SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

New Act

Creates the Illinois Human Services Commission Act. Provides that the General Assembly finds that the State depends upon public and private service providers to deliver many critical human services necessary to protect and enhance the welfare of its citizens, including its most vulnerable populations; that the citizens of Illinois and their communities depend upon these services to protect public health, create individual and family well-being, improve public safety, revitalize local economies, and enhance learning; and that a strong and well-managed network of public and private human services is integral to the achievement of other State goals in the areas of health and wellness, educational outcomes, workforce development, and an improved business climate. Creates the Illinois Human Services Commission to undertake a systematic review of human services programs with the goal of ensuring their consistent delivery in the State. Requires the Commission to make recommendations for achieving a system that will provide for the efficient and effective delivery of high quality human services. Contains provisions concerning Commission recommendations and best efforts; Commission membership and appointments; reporting requirements; and transparency.

2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the
Illinois Human Services Commission Act.

6 Section 5. Legislative findings. The General Assembly7 finds that:

8 (1) The State of Illinois depends upon public and private 9 service providers to deliver many critical human services 10 necessary to protect and enhance the welfare of its citizens, 11 including its most vulnerable populations.

12 (2) The citizens of Illinois and their communities depend 13 upon these services to protect public health, create individual 14 and family well-being, improve public safety, revitalize local 15 economies, and enhance learning.

16 (3) Human services play a vital role in every community and 17 legislative district across the State, providing jobs and 18 revenue in addition to services and supports to children and 19 youth, families, workers, the elderly, people with 20 disabilities, and other vulnerable populations.

(4) A strong and well-managed network of public and private
human services is integral to the achievement of other State
goals in the areas of health and wellness, educational

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A lack of adequate appropriations, clear goals, 3 (5) spending priorities, and measurable outcomes along with delays 4 5 in payments, inadequate rates, duplicative reporting 6 requirements, and other systemic barriers prevent private 7 entities from achieving the goal of a strong and effective 8 network of well managed public and private service providers.

9 (6) The maintenance of a strong and well managed network of 10 human services requires a joint planning process that brings 11 together public and private experts in human services to 12 identify best practices and strategies.

13 Section 10. Illinois Human Services Commission. The 14 Illinois Human Services Commission is created to undertake a 15 systematic review of human services programs with the goal of 16 ensuring their consistent delivery in the State.

17 Section 15. Duties.

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(a) The Commission shall review all State human services programs and make recommendations for achieving a system that will provide for the efficient and effective delivery of high quality human services. These recommendations shall include the following elements:

(1) Ensuring adequate appropriations for the provisionof human services.

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(2) Establishing processes for determining fair,
 adequate, and timely reimbursement.

3 (3) Maintaining efficient management of
4 publicly-funded programs and services.

5 (4) Implementing best practices within the human6 services field.

7 (5) Creating outcome measures and accountability8 mechanisms.

9 (6) Developing projections for future human services 10 needs based on demographic trends and other related 11 variables.

(b) The Commission shall make best efforts to:

(1) Use existing reports, research, and planning
efforts and call for additional reports and research to
support its work.

16 (2) Seek input from existing advisory councils and task
 17 forces that address human services delivery, as well as
 18 other human services experts and the public-at-large
 19 including one or more public hearings to take and consider
 20 public comment.

(3) Identify opportunities for increased efficiency or
 cross-agency collaboration regarding human services
 delivery.

24 Section 20. Membership; appointments; meetings; support.25 (a) The Commission shall include representation from both

public and private organizations, and its membership shall 1 2 reflect regional, racial, and cultural diversity to ensure representation of the needs of all Illinois citizens. 3 Commission members shall include one member appointed by the 4 5 President of the Senate, one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate, one member appointed by the Speaker of 6 7 the House of Representatives, one member appointed by the 8 Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, and other 9 members appointed by the Governor. The Governor's appointments 10 shall include, without limitation, the following:

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(1) A co-chair from the Office of the Governor and a co-chair not employed by a governmental entity to represent the interests of non-governmental organizations.

14 (2) Eight members of the General Assembly representing15 each of the majority and minority caucuses of each chamber.

16 (3) The Directors or Secretaries of the following State17 agencies or their designees:

(A) Department of Human Services. 18 19 (B) Department of Children and Family Services. 20 (C) Department of Healthcare and Family Services. 21 (D) State Board of Education. 22 (E) Department on Aging. 23 (F) Department of Juvenile Justice. 24 (G) Department of Corrections. 25 (H) Department of Public Health. 26 (4) Local government stakeholders and nongovernmental

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1	stakeholders with an interest in human services, including
2	representation among the following private-sector fields
3	and constituencies:
4	(A) Early childhood education and development.
5	(B) Child care.
6	(C) Child welfare.
7	(D) Youth services.
8	(E) Developmental disabilities.
9	(F) Mental health.
10	(H) Employment and training.
11	(I) Sexual and domestic violence.
12	(J) Alcohol and substance abuse.
13	(K) Local community collaborations among human
14	services programs.
15	(L) Immigrant services.
16	(M) Affordable housing.
17	(N) Re-entry.
18	(O) Food and nutrition.
19	(P) Homelessness.
20	(Q) Older adults.
21	(R) Physical disabilities.
22	(S) Business.
23	(T) Philanthropy.
24	(U) Labor.
25	(V) Law enforcement.
26	(b) Members shall serve without compensation for the

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1 duration of the Commission.

2 (c) In the event of a vacancy, the appointment to fill the 3 vacancy shall be made in the same manner as the original 4 appointment.

5 (d) The Commission shall convene within 60 days after the 6 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 97th General 7 Assembly. The initial meeting of the Commission shall be 8 convened by the co-chair selected by the Governor. Subsequent 9 meetings shall convene at the call of the co-chairs. The 10 Commission shall meet on a quarterly basis, or more often if 11 necessary.

12 (e) The Department of Human Services shall provide13 administrative support to the Commission.

14 Section 25. Report. The Commission shall report to the 15 Governor and the General Assembly on the Commission's progress 16 toward its goals and objectives by June 30, 2013, and every 17 June 30 thereafter. A final report shall be due no later than 2 18 years after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 19 97th General Assembly. The Commission and the terms of its 20 members shall expire upon delivery of the final report.

21 Section 30. Transparency. In addition to whatever policies 22 or procedures it may adopt, all operations of the Commission 23 shall be subject to the provisions of the Freedom of 24 Information Act and the Open Meetings Act. This Section shall
