## Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Sec. 10. Commission on the Elimination of Poverty. The Commission on the Elimination of Poverty is created. The purpose of the Commission is to comprehensively address poverty in Illinois consistent with international human rights standards. The initial goal of the Commission is to develop a poverty elimination strategic plan to reduce extreme poverty in Illinois by 50% or more by 2015. Additional goals may be established by the Commission. In developing the overall strategic plan, and in working toward the goal of reducing extreme poverty in Illinois by at least 50% by 2015, the Commission shall address, at a minimum, all of the following:
  - (1) Access to safe, decent and affordable housing.
  - (2) Access to adequate food and nutrition.
    - (3) Access to affordable and quality health care.
- 21 (4) Equal access to quality education and training.
- 22 (5) Dependable and affordable transportation.
- 23 (6) Access to quality and affordable child care.

- 1 (7) Opportunities to engage in meaningful and 2 sustainable work that pays a living wage.
- 3 (8) The availability of adequate income supports.

4 The strategic plan shall include specific policy and fiscal 5 recommendations and a timeline for each stage of implementation 6 each recommendation. For each recommendation, 7 Commission shall identify in measurable terms the actual or potential impact. The Commission may review and may make 8 9 comments and recommendations on existing or proposed programs, 10 policies, administrative rules, and statutes that have an 11 impact on poverty in Illinois and, in particular, people living 12 in extreme poverty.
