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AN ACT concerning health.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 2 represented in the General Assembly: 3

Section 5. The Food Handling Regulation Enforcement Act is 4 5 amended by changing Section 3 as follows:

(410 ILCS 625/3) (from Ch. 56 1/2, par. 333) 6

7 Sec. 3. Each food service establishment shall be under the operational supervision of a certified food service sanitation 8 9 manager in accordance with rules promulgated under this Act.

10 By July 1, 1990, the Director of the Department of Public Health in accordance with this Act, shall promulgate rules for 11 the education, examination, and certification of food service 12 13 establishment managers and instructors of the food service 14 sanitation manager certification education programs. Beginning January 1, 2018, any individual who has completed a minimum of 15 16 8 hours of Department-approved training for food service 17 sanitation manager certification, inclusive of the examination, and received a passing score on the examination 18 19 set by the certification exam provider accredited under 20 standards developed and adopted by the Conference for Food 21 Protection or its successor organization, shall be considered 22 to be a certified food service sanitation manager. Beginning January 1, 2018, any individual who has completed a minimum of 23

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8 hours of Department-approved training for food service 1 2 sanitation manager instructor certification, inclusive of the examination, and received a passing score on the examination 3 set by the certification exam provider accredited under 4 5 standards developed and adopted by the Conference for Food Protection or its successor organization, shall be considered 6 7 to be a certified food service sanitation manager instructor. Beginning July 1, 2014, any individual seeking a food service 8 9 sanitation manager certificate or a food service sanitation 10 manager instructor certificate must complete a minimum of 8 11 hours of Department-approved training, inclusive of the 12 examination, and receive a passing score on the examination set by the certification exam provider accredited under standards 13 developed and adopted by the Conference for Food Protection or 14 15 its successor organization. A food service sanitation manager 16 certificate and a food service sanitation manager instructor 17 certificate issued by the exam provider shall be valid for 5 years, unless revoked by the Department of Public Health, and 18 shall not be transferable from the individual to whom it was 19 issued. Beginning July 1, 2014, recertification for food 20 service sanitation manager certification shall be accomplished 21 22 by presenting evidence of completion of 8 hours of 23 Department-approved training, inclusive of the examination, and having received a passing score on the examination set by 24 25 the certification exam provider accredited under standards 26 developed and adopted by the Conference for Food Protection or

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1 its successor organization.

2 For purposes of certification and recertification for food service sanitation manager certification, the Department shall 3 accept only training approved by the Department 4 and 5 certification exams accredited under standards developed and adopted by the Conference for Food Protection or its successor. 6 The Department shall charge a fee of \$35 for each new and 7 8 renewed food service sanitation manager certificate and \$10 for 9 each replacement certificate. All fees collected under this 10 Section shall be deposited into the Food and Drug Safety Fund.

11 Any fee received by the Department under this Section that 12 is submitted for the renewal of an expired food service 13 sanitation manager certificate may be returned by the Director 14 after recording the receipt of the fee and the reason for its 15 return.

16 The Department shall award an Illinois certificate to 17 anyone presenting a valid certificate issued by another state, so long as the holder of the certificate provides proof of 18 having passed an examination accredited under standards 19 20 developed and adopted by the Conference for Food Protection or its successor. The \$35 issuance fee applies. The reciprocal 21 22 Illinois certificate shall expire on the same date as the 23 presented certificate. On or before the expiration date, the holder must have met the Illinois recertification requirements 24 in order to be reissued an Illinois certificate. Reciprocity is 25 26 only for individuals who have moved to or begun working in
