SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

35 ILCS 105/3-5
35 ILCS 110/3-5
35 ILCS 115/3-5
35 ILCS 120/2-5

Amends the Use Tax Act, the Service Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act, and the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. Reinstates an exemption for oil field exploration, drilling, and production equipment for the period beginning on July 1, 2017 and ending on June 30, 2022. Effective immediately.

2 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,**
3 **represented in the General Assembly:**

4 Section 5. The Use Tax Act is amended by changing Section
5 3-5 as follows:

6 (35 ILCS 105/3-5)

7 Sec. 3-5. Exemptions. Use of the following tangible
8 personal property is exempt from the tax imposed by this Act:

9 (1) Personal property purchased from a corporation,
10 society, association, foundation, institution, or
11 organization, other than a limited liability company, that is
12 organized and operated as a not-for-profit service enterprise
13 for the benefit of persons 65 years of age or older if the
14 personal property was not purchased by the enterprise for the
15 purpose of resale by the enterprise.

16 (2) Personal property purchased by a not-for-profit
17 Illinois county fair association for use in conducting,
18 operating, or promoting the county fair.

19 (3) Personal property purchased by a not-for-profit arts or
20 cultural organization that establishes, by proof required by
21 the Department by rule, that it has received an exemption under
22 Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and that is
23 organized and operated primarily for the presentation or

1 support of arts or cultural programming, activities, or
2 services. These organizations include, but are not limited to,
3 music and dramatic arts organizations such as symphony
4 orchestras and theatrical groups, arts and cultural service
5 organizations, local arts councils, visual arts organizations,
6 and media arts organizations. On and after the effective date
7 of this amendatory Act of the 92nd General Assembly, however,
8 an entity otherwise eligible for this exemption shall not make
9 tax-free purchases unless it has an active identification
10 number issued by the Department.

11 (4) Personal property purchased by a governmental body, by
12 a corporation, society, association, foundation, or
13 institution organized and operated exclusively for charitable,
14 religious, or educational purposes, or by a not-for-profit
15 corporation, society, association, foundation, institution, or
16 organization that has no compensated officers or employees and
17 that is organized and operated primarily for the recreation of
18 persons 55 years of age or older. A limited liability company
19 may qualify for the exemption under this paragraph only if the
20 limited liability company is organized and operated
21 exclusively for educational purposes. On and after July 1,
22 1987, however, no entity otherwise eligible for this exemption
23 shall make tax-free purchases unless it has an active exemption
24 identification number issued by the Department.

25 (5) Until July 1, 2003, a passenger car that is a
26 replacement vehicle to the extent that the purchase price of

1 the car is subject to the Replacement Vehicle Tax.

2 (6) Until July 1, 2003 and beginning again on September 1,
3 2004 through August 30, 2014, graphic arts machinery and
4 equipment, including repair and replacement parts, both new and
5 used, and including that manufactured on special order,
6 certified by the purchaser to be used primarily for graphic
7 arts production, and including machinery and equipment
8 purchased for lease. Equipment includes chemicals or chemicals
9 acting as catalysts but only if the chemicals or chemicals
10 acting as catalysts effect a direct and immediate change upon a
11 graphic arts product.

12 (7) Farm chemicals.

13 (8) Legal tender, currency, medallions, or gold or silver
14 coinage issued by the State of Illinois, the government of the
15 United States of America, or the government of any foreign
16 country, and bullion.

17 (9) Personal property purchased from a teacher-sponsored
18 student organization affiliated with an elementary or
19 secondary school located in Illinois.

20 (10) A motor vehicle that is used for automobile renting,
21 as defined in the Automobile Renting Occupation and Use Tax
22 Act.

23 (11) Farm machinery and equipment, both new and used,
24 including that manufactured on special order, certified by the
25 purchaser to be used primarily for production agriculture or
26 State or federal agricultural programs, including individual

1 replacement parts for the machinery and equipment, including
2 machinery and equipment purchased for lease, and including
3 implements of husbandry defined in Section 1-130 of the
4 Illinois Vehicle Code, farm machinery and agricultural
5 chemical and fertilizer spreaders, and nurse wagons required to
6 be registered under Section 3-809 of the Illinois Vehicle Code,
7 but excluding other motor vehicles required to be registered
8 under the Illinois Vehicle Code. Horticultural polyhouses or
9 hoop houses used for propagating, growing, or overwintering
10 plants shall be considered farm machinery and equipment under
11 this item (11). Agricultural chemical tender tanks and dry
12 boxes shall include units sold separately from a motor vehicle
13 required to be licensed and units sold mounted on a motor
14 vehicle required to be licensed if the selling price of the
15 tender is separately stated.

16 Farm machinery and equipment shall include precision
17 farming equipment that is installed or purchased to be
18 installed on farm machinery and equipment including, but not
19 limited to, tractors, harvesters, sprayers, planters, seeders,
20 or spreaders. Precision farming equipment includes, but is not
21 limited to, soil testing sensors, computers, monitors,
22 software, global positioning and mapping systems, and other
23 such equipment.

24 Farm machinery and equipment also includes computers,
25 sensors, software, and related equipment used primarily in the
26 computer-assisted operation of production agriculture

1 facilities, equipment, and activities such as, but not limited
2 to, the collection, monitoring, and correlation of animal and
3 crop data for the purpose of formulating animal diets and
4 agricultural chemicals. This item (11) is exempt from the
5 provisions of Section 3-90.

6 (12) Until June 30, 2013, fuel and petroleum products sold
7 to or used by an air common carrier, certified by the carrier
8 to be used for consumption, shipment, or storage in the conduct
9 of its business as an air common carrier, for a flight destined
10 for or returning from a location or locations outside the
11 United States without regard to previous or subsequent domestic
12 stopovers.

13 Beginning July 1, 2013, fuel and petroleum products sold to
14 or used by an air carrier, certified by the carrier to be used
15 for consumption, shipment, or storage in the conduct of its
16 business as an air common carrier, for a flight that (i) is
17 engaged in foreign trade or is engaged in trade between the
18 United States and any of its possessions and (ii) transports at
19 least one individual or package for hire from the city of
20 origination to the city of final destination on the same
21 aircraft, without regard to a change in the flight number of
22 that aircraft.

23 (13) Proceeds of mandatory service charges separately
24 stated on customers' bills for the purchase and consumption of
25 food and beverages purchased at retail from a retailer, to the
26 extent that the proceeds of the service charge are in fact

1 turned over as tips or as a substitute for tips to the
2 employees who participate directly in preparing, serving,
3 hosting or cleaning up the food or beverage function with
4 respect to which the service charge is imposed.

5 (14) Until July 1, 2003, and beginning again on July 1,
6 2017 and ending on June 30, 2022, oil field exploration,
7 drilling, and production equipment, including (i) rigs and
8 parts of rigs, rotary rigs, cable tool rigs, and workover rigs,
9 (ii) pipe and tubular goods, including casing and drill
10 strings, (iii) pumps and pump-jack units, (iv) storage tanks
11 and flow lines, (v) any individual replacement part for oil
12 field exploration, drilling, and production equipment, and
13 (vi) machinery and equipment purchased for lease; but excluding
14 motor vehicles required to be registered under the Illinois
15 Vehicle Code.

16 (15) Photoprocessing machinery and equipment, including
17 repair and replacement parts, both new and used, including that
18 manufactured on special order, certified by the purchaser to be
19 used primarily for photoprocessing, and including
20 photoprocessing machinery and equipment purchased for lease.

21 (16) Coal and aggregate exploration, mining, off-highway
22 hauling, processing, maintenance, and reclamation equipment,
23 including replacement parts and equipment, and including
24 equipment purchased for lease, but excluding motor vehicles
25 required to be registered under the Illinois Vehicle Code. The
26 changes made to this Section by Public Act 97-767 apply on and

1 after July 1, 2003, but no claim for credit or refund is
2 allowed on or after August 16, 2013 (the effective date of
3 Public Act 98-456) for such taxes paid during the period
4 beginning July 1, 2003 and ending on August 16, 2013 (the
5 effective date of Public Act 98-456).

6 (17) Until July 1, 2003, distillation machinery and
7 equipment, sold as a unit or kit, assembled or installed by the
8 retailer, certified by the user to be used only for the
9 production of ethyl alcohol that will be used for consumption
10 as motor fuel or as a component of motor fuel for the personal
11 use of the user, and not subject to sale or resale.

12 (18) Manufacturing and assembling machinery and equipment
13 used primarily in the process of manufacturing or assembling
14 tangible personal property for wholesale or retail sale or
15 lease, whether that sale or lease is made directly by the
16 manufacturer or by some other person, whether the materials
17 used in the process are owned by the manufacturer or some other
18 person, or whether that sale or lease is made apart from or as
19 an incident to the seller's engaging in the service occupation
20 of producing machines, tools, dies, jigs, patterns, gauges, or
21 other similar items of no commercial value on special order for
22 a particular purchaser. The exemption provided by this
23 paragraph (18) does not include machinery and equipment used in
24 (i) the generation of electricity for wholesale or retail sale;
25 (ii) the generation or treatment of natural or artificial gas
26 for wholesale or retail sale that is delivered to customers

1 through pipes, pipelines, or mains; or (iii) the treatment of
2 water for wholesale or retail sale that is delivered to
3 customers through pipes, pipelines, or mains. The provisions of
4 Public Act 98-583 are declaratory of existing law as to the
5 meaning and scope of this exemption.

6 (19) Personal property delivered to a purchaser or
7 purchaser's donee inside Illinois when the purchase order for
8 that personal property was received by a florist located
9 outside Illinois who has a florist located inside Illinois
10 deliver the personal property.

11 (20) Semen used for artificial insemination of livestock
12 for direct agricultural production.

13 (21) Horses, or interests in horses, registered with and
14 meeting the requirements of any of the Arabian Horse Club
15 Registry of America, Appaloosa Horse Club, American Quarter
16 Horse Association, United States Trotting Association, or
17 Jockey Club, as appropriate, used for purposes of breeding or
18 racing for prizes. This item (21) is exempt from the provisions
19 of Section 3-90, and the exemption provided for under this item
20 (21) applies for all periods beginning May 30, 1995, but no
21 claim for credit or refund is allowed on or after January 1,
22 2008 for such taxes paid during the period beginning May 30,
23 2000 and ending on January 1, 2008.

24 (22) Computers and communications equipment utilized for
25 any hospital purpose and equipment used in the diagnosis,
26 analysis, or treatment of hospital patients purchased by a

1 lessor who leases the equipment, under a lease of one year or
2 longer executed or in effect at the time the lessor would
3 otherwise be subject to the tax imposed by this Act, to a
4 hospital that has been issued an active tax exemption
5 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of the
6 Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. If the equipment is leased in a
7 manner that does not qualify for this exemption or is used in
8 any other non-exempt manner, the lessor shall be liable for the
9 tax imposed under this Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the
10 case may be, based on the fair market value of the property at
11 the time the non-qualifying use occurs. No lessor shall collect
12 or attempt to collect an amount (however designated) that
13 purports to reimburse that lessor for the tax imposed by this
14 Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the case may be, if the tax
15 has not been paid by the lessor. If a lessor improperly
16 collects any such amount from the lessee, the lessee shall have
17 a legal right to claim a refund of that amount from the lessor.
18 If, however, that amount is not refunded to the lessee for any
19 reason, the lessor is liable to pay that amount to the
20 Department.

21 (23) Personal property purchased by a lessor who leases the
22 property, under a lease of one year or longer executed or in
23 effect at the time the lessor would otherwise be subject to the
24 tax imposed by this Act, to a governmental body that has been
25 issued an active sales tax exemption identification number by
26 the Department under Section 1g of the Retailers' Occupation

1 Tax Act. If the property is leased in a manner that does not
2 qualify for this exemption or used in any other non-exempt
3 manner, the lessor shall be liable for the tax imposed under
4 this Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the case may be, based
5 on the fair market value of the property at the time the
6 non-qualifying use occurs. No lessor shall collect or attempt
7 to collect an amount (however designated) that purports to
8 reimburse that lessor for the tax imposed by this Act or the
9 Service Use Tax Act, as the case may be, if the tax has not been
10 paid by the lessor. If a lessor improperly collects any such
11 amount from the lessee, the lessee shall have a legal right to
12 claim a refund of that amount from the lessor. If, however,
13 that amount is not refunded to the lessee for any reason, the
14 lessor is liable to pay that amount to the Department.

15 (24) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
16 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
17 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is donated for
18 disaster relief to be used in a State or federally declared
19 disaster area in Illinois or bordering Illinois by a
20 manufacturer or retailer that is registered in this State to a
21 corporation, society, association, foundation, or institution
22 that has been issued a sales tax exemption identification
23 number by the Department that assists victims of the disaster
24 who reside within the declared disaster area.

25 (25) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
26 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or

1 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is used in the
2 performance of infrastructure repairs in this State, including
3 but not limited to municipal roads and streets, access roads,
4 bridges, sidewalks, waste disposal systems, water and sewer
5 line extensions, water distribution and purification
6 facilities, storm water drainage and retention facilities, and
7 sewage treatment facilities, resulting from a State or
8 federally declared disaster in Illinois or bordering Illinois
9 when such repairs are initiated on facilities located in the
10 declared disaster area within 6 months after the disaster.

11 (26) Beginning July 1, 1999, game or game birds purchased
12 at a "game breeding and hunting preserve area" as that term is
13 used in the Wildlife Code. This paragraph is exempt from the
14 provisions of Section 3-90.

15 (27) A motor vehicle, as that term is defined in Section
16 1-146 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, that is donated to a
17 corporation, limited liability company, society, association,
18 foundation, or institution that is determined by the Department
19 to be organized and operated exclusively for educational
20 purposes. For purposes of this exemption, "a corporation,
21 limited liability company, society, association, foundation,
22 or institution organized and operated exclusively for
23 educational purposes" means all tax-supported public schools,
24 private schools that offer systematic instruction in useful
25 branches of learning by methods common to public schools and
26 that compare favorably in their scope and intensity with the

1 course of study presented in tax-supported schools, and
2 vocational or technical schools or institutes organized and
3 operated exclusively to provide a course of study of not less
4 than 6 weeks duration and designed to prepare individuals to
5 follow a trade or to pursue a manual, technical, mechanical,
6 industrial, business, or commercial occupation.

7 (28) Beginning January 1, 2000, personal property,
8 including food, purchased through fundraising events for the
9 benefit of a public or private elementary or secondary school,
10 a group of those schools, or one or more school districts if
11 the events are sponsored by an entity recognized by the school
12 district that consists primarily of volunteers and includes
13 parents and teachers of the school children. This paragraph
14 does not apply to fundraising events (i) for the benefit of
15 private home instruction or (ii) for which the fundraising
16 entity purchases the personal property sold at the events from
17 another individual or entity that sold the property for the
18 purpose of resale by the fundraising entity and that profits
19 from the sale to the fundraising entity. This paragraph is
20 exempt from the provisions of Section 3-90.

21 (29) Beginning January 1, 2000 and through December 31,
22 2001, new or used automatic vending machines that prepare and
23 serve hot food and beverages, including coffee, soup, and other
24 items, and replacement parts for these machines. Beginning
25 January 1, 2002 and through June 30, 2003, machines and parts
26 for machines used in commercial, coin-operated amusement and

1 vending business if a use or occupation tax is paid on the
2 gross receipts derived from the use of the commercial,
3 coin-operated amusement and vending machines. This paragraph
4 is exempt from the provisions of Section 3-90.

5 (30) Beginning January 1, 2001 and through June 30, 2016,
6 food for human consumption that is to be consumed off the
7 premises where it is sold (other than alcoholic beverages, soft
8 drinks, and food that has been prepared for immediate
9 consumption) and prescription and nonprescription medicines,
10 drugs, medical appliances, and insulin, urine testing
11 materials, syringes, and needles used by diabetics, for human
12 use, when purchased for use by a person receiving medical
13 assistance under Article V of the Illinois Public Aid Code who
14 resides in a licensed long-term care facility, as defined in
15 the Nursing Home Care Act, or in a licensed facility as defined
16 in the ID/DD Community Care Act, the MC/DD Act, or the
17 Specialized Mental Health Rehabilitation Act of 2013.

18 (31) Beginning on the effective date of this amendatory Act
19 of the 92nd General Assembly, computers and communications
20 equipment utilized for any hospital purpose and equipment used
21 in the diagnosis, analysis, or treatment of hospital patients
22 purchased by a lessor who leases the equipment, under a lease
23 of one year or longer executed or in effect at the time the
24 lessor would otherwise be subject to the tax imposed by this
25 Act, to a hospital that has been issued an active tax exemption
26 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of the

1 Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. If the equipment is leased in a
2 manner that does not qualify for this exemption or is used in
3 any other nonexempt manner, the lessor shall be liable for the
4 tax imposed under this Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the
5 case may be, based on the fair market value of the property at
6 the time the nonqualifying use occurs. No lessor shall collect
7 or attempt to collect an amount (however designated) that
8 purports to reimburse that lessor for the tax imposed by this
9 Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the case may be, if the tax
10 has not been paid by the lessor. If a lessor improperly
11 collects any such amount from the lessee, the lessee shall have
12 a legal right to claim a refund of that amount from the lessor.
13 If, however, that amount is not refunded to the lessee for any
14 reason, the lessor is liable to pay that amount to the
15 Department. This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of
16 Section 3-90.

17 (32) Beginning on the effective date of this amendatory Act
18 of the 92nd General Assembly, personal property purchased by a
19 lessor who leases the property, under a lease of one year or
20 longer executed or in effect at the time the lessor would
21 otherwise be subject to the tax imposed by this Act, to a
22 governmental body that has been issued an active sales tax
23 exemption identification number by the Department under
24 Section 1g of the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. If the
25 property is leased in a manner that does not qualify for this
26 exemption or used in any other nonexempt manner, the lessor

1 shall be liable for the tax imposed under this Act or the
2 Service Use Tax Act, as the case may be, based on the fair
3 market value of the property at the time the nonqualifying use
4 occurs. No lessor shall collect or attempt to collect an amount
5 (however designated) that purports to reimburse that lessor for
6 the tax imposed by this Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the
7 case may be, if the tax has not been paid by the lessor. If a
8 lessor improperly collects any such amount from the lessee, the
9 lessee shall have a legal right to claim a refund of that
10 amount from the lessor. If, however, that amount is not
11 refunded to the lessee for any reason, the lessor is liable to
12 pay that amount to the Department. This paragraph is exempt
13 from the provisions of Section 3-90.

14 (33) On and after July 1, 2003 and through June 30, 2004,
15 the use in this State of motor vehicles of the second division
16 with a gross vehicle weight in excess of 8,000 pounds and that
17 are subject to the commercial distribution fee imposed under
18 Section 3-815.1 of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Beginning on July
19 1, 2004 and through June 30, 2005, the use in this State of
20 motor vehicles of the second division: (i) with a gross vehicle
21 weight rating in excess of 8,000 pounds; (ii) that are subject
22 to the commercial distribution fee imposed under Section
23 3-815.1 of the Illinois Vehicle Code; and (iii) that are
24 primarily used for commercial purposes. Through June 30, 2005,
25 this exemption applies to repair and replacement parts added
26 after the initial purchase of such a motor vehicle if that

1 motor vehicle is used in a manner that would qualify for the
2 rolling stock exemption otherwise provided for in this Act. For
3 purposes of this paragraph, the term "used for commercial
4 purposes" means the transportation of persons or property in
5 furtherance of any commercial or industrial enterprise,
6 whether for-hire or not.

7 (34) Beginning January 1, 2008, tangible personal property
8 used in the construction or maintenance of a community water
9 supply, as defined under Section 3.145 of the Environmental
10 Protection Act, that is operated by a not-for-profit
11 corporation that holds a valid water supply permit issued under
12 Title IV of the Environmental Protection Act. This paragraph is
13 exempt from the provisions of Section 3-90.

14 (35) Beginning January 1, 2010, materials, parts,
15 equipment, components, and furnishings incorporated into or
16 upon an aircraft as part of the modification, refurbishment,
17 completion, replacement, repair, or maintenance of the
18 aircraft. This exemption includes consumable supplies used in
19 the modification, refurbishment, completion, replacement,
20 repair, and maintenance of aircraft, but excludes any
21 materials, parts, equipment, components, and consumable
22 supplies used in the modification, replacement, repair, and
23 maintenance of aircraft engines or power plants, whether such
24 engines or power plants are installed or uninstalled upon any
25 such aircraft. "Consumable supplies" include, but are not
26 limited to, adhesive, tape, sandpaper, general purpose

1 lubricants, cleaning solution, latex gloves, and protective
2 films. This exemption applies only to the use of qualifying
3 tangible personal property by persons who modify, refurbish,
4 complete, repair, replace, or maintain aircraft and who (i)
5 hold an Air Agency Certificate and are empowered to operate an
6 approved repair station by the Federal Aviation
7 Administration, (ii) have a Class IV Rating, and (iii) conduct
8 operations in accordance with Part 145 of the Federal Aviation
9 Regulations. The exemption does not include aircraft operated
10 by a commercial air carrier providing scheduled passenger air
11 service pursuant to authority issued under Part 121 or Part 129
12 of the Federal Aviation Regulations. The changes made to this
13 paragraph (35) by Public Act 98-534 are declarative of existing
14 law.

15 (36) Tangible personal property purchased by a
16 public-facilities corporation, as described in Section
17 11-65-10 of the Illinois Municipal Code, for purposes of
18 constructing or furnishing a municipal convention hall, but
19 only if the legal title to the municipal convention hall is
20 transferred to the municipality without any further
21 consideration by or on behalf of the municipality at the time
22 of the completion of the municipal convention hall or upon the
23 retirement or redemption of any bonds or other debt instruments
24 issued by the public-facilities corporation in connection with
25 the development of the municipal convention hall. This
26 exemption includes existing public-facilities corporations as

1 provided in Section 11-65-25 of the Illinois Municipal Code.
2 This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of Section 3-90.

3 (37) Beginning January 1, 2017, menstrual pads, tampons,
4 and menstrual cups.

9 Section 10. The Service Use Tax Act is amended by changing
10 Section 3-5 as follows:

11 (35 ILCS 110/3-5)

12 Sec. 3-5. Exemptions. Use of the following tangible
13 personal property is exempt from the tax imposed by this Act:

14 (1) Personal property purchased from a corporation,
15 society, association, foundation, institution, or
16 organization, other than a limited liability company, that is
17 organized and operated as a not-for-profit service enterprise
18 for the benefit of persons 65 years of age or older if the
19 personal property was not purchased by the enterprise for the
20 purpose of resale by the enterprise.

21 (2) Personal property purchased by a non-profit Illinois
22 county fair association for use in conducting, operating, or
23 promoting the county fair.

24 (3) Personal property purchased by a not-for-profit arts or

1 cultural organization that establishes, by proof required by
2 the Department by rule, that it has received an exemption under
3 Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and that is
4 organized and operated primarily for the presentation or
5 support of arts or cultural programming, activities, or
6 services. These organizations include, but are not limited to,
7 music and dramatic arts organizations such as symphony
8 orchestras and theatrical groups, arts and cultural service
9 organizations, local arts councils, visual arts organizations,
10 and media arts organizations. On and after the effective date
11 of this amendatory Act of the 92nd General Assembly, however,
12 an entity otherwise eligible for this exemption shall not make

10 in the ID/DD Community Care Act, the MC/DD Act, or the
11 Specialized Mental Health Rehabilitation Act of 2013.

12 (14) Semen used for artificial insemination of livestock
13 for direct agricultural production.

14 (15) Horses, or interests in horses, registered with and
15 meeting the requirements of any of the Arabian Horse Club
16 Registry of America, Appaloosa Horse Club, American Quarter
17 Horse Association, United States Trotting Association, or
18 Jockey Club, as appropriate, used for purposes of breeding or
19 racing for prizes. This item (15) is exempt from the provisions
20 of Section 3-55, and the exemption provided for under this item
21 (15) applies for all periods beginning May 30, 1995, but no
22 claim for credit or refund is allowed on or after January 1,
23 2008 (the effective date of Public Act 95-88) for such taxes
24 paid during the period beginning May 30, 2000 and ending on
25 January 1, 2008 (the effective date of Public Act 95-88).

26 (16) Computers and communications equipment utilized for

1 any hospital purpose and equipment used in the diagnosis,
2 analysis, or treatment of hospital patients sold to a lessor
3 who leases the equipment, under a lease of one year or longer
4 executed or in effect at the time of the purchase, to a
5 hospital that has been issued an active tax exemption
6 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of the
7 Retailers' Occupation Tax Act.

8 (17) Personal property sold to a lessor who leases the
9 property, under a lease of one year or longer executed or in
10 effect at the time of the purchase, to a governmental body that
11 has been issued an active tax exemption identification number
12 by the Department under Section 1g of the Retailers' Occupation
13 Tax Act.

14 (18) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
15 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
16 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is donated for
17 disaster relief to be used in a State or federally declared
18 disaster area in Illinois or bordering Illinois by a
19 manufacturer or retailer that is registered in this State to a
20 corporation, society, association, foundation, or institution
21 that has been issued a sales tax exemption identification
22 number by the Department that assists victims of the disaster
23 who reside within the declared disaster area.

24 (19) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
25 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
26 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is used in the

1 performance of infrastructure repairs in this State, including
2 but not limited to municipal roads and streets, access roads,
3 bridges, sidewalks, waste disposal systems, water and sewer
4 line extensions, water distribution and purification
5 facilities, storm water drainage and retention facilities, and
6 sewage treatment facilities, resulting from a State or
7 federally declared disaster in Illinois or bordering Illinois
8 when such repairs are initiated on facilities located in the
9 declared disaster area within 6 months after the disaster.

10 (20) Beginning July 1, 1999, game or game birds sold at a
11 "game breeding and hunting preserve area" as that term is used
12 in the Wildlife Code. This paragraph is exempt from the
13 provisions of Section 3-55.

14 (21) A motor vehicle, as that term is defined in Section
15 1-146 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, that is donated to a
16 corporation, limited liability company, society, association,
17 foundation, or institution that is determined by the Department
18 to be organized and operated exclusively for educational
19 purposes. For purposes of this exemption, "a corporation,
20 limited liability company, society, association, foundation,
21 or institution organized and operated exclusively for
22 educational purposes" means all tax-supported public schools,
23 private schools that offer systematic instruction in useful
24 branches of learning by methods common to public schools and
25 that compare favorably in their scope and intensity with the
26 course of study presented in tax-supported schools, and

1 vocational or technical schools or institutes organized and
2 operated exclusively to provide a course of study of not less
3 than 6 weeks duration and designed to prepare individuals to
4 follow a trade or to pursue a manual, technical, mechanical,
5 industrial, business, or commercial occupation.

6 (22) Beginning January 1, 2000, personal property,
7 including food, purchased through fundraising events for the
8 benefit of a public or private elementary or secondary school,
9 a group of those schools, or one or more school districts if
10 the events are sponsored by an entity recognized by the school
11 district that consists primarily of volunteers and includes
12 parents and teachers of the school children. This paragraph
13 does not apply to fundraising events (i) for the benefit of
14 private home instruction or (ii) for which the fundraising
15 entity purchases the personal property sold at the events from
16 another individual or entity that sold the property for the
17 purpose of resale by the fundraising entity and that profits
18 from the sale to the fundraising entity. This paragraph is
19 exempt from the provisions of Section 3-55.

20 (23) Beginning January 1, 2000 and through December 31,
21 2001, new or used automatic vending machines that prepare and
22 serve hot food and beverages, including coffee, soup, and other
23 items, and replacement parts for these machines. Beginning
24 January 1, 2002 and through June 30, 2003, machines and parts
25 for machines used in commercial, coin-operated amusement and
26 vending business if a use or occupation tax is paid on the

1 gross receipts derived from the use of the commercial,
2 coin-operated amusement and vending machines. This paragraph
3 is exempt from the provisions of Section 3-55.

4 (24) Beginning on the effective date of this amendatory Act
5 of the 92nd General Assembly, computers and communications
6 equipment utilized for any hospital purpose and equipment used
7 in the diagnosis, analysis, or treatment of hospital patients
8 sold to a lessor who leases the equipment, under a lease of one
9 year or longer executed or in effect at the time of the
10 purchase, to a hospital that has been issued an active tax
11 exemption identification number by the Department under
12 Section 1g of the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. This paragraph
13 is exempt from the provisions of Section 3-55.

14 (25) Beginning on the effective date of this amendatory Act
15 of the 92nd General Assembly, personal property sold to a
16 lessor who leases the property, under a lease of one year or
17 longer executed or in effect at the time of the purchase, to a
18 governmental body that has been issued an active tax exemption
19 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of the
20 Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. This paragraph is exempt from
21 the provisions of Section 3-55.

22 (26) Beginning on January 1, 2002 and through June 30,
23 2016, tangible personal property purchased from an Illinois
24 retailer by a taxpayer engaged in centralized purchasing
25 activities in Illinois who will, upon receipt of the property
26 in Illinois, temporarily store the property in Illinois (i) for

1 the purpose of subsequently transporting it outside this State
2 for use or consumption thereafter solely outside this State or
3 (ii) for the purpose of being processed, fabricated, or
4 manufactured into, attached to, or incorporated into other
5 tangible personal property to be transported outside this State
6 and thereafter used or consumed solely outside this State. The
7 Director of Revenue shall, pursuant to rules adopted in
8 accordance with the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act,
9 issue a permit to any taxpayer in good standing with the
10 Department who is eligible for the exemption under this
11 paragraph (26). The permit issued under this paragraph (26)
12 shall authorize the holder, to the extent and in the manner
13 specified in the rules adopted under this Act, to purchase
14 tangible personal property from a retailer exempt from the
15 taxes imposed by this Act. Taxpayers shall maintain all
16 necessary books and records to substantiate the use and
17 consumption of all such tangible personal property outside of
18 the State of Illinois.

19 (27) Beginning January 1, 2008, tangible personal property
20 used in the construction or maintenance of a community water
21 supply, as defined under Section 3.145 of the Environmental
22 Protection Act, that is operated by a not-for-profit
23 corporation that holds a valid water supply permit issued under
24 Title IV of the Environmental Protection Act. This paragraph is
25 exempt from the provisions of Section 3-55.

26 (28) Tangible personal property sold to a

1 public-facilities corporation, as described in Section
2 11-65-10 of the Illinois Municipal Code, for purposes of
3 constructing or furnishing a municipal convention hall, but
4 only if the legal title to the municipal convention hall is
5 transferred to the municipality without any further
6 consideration by or on behalf of the municipality at the time
7 of the completion of the municipal convention hall or upon the
8 retirement or redemption of any bonds or other debt instruments
9 issued by the public-facilities corporation in connection with
10 the development of the municipal convention hall. This
11 exemption includes existing public-facilities corporations as
12 provided in Section 11-65-25 of the Illinois Municipal Code.
13 This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of Section 3-55.

14 (29) Beginning January 1, 2010, materials, parts,
15 equipment, components, and furnishings incorporated into or
16 upon an aircraft as part of the modification, refurbishment,
17 completion, replacement, repair, or maintenance of the
18 aircraft. This exemption includes consumable supplies used in
19 the modification, refurbishment, completion, replacement,
20 repair, and maintenance of aircraft, but excludes any
21 materials, parts, equipment, components, and consumable
22 supplies used in the modification, replacement, repair, and
23 maintenance of aircraft engines or power plants, whether such
24 engines or power plants are installed or uninstalled upon any
25 such aircraft. "Consumable supplies" include, but are not
26 limited to, adhesive, tape, sandpaper, general purpose

1 lubricants, cleaning solution, latex gloves, and protective
2 films. This exemption applies only to the transfer of
3 qualifying tangible personal property incident to the
4 modification, refurbishment, completion, replacement, repair,
5 or maintenance of an aircraft by persons who (i) hold an Air
6 Agency Certificate and are empowered to operate an approved
7 repair station by the Federal Aviation Administration, (ii)
8 have a Class IV Rating, and (iii) conduct operations in
9 accordance with Part 145 of the Federal Aviation Regulations.
10 The exemption does not include aircraft operated by a
11 commercial air carrier providing scheduled passenger air
12 service pursuant to authority issued under Part 121 or Part 129
13 of the Federal Aviation Regulations. The changes made to this
14 paragraph (29) by Public Act 98-534 are declarative of existing
15 law.

16 (30) Beginning January 1, 2017, menstrual pads, tampons,
17 and menstrual cups.

18 (Source: P.A. 98-104, eff. 7-22-13; 98-422, eff. 8-16-13;

21 Section 20. The Retailers' Occupation Tax Act is amended by
22 changing Section 2-5 as follows:

23 (35 ILCS 120/2-5)

24 Sec. 2-5. Exemptions. Gross receipts from proceeds from the

1 sale of the following tangible personal property are exempt
2 from the tax imposed by this Act:

3 (1) Farm chemicals.

4 (2) Farm machinery and equipment, both new and used,
5 including that manufactured on special order, certified by the
6 purchaser to be used primarily for production agriculture or
7 State or federal agricultural programs, including individual
8 replacement parts for the machinery and equipment, including
9 machinery and equipment purchased for lease, and including
10 implements of husbandry defined in Section 1-130 of the
11 Illinois Vehicle Code, farm machinery and agricultural
12 chemical and fertilizer spreaders, and nurse wagons required to
13 be registered under Section 3-809 of the Illinois Vehicle Code,
14 but excluding other motor vehicles required to be registered
15 under the Illinois Vehicle Code. Horticultural polyhouses or
16 hoop houses used for propagating, growing, or overwintering
17 plants shall be considered farm machinery and equipment under
18 this item (2). Agricultural chemical tender tanks and dry boxes
19 shall include units sold separately from a motor vehicle
20 required to be licensed and units sold mounted on a motor
21 vehicle required to be licensed, if the selling price of the
22 tender is separately stated.

23 Farm machinery and equipment shall include precision
24 farming equipment that is installed or purchased to be
25 installed on farm machinery and equipment including, but not
26 limited to, tractors, harvesters, sprayers, planters, seeders,

1 or spreaders. Precision farming equipment includes, but is not
2 limited to, soil testing sensors, computers, monitors,
3 software, global positioning and mapping systems, and other
4 such equipment.

5 Farm machinery and equipment also includes computers,
6 sensors, software, and related equipment used primarily in the
7 computer-assisted operation of production agriculture
8 facilities, equipment, and activities such as, but not limited
9 to, the collection, monitoring, and correlation of animal and
10 crop data for the purpose of formulating animal diets and
11 agricultural chemicals. This item (2) is exempt from the
12 provisions of Section 2-70.

13 (3) Until July 1, 2003, distillation machinery and
14 equipment, sold as a unit or kit, assembled or installed by the
15 retailer, certified by the user to be used only for the
16 production of ethyl alcohol that will be used for consumption
17 as motor fuel or as a component of motor fuel for the personal
18 use of the user, and not subject to sale or resale.

19 (4) Until July 1, 2003 and beginning again September 1,
20 2004 through August 30, 2014, graphic arts machinery and
21 equipment, including repair and replacement parts, both new and
22 used, and including that manufactured on special order or
23 purchased for lease, certified by the purchaser to be used
24 primarily for graphic arts production. Equipment includes
25 chemicals or chemicals acting as catalysts but only if the
26 chemicals or chemicals acting as catalysts effect a direct and

1 immediate change upon a graphic arts product.

2 (5) A motor vehicle that is used for automobile renting, as
3 defined in the Automobile Renting Occupation and Use Tax Act.
4 This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of Section 2-70.

5 (6) Personal property sold by a teacher-sponsored student
6 organization affiliated with an elementary or secondary school
7 located in Illinois.

8 (7) Until July 1, 2003, proceeds of that portion of the
9 selling price of a passenger car the sale of which is subject
10 to the Replacement Vehicle Tax.

11 (8) Personal property sold to an Illinois county fair
12 association for use in conducting, operating, or promoting the
13 county fair.

14 (9) Personal property sold to a not-for-profit arts or
15 cultural organization that establishes, by proof required by
16 the Department by rule, that it has received an exemption under
17 Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and that is
18 organized and operated primarily for the presentation or
19 support of arts or cultural programming, activities, or
20 services. These organizations include, but are not limited to,
21 music and dramatic arts organizations such as symphony
22 orchestras and theatrical groups, arts and cultural service
23 organizations, local arts councils, visual arts organizations,
24 and media arts organizations. On and after the effective date
25 of this amendatory Act of the 92nd General Assembly, however,
26 an entity otherwise eligible for this exemption shall not make

1 tax-free purchases unless it has an active identification
2 number issued by the Department.

3 (10) Personal property sold by a corporation, society,
4 association, foundation, institution, or organization, other
5 than a limited liability company, that is organized and
6 operated as a not-for-profit service enterprise for the benefit
7 of persons 65 years of age or older if the personal property
8 was not purchased by the enterprise for the purpose of resale
9 by the enterprise.

10 (11) Personal property sold to a governmental body, to a
11 corporation, society, association, foundation, or institution
12 organized and operated exclusively for charitable, religious,
13 or educational purposes, or to a not-for-profit corporation,
14 society, association, foundation, institution, or organization
15 that has no compensated officers or employees and that is
16 organized and operated primarily for the recreation of persons
17 55 years of age or older. A limited liability company may
18 qualify for the exemption under this paragraph only if the
19 limited liability company is organized and operated
20 exclusively for educational purposes. On and after July 1,
21 1987, however, no entity otherwise eligible for this exemption
22 shall make tax-free purchases unless it has an active
23 identification number issued by the Department.

24 (12) Tangible personal property sold to interstate
25 carriers for hire for use as rolling stock moving in interstate
26 commerce or to lessors under leases of one year or longer

1 executed or in effect at the time of purchase by interstate
2 carriers for hire for use as rolling stock moving in interstate
3 commerce and equipment operated by a telecommunications
4 provider, licensed as a common carrier by the Federal
5 Communications Commission, which is permanently installed in
6 or affixed to aircraft moving in interstate commerce.

7 (12-5) On and after July 1, 2003 and through June 30, 2004,
8 motor vehicles of the second division with a gross vehicle
9 weight in excess of 8,000 pounds that are subject to the
10 commercial distribution fee imposed under Section 3-815.1 of
11 the Illinois Vehicle Code. Beginning on July 1, 2004 and
12 through June 30, 2005, the use in this State of motor vehicles
13 of the second division: (i) with a gross vehicle weight rating
14 in excess of 8,000 pounds; (ii) that are subject to the
15 commercial distribution fee imposed under Section 3-815.1 of
16 the Illinois Vehicle Code; and (iii) that are primarily used
17 for commercial purposes. Through June 30, 2005, this exemption
18 applies to repair and replacement parts added after the initial
19 purchase of such a motor vehicle if that motor vehicle is used
20 in a manner that would qualify for the rolling stock exemption
21 otherwise provided for in this Act. For purposes of this
22 paragraph, "used for commercial purposes" means the
23 transportation of persons or property in furtherance of any
24 commercial or industrial enterprise whether for-hire or not.

25 (13) Proceeds from sales to owners, lessors, or shippers of
26 tangible personal property that is utilized by interstate

1 carriers for hire for use as rolling stock moving in interstate
2 commerce and equipment operated by a telecommunications
3 provider, licensed as a common carrier by the Federal
4 Communications Commission, which is permanently installed in
5 or affixed to aircraft moving in interstate commerce.

6 (14) Machinery and equipment that will be used by the
7 purchaser, or a lessee of the purchaser, primarily in the
8 process of manufacturing or assembling tangible personal
9 property for wholesale or retail sale or lease, whether the
10 sale or lease is made directly by the manufacturer or by some
11 other person, whether the materials used in the process are
12 owned by the manufacturer or some other person, or whether the
13 sale or lease is made apart from or as an incident to the
14 seller's engaging in the service occupation of producing
15 machines, tools, dies, jigs, patterns, gauges, or other similar
16 items of no commercial value on special order for a particular
17 purchaser. The exemption provided by this paragraph (14) does
18 not include machinery and equipment used in (i) the generation
19 of electricity for wholesale or retail sale; (ii) the
20 generation or treatment of natural or artificial gas for
21 wholesale or retail sale that is delivered to customers through
22 pipes, pipelines, or mains; or (iii) the treatment of water for
23 wholesale or retail sale that is delivered to customers through
24 pipes, pipelines, or mains. The provisions of Public Act 98-583
25 are declaratory of existing law as to the meaning and scope of
26 this exemption.

1 (15) Proceeds of mandatory service charges separately
2 stated on customers' bills for purchase and consumption of food
3 and beverages, to the extent that the proceeds of the service
4 charge are in fact turned over as tips or as a substitute for
5 tips to the employees who participate directly in preparing,
6 serving, hosting or cleaning up the food or beverage function
7 with respect to which the service charge is imposed.

8 (16) Petroleum products sold to a purchaser if the seller
9 is prohibited by federal law from charging tax to the
10 purchaser.

11 (17) Tangible personal property sold to a common carrier by
12 rail or motor that receives the physical possession of the
13 property in Illinois and that transports the property, or
14 shares with another common carrier in the transportation of the
15 property, out of Illinois on a standard uniform bill of lading
16 showing the seller of the property as the shipper or consignor
17 of the property to a destination outside Illinois, for use
18 outside Illinois.

19 (18) Legal tender, currency, medallions, or gold or silver
20 coinage issued by the State of Illinois, the government of the
21 United States of America, or the government of any foreign
22 country, and bullion.

23 (19) Until July 1 2003, and beginning again on July 1, 2017
24 and ending on June 30, 2022, oil field exploration, drilling,
25 and production equipment, including (i) rigs and parts of rigs,
26 rotary rigs, cable tool rigs, and workover rigs, (ii) pipe and

1 tubular goods, including casing and drill strings, (iii) pumps
2 and pump-jack units, (iv) storage tanks and flow lines, (v) any
3 individual replacement part for oil field exploration,
4 drilling, and production equipment, and (vi) machinery and
5 equipment purchased for lease; but excluding motor vehicles
6 required to be registered under the Illinois Vehicle Code.

7 (20) Photoprocessing machinery and equipment, including
8 repair and replacement parts, both new and used, including that
9 manufactured on special order, certified by the purchaser to be
10 used primarily for photoprocessing, and including
11 photoprocessing machinery and equipment purchased for lease.

12 (21) Coal and aggregate exploration, mining, off-highway
13 hauling, processing, maintenance, and reclamation equipment,
14 including replacement parts and equipment, and including
15 equipment purchased for lease, but excluding motor vehicles
16 required to be registered under the Illinois Vehicle Code. The
17 changes made to this Section by Public Act 97-767 apply on and
18 after July 1, 2003, but no claim for credit or refund is
19 allowed on or after August 16, 2013 (the effective date of
20 Public Act 98-456) for such taxes paid during the period
21 beginning July 1, 2003 and ending on August 16, 2013 (the
22 effective date of Public Act 98-456).

23 (22) Until June 30, 2013, fuel and petroleum products sold
24 to or used by an air carrier, certified by the carrier to be
25 used for consumption, shipment, or storage in the conduct of
26 its business as an air common carrier, for a flight destined

1 for or returning from a location or locations outside the
2 United States without regard to previous or subsequent domestic
3 stopovers.

4 Beginning July 1, 2013, fuel and petroleum products sold to
5 or used by an air carrier, certified by the carrier to be used
6 for consumption, shipment, or storage in the conduct of its
7 business as an air common carrier, for a flight that (i) is
8 engaged in foreign trade or is engaged in trade between the
9 United States and any of its possessions and (ii) transports at
10 least one individual or package for hire from the city of
11 origination to the city of final destination on the same
12 aircraft, without regard to a change in the flight number of
13 that aircraft.

14 (23) A transaction in which the purchase order is received
15 by a florist who is located outside Illinois, but who has a
16 florist located in Illinois deliver the property to the
17 purchaser or the purchaser's donee in Illinois.

18 (24) Fuel consumed or used in the operation of ships,
19 barges, or vessels that are used primarily in or for the
20 transportation of property or the conveyance of persons for
21 hire on rivers bordering on this State if the fuel is delivered
22 by the seller to the purchaser's barge, ship, or vessel while
23 it is afloat upon that bordering river.

24 (25) Except as provided in item (25-5) of this Section, a
25 motor vehicle sold in this State to a nonresident even though
26 the motor vehicle is delivered to the nonresident in this

1 State, if the motor vehicle is not to be titled in this State,
2 and if a drive-away permit is issued to the motor vehicle as
3 provided in Section 3-603 of the Illinois Vehicle Code or if
4 the nonresident purchaser has vehicle registration plates to
5 transfer to the motor vehicle upon returning to his or her home
6 state. The issuance of the drive-away permit or having the
7 out-of-state registration plates to be transferred is prima
8 facie evidence that the motor vehicle will not be titled in
9 this State.

10 (25-5) The exemption under item (25) does not apply if the
11 state in which the motor vehicle will be titled does not allow
12 a reciprocal exemption for a motor vehicle sold and delivered
13 in that state to an Illinois resident but titled in Illinois.
14 The tax collected under this Act on the sale of a motor vehicle
15 in this State to a resident of another state that does not
16 allow a reciprocal exemption shall be imposed at a rate equal
17 to the state's rate of tax on taxable property in the state in
18 which the purchaser is a resident, except that the tax shall
19 not exceed the tax that would otherwise be imposed under this
20 Act. At the time of the sale, the purchaser shall execute a
21 statement, signed under penalty of perjury, of his or her
22 intent to title the vehicle in the state in which the purchaser
23 is a resident within 30 days after the sale and of the fact of
24 the payment to the State of Illinois of tax in an amount
25 equivalent to the state's rate of tax on taxable property in
26 his or her state of residence and shall submit the statement to

1 the appropriate tax collection agency in his or her state of
2 residence. In addition, the retailer must retain a signed copy
3 of the statement in his or her records. Nothing in this item
4 shall be construed to require the removal of the vehicle from
5 this state following the filing of an intent to title the
6 vehicle in the purchaser's state of residence if the purchaser
7 titles the vehicle in his or her state of residence within 30
8 days after the date of sale. The tax collected under this Act
9 in accordance with this item (25-5) shall be proportionately
10 distributed as if the tax were collected at the 6.25% general
11 rate imposed under this Act.

12 (25-7) Beginning on July 1, 2007, no tax is imposed under
13 this Act on the sale of an aircraft, as defined in Section 3 of
14 the Illinois Aeronautics Act, if all of the following
15 conditions are met:

16 (1) the aircraft leaves this State within 15 days after
17 the later of either the issuance of the final billing for
18 the sale of the aircraft, or the authorized approval for
19 return to service, completion of the maintenance record
20 entry, and completion of the test flight and ground test
21 for inspection, as required by 14 C.F.R. 91.407;

22 (2) the aircraft is not based or registered in this
23 State after the sale of the aircraft; and

24 (3) the seller retains in his or her books and records
25 and provides to the Department a signed and dated
26 certification from the purchaser, on a form prescribed by

1 the Department, certifying that the requirements of this
2 item (25-7) are met. The certificate must also include the
3 name and address of the purchaser, the address of the
4 location where the aircraft is to be titled or registered,
5 the address of the primary physical location of the
6 aircraft, and other information that the Department may
7 reasonably require.

8 For purposes of this item (25-7):

9 "Based in this State" means hangared, stored, or otherwise
10 used, excluding post-sale customizations as defined in this
11 Section, for 10 or more days in each 12-month period
12 immediately following the date of the sale of the aircraft.

13 "Registered in this State" means an aircraft registered
14 with the Department of Transportation, Aeronautics Division,
15 or titled or registered with the Federal Aviation
16 Administration to an address located in this State.

17 This paragraph (25-7) is exempt from the provisions of
18 Section 2-70.

19 (26) Semen used for artificial insemination of livestock
20 for direct agricultural production.

21 (27) Horses, or interests in horses, registered with and
22 meeting the requirements of any of the Arabian Horse Club
23 Registry of America, Appaloosa Horse Club, American Quarter
24 Horse Association, United States Trotting Association, or
25 Jockey Club, as appropriate, used for purposes of breeding or
26 racing for prizes. This item (27) is exempt from the provisions

1 of Section 2-70, and the exemption provided for under this item
2 (27) applies for all periods beginning May 30, 1995, but no
3 claim for credit or refund is allowed on or after January 1,
4 2008 (the effective date of Public Act 95-88) for such taxes
5 paid during the period beginning May 30, 2000 and ending on
6 January 1, 2008 (the effective date of Public Act 95-88).

7 (28) Computers and communications equipment utilized for
8 any hospital purpose and equipment used in the diagnosis,
9 analysis, or treatment of hospital patients sold to a lessor
10 who leases the equipment, under a lease of one year or longer
11 executed or in effect at the time of the purchase, to a
12 hospital that has been issued an active tax exemption
13 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of
14 this Act.

15 (29) Personal property sold to a lessor who leases the
16 property, under a lease of one year or longer executed or in
17 effect at the time of the purchase, to a governmental body that
18 has been issued an active tax exemption identification number
19 by the Department under Section 1g of this Act.

20 (30) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
21 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
22 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is donated for
23 disaster relief to be used in a State or federally declared
24 disaster area in Illinois or bordering Illinois by a
25 manufacturer or retailer that is registered in this State to a
26 corporation, society, association, foundation, or institution

1 that has been issued a sales tax exemption identification
2 number by the Department that assists victims of the disaster
3 who reside within the declared disaster area.

4 (31) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
5 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
6 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is used in the
7 performance of infrastructure repairs in this State, including
8 but not limited to municipal roads and streets, access roads,
9 bridges, sidewalks, waste disposal systems, water and sewer
10 line extensions, water distribution and purification
11 facilities, storm water drainage and retention facilities, and
12 sewage treatment facilities, resulting from a State or
13 federally declared disaster in Illinois or bordering Illinois
14 when such repairs are initiated on facilities located in the
15 declared disaster area within 6 months after the disaster.

16 (32) Beginning July 1, 1999, game or game birds sold at a
17 "game breeding and hunting preserve area" as that term is used
18 in the Wildlife Code. This paragraph is exempt from the
19 provisions of Section 2-70.

20 (33) A motor vehicle, as that term is defined in Section
21 1-146 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, that is donated to a
22 corporation, limited liability company, society, association,
23 foundation, or institution that is determined by the Department
24 to be organized and operated exclusively for educational
25 purposes. For purposes of this exemption, "a corporation,
26 limited liability company, society, association, foundation,

1 or institution organized and operated exclusively for
2 educational purposes" means all tax-supported public schools,
3 private schools that offer systematic instruction in useful
4 branches of learning by methods common to public schools and
5 that compare favorably in their scope and intensity with the
6 course of study presented in tax-supported schools, and
7 vocational or technical schools or institutes organized and
8 operated exclusively to provide a course of study of not less
9 than 6 weeks duration and designed to prepare individuals to
10 follow a trade or to pursue a manual, technical, mechanical,
11 industrial, business, or commercial occupation.

12 (34) Beginning January 1, 2000, personal property,
13 including food, purchased through fundraising events for the
14 benefit of a public or private elementary or secondary school,
15 a group of those schools, or one or more school districts if
16 the events are sponsored by an entity recognized by the school
17 district that consists primarily of volunteers and includes
18 parents and teachers of the school children. This paragraph
19 does not apply to fundraising events (i) for the benefit of
20 private home instruction or (ii) for which the fundraising
21 entity purchases the personal property sold at the events from
22 another individual or entity that sold the property for the
23 purpose of resale by the fundraising entity and that profits
24 from the sale to the fundraising entity. This paragraph is
25 exempt from the provisions of Section 2-70.

26 (35) Beginning January 1, 2000 and through December 31,

1 2001, new or used automatic vending machines that prepare and
2 serve hot food and beverages, including coffee, soup, and other
3 items, and replacement parts for these machines. Beginning
4 January 1, 2002 and through June 30, 2003, machines and parts
5 for machines used in commercial, coin-operated amusement and
6 vending business if a use or occupation tax is paid on the
7 gross receipts derived from the use of the commercial,
8 coin-operated amusement and vending machines. This paragraph
9 is exempt from the provisions of Section 2-70.

10 (35-5) Beginning August 23, 2001 and through June 30, 2016,
11 food for human consumption that is to be consumed off the
12 premises where it is sold (other than alcoholic beverages, soft
13 drinks, and food that has been prepared for immediate
14 consumption) and prescription and nonprescription medicines,
15 drugs, medical appliances, and insulin, urine testing
16 materials, syringes, and needles used by diabetics, for human
17 use, when purchased for use by a person receiving medical
18 assistance under Article V of the Illinois Public Aid Code who
19 resides in a licensed long-term care facility, as defined in
20 the Nursing Home Care Act, or a licensed facility as defined in
21 the ID/DD Community Care Act, the MC/DD Act, or the Specialized
22 Mental Health Rehabilitation Act of 2013.

23 (36) Beginning August 2, 2001, computers and
24 communications equipment utilized for any hospital purpose and
25 equipment used in the diagnosis, analysis, or treatment of
26 hospital patients sold to a lessor who leases the equipment,

1 under a lease of one year or longer executed or in effect at
2 the time of the purchase, to a hospital that has been issued an
3 active tax exemption identification number by the Department
4 under Section 1g of this Act. This paragraph is exempt from the
5 provisions of Section 2-70.

6 (37) Beginning August 2, 2001, personal property sold to a
7 lessor who leases the property, under a lease of one year or
8 longer executed or in effect at the time of the purchase, to a
9 governmental body that has been issued an active tax exemption
10 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of
11 this Act. This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of
12 Section 2-70.

13 (38) Beginning on January 1, 2002 and through June 30,
14 2016, tangible personal property purchased from an Illinois
15 retailer by a taxpayer engaged in centralized purchasing
16 activities in Illinois who will, upon receipt of the property
17 in Illinois, temporarily store the property in Illinois (i) for
18 the purpose of subsequently transporting it outside this State
19 for use or consumption thereafter solely outside this State or
20 (ii) for the purpose of being processed, fabricated, or
21 manufactured into, attached to, or incorporated into other
22 tangible personal property to be transported outside this State
23 and thereafter used or consumed solely outside this State. The
24 Director of Revenue shall, pursuant to rules adopted in
25 accordance with the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act,
26 issue a permit to any taxpayer in good standing with the

1 Department who is eligible for the exemption under this
2 paragraph (38). The permit issued under this paragraph (38)
3 shall authorize the holder, to the extent and in the manner
4 specified in the rules adopted under this Act, to purchase
5 tangible personal property from a retailer exempt from the
6 taxes imposed by this Act. Taxpayers shall maintain all
7 necessary books and records to substantiate the use and
8 consumption of all such tangible personal property outside of
9 the State of Illinois.

10 (39) Beginning January 1, 2008, tangible personal property
11 used in the construction or maintenance of a community water
12 supply, as defined under Section 3.145 of the Environmental
13 Protection Act, that is operated by a not-for-profit
14 corporation that holds a valid water supply permit issued under
15 Title IV of the Environmental Protection Act. This paragraph is
16 exempt from the provisions of Section 2-70.

17 (40) Beginning January 1, 2010, materials, parts,
18 equipment, components, and furnishings incorporated into or
19 upon an aircraft as part of the modification, refurbishment,
20 completion, replacement, repair, or maintenance of the
21 aircraft. This exemption includes consumable supplies used in
22 the modification, refurbishment, completion, replacement,
23 repair, and maintenance of aircraft, but excludes any
24 materials, parts, equipment, components, and consumable
25 supplies used in the modification, replacement, repair, and
26 maintenance of aircraft engines or power plants, whether such

1 engines or power plants are installed or uninstalled upon any
2 such aircraft. "Consumable supplies" include, but are not
3 limited to, adhesive, tape, sandpaper, general purpose
4 lubricants, cleaning solution, latex gloves, and protective
5 films. This exemption applies only to the sale of qualifying
6 tangible personal property to persons who modify, refurbish,
7 complete, replace, or maintain an aircraft and who (i) hold an
8 Air Agency Certificate and are empowered to operate an approved
9 repair station by the Federal Aviation Administration, (ii)
10 have a Class IV Rating, and (iii) conduct operations in
11 accordance with Part 145 of the Federal Aviation Regulations.
12 The exemption does not include aircraft operated by a
13 commercial air carrier providing scheduled passenger air
14 service pursuant to authority issued under Part 121 or Part 129
15 of the Federal Aviation Regulations. The changes made to this
16 paragraph (40) by Public Act 98-534 are declarative of existing
17 law.

18 (41) Tangible personal property sold to a
19 public-facilities corporation, as described in Section
20 11-65-10 of the Illinois Municipal Code, for purposes of
21 constructing or furnishing a municipal convention hall, but
22 only if the legal title to the municipal convention hall is
23 transferred to the municipality without any further
24 consideration by or on behalf of the municipality at the time
25 of the completion of the municipal convention hall or upon the
26 retirement or redemption of any bonds or other debt instruments

1 issued by the public-facilities corporation in connection with
2 the development of the municipal convention hall. This
3 exemption includes existing public-facilities corporations as
4 provided in Section 11-65-25 of the Illinois Municipal Code.
5 This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of Section 2-70.

6 (42) Beginning January 1, 2017, menstrual pads, tampons,
7 and menstrual cups.
