Ageing, Dept. on

Illinois Multisector Plan for Ageing, 2025

The Plan, called EngAgeing Illinois, has four focus areas: creating livable and connected communities; ensuring health for all ages; investing in caregivers; and affordable aging. For each area, the report lists actions the agency will seek to take in the short term (1-3 years), middle term (4-6 years), and long term (7-10 years), and data to be measured to ensure progress. Collection statistics, 2025

State agencies referred 12,762 collection cases involving \$108.6 million to the Attorney General (89% from the Department of Healthcare and Family Services). Total collections (including older cases) were nearly \$368.9 million. The report categorizes referrals by agency. Amounts

African American Employment Plan for Illinois Public Universities, FY 2025

At the end of FY 2025, 7,173 public university and Board of Higher Education employees identified as African American, up from 6,443 in FY 2024. African Americans employed as administrative support staff in FY 2025 numbered 4,576 (63.8%); African American faculty members totaled 1,097 (15.3%). The highest numbers of African American employees were on the University of Illinois at Chicago (3,048); University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (1,209); Northern Illinois University (701); Chicago State University (552); and Southern Illinois University at

Asian American Employment Plan for Illinois Public Universities, FY 2025

At the end of FY 2025, 6,615 public university and Board of Higher Education employees identified as Asian American, up from 5,956 in FY 2024. Asian Americans employed as administrative support staff in FY 2025 numbered 3,293 (49.8%); Asian American faculty members totaled 2,929 (44.3%). The highest numbers of Asian American employees were at the University of Illinois at Chicago (3,081); University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (1,849); Northern Illinois University (554); Southern Illinois University at Carbondale (274); and Illinois State University (162). Budget recommendations for FY 2027

The Board recommends a \$121.6 million (4.5%) increase in higher education funding, excluding the State Universities Retirement System, to \$2.8 billion. It also recommends fully funding certified amounts for the State Universities Retirement System and the community college health insurance program—a \$47.4 million increase to \$2.4 billion. Hispanic Employment Plan for Illinois Public Universities, FY 2025

At FY 2025 yearend, 5,079 public university or Board of Higher Education employees identified as Hispanic, up from 4,578 in FY 2024. Of those, 3,413 (67.2%) were administrative support staff and 990 (19.5%) were faculty members. The five universities with the most Hispanic employees were the University of Illinois at Chicago (2,870); University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (857); Northern Illinois University (517); Northeastern Illinois University (221); and Illinois State University (153). Native American Employment Plan for Illinois Public Universities, FY 2025

At FY 2025 yearend, 230 public university and Board of Higher Education employees identified as Native American, up from 200 in FY 2024. Of those, 120 (52.2%) were administrative support staff and 52 (22.6%) were faculty members. The five universities with the most Native American employees were the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (80); University of Illinois at Chicago (47); Northern Illinois University (27); Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville (23); and Southern Illinois University at Carbondale (16). Illinois Articulation Initiative annual report, FY 2025

The Illinois Articulation Initiative (IAI) was started in 1993 to help students transfer among Illinois public and private higher education institutions. A 2017 law required all public institutions to participate by accepting a “package” of IAI-approved general education courses in lieu of their general education requirements. Among 44,080 students transferring in fall 2024, over 8,358 completed the IAI general education package at community colleges. Institutions can submit courses to IAI for transfer approval, in which other participating institutions grant credit for the courses. In FY 2025, institutions

submitted 990 courses for review and 685 were approved; 368 faculty members participated in course review panels. (110 ILCS 152/25(b); filed by IBHE Dec. 31, 2025, rec'd by CGFA Jan. 6, 2026, 9 pp.; HAP)

Public university tuition and fee waivers and tuition quartiles, FY 2025

Public universities granted 41,833 tuition and fee waivers worth \$526.2 million in FY 2025. By value, 77.1% of waivers went to graduate students and 22.9% to undergraduates. Most graduate student waivers went to teaching and/or research assistants. About 89% of waivers were discretionary; the rest were mandatory. Public universities waived \$21.7 million in tuition and fees for military veterans, of which state funding covered \$6 million. No tuition or fees were charged to 39% of university undergraduates. Such total waivers went to 43.6% of in-state and 10.7% of out-of-state students. Among students eligible for Pell grants, over 78% paid no tuition or fees. Children and Family Services, Dept. of

Inspector General's report, FY 2025

In FY 2025, 163 child deaths met review criteria, leading to 13 full investigations. Ninety-seven other cases were referred for Child Welfare Employee License investigations; 8,065 criminal

background searches were done; and the Executive Inspector General made 191 investigation referrals. The hotline took 663 calls, including 226 requesting investigations. The report summarizes child death investigations, circumstances of reported deaths, and general investigations conducted. Electricity, gas, water, and sewer utilities annual report, 2025

Major electric utilities' 2024 average prices per kilowatt-hour (kWh) were: Commonwealth Edison, 14.35¢; MidAmerican Energy, 7.64¢; Ameren Illinois, 13.35¢; and Mt. Carmel, 18.58¢. Major gas utilities' 2024 average prices per therm were: MidAmerican Energy, 53.23¢; Nicor Gas, 79.80¢; North Shore Gas, 82.43¢; Peoples Gas, \$125.15; Ameren Illinois, \$132.80; Consumers Gas, 74.79¢; Illinois Gas, 81.27¢; Liberty Utilities, 88.74¢; and Mt. Carmel, \$140.11. The report includes a review of Commission activities, examinations of the utility industry and energy planning, and information on effects of federal actions on state utility services. Commerce and Economic Opportunity, Dept. of *Build Illinois revolving funds and Enterprise Zone Loan Fund, FY 2025*

On June 30, 2025 the Illinois Capital Revolving Loan Fund had \$2.3 million; the Large Business Attraction Fund had \$216.5 million; and the Illinois Equity Fund had \$2.5 million. The Department never received an appropriation for the Enterprise Zone Loan Fund, and the State Comptroller has no such fund. Economic empowerment centers report, June 2024-Sept. 2025

Economic empowerment centers (EECs) give training and resources to start-ups or existing businesses. DCEO selected 10 agencies to be EECs and gave each a \$250,000 grant. Since June 2024, EECs have hosted 372 seminars, trained 644 entrepreneurs, and provided one-to-one business advising to 1,154 people. EECs helped launch 66 new businesses that created 128 jobs and retained 510 jobs. The report lists goals for 2026. Community College Board

Illinois Community College Cannabis Vocational Pilot Program report, 2025

The Program offers community colleges licenses to grow and process cannabis as educational opportunities for students seeking to enter the legal cannabis market. In December 2025, 9 community colleges participated, using federally legal hemp plants in lieu of cannabis. From 2022 through 2025, 1,054 students enrolled in the Program and 52% completed it. The report gives data on enrollment by race, gender, and age, and information on Illinois' cannabis industry. Grant Accountability and Transparency Act annual report, 2026

The Grant Accountability and Transparency Unit (GATU) continued expanding use of its statewide electronic grant management system. By FY 2025 yearend, 20 state agencies

were using the system for pre-award management, and 16 for post-award management. In August 2025, 1,122 entities were on the temporary stop-payment list, and 20,495 entities ineligible for state financial assistance were verified against the federal do-not-pay list. GATU also updated its training courses based on changes in federal guidance and participant feedback. GATU estimated it saved the state \$309.2 million in FY 2025. Comprehensive Housing Plan for 2026

The report lists four policy priorities: (1) address inequities in housing; (2) advance housing access for priority populations; (3) support community development and resiliency through affordable housing investments; and (4) maximize affordable housing resources and policy decisions for the current funding environment. An administrative priority is to plan next steps for the Housing Task Force and comprehensive housing planning after expected renewal of Illinois' Comprehensive Housing Planning Act in 2026. The report summarizes actions and

Human Services, Dept. of

Commission on Children of Incarcerated Parents annual report, 2025

Public Act 102-814, effective January 1, 2023, created the Commission to coordinate and implement recommendations of the Task Force on Children of Incarcerated Parents. The Commission has held 10 meetings, formed four workgroups, and made a plan for implementing the recommendations. New members are still being appointed. Homeless Prevention, Supportive Housing, and Emergency and Transitional Housing Programs annual report, FY 2025

Organizations getting money from the Homeless Prevention Program served 8,709 households with 11,292 adults and 9,297 children. The Program received \$29.8 million in funding. The Supportive Housing Program served 12,068 persons (including 3,148 children) in 8,250 households,

and cost \$23.9 million. The Emergency and Transitional Housing Program provided over 2.6 million shelter nights, 2.4 million meals, and 1.7 million units of support services to homeless persons. It served 25,835 households, including 27,669 adults and 9,522 children, and received \$51.9 million in funding. Illinois Human Trafficking State Strategic Plan, 2025-2028

The Plan includes (1) objectives; (2) a discussion of existing gaps in statewide human trafficking response regarding victim services, training for child welfare workers and law enforcement, screening tools, and funding; (3) strategies for filling the gaps (with a FY 2026 phase called Building the Foundation and a FY 2027 phase called Expanding Capacity); and (4) performance measures. (20 ILCS 1305/1-90(b); filed by DHS Dec. 23, 2025, rec'd by CGFA Jan. 14, 2026, 25 pp. + 11 appendices; AER)

Reimagine Public Safety Act year-end report, 2024

The Office of Firearm Violence Prevention, created by the Act in 2021, and the Firearm Violence Research Group listed cities and communities with

the highest rates of firearm violence that are eligible for grants and other aid under the Act. Federal American Rescue Plan Act funding of \$250 million was allocated for that purpose; the Office has distributed over \$235 million so far. The report reports how it is being distributed; demographic information on persons served; and what programs are being developed. Social Services Block Grant Fund and Local Initiative Fund receipts and transfers, second quarter FY 2026

The Social Services Block Grant Fund began the second quarter with \$500,000 and received \$18.8 million in federal funds. It transferred \$16.8 million to the Special Purpose Trust Fund, \$1.7 million to the General Revenue Fund, and \$331,145 to the Local Initiative Fund, ending with \$500,000. Illinois Broadband Advisory Council

Annual report, 2025

The Council met four times in 2025. The Connect Illinois initiative for broadband

expansion has awarded over \$387 million to 27 Internet service providers to connect 13,400 households. The state's funding under the federal Digital Equity Capacity Grant program was cut. After federal restructuring of the Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program, the Council revised the guidelines and received 400 applications to provide Internet access to all eligible locations in the state. Through the Broadband Regional Engagement for Adoption and Digital Equity program, state universities held events to promote digital literacy and identify broadband access gaps. Joint Committee on Administrative Rules

Annual report, 2025

In 2025, JCAR reviewed 374 rulemakings: 347 proposed, 19 emergency, and 8 required. The report lists and summarizes notable rulemakings on which JCAR took action, and laws and bills related to rulemaking. It also summarizes JCAR's Public Act review and complaint review programs. Labor Relations Board

Annual report, 2025

The Board's State Panel handled 157 unfair labor practice charges, 240 representation cases, and 378 mediation or arbitration cases (including 8 grievance cases). It issued no declaratory rulings. The Local Panel handled 88 unfair labor practice charges, 43 representation cases, and 3 mediation or arbitration cases. The report gives an overview of the Board's functions, and summarizes selected cases. It spent \$1.77 million in FY 2025. Public Health, Dept. of

Breast reconstruction and prostheses options and education program, FYs 2024 to 2025

IDPH partners with other agencies and public universities to raise awareness of breast reconstruction and prostheses options, especially among patients from racial and ethnic minority groups. An updated "Your Right to Know" booklet for breast cancer and breast surgery patients is planned to be issued in 2026. IDPH and its partners provided information through conferences, published interviews with medical providers, and virtual education events. Breast and cervical cancer educational materials

were viewed on IDPH’s website 8,649 times in 2024 and 19,094 times in 2025. (20 ILCS 2310/2310-670(e); undated, rec’d by CGFA Jan. 6, 2026, 8 pp.; GIL)

Health in All Policies

Workgroup annual report, 2025

The Workgroup met twice in 2025 to study a framework for public and private sectors to collaborate on incorporating health considerations into decisions in all policy areas. It made recommendations on disease prevention and management; public health communications; monitoring and early action on public health issues; evaluation and continuous improvement; workforce capacity and development; and resources and cross-sector partnerships. State Board of Health annual report, 2025

The Board worked with IDPH to provide policy guidance on rulemakings, especially for the Illinois Community Health Worker Certification program; heard updates on current public health issues from Department staff and other experts; began revising its bylaws based on changes in statutory responsibilities and training

requirements; and continued to support priority areas in the state’s health improvement plan. (20 ILCS 5/5-565(a)(8); filed by IDPH Jan. 20, 2026, rec’d by CGFA Jan. 28, 2026, 5 pp.; AER)

Used Tire Fund status report, Jan. 2026

A 1989 law created a Used Tire Management Fund to help regulate disposal of used tires, which Asian tiger mosquitos use as breeding sites. The money helps fund IDPH’s Vector Control Program, training local health departments on surveillance and control of mosquitos and other disease vectors, and animal testing for West Nile virus and St. Louis Encephalitis. In 2024, 192 dead birds and 23,298 mosquito samples were tested. In 2025, no birds were collected due to the H5N1 avian influenza outbreak; 23,742 mosquito samples were tested. Under a new Active Tick Surveillance Grant, local health departments collected 7,178 ticks at 527 collection events in FY 2025; they were tested for pathogens. State Board of Education

Analysis of school worker caseloads and employment trends, 2025

In school year 2023-24, student-to-staff ratios in Illinois

schools were above national associations’ recommendations for school counselors, nurses, psychologists, and social workers; speech-language pathologists’ average caseloads met the national standard. Licensing trends from FYs 2022-2024 showed growth in most of those fields. The Board estimated that making student-to-staff ratios meet national associations’ standards would cost at least \$344.1 million the first year. State Education Equity Committee annual progress report, 2025

The report lists the Committee’s activities in 2025 and how they align with ISBE’s strategic plan, and gives updates on efforts to implement past recommendations. Emerging & Minority

Investment Managers annual report, 2025

On June 30, 2025, \$14.5 billion (51.1%) of the Board's total investments were with emerging and minority-owned firms. Such investments met or exceeded the Board's policy goals for each asset class for minority-owned firms; for emerging firms, they meet the goal for one asset class and were below it for the others. Use of Illinois-based brokerages is above the 25% target rate in one asset class and below it in four. The Board's diversity policy is included. State Police, Illinois

Commission on Implementing the Firearms Restraining Order Act annual report, 2025

At its October 2025 meeting, the Commission heard from the Illinois Department of Public Health on the Pause to Heal campaign, addressing gun violence through community engagement and mental health support. In 2024, 254 firearms restraining orders were issued. In 2025 through December 2, 307 were issued. The State Police held at least 39 trainings on firearms restraining orders in 2024 and 2025. Gun Trafficking Information Act compliance report, 2025

The Act requires ISP to report data on firearms used in crimes in Illinois. Lack of a data collection tool for use by all law enforcement agencies makes the collection of all mandated information unattainable. Also, a Memorandum of Understanding between ISP and the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives restricts disclosure of sensitive information to the public. The report gives some 2025 data, including firearms restraining orders received (337); clear and present danger reports (10,429); and FOID and concealed-carry license applications received, and actions on them. ISP conducted 1,001 FOID-related details statewide, seized 833 firearms, and made 891 firearms-related arrests. (5 ILCS 830/10-5(a); undated, rec'd by CGFA Jan. 28, 2026, 3 pp.; AER)

Juvenile charge report, Oct.-Dec. 2025

The State Police received 3,859 charge reports in the fourth quarter of 2025. Charges are listed by disposition code, offense type, gender, race, age at arrest, and county. (20 ILCS 2605/2605-355; undated, rec'd by CGFA Jan. 29, 2026, 3 pp.; DON)

Metropolitan Enforcement Groups annual report, 2025

Metropolitan Enforcement Groups (MEGs) were authorized in 1977 to enforce state drug laws and investigate gang activity. Illinois has 9 MEGs covering 20 counties (including 1 Iowa county). They have 106 staff: 27 State Police officers, 50 local officers, 10 federal officers, and 19 administrative staff. They received \$1.17 million in funding in 2025. They opened 1,203 cases, and closed 784 by arrest and 513 administratively. MEGs arrested 68 gang members and seized 331 weapons. The report also lists drugs seized and drug arrests by type; weapons seized by type; and gang arrests by gang name. It also gives statistics on each MEG. Teachers' Retirement System

Final state funding certification, FY 2027

The TRS Board certified two state funding amounts for FY 2027: \$6.6 billion based on law and \$11.2 billion based on actuarial standards. The certifications include assumptions on impacts of the accelerated pension benefit programs in P.A. 100-587, extended by P.A. 102-718. By June 30, 2025, 27,415 employers had registered with the Program and 11,143 were submitting payroll deductions. Active accounts grew from 152,973 to 157,473 in fiscal year 2025; the average balance rose from \$1,255 to \$1,682. The Fund's total assets rose from \$193.1 million to \$265.8 million, and contributions exceeded distributions by \$43.2 million. The staffing report gives numbers of staff providing direct patient care at the five state veterans' homes. There were 36 resident complaints filed on official grievance forms or requiring follow-up: 17 in Manteno, 8 in Chicago, 5 in Quincy, 3 in Anna, and 3 in LaSalle. Most were resolved.
