- I...believe this is not a controversial bill. I've
- 4. spoken to the leadership on both sides of the aisle.

My feeling is that this is another one of what is becoming to be a fairly common problem and that is the attempt to distinguish between what is an act of classification...with respect to the real property tax. And that, of course, can be done only by counties of over 200,000 or by the Legislature with respect to counties of over 200,000 population and an act of defining what is the assessed valuation of property. ... We have virtually no case law on the matter. Dale Yung had called my attention to one case which...is perhaps gives some hints about where we may be going but certainly doesn't solve it in terms of the new Constitutional language. My own feeling is, that at least it is arguable and defensible that the basic objective of this Act, that is, the roll back device... could be called an act of defining what is the value of that property and on that basis it would not have to be confined to counties of 200,000 population or over. I think it's a close question. I think no one is going to know for sure until there's a good court test which squarely presents it but I think it is a defensible position.

Senator Donnewald.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

SENATOR DONNEWALD:

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Yes, Mr. President and Members of the Senate, of course this particular bill is using the farmer as a camouflage to protect the land speculators. It was a bad bill and it is a bad bill and if it's introduced again, it'd still be a bad bill. The land if it's held for more than three years, local governments will lose tax revenues. If the land speculator farms the land, his holding costs are reduced so he can make himself out to be a farmer and...and have his taxes reduced. And for the same amount of money, he can hold more land and

hold the same land longer. This...the speculator works with
 public money while the taxes are shifted to other people. I
 ...I oppose the bill and I would hope that the Senate not
 pass it.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

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Is there further discussion? Senator Latherow. SENATOR LATHEROW:

Well, Senator I just would like to have you answer one inquiry. The area where property may normally be considered by those joining it first we'll say for instance \$30,000 and someone gets the speculative idea that that should be worth or would eventually be worth sixty-five, and I'll have you know I am using an exact case, \$65,000. Now, what are you going to do on a case like that? There is no particular area where there is any development going on in...within six miles of this property. How are you going to assess him?

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

I'm not quite sure I understand the question. But... quite frankly, the concept here is...to use an area, to use an example, like my area. We have, and I might add that I haven't heard word one from any land developer being in favor of this but every farmer in my district is screaming for it because they suddenly find farmland that is truly worth anywhere from 8 to \$15,000 an acre for development and if they're taxed on that basis, they're in real trouble.

...What this allows us to do and it is at the request of the individual land owner or farmer, it allows them to, at their request use the roll back concept for assessment. ...I'm not quite sure I understood your question. I tried to answer it.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Latherow.

SENATOR LATHEROW:

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Well, I'm just wondering...when you go in an area and purchase property and pay what those living there generally assume is twice what it's actually worth and the man is speculating in his own mind that there's going to be future development in that area. It's just exactly what he's doing. Now, he in turn is putting a penalty on every property owner in that whole township and county because he is proving to the supervisor of assessments that that land is worth more than what any man next to it locally is willing to pay. Now, you say you want to be sure and not penalize the farmer. Well, let me tell you in a case like this you're penalizing everyone of them around this man who individually has a speculative mind.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

If I might point out that that doesn't have a whole lot to do with the bill. But, I agree with you, we've had cases where people have come in and paid unbelievable prices for individual pieces of property or for that matter individual homes. Hopefully, your supervisor of assessment and your local assessor is intelligent enough to realize that one sale does not make the basis for assessing the whole are. Now, quite frankly, we've had some assessors up in the northern part of the State that have had gone, let the productivity...basis of assessment go by the wayside and started assessing farmland for what it would sell for if it were owned by a developer.

Now, I'm not concerned. I could care less about a developer. They can pay the taxes, they should pay the taxes. But we've got some people, I'm not talking about one or two, I'm

- talking about hundreds of families. Some of whom have been
- on the land hundreds of years. Three and four and five
- generations and they're going to be taxed off this land
- 4. if they don't get this particular piece of legislation.
- 5. That is my concern. That is why I'm sponsoring this bill.
- 6. This is why I...I want this bill passed.
- 7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
- Senator Berning. Excuse me, Senator Latherow, you
 have another question?

Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Body. 17. At the possible expense of being redundant, I want to rise 18. in support of this HB 211 and attempt to point out that this 19. 20. is a potential vehicle for slowing down the tremendously accelerated development in the urban counties. The way the 21. assessment practices are now, a sale, and this is what 22. 23. Senator Latherow was objecting to, a sale is reflected in increased assessments for surrounding properties. It 24. becomes absolutely financially impossible for the person 25. to continue to hold the land. We are thereby forcing the 26. land into sale and into premature development. HB 211 is 27. a legitimate and defensible tool to hopefully retain some 28. additional open land for an additional period of time. 29. Ultimately, I suppose most of the territory around our 30. urban areas will be developed. But if we can slow it down 31. somewhat by making it possible for those who are actually 32. farming to continue to do so by giving them this kind 33.

of relief, it is highly desirable and completely defensible.

I certainly would urge an aye vote on this.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Netsch.

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SENATOR NETSCH:

Mr. President, if I might make one brief comment on the merits of the bill. I think it is important to notice that this bill really does not either create or destroy the basic concept that was adopted, I gather two years ago, and that is ... the roll back principle. All it does is say that the roll back principle, if it ever was valid, is now made available to all counties. ... And it seems to me, if indeed it is valid, then if there is good reason to make it available in all of the counties. would like to say, and this point was made by several people at the hearing of the Revenue Committee that there does seem to be some considerable doubt as to whether or not the roll back principle has achieved the purpose for which it was originally adopted. And that is to slow down the speculative process... Some felt that it had, others felt that it had not. It seems to me that the Senate ought to reexamine...certainly next Session, whether that device has worked, whether it is indeed sound. In the meantime though, it seems to me that it is perfectly defensible to allow the same thing to be available to all counties until the whole principle is reexamined.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Schaffer may close debate.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

This bill...is merely an extension of the roll back principle. It's purely optional. It's not mandatory.

It doesn't penalize anbody. It provides a necessary tool.

I might point out that the county superintendent of assessment or the county board's review on several of the medium size northern

- counties are watching to see whether this legislation is
- 2. passed. If it is not passed, I think they will abandon
- 3. the productivity approach and assessment which, I think,
- 4. will cause an awful lot of hardship, I don't think it,
- 5. I know it. It'll put an awful lot of small farmers, some
