## SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

720 ILCS 5/19-3

from Ch. 38, par. 19-3

Amends the Criminal Code of 2012. Provides that a person commits residential burglary when he or she knowingly and without authority enters on the property of another, or any part thereof, with the intent to commit therein a theft of a motor vehicle. Effective immediately.

1 AN ACT concerning criminal law.

## Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Criminal Code of 2012 is amended by changing Section 19-3 as follows:
- 6 (720 ILCS 5/19-3) (from Ch. 38, par. 19-3)
- 7 Sec. 19-3. Residential burglary.
- 8 (a) A person commits residential burglary when he or she 9 knowingly and without authority enters or knowingly and 10 without authority remains within the dwelling place of 11 another, or any part thereof, with the intent to commit 12 therein a felony or theft. This offense includes the offense 13 of burglary as defined in Section 19-1.
  - (a-5) A person commits residential burglary when he or she falsely represents himself or herself, including but not limited to falsely representing himself or herself to be a representative of any unit of government or a construction, telecommunications, or utility company, for the purpose of gaining entry to the dwelling place of another, with the intent to commit therein a felony or theft or to facilitate the commission therein of a felony or theft by another.
  - (a-10) A person commits residential burglary when he or she knowingly and without authority enters on the property of

- 1 another, or any part thereof, with the intent to commit
- 2 <u>therein a theft of a motor vehicle.</u>
- 3 (b) Sentence. Residential burglary is a Class 1 felony.

- 5 Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon
