your examination to drive an automobile, that they can't

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM): 16. Take it out of the record., I can't see you, Senator. 17. The next bill will be HB 12. Read HB 12 by title a 3rd time 18. Mr. Secretary. 12. 19. SECRETARY: 20. HB 12 (Secretary reads title of the bill) 21. 3rd reading of the bill. 22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM): 23. Senator Walker will explain his bill. 24. SENATOR WALKER: 25. ... Thank you, Mr. President, and Members of the Senate. 26. HB 12...introduced with bi-partisan sponsorship. ...pro-27. vides that vehicles if they make a right turn after a full 28. stop at a red signal, unless specifically prohibited by 29. local ordinance by posted sign at the intersection. also permits a left turn after a full stop at red signal only 30. 31. as authorized by local ordinance by posted sign at the inter-32. section. I've been...asked as to the effective date and the

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bill...is amended -- the effective date of January 1,74. Now

briefly...this concept would expedite the flow of traffic. 1. would ease traffic congestion and reduce one source of driver 2. frustration. ... Cars would be permitted to turn right at a 3. red light after a full stop or to turn left on red from a one 4. way street into a one way street on which traffic moves to the 5. left. The drivers would have to yield the right of way to 6. pedestrians and to through traffic. Municipalities would be 7. empowered to designate any intersections where such turns 8. would be prohibited by signs. The bill prohibits pedestrians 9. from crossing against a red light. A provision to promote 10. the safety of pedestrians. California implemented their 11. right turn on red in '46 and since then it has been adopted 12. by 11 other states and I know a number of you have driven 13. in those states. It goes into effect in Indiana July the 1st 14. of this year. And no state that's ever enacted it has ever 15. repealed it. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration 16. has recommended inclusion of right turn on red in the Federal 17. Model Code on Uniform Traffic. The bill has the support of 18. the Secretary of State's office, WMAQ-TV ran a series of 19. editorials, and the viewer response was 8511 in favor of 20.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

the right turn and 30, only 37 opposed.

Gentlemen, please.

## SENATOR WALKER:

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Inasmuch as it doesn't go into effect until January 1,
'74, there's sufficient time for municipalities to select
locations where right turn on red should be prohibited and
for a campaign of public education to be conducted by the
news media, the Secretary of the State and the State Police.
I think it's a good bill. I've had a lot of reader response
to it. And I'd appreciate a favorable vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Partee.

#### SENATOR PARTEE:

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Well, I want Senator Walker know...to know that I personally sort of like this program. I have observed it...
 PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

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Please, Ladies and Gentlemen.

#### SENATOR PARTEE:

I have observed this program particularly in the western states. I would only say that I have a communication from the Secretary of the Department of Transportation, Mr. Bond, who recognizes that this is a subject that is under much discussion at this time. And he says this, there is a Federally coordinated research program that has taken into consideration all of the proposals involved here and that very soon there will be authorization or lack of authorization for the studying of this particular problem in depth. Whereby they will make recommendations for a National policy, which I suppose is to say as he says in his para...last paragraph, I strongly recommend that no change be made in Illinois law until the results of the Federal Research Study are completed and distributed to the states. And he would appreciate our cooperation in that matter. I suppose what he's · saying really is that your bill though perhaps meritorious is just a little early because they'd like first to get this coordinated Federal study so that the recommendation could be made Nation-wide. I don't want to be the first by whom the...there's an old expression of mine, "Never be the first by which the new is tried and or...yet the last to lay the old aside" - but I think it is premature at this time. And I want you to understand, Senator Walker, that any lack of support of your bill does not indicate any lack of feeling and concern about what you seek to accomplish. It's just that we prefer, in the suggestion of the Director of Transportation, to wait until the National survey has been

made so that this matter may be...if...it shows to be proper,

implemented Nation-wide.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Any further discussion? Senator Scholl.

SENATOR SCHOLL:

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6. Mr. President, and Members of the Senate, I've heard
7. over the past month and a half, the City of Chicago is doing
8. this. Now, I hear the Federal government's doing something
9. else. I say the State of Illinois needs this bill and we
10. ought to get on with the job and pass it. And I ask for
11. a favorable roll call on this bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Clarke.

SENATOR CLARKE:

If the sponsor would yield, I would like to ask him a question or two.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

He indicates he will. Senator Walker.

SENATOR CLARKE:

Senator Walker, I've heard a good deal about the problems of the municipalities financially. Now, can you give me or does anybody have any facts as to how many streets actually have this heavy traffic that this would facilitate the flow, as against the cost of the municipalities in putting up signs prohibiting the right turn.

SENATOR WALKER:

I...I think the answer to that, Senator Clarke, would be... would...you'd have to know the number of stop...red and green lights in each municipality, in my own Lansing they're probably aren't over 10 or 12. This would probably be permitted at half of them... In Chicago Heights probably the same number of stop lights... Thornton, Glenwood and... well Glenwood about 3 or 4 and I can think of a couple of

streets there where a right turn would expedite the flow
 of traffic. It would...it...it would depend on the number
 of stop and go lights in each municipality. As I say,
 using my town of 26,000 as an example...they would prob ably have 12 corners to post there.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Clarke.

#### SENATOR CLARKE:

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Let me ask further then. As I understand the present law, ...a municipality can permit this if they so desire. How widespread is that in this present time? How many municipalities are using a right turn or just putting up a sign to allow it?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Walker.

## SENATOR WALKER:

...The City of Rockford now has it. The second largest city in the State and the Illinois Motor Vehicle Law now permits right turns on red at certain...designated corners if the corner's posted. So, if it's not causing any inconvenience and if it's expediting the flow of traffic in Rockford...I assume the same would apply to Peoria and some of our larger cities as well as some of our 25 - 30 thousand population.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Clarke.

## SENATOR CLARKE:

Well, let me...let me ask a further question then. Many of those large corners are becoming very...congested and that's the reason for this bill. But we have in many of these corners a left turn period. And...if a person gets in a wrong lane because they don't know that this flashing light is going to go on sho...saying that they can turn left

l. then they make the people in back of them mad. Now, the 2. same thing is going to be true in the right lane. If they don't know and they pull up in the right lane not intending 4. to turn right. Isn't this going to cause confusion? 5.

SENATOR WALKER:

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... I understand that it hasn't worked out that way in ... Rockford and ... I think the average motorist, if he's going to turn right on a red light is...going to turn right at an intersection is usually in the right-hand...lane. I say, it's worked well in Rockford where they've...they've tried it by ordinance.

## SENATOR CLARKE:

Mr. President, I... I just like to conclude by saying that I don't know enough about this to say that because it's worked in Rockford, it's good for the entire State. ... There is differing opinions about it. I have information from the Northwestern Traffic Institute that indicates the Institute of Traffic Engineers which is a Nationwide organization is not sold on the idea and it's trying to talk this group, that Senator Walker said is for it, into reversing their stand. I think it's a rather questionable thing and I also think most important that pedestrians have rights, too. And it's going to make for great difficulty in pedestrians crossing the street as to whether a car's coming around the corner from the back of them and as to the coordinating of the traffic signals, as to when you're going to walk on a green, and when the car's coming on the green and you can't walk on the red. And, I think we ought to have more study as the Federal government is doing.

# PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

The Senator's time is up. Senator Course. 31.

#### SENATOR COURSE: 32.

Yes, Mr. President, Members of the Senate, this is a

very good piece of legislation but as Senator Partee pointed l. out it's a little bit premature. Now, as has been pointed 2. out by previous speakers, I'd just like to cover it again, 3. the Federal government DOT is making a study. They appro-4. priated \$100,000 to see if this would be feasible throughout 5. the United States. The State Department of Transportation 6. is opposed to it. They're making a study. The...City of 7. Chicago, the Traffic Engineers in the City of Chicago are 8. making a study of it. In fact, they have 11 or 130 locations 9. in the City of Chicago where they have posted signs permitting 10. right turns. Now, they have had a lot of complaints. Now, 11. in the City of Chicago they've taken all different kinds of ... 12. of intersections. They've taken them close to schools, 13. business districts, residential districts, church districts, 14. every place. Now, they've had a lot of complaints from people 15. around churches and schools where signs have been posted. 16. Now, another thing I'd like to add, Ladies and Gentlemen, 17. these signs aren't put up for nothing. These... 18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM): 19.

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## SENATOR COURSE:

...signs cost a minimum of \$15.00 a piece. That's a minimum. Now, we don't know what it's going to cost to put them up. The...intersections require four signs to be posted. Now, as I say the City of Chicago is currently making a study, they have taken some of the signs down because they were...were too many complaints and the... pedestrians were complaining. Now, the radio station in Chicago has done a very good job of...promoting this right turn on red lights. But even they admit, Ladies and Gentlemen, 11 states in one of their editorials there was...is strict discipline by the people...the pedestrians and crossing against the red lights. Now, in the State of Illinois we don't have

that...kind of discipline with the people. Representative 1. Brandt and I were crossing the other night about 9:00 o'clock. 2. A semi came around the corner, we had the ... the red light, the 3. walk sign and a...truck made us get back on the...on the curb 4. 5. on the other side of the street. We had in...we had to run back to...for fear of being hit. Well, we...if...if the motorist 6. 7. doesn't care that much about a pedestrian when they have the right-of-way, what are they going to do when they have the 8. right-of-way and they...the vehicle is permitted to turn on the 9. red light. Even in the editorial here, it says right here 10. Ladies and Gentlemen and I quote, "But the dangerous prac-11. tice of crossing against a red light would be prohibited." 12. Now, who's going to prohibit that a... are we going to put 13. a policeman on every corner. If we're going to put police-14. men on every corner, we don't have to have a sign 15. permitting...right turn after a stop on a red light. Most 16. important, and I continue to quote, "Most important they would 17. have the right-of-way even if they were wrong." Now 18. that's a wonderful piece of verbiage. Even if they are 19. wrong. In other words, if you get hit, well you're wrong. 20. It's all right, you can get hit and it goes on to say, "And 21. where right turns might not be safe, signs would be put up 22. prohibiting them." Well, this is fine but again, Ladies and 23. Gentlemen, we go into the cost. How many of these inter-24. sections are going to be posted? Who's going to pay for 25. them? How long are they going to be posted? And some of 26. these municipalities is by local ordinance okay. So, I'm 27. alderman, a warder, I'm a township committeeman and some-28. body, some businessman comes to me and he says, well 29. there's too much traffic building up on the main street and 30. if you...may...permit a right turn at the next block it'll 31. clear the traffic away from in front of my house. 32.

concerned with whether there's going to be anybody...any

pedestrians crossing. It's just to get the traffic away from in front of his establishment. So, the local politician, we're all politicians, we're going to go to the proper people and say, well put a sign up in that corner. I'd...I think it's a good spot for one. Ladies and Gentleman, I did ask Senator Walker to postpone or to...allow me to put an amendment on this bill, postponing the date for one year. Make it effective January 1, 1975. When the studies are complete, I would be happy to support this bill and I think all the membership of the Sen...Senate would be happy to support it. But, again, I say, this legislation is a little bit premature and I'm not going to see a bunch of people get hit by a bunch of maniacs who are in a hurry to get home and sit in front of their...their idiot box and watch TV.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Any further discussion? The question shall be put. Senator Walker.

## SENATOR WALKER:

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It's those people who are in a hurry to get home as a result of waiting at a red light when there wasn't any traffic crossing the intersection that...get in trouble.

And in regards to these studies, Mr. President and Members of the Senate, takes me back about 12 years ago when...I introduced a bill to put the numbers on the plates such as they are now. ...I recall...Charlie Carpentier was Secretary of State. Well, they made a study and six years later the legislation...passed. ...This right turn on red has worked excellently in states like California and Florida where there's a lot of off-season travel. It's endorsed by the House Motor Vehicle Committee and I think that's as good a study commission as we...can look forward to or expect any expertise...from. It's similar to the picture on the driver's license legislation that's been kicked around

l. here for five or six terms in which I've sponsored in the 2. past. Now, I might say I've sponsored similar legislation 3. to this two years ago and they were talking about a study 4. at that time. I think it's high time that we passed 5. legislation like this. If a car pulls up to a red light 6. it's on a half a minute, a minute, a quarter minute and 7. a half. 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I just heard two very vacuous objections to this bill.

...Either their mentor, Bakalis, ought to get rid of his affidavit or this bill ought to pass. It's...it's so
