27		10 of the Act. Examples of a career exploration activity include, but are not
28		limited to, worksite tours, job shadowing, career-related services, or mentorship.

30		"Career Pathway" means the occupational areas of agriculture, food, and natural
31		resources; arts and communications; finance and business services; health
32		sciences and technology; human and public services; information technology;
33		manufacturing, engineering, technology, and trades.

35		"Endorsement" means the College and Career Pathway Endorsement.

"School Code" means 105 ILCS 5. "State Board" means the State Board of Education. "Supervised Career Development Experience" has the meaning given to that term under Section 10 of the Act. "Team-based Challenge" has the meaning given to that term under Section 10 of the Act. "Work-based Learning" means sustained interactions with industry or community professionals in real workplace settings, to the extent practicable, or simulated environments at an educational institution that foster in-depth, firsthand engagement with the tasks required in each career field and that are aligned to

curriculum and instruction.

This Part establishes the standards and parameters for a school district that implements the College and Career Pathway Endorsement under Section 10-20.84 or 34-18.80 of the School Code and Section 80 of the Act. Except for a school district organized under Article 34 of the School Code, a school district may elect to implement College and Career Pathway Endorsements by July 1, 2025, either by submitting the necessary application materials to the State Board of Education to award the number of endorsements required by Section 10-20.84(c) of the School Code or by the school board of the school district adopting a timeline for implementation (see Section 10-20.84(c) of the School Code).

Section 258.20 College and Career Pathway Endorsement Plan

A school district that implements the Endorsement must submit an application, if applicable, and an Endorsement plan to the State Board via an online portal. The application and plan must be submitted no later than December 15 of the school year the district intends to award the Endorsement. Plans will be reviewed for compliance with the Act, the School Code, and the requirements of this Section. The State Board will notify the district of its approval status no later than February 28 of the submitted school year. The Endorsement plan must include the requirements outlined in this Section.

a) The school district must demonstrate that the Endorsement is aligned with a specific career pathway. A school district may offer multiple routes toward an Endorsement within each career pathway if each route meets the requirements in this Section.
