SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 312

- WHEREAS, Lt. Gov. Corinne Wood served as the first female Lt. Governor of Illinois from 1999 to 2003; and
- WHEREAS, Lt. Gov. Wood was known as a staunch advocate for women and children; her experience also included service as a state representative, attorney, and community activist, as well as wife and mother; and
- WHEREAS, Lt. Gov. Wood served as a member of the Illinois House of Representatives from 1997 to 1999, and during her first year as a member of the Illinois Legislature, she passed more bills that were signed into law than any other freshman state representative; and
- WHEREAS, During her bid for Lt. Governor, Lt. Gov. Wood made campaign visits to all 102 counties in Illinois, discussing the ambitious agenda of the Ryan/Wood team, and on November 3rd, 1998, she was elected Lieutenant Governor of Illinois; and
- WHEREAS, During her time as Lt. Governor, Lt. Gov. Wood championed women's health and was dedicated to improving health care for women; and
- WHEREAS, Lt. Gov. Wood launched the highly regarded Check for a Cure campaign to increase contributions to the State's breast cancer research fund; her initiative was extremely effective and, in the first year, doubled the revenue donated to this fund; and
- WHEREAS, Lt. Gov. Wood served as the Chair of Women's Health Illinois, an inter-agency program that focuses on enhancing women's health education and services; she also served as Honorary Chair of the Governor's Commission on the Status of Women; and
- WHEREAS, Lt. Gov. Wood worked to triple funding for the State's Office of Women's Health, expanding health education and outreach efforts and making a program for low-cost breast and cervical exams available to more women throughout Illinois; and
- WHEREAS, Lt. Gov. Wood created and hosted a Midwest Emmy-nominated cable television show, Today's Healthy Woman, to provide important health information to Illinois women and their families; and
- WHEREAS, Lt. Gov. Wood served as the Chair of the Governor's Rural Affairs Council and the Illinois Rural Bond Bank, as well as the Chair of the Illinois Main Street Council; and
- WHEREAS, Lt. Gov. Wood courageously battled with breast cancer throughout her life, including during her time as Lt. Governor; and

WHEREAS, Lt. Gov. Wood's dedication to public service, despite battling breast cancer, showed how strong she was and how dedicated she was to improving Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Above all, Lt. Gov. Wood was a wife to Paul and a mother to three children, Ashley, Brandon, and Courtney; she will be missed by her family, friends, and colleagues; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May 28, 2021 as "Lt. Governor Corinne Wood Day" in the State of Illinois to commemorate her years of public service and to celebrate the life that she led; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be presented to Lt. Gov. Wood's family as a symbol of our esteem and respect.

MESSAGES FROM THE HOUSE

A message from the House by

Mr. Hollman, Clerk:

Mr. President -- I am directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives has adopted the following joint resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the Senate, to-wit:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37

WHEREAS, It is highly fitting that the Illinois General Assembly pays honor and respect to the truly great individuals who have served our country and, in doing so, have made the ultimate sacrifice for our nation; and

WHEREAS, John W. Frederick Jr. was born on December 13, 1923 in Manito; on May 7, 1942, he enlisted in the Marine Corps and subsequently attended Marine Corps Recruit Depot in San Diego, California; during 40 combat missions in World War II, he served as a tail gunner and radar operator on Grumman TBF Avenger torpedo bombers; and

WHEREAS, After the war, John Frederick flew reconnaissance missions in China during Operation Beleaguer; and

WHEREAS, During the first year of the Korean War, Technical Sergeant John Frederick flew 90 combat missions as the airborne intercept operator in Grumman F7F Tigercats with Marine All Weather Fighter Squadron 542 (VMF(N)-542); he was awarded a Distinguished Flying Cross for his service before rotating home in July of 1951; and

WHEREAS, After the war, Master Sergeant John Frederick was stationed at Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point, North Carolina and Naval Air Station Atsugi, Japan; in June of 1959, he was assigned to Naval Air Station Patuxent River, Maryland where he worked on the F4H-1 Phantom II project; in July of 1961, he was promoted to warrant officer; in December of 1964, he was assigned to Marine Attack Squadron 533 (VMA-533) at Cherry Point; in May of 1965, he was transferred to Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 323 (VMFA-323); and

WHEREAS, On December 1, 1965, Chief Warrant Officer 2 John Frederick deployed to Vietnam with VMFA-323; on the night of December 7, he was the radar intercept officer of an F-4B Phantom during an escort mission out of Da Nang Air Base when his plane was shot down by a surface-to-air missile over North Vietnam; although he severely burned his hands when his part of the cockpit was enveloped by flames, he successfully ejected from the aircraft; the pilot, Major John H. Dunn, also survived the crash and was captured six days later; and

WHEREAS, The next morning, John Frederick accidentally walked into an enemy gun emplacement and single-handedly attacked the position; he managed to fight off North Vietnamese soldiers before he was overpowered and captured; he was subsequently beaten and taken to a prisoner of war camp in Hanoi; and

WHEREAS, As one of the first Marines to be taken as a POW during the war, John Frederick helped set the standard for conduct of other captured Marines, unifying the men and increasing morale; he strictly adhered to the code of conduct and refused to take part in North Vietnamese propaganda programs; his resistance to the enemy also caused him to be routinely tortured and beaten during countless interrogations; and

WHEREAS, John Frederick also faced extended periods of solitary confinement for refusing to bow and refusing to provide biographical information; in 1972, he was held in solitary confinement for 90 days and contracted either typhoid fever or meningitis; falling into a coma, he was likely being transported to a hospital in Hanoi when he died on or about July 19, 1972 after more than 2,400 days in captivity; and

WHEREAS, While other American prisoners of war were released between February and April of 1973 during Operation Homecoming, John Frederick's remains were returned to the United States on March 13, 1974; he was buried at Mount Hope Cemetery in Tremont; and

WHEREAS, John Frederick was posthumously promoted to chief warrant officer 4 and was awarded the Navy Cross; he was also awarded the Silver Star, two Legions of Merit, and the Bronze Star for his actions while a prisoner of war, making him one of the most decorated warrant officers in Marine Corps history; in 1999, a study lounge at The Basic School in Marine Corps Base Quantico was dedicated in his name; and

WHEREAS, CWO4 John W. Frederick Jr. was survived by his wife, Lorraine Wilma, and his four children, Michael, Gerald, Barbara, and Paula; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate Interstate I-155 from Interstate 74 to IL Route 9 near Morton and Tremont as the "CWO4 John W. Frederick Jr. Memorial Highway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation is requested to erect, at suitable locations consistent with State and federal regulations, appropriate plaques or signs giving notice of the name of the "CWO4 John W. Frederick Jr. Memorial Highway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the family of CWO4 John W. Frederick Jr. and the Secretary of Transportation.

READING BILLS FROM THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES A SECOND TIME

On motion of Senator Villivalam, **House Bill No. 645** having been printed, was taken up and read by title a second time.

The following amendment was offered in the Committee on Commerce, adopted and ordered printed:

AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO HOUSE BILL 645

AMENDMENT NO. $\underline{1}$. Amend House Bill 645 by replacing everything after the enacting clause with the following:

"Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the Illinois Future of Work Act.

- Section 5. Findings and declaration of policy. The General Assembly hereby finds, determines, and declares the following:
 - (1) The future of work is a critically important conversation for those currently in the workforce as well as those looking to reenter or enter it as Illinois contemplates an equitable economic recovery from the coronavirus pandemic.
 - (2) Policymakers at every level of government will be required to deal with the concurrent crises of the pandemic recovery, systemic inequities, and creating good-paying jobs. Policymakers must be able to anticipate the workforce policies and programs needed in the future to combat poverty, inequality, and climate change.
 - (3) Rapid advancements in technology, specifically the automation of jobs and expanded artificial intelligence capability, have had and will continue to have a profound impact on the type, quality, and number of jobs available in our 21st century economy.
 - (4) Automation and the rise of artificial intelligence and predictive analytics will have major impacts on industries and their jobs; from the service sector to white collar positions, the impacts will be felt by millions of workers in the United States.
 - (5) Despite the opportunities and challenges presented by rapid advancements in technology, Illinois is a leader in the innovation and development of technology. Illinois has been an engine of progress, and it drives new products that connect people across the globe, sparking economic growth and building prosperity.
 - (6) Illinois has a large, diverse, and well-educated labor force ready to meet the challenges it faces.
 - (7) Innovative partnerships across the private and public sectors need to be created.

Section 10. Illinois Future of Work Task Force; duties and responsibilities.

- (a) The Illinois Future of Work Task Force is created. The Task Force shall be proactive and plan for the future of work while simultaneously addressing the state of work today.
 - (b) The duties and responsibilities of the Task Force include the following:

- (1) The Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall identify and assess the new and emerging technologies that have the potential to significantly affect employment, wages, and skill requirements.
- (2) The Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall develop a set of job standards and working conditions that will ensure that future work in Illinois builds a vibrant middle class.
- (3) The Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall identify the potential jobs of the future and opportunities to shape those jobs for the improvement of life for all of Illinois.
- (4) The Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall compile research and best practices from other states and countries on how to deploy technology to benefit workers and the public good.
- (5) The Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall develop tools to assess the impact of proposed technologies and evaluate their costs and benefits on workers, employers, the public and the State.
- (6) The Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall identify policies and practices that will help businesses, workers, and communities thrive economically throughout the State of Illinois.
- (7) The Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall propose workforce development, training, education, and apprenticeship programs for the jobs of the future.

Section 15. Membership; meetings.

- (a) The members of the Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall include and represent the diversity of the people of Illinois, and shall be composed of the following:
 - (1) four members, including one representative of the business community and one representative of the labor community, appointed by the Senate President, one of whom shall serve as co-chair:
 - (2) four members, including one representative of the business community and one representative of the labor community, appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate, one of whom shall serve as co-chair;
 - (3) four members, including one representative of the business community and one representative of the labor community, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one of whom shall serve as co-chair;
 - (4) four members, including one representative of the business community and one representative of the labor community, appointed by the Minority Leader of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one of whom shall serve as co-chair;
 - (5) four members, one from each of the following: the business community, the labor community, the environmental community, and the education community that advocate for job growth, appointed by the Governor;
 - (6) three members appointed by the Governor whose professional expertise is at the juncture of work and workers' rights;
 - (7) the Director of Labor or his or her designee;
 - (8) the Director of Commerce and Economic Opportunity or his or her designee;
 - (9) the Director of Employment Security or his or her designee;
 - (10) the Superintendent of the State Board of Education or his or her designee:
 - (11) the Executive Director of the Illinois Community College Board or his or her designee; and
 - (12) the Executive Director of the Board of Higher Education or his or her designee.
- (b) Appointments for the Illinois Future of Work Task Force must be finalized by August 31, 2021. The Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall hold one meeting per month for a total of 7 meetings, and the first meeting must be held within 30 days after appointments are finalized.
 - (c) Members of the Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall serve without compensation.
- (d) The Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity shall provide administrative support to the Task Force.

Section 20. Report; dissolution.

- (a) The Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall issue a report based upon its findings in the course of performing its duties and responsibilities specified under Section 10. The report shall be written by an independent authority with subject matter expertise on the future of work.
- (b) The Illinois Future of Work Task Force shall submit its final report to the Governor and the General Assembly no later than April 1, 2022, and is dissolved upon the filing of its report.

Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon becoming law.".
