appropriation to do what you want done without having to go to Second Reading. It's my understanding that in the interests of, of some Members or in all of them, all the Members, that this is something that maybe we don't want to have done. Ah... You, I think we should think about that, but it... The machinery is already there with this appropriation to do what you're asking to do. I think that we get to work out the mechanics and I think that can be done ah... Representative Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions? The question is shall House Bill 3180 pass. All in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 126 'aye', 5 'no', and the Bill having received the Constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. 3186."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 31, 3186. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Illinois Law Enforcement Commission. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 3186 is a Bill which will provide an additional \$498,000 in Federal funds without one additional penny in General Revenue funds. That is no additional General Revenue funds would be made. Ah... It also has the effect of consolidating three of the present grants to the Department of Corrections under one grant to allow for more simplified handling of the grant by both E.O.C. and I.L.E.C. and the transferring of a small amount, \$6,480, from one youth services grant to another youth services grant to provide for a match and I would move a successful Roll Call."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

Maragos: "Representative Getty, will this Bill, will this appropriation be any way affected by the results of the ah... Senate Bill 32?"

Getty: "Well, no more so than the entire appropriation dialect may or may not be affected."

Maragos: "In other words..."

Getty: "There's no direct relationship."

Maragos: "All right, that's what I wanted. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further, any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 318... Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

Totten: "When this Bill was before the Appropriations Committee, we did ask ah... whether these additional moneys which would go into certain programs ah... we could expect them to continue ah... being appropriated or provided for by the Federal government or whether the State may expect these grants to expire this year, next year, three years; and what the fiscal implications may be in the future for the State fully funding these programs. Those ques... Those answers were ah... supposed to be forthcoming and we never did receive them and I wondered whether you have ah... answers to those questions, specifically whether the State may have to pick up full funding of these programs in the near future."

Getty: "Representative Totten, ah.. in specific answer to your question, I have no additional information to give you. Ah... I think the question is one that can be addressed to any L.E.A.A. money as to how long the Federal government intends to continue ah... funding it."

Totten: "Well, okay as I may speak to the Bill then, Mr. Speaker. It seems that the, the question that may be before us is to whether we should be willing to accept Federal moneys without the knowledge as to whether we'll be picking up State funds and the implications on our own State budget which now requires us, 22% of our State moneys



are for matching Federal funds right now. Ah... I don't know whether this is matching, but we've also had to on many occasions pick up programs where the Federal government has decided to get out of funding them and the implications to us especially at this time are something that I think the Members of the General Assembly ah... should consider ah... when we're looking at appropriations that come to us ah... under the guise of Federal money only, it's free. Ah... Tomorrow it may be all State money ah... and that's ah... certainly one that is, something that we've got to be concerned about at this time. So I haven't got the answers to this and I'd really just like to hold off. I'm not going to vote 'aye' on this until I have those answers."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in response to Representative Totten, there was a letter that was presented to the Committee and I sent it to your staff down and maybe you've not had an opportunity to read it, but the Director did respond to the questions in Committee and in turn it was his understanding that there was no word coming from ah... Washington as far as termination of these funds for the next coming year and in turn I don't see any jeopardy of passing this Bill at this time because the Director did respond to all questions in Committee and that was one of the major questions. I'm sorry if you haven't had an opportunity to read his reply. I think it was a two-page letter, Don; but I'm sure that your staff has it."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative Getty, to close."

Getty: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'll point out again that there are no additional General Revenue funds. This is \$498,000 in Federal money which the State would lose if ah... this Bill is not passed and I would move ah... that it be passed."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall House Bill 3186 pass. All in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 117 'aye' and no 'nay' and the Bill having received the requisite majority is hereby declared passed. 3187."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3187. A Bill for an Act making an



appropriation to the Capitol Development Board and amending Sections of an Act making an appropriation to the Capitol Development Board.
Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Londrigan."

Londrigan: "Mr. Speaker, this appropriates \$405,000 from the Capitol Development Bond Fund to to the Capitol Development Board for land acquisition to expand the State Police Training facilities. A similar Bill was passed out of the House before and sent to the Governor taking this money out of the Road Fund. It was thought more appropriate to take it out of the Capitol Development Bond Fund so we're coming back with this similar Bill and we ask your approval."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

Cunningham: "Representative Londrigan, when this was before Committee, I believe you said there were how many acres, 100? Is that correct?"

Londrigan: "No, that's not correct, but I don't remember off hand how many acres there was. I'm, I'm not sure how many acres there was."

Cunningham: "You don't have the acreage. Well, let me speak to the Bill just for a moment. I've looked into this just a little and this is a Bill that ought to come under the heading of austerity in saving the taxpayers buck. My recollection was it was 100 acres. If it's any less than 100, why the price becomes prohibitive. That would be in excess of \$4,000 an acre. At the present time, the Police Academy has 18.64 acres down there. They've gotten along quite well for a dozen years with that number of acreage, but all at once bureaucracy is beginning to grow and their plan is to add 9 more employees, their plan is to spend with, by 1978, an additional \$1,372,864 and they're going to construct additional buildings and the building will have 21,168 square feet. We not only will have the best State Police force on earth, but we'll have by far the largest, but the danger to the taxpayers is this. This was well said by Governor Brown of California that the difficulty is that government never goes broke. Bureaucracy just gets bigger and bigger and bigger as it grows along. And it's time somewhere along to blow the whistle. We add one more State installation to Sangamon



County and it'll sink the entire County. At this time when many of us have State Police installations in our own districts that are being moved or cut back and I'm referring to 12A at this time in Albion in the 54th District. It's a poor time to expand the, the State's already considerable investment in State Police ah... hardware and showplace here in Sangamon County, but the clincher in this matter, Representative Londrigan, is that on the tax records downtown here you'll find that this acreage is only on the books for \$108,700. Now since we are by law, we're within by law required to have it on at 50%, it would seem that your appraisers to the contra-notwithstanding that your price is just twice too high. I doubt that there are any here who'd, who believe it for a moment that Law Enforcement would... Your noise is bothering me, Speaker. I doubt that there are any here who believe for a moment that the Law Enforcement would be in any way jeopardized by postponing this unnecessary expense and I assure you by all that's holy that the taxpayers would be grateful if you'd put off this waste until another year. If it only gets one 'no' vote, it'll be mine."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Will Representative Londrigan yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he'll yield."

Kosinski: "Representative Londrigan, I think Mr. Cunningham has thoroughly confused me. It's my understanding that this body has already passed this action and this Bill essentially remove... takes the action out of the road fund and puts it in the Capitol Development Board where it belongs, isn't that correct?"

Londrigan: "You're absolutely right. We've been through this before and it passed out of there without any question whatsoever to all the Committees in the whole system."

Kosinski: "If I may address the ah..."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Kosinski: "Well, on the base of that, I see nothing wrong with this Capitol Development Board action and I would very heartily recommend we go along. I understand that two years there will be Federal money for development of this acreage ah... to the ah... as an additional facility to that Department and I will vote 'yes.'"



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield to a question or two?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes."

Lechowicz: "Could you tell me when this state started the proposal as far as the initial action and the purchase of this land?"

Londrigan: "In the late '60's."

Lechowicz: "Would that be '68 or '69?"

Londrigan: "Yes."

Lechowicz: "And the Department made an agreement with these people at that time for the purchase price of \$405,000 in '68 or '69?"

Londrigan: "No, the agreement price was finally this year."

Lechowicz: "Could you kindly tell the House what transpired between '68 and '69 to 1975 on the same parcel?"

Londrigan: "Governor Ogilvie approved this and Governor Walker would not release the funds."

Lechowicz: "Governor Walker was elected in '73, wasn't it?"

Londrigan: "Well, whenever the chronological order came. The only thing I know is I was told that Governor Ogilvie approved it and ah... Walker would not release the funds at that time."

Lechowicz: "Well, if that was true, Jim, from '68 to '72 is the entire term of the Governor Ogilvie's administration. '72 to '75 is just about the term of the present administration and I'd like to know why there is an immediate need for this parcel of a hundred and some acres that the State has been looking for the past eight years?"

Londrigan: "This came about in the last part of Governor Ogilvie's administration and then money wasn't spent by Governor Walker."

Lechowicz: "And could you tell us who the interested parties in this parcel?"

Londrigan: "Yes, I think the Members of the Committee were supposed to be furnished with this information. I will get it for you here in a minute. It's Hunting Meadows Inc. It's a corporation and they are honey... Huntington, Hunting Meadows Inc., or David M. Willford, Edward Teribeldi, Del Schroeyer and Virginia Heron and Johan Hamil."

Lechowicz: "Are those the directors or the shareholders?"

Londrigan: "My information, they are the directos and shareholders."



Lechowicz: "In total?"

Londrigan: "Yes."

Lechowicz: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Gene Hoffman."

G.L. Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Indicates he will."

G.L. Hoffman: "What is the total amount of the acreage involved?"

Londrigan: "105 acres."

G.L. Hoffman: "105 acres."

Londrigan: "It was appraised for \$420,000."

G.L. Hoffman: "Appraised for \$420,000. How many appraisals were there?"

Londrigan: "One."

G.L. Hoffman: "One appraisal. Is this ah... This then, I must assume, is the going, going price ah... \$40,000 an acre for comparable property?"

Londrigan: "I don't think 40 is the correct figure, but ah... there is 4,000 is a more... I mean, 4,000. This is a comparable appraisal. It all depends on where we're talking about. This is the only property available next to the present State Police facility. That's where the property is located. This is their only piece of land that can be obtained to make this expansion."

G.L. Hoffman: "Fine, thank you very much."

Speaker Redmond: "Any other questions? Representative Londrigan, to close."

Londrigan: "Mr. Speaker, as indicated, we're not doing anything here but actually transferring the money from a different appropriation to the Capitol Bond Development Board from the road fund. Previous legislation not handled by me. I don't know who handled by in our session. This Bill came out of the House and out of the Senate without any question, without any problems and I ask for the same vote now to approve this facility so that the State Police can expand this facility and the only place available out there by Lake Springfield. I ask for your favorable vote."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall House Bill 3187 pass. All in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished?

All voted who wished? Representative Walsh, do you seek recog...



Have all voted who wished? Representative Shea."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I know there's some confusion over this, but I wonder about some of my colleagues that this Bill is already law. They've got the money to purchase this land now with some of the present money have and that money would come out of the road fund. With the passage of this Bill, the money would then come out of the Capitol Development Bond Fund and there'd be an extra \$405,000 in the road fund to spend on roads. So what I can't understand is everybody crying that we need money in the road fund and we need to spend money more and more money on roads, particularly in downstate Illinois and when you have a change to utilize money out of the Capitol Development Bond Fund and to save almost a half a million dollars for building roads, the people from downstate Illinois are voting against this measure. I don't understand that vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the last speaker couldn't of been 'wronger' if he'd tried. The Governor said that he would not take the money out of the road fund and he said if you want this ah... new monument, you have to go get out of the Capitol Bond Fund. And for you to stand on this floor and tell the Members of this Legislature otherwise is either willful or malicious. Now it's not a question whatever in this case of the money being available. It's not a fait accompli. You're raiding the Treasure now when you vote green. If you're red, you're right and stand firm."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen, in explaining my vote, I, I think there may be some confusion in some of the Members minds as to the value of this land. Farm land, just farm land alone in this general area is selling in the area of \$2,000 to \$2,600 an acre. This land lays immediately south of this, as I understand it, of the State Police Headquarters and along the east side of Interstate 55 just south of Lake Springfield which puts it in an area in which the land has an unusual value. Its land, too, that has a specific and unusual value to the State Police for the purposes of this facility.



So I really don't think that the price of this land in consideration of just pure, bare farmland prices in this area and the location of this land is at all unconscionable. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman. Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, may I explain my vote. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, it is my understanding that we have already spent this money out of the road fund no matter what action occurs here; but if, if we pass House Bill 3187, instead of utilizing road fund money which is part of the general fund, we will transfer this indebtedness to a bonding situation under C.D.B. I think this is a distinct advantage to the general fund and to the road fund and it's on that premise that I base my vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? Representative Londrigan."

Londrigan: "In explanation of my vote, as indicated, this money is already been appropriated from the road fund. All of us who are interested in seeing that our money stays in a road fund should favor this vote and that we are now changing it and we are putting it out of the Capitol Development Bond Fund. This means that the road fund will gain \$405,000. Now this parcel of land is one of a kind. Outside the State Police facility, south of Lake Springfield Bridge. We have this opportunity to buy it now under an agreement and agreed price. If we lose the opportunity now, if we have it again in the future, it's going to cost much more. It's an opportunity to buy the facility at a reasonable time and to give the land owners who have been waiting eight years on this valuable piece of property to know what we are going to do. If we don't do it now, it's the difference of doing it ourselves or of renting. If we rent facilities, it's going to be rental facilities and money out of our pocket one way or another. I, this has been approved by the House and Senate one time and I believe we should have this same approval again today and I encourage you to vote 'aye'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, the issue before is not whether there be land acquired for the expansion of the Police



Training Academy facilities near Springfield. We've already approved that. The question before us today is out of which fund the \$405,000 will come. Now the distinguished Majority Leader suggested by the passage of this Bill there will be an additional \$405,000 for road construction. Well I suggest to you there's a reverse side of that coin. By the passage of this Bill, there will be \$405,000 less for community college buildings, for mental health buildings, for criminal correction buildings, criminal rehabilitation, for higher education buildings, etc. And it seems to me, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, we should directly relate Police Training Academy facilities to roads and that's where the appropriation should be from and, therefore, I suggest that we both know nothing against the training facility, but vote 'no' to insure that there's adequate funds for these other facilities for the promotion of the ah... health, welfare, and morals of the people of the State."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. Representative Londrigan."

Londrigan: "Would you poll the absentees."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has requested a poll of the absentees. Mr. Clerk, will you poll the absentees."

Jack O'Brien: "Arnell, Bluthardt, Caldwell, Choate, Ewell, Gaines, Hirschfeld, Ron Hoffman, Jaffe, Kucharski, Lundy, McAuliffe, McMaster, Meyer, Palmer, Polk, Porter, Randolph, Rose, Sangmeister, Satterthwaite, Schneider, Sevcik, Stearney, VonBoeckman, Washington, Yourell."

Speaker Redmond: "No changes after the ah... Representative Yourell. Representative Yourell is 'aye'. Representative Merlo."

Merlo: "How am I recorded, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "How is the Gentleman recorded?"

Jack O'Brien: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'present'."

Merlo: "Would you change that to 'aye', please."

Speaker Redmond: "Change the Gentleman to 'aye'. Anything further. Clerk will take the record. Representative Londrigan."

Londrigan: "I'll ask for postponed consideration."

Speaker Redmond: "Postponed consideration. 3131. Representative Giorgi."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3131. A Bill for an Act to provide supplemental appropriation for the ordinary and contingent expense of the



Department of Labor. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, House Bill 3131 is the supplemental appropriation to keep the Unemployment Compensation Office going for the rest of the fiscal year and all these \$24,000,000 are from Federal funds. They're payable from the Federal Title Tree Social Security Employment Service Fund and from the Title Tree Social Security and Employment Service Fund and this had a full hearing in the Appropriations Committee and I appreciate your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 3131 pass. All in favor vote 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. All voted who wished? All voted who wished? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 131 'aye', no 'nay'. The Bill having received the requisite majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 3145, Representative Taylor."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3154. A Bill for an Act provide for the payment of awards through the court of claims under the Crime Victims Compensation Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Taylor."

Taylor: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 3154 is a supplemental appropriation for the court of claims of \$750,000 for awards of, of violent crimes under the Crime Victim Compensation Act. I solicit your support for this Bill since it has had a full hearing with the Appropriation Committee and the Bill came out of Appropriation Committee 13 to 1. I solicit your 'aye' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Any questions? Any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 3154 pass. All in favor indicate by voting 'aye'; opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 12... 131 'aye', 1 'no'. The Bill having received the requisite majority is hereby declared passed. 3156. Representative Boyle. Stubblefield 'aye'."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3156. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Board of Vocational Rehabilitation. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Boyle, in the chambers? Take it out



of the record. House Bill 3162."

O'Brien: "House Bill 3162, A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to create a Legislative Council, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "This is the Bill that would allow the Legislative Council, in fact, authorize the Legislative Council to do printing for Legislators if the Legislators think it is of need in their District. It further strengthens the prohibition of the Department to do partisan work in fact it absolutely prohibits it. I would ask for your favorable consideration of this Bill, and more than that if you know a State Senator who you might be able to get through to, its got to get considered this week or else we're not going to have stationary for Christmas."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Schlickman: "I noticed in Section 201, line 13 on page 1 of the Bill you used the word non-partisan but on in Section 202 on line 21 you will use the word non-political, and I am wondering if a difference between non-partisan and non-political was intended and if so what that distinction is?"

Skinner: "Well, let me take you through my through prefaces as muddled as they may be. I had non-political in Section 201 and it occurred to me that virtually anything having to do with the expenditure of money is political and so I said gee whiz virtually everything the Legislature does has something to do with that and that's a pretty stupid word to put in there. So I changed it to non-partisan. Now in Section 202, I'm not even sure I focus in on it. What I have in mind specifically to prohibit is the reason that this Bill has been introduced today and that is that one member of the Legislature apparently slipped into his News Letter a request for funds to something that apparently was a political fund raising committee but was used to operate his office and I intended specifically to prohibit anything that would be anything remotely similar to that."

Schlickman: "Referring to, was that for me Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "I think it was for your side of the aisle. Representative Schlickman."



Schlickman: "May I proceed, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "You may."

Schlickman: "Referring you to Section 202 lines 20 and 21, you've got the phrase "But you shall not be limited to", now let me inquire as to what limitation if any then there is contained in this Bill with respect to legislative services either of a non-partisan or non-political nature."

Skinner: "Okay, the limitation was put in there before I even thought about putting in the word non-political and should be construed if anybody wants to take this to court, but shall not be limited to the preparation and printing materials that the Members themselves consider necessary. That is what I may consider necessary in my District may not be what you consider necessary in your District or what a Leadership Committee or a Sub-Committee of a Legislative Council that might screen various types of material might be considered necessary. For instance Ralph Dunn at one point had some post cards prepared that were to be handed out widely I think while he was at a County Fair that asked for people's ideas on Legislation and it was a post card addressed to his Legislative Office in wherever it is and something like that is not clearly a News Letter but it is certainly a material that he would consider necessary for keeping in touch with his Constituents. So I certainly, perhaps we ought to ask the Senate just to take the word non-political out that might make it clearer and I certainly would be more than willing to do that if you think that would be necessary."

Schlickman: "I have one more question if I may, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Schlickman: "Does this Bill have the support of the Legislative Council?"

Skinner: "Frankly I have no idea. They didn't ask us when whether we wanted to have printing presses turned off and I haven't asked them whether they want to turn them back on, and I think they should have asked us."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schlickman. Give the Gentleman attention please."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, as some if not all of us know, the Legislative Council service to the Members has become restricted. Now my understanding is that that restriction is not due to any policy-making decision of the Council but rather due to an opinion from the Attorney General's Office. It would seem to me Mr. Speaker, Members of



the House that before we impose upon statutorily a duty on the Legislative Council that number one we should be concerned about that Attorney General's position, ah, opinion. Number two we should consult with the Legislative Council whom we appointed to govern the activities of the staff of the Council and finally Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, it seems to me that by this Bill with the words non-partisan, non-political apparently in contradiction or perhaps complimentary we don't know and also with the phrase but shall not be limited to, we're simply going to compound what apparently is a compounded, further compound a situation that is already compounded which is evident by the Attorney General's opinion and therefore with some regret and with sympathy for the Sponsor's objective in this Bill I'm going to vote no."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hudson."

Hudson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield for a question or two?"

Speaker Redmond: "He says he will."

Hudson: "Cal, I'm a little bit confused in my own mind here. I notice in Section 201, it indicates that the Council may make and collect reasonable charges for such services and so forth. That I understand, now we get to Section 202, does the charge aspect apply to the Members of the General Assembly?"

Skinner: "My intent is that the Legislative Service Unit should continue charging the Members as they have in the past, which is for materials."

Hudson: "Okay, so there would be a fee attached to any demands levied on the Council by the Members."

Skinner: "That is not quite correct. There would be, the Legislative Council would be empowered to charge for the cost for things like paper. The running, the basic materials that if they supply the basic material."

Hudson: "Well then, one more question then, if I may, Cal, and that is I'm somewhat puzzled by the preparation and printing of non-political materials that Members consider necessary to the performance of their Legislative duties. That is not to be construed as what they consider necessary to be re-elected, would it?"

Skinner: "You're darn right it's not. This is certainly not suppose to be a printing press for campaign materials. That in deed is why the word political is in there. You know anything a State Legislator does



in the performance of his official duties is political. Any way you cut it and yet what I'm trying to say is that I sure don't want the Legislative Council printing anything that has to do with a campaign. That is probable as far as I am concerned. Now this may be clumsily worded and if anyone would come up with any better wording I would be happy to attempt to do something over in the Senate, but if we're going to get this thing, get mundane little things like envelopes which I ran out of about two months ago or stationary which I won't run out of until next June or July, this thing has got to get passed this week and I apologize for any defects that you may sense."

Hudson: "Is that the kind of thing you are talking about? Envelopes and stationary."

Skinner: "Among other things. I'm also thinking about News Letters, for instance, for materials for instance, I had a I think there was a AP picture that was of my self that I wanted to have blown up and they have the ability to blow something like that up, that's a material, it's not clearly something they print, though. I would hope that eventually they would be able to provide more sophisticated graphic services than they do now. For instance, I don't think we ought to have to depend on clipping the State Budget apart in order to run a demonstration of where the State money goes. I think the Legislative Service Bureau ought to have the type of craftsman or women as the case may be that would be able to do that, craftsperson, craftyperson."

Hudson: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion. Representative Skinner to close."

Skinner: "Well, I think the issue..."

Speaker Redmond: Representative Lechowicz, Pardon me Representative Skinner."

Lechowicz: "I'm sorry Cal, would you respond to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Lechowicz: "Cal, if I understand the input of your Bill is to provide the services that the Legislative Reference Bureau provided to the Members of this General Assembly before the Attorney General's opinion."

Skinner: "Not the Reference Bureau, the Legislative Council."

Lechowicz: "The Legislative Council."

Skinner: "And to give them the flexibility that if the Council decides that there is further services of a similar nature or a parallel nature that



they can do so. I don't want to just say they can print News Letters, they can print stationary, they can print envelopes, they can print post cards, because that would be a limitation on the Council's service and I think that the Council might decide later that they might want to expand it."

Lechowicz: "How would your Bill, if it is passed, work in conjunction with the memo that we received today."

Skinner: "Well, I guess I haven't seen the memo today, so I have no idea what it is."

Lechowicz: "Well, I see, they are establishing an approval system that either the Director or a person that he leaves in charge as far as before the item is printed."

Skinner: "I guess the Members of the Legislative Council must have figured out that the Membership of the General Assembly is serious and displeased with their actions. I think this is the way. This way started by the Legislative Council or someone on the Legislative Council asking a gratuitous question of the Attorney General and the Attorney General not answering well answering that specific question but adding a gratuitive remark which shut down the printing presses. Now if the Legislative Council had played this the way I would have played it or the way Congress has played it, they would have set up some type of a screening Committee for News Letters in the first place, when they found that one Member had misused the privilege and they would have slapped that Member on the wrist and said naughty, naughty, you shouldn't do that again and that Member would have said gee whiz I'm sorry, I quit, I didn't do it deliberately and we wouldn't even be here today, but I think at this point seeing the bad judgment in my opinion that the Legislative Council has used and the inconvenience that they have put the Membership we ought to make damm sure it doesn't happen again."

Lechowicz: "Well the only thing I want to point out there was more than one Member that made that mistake."

Skinner: "I'm not aware of that."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, may I speak in reference to the Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Lechowicz: "Unfortunately what was pointed out on this Floor is true, certain



members maybe because they didn't know about the process as far as the makeup of a News Letter and what can and cannot be within that News Letter used the Legislative Council for the publication of an item that was not really only the news as far as the action of the General Assembly but was for the self containment of that member, and also for asking of funds from people within the District for the re-election of that Member or Members. I see that the Attorney General's opinion was proper in fact I was surprised when I received the notice on it and I talked to the Chairman of the Council, Mr. Frank Ozinga and he in turn pointed out to me that unfortunately there were certain abuses that did transpire without the knowledge of the Council and they in turn requested an opinion from the Attorney General and that's the reason why it was given. I think that the Attorney General ruled properly. It's unfortunate some of the Membership made an error. I don't think that the entire Membership should be penalized because of the actions of a few. I think Cal Skinner has a proper approach and I think this Bill should pass."

Speaker Redmond: "Are you ready for the question? Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker will the Sponsor yield."

Speaker Redmond: "He indicated he will."

Griesheimer: "Cal, just a question, I do have a copy of the memo of November 10th from the Illinois Council, Legislative Council in front of me signed by Director Bill Hey."

Skinner: "November 10th?"

Griesheimer: "November 10th, 1975."

Skinner: "I've got one that says November 17th, I'm sorry, what does the one on November 10th say?"

Griesheimer: "It just sets out a policy, it says that in the future, all printing orders have to be submitted to them for screening and the question that this raises in my mind is what was the nature of the Attorney General's opinion. I thought there was a prohibition against any printing of any kind for Members. Does this imply that there is only a prohibition of political printing, because I don't see how the Legislative Council can screen anything when the Attorney General that in its opinion they can't print anything for Members."

Skinner: "That is a memo I am informed that was sent to Committees. Now I would, this brings up an entirely different aspect in considering the



Legislative's Council incredible judgment on this other matter of just shutting the printing presses off. Do you think they are saying that they are going to tell a Committee what report they can print and can't print."

Griesheimer: "No, this was not to Committee, it was sent to all Members of the Legislature."

Skinner: "Well, I've got one dated the 17th and this line jumps out of it. It says this does not change the policy regarding the type of printing we do. Which means that they are not going to print anything if we don't do something as far as I can figure out, unless you happen to be a Committee or a Commission."

Griesheimer: "I'm just trying to get to the point that we still need your Bill because of the Attorney General's opinion and that these letters are really not entities they really have no meaning whatsoever, then."

Skinner: "Frankly I don't see why they were written."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, to shed some light I hope on Representative Griesheimer's question. I just spoke to Bill Hey of the Council and the letter does mean that all that is done is to put in a new administrative procedure for screening. It does not mean that they can print our News Letters or stationary etc. So we would still need Representative Skinner's Bill if that is the will of the House in order to proceed with the services that they have previously given to us. I intend to support this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further questions? Representative Skinner to close."

Skinner: "I don't think we need any closing."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is shall House Bill 3162 pass. All in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have all voted who wish? Schneider aye. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question, there is 121 aye and 6 no and the Bill having received the requisite majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Catania aye. Shea aye. Collins aye. Messages from the Senate."

O'Brien: "A message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary. Mr. Speaker I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate passed the Bill of the following title, the passage which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House of Representatives to with Senate Bill 1518



passed by the Senate November 18, 1975, by a three fifths vote. Kenneth Wright, Secretary."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brandt."

Brandt: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the..."

Speaker Redmond: "Senate Bills First Reading, pardon me."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1518, A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act making a supplemental appropriation to the Space Needs Commission, First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brandt."

Brandt: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the, Members of the House, I would like to place Senate Bill 1518 on Second Reading, Second day without reference to the Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion, Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "May we have an explanation of what the Bill does?"

Brandt: "The Bill is removing a two and a half million dollar appropriation from the General Revenue Funds to place to the Space Needs Commission and transferring that amount in funds from the Capital Development Bond Fund to the Space Needs Commission for the purpose of purchasing property."

Schlickman: "So in this Bill we have a transfer of an appropriation from the General Revenue Fund to the Capitol Development Fund. What's the object of the appropriation."

Brandt: "In order to purchase property in the for the acquisition of real property within the areas bounded by College, Monroe, First, Adams Street and Third and Monroe, Second Street and Capitol Avenue in the City of Springfield."

Schlickman: "And this is an appropriation which has already been approved, but this is simply a transfer from one fund to another."

Brandt: "That's all it does."

Schlickman: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved that Senate Bill 1518 be placed on the order of Second Reading, Second Legislative Day without reference. All in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Hanahan, aye. Have all voted who wish? 107 votes. Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 114 aye, 5 no. The Motion carries. Representative Shea, Representative Berman, for what purpose do you rise?"

Berman: "Mr. Speaker, to make a Motion regarding two Bills."



Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Berman: "That were reported out of the House Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education Committee today, the report was read. The two Bills that are involved, one is by Representative Schneider, and Hoffman, House Bill 3197, and the other one is House Bill 3202 by myself. I would ask leave to waive the appropriate rules to advance those two Bills to the order of Second Reading Second Legislative Day so they can be read a second time today."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, referring specifically to Bill, House Bill 3202. This is really a rather complex Bill that deals with the school formula. We just worked on it in Committee today. I myself have sponsored an Amendment which I have filed with the Clerk. Which the Clerk now has in which he has not had time to distribute. If we are going to read this Bill today for Second Reading, Second Day, in fact it will be moved on to Third Reading and then I will not have an opportunity to hear my Amendment, nor will anybody else have an opportunity to offer an Amendment. Since it is a change in the school formula, which is rather serious and which did not come out of Committee unanimously because there were a few votes against it, I would object to the Gentleman's Motion at this time."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Berman."

Berman: "Well, Mr. Speaker, the purpose of the Motion was and I have indicated this to Representative Jaffe, who raised that question in Committee, that if it is read a Second Time today moved to Third that if his Amendment is ready tomorrow I will be glad to bring it back for consideration of his Amendment tomorrow."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, I have filed my Motion already and I think it will be ready tomorrow, however, I do think it would be unfair to the other Members of this body just to move it at this particular time because I think other people will have different thoughts on this particular Bill. It is a change in the school formula and I would just hate to see it go ahead at this particular time without having the Members of this House look it over for at least one day."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? It is going to be the position of the chair that we should have separate Roll Calls on this. So we will take



House Bill 3197 first and the Gentleman has moved that that be advanced to the order of Second Reading, Second Legislative Day without reference to Committee. I am in error it is just to suspend Rule 33A to, all in favor indicate by voting aye, opposed vote no, 89 votes on this one. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. Marovitz aye. Hanahan aye. Clerk will take the record. On this question 117 ayes, and 3 no. The Motion is carried. Now House Bill 3202, same Motion that Rule 33 be suspended. Representative Berman."

Berman: "I would ask leave for the same Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe objects. The question is on the Motion of Representative Berman, the Gentleman from Cook asking leave that Rule 33 be suspended so that House Bill 3202 be advanced to the order of Second Reading, Second Legislative Day, all in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have all voted who wish? 89 votes. Have all voted who wish? Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, you know I can see that the votes are up there and I really think that the Members of this body do not realize what we are doing. We are in fact changing the School Formula and I think that every year we come back here and we say, my God we shouldn't have done it last year, we committed ourselves to something that we should not have done last year. I think that if we are going to be responsible I think we ought to take this Bill and keep it on its regular order so that we can take a look at it for the next couple days and have those people who wish to offer amendments offer amendments at that particular time. I think at the present time if we just rush to take this thing and put it on Second Reading, Second Day you are going to find out that a week from now you are going to be very very sorry, because you will find that once again we have changed the school formula and once again we are going to be committed to something that no one really wants to be committed to and I would advise the Members of this House to look at this Bill rather closely and withhold their green votes at this time."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Gene Hoffman to explain his vote."

Gene Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, to explain my vote. Let me just say that we are merely suspending the Rules to move this Bill past First Day, Second Reading, the Sponsor has agreed to bring the Bill back from Second or from Third to Second for any consideration of



Amendments. I opposed this particular Bill in Committee but I do not oppose this Motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? On this question, there is 119 aye and 25 no, and the Motion carried. Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, just for the information of the Republican Members we did intend to hold a conference this afternoon but there were some complications, so there will be a Republican Conference tomorrow morning at the convenience of the Speaker and the procedures here."

Speaker Redmond: "I have been advised by the Parliamentarian that anyone who desires to file a Motion with respect to some of the vetoes or all of the vetoes that appear. They are all filed. I have been advised that they are all filed. Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker I move that the House now stand adjourned."

Speaker Redmond: "We've got a couple of Second Readings first Mr. Shea."

Shea: "All right."

Speaker Redmond: "Second Readings."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3202, a Bill for an Act to Amend the School Code Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the Floor."

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3197, A Bill for an Act..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to make note that on 3202 I have filed an Amendment and according to Mr. Berman we will bring it back tomorrow and I want that to be in the record and I would like to make evident to the fact that in fact we did file an Amendment to the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "The journal will so show."

Jack O'Brien: "The Amendment is filed."

Speaker Redmond: "3197."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 3197 a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code, Second Reading of the Bill, no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the Floor?"

Jack O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Shea."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce, do you seek recognition?"

Pierce: "Just for an announcement Mr. Speaker, because I know we have a lot of things on our desk. There is an important meeting at 8:00 a.m. tomorrow of the Committee on Environment Energy and Natural Resources where we will consider Representative Mudd's Resolution, Joint Resolution on the Rock Island Trail. I know that's very important to the Peoria area, so I just wanted to make sure that we have a quorum of the Committee. 8:00 a.m. in Room 118. That's the full Committee, Environment Energy, and Natural Resources. The Sub-Committee meeting of Energy is at 4:00 p.m. tomorrow."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Shea."

Shea: "One more time, I move that we do now stand adjourned until 9:30 a.m. tomorrow morning."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved that we now stand adjourned, all in favor of the Motion indicate by saying aye, opposed no. The ayes have it. We stand adjourned until 9:30 a.m. tomorrow morning."
