10 and 27 as follows:

13 Sec. 2. Definitions. As used in this Act:

14 (1) "Department" means the Department of Financial and
15 Professional Regulation.

16 (2) "Secretary" means the Secretary of Financial and
17 Professional Regulation.

18 (3) "Board" means the Clinical Psychologists Licensing
19 and Disciplinary Board appointed by the Secretary.

20 (4) (Blank).

21 (5) "Clinical psychology" means the independent
22 evaluation, classification, diagnosis, and treatment of
23 mental, emotional, behavioral or nervous disorders or
24 conditions, developmental disabilities, alcoholism and

1 substance abuse, disorders of habit or conduct, and the
2 psychological aspects of physical illness. The practice of
3 clinical psychology includes psychoeducational
4 evaluation, therapy, remediation and consultation, the use
5 of psychological and neuropsychological testing,
6 assessment, psychotherapy, psychoanalysis, hypnosis,
7 biofeedback, and behavioral modification when any of these
8 are used for the purpose of preventing or eliminating
9 psychopathology, or for the amelioration of psychological
10 disorders of individuals or groups. "Clinical psychology"
11 does not include the use of hypnosis by unlicensed persons
12 pursuant to Section 3.

13 (6) A person represents oneself ~~himself~~ to be a
14 "clinical psychologist" or "psychologist" within the
15 meaning of this Act when the person ~~he or she~~ holds himself
16 or herself out to the public by any title or description of
17 services incorporating the words "psychological",
18 "psychologic", "psychologist", "psychology", or "clinical
19 psychologist" or under such title or description offers to
20 render or renders clinical psychological services as
21 defined in paragraph (7) of this Section to individuals or
22 the public for remuneration.

23 (7) "Clinical psychological services" refers to any
24 services under paragraph (5) of this Section if the words
25 "psychological", "psychologic", "psychologist",
26 "psychology" or "clinical psychologist" are used to

1 describe such services by the person or organization
2 offering to render or rendering them.

3 (8) "Collaborating physician" means a physician
4 licensed to practice medicine in all of its branches in
5 Illinois who generally prescribes medications for the
6 treatment of mental health disease or illness to the
7 physician's ~~his or her~~ patients in the normal course of
8 the physician's ~~his or her~~ clinical medical practice.

9 (9) "Prescribing psychologist" means a licensed,
10 doctoral level psychologist who has undergone specialized
11 training, has passed an examination as determined by rule,
12 and has received a current license granting prescriptive
13 authority under Section 4.2 of this Act that has not been
14 revoked or suspended from the Department.

15 (10) "Prescriptive authority" means the authority to
16 prescribe, administer, discontinue, or distribute drugs or
17 medicines.

18 (11) "Prescription" means an order for a drug,
19 laboratory test, or any medicines, including controlled
20 substances as defined in the Illinois Controlled
21 Substances Act.

22 (12) "Drugs" has the meaning given to that term in the
23 Pharmacy Practice Act.

24 (13) "Medicines" has the meaning given to that term in
25 the Pharmacy Practice Act.

26 (14) "Address of record" means the designated address

1 recorded by the Department in the applicant's application
2 file or the licensee's license file maintained by the
3 Department's licensure maintenance unit.

4 (15) "Email address of record" means the designated
5 email address recorded by the Department in the

8 limited liability companies, partnerships, and associations;
9 display of license.

10 (a) No individual shall, without a valid license as a
11 clinical psychologist issued by the Department, in any manner
12 hold oneself ~~himself or herself~~ out to the public as a
13 psychologist or clinical psychologist under the provisions of
14 this Act or render or offer to render clinical psychological
15 services as defined in paragraph 7 of Section 2 of this Act; or
16 attach the title "clinical psychologist", "psychologist" or
17 any other name or designation which would in any way imply that
18 the person ~~he or she~~ is able to practice as a clinical
19 psychologist; or offer to render or render clinical
20 psychological services as defined in paragraph 7 of Section 2
21 of this Act.

22 No person may engage in the practice of clinical
23 psychology, as defined in paragraph (5) of Section 2 of this
24 Act, without a license granted under this Act, except as
25 otherwise provided in this Act.

1 (b) No business organization shall provide, attempt to
2 provide, or offer to provide clinical psychological services
3 unless every member, shareholder, director, officer, holder of
4 any other ownership interest, agent, and employee who renders
5 clinical psychological services holds a currently valid
6 license issued under this Act. No corporation or limited
7 liability company shall be created that (i) has a stated
8 purpose that includes clinical psychology, or (ii) practices
9 or holds itself out as available to practice clinical
10 psychology, unless it is organized under the Professional
11 Service Corporation Act or the Professional Limited Liability
12 Company Act.

13 (c) Individuals, corporations, professional limited
14 liability companies, partnerships, and associations may employ
15 practicum students, interns or postdoctoral candidates seeking
16 to fulfill educational requirements or the professional
17 experience requirements needed to qualify for a license as a
18 clinical psychologist to assist in the rendering of services,
19 provided that such employees function under the direct
20 supervision, order, control and full professional
21 responsibility of a licensed clinical psychologist in the
22 corporation, professional limited liability company,
23 partnership, or association. Nothing in this paragraph shall
24 prohibit a corporation, professional limited liability
25 company, partnership, or association from contracting with a
26 licensed health care professional to provide services.

1 (c-5) Nothing in this Act shall preclude individuals
2 licensed under this Act from practicing directly or indirectly
3 for a physician licensed to practice medicine in all its
4 branches under the Medical Practice Act of 1987 or for any
5 legal entity as provided under subsection (c) of Section 22.2
6 of the Medical Practice Act of 1987.

7 Nothing in this Act shall preclude individuals licensed
8 under this Act from practicing directly or indirectly for any
9 hospital licensed under the Hospital Licensing Act or any
10 hospital affiliate as defined in Section 10.8 of the Hospital
11 Licensing Act and any hospital authorized under the University
12 of Illinois Hospital Act.

13 (d) Nothing in this Act shall prevent the employment, by a
14 clinical psychologist, individual, association, partnership,
15 professional limited liability company, or corporation
16 furnishing clinical psychological services for remuneration,
17 of persons not licensed as clinical psychologists under the
18 provisions of this Act to perform services in various
19 capacities as needed, provided that such persons are not in
20 any manner held out to the public as rendering clinical
21 psychological services as defined in paragraph 7 of Section 2
22 of this Act. Nothing contained in this Act shall require any
23 hospital, clinic, home health agency, hospice, or other entity
24 that provides health care services to employ or to contract
25 with a clinical psychologist licensed under this Act to
26 perform any of the activities under paragraph (5) of Section 2

1 of this Act.

2 (e) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to limit the
3 services and use of official title on the part of a person, not
4 licensed under the provisions of this Act, in the employ of a
5 State, county, or municipal agency or other political
6 subdivision insofar that such services are a part of the
7 duties in the person's ~~his or her~~ salaried position, and
8 insofar that such services are performed solely on behalf of
9 the person's ~~his or her~~ employer.

10 Nothing contained in this Section shall be construed as
11 permitting such person to offer their services as
12 psychologists to any other persons and to accept remuneration
13 for such psychological services other than as specifically
14 excepted herein, unless they have been licensed under the
15 provisions of this Act.

16 (f) Duly recognized members of any bona fide ~~bonafide~~
17 religious denomination shall not be restricted from
18 functioning in their ministerial capacity provided they do not
19 represent themselves as being clinical psychologists or
20 providing clinical psychological services.

21 (g) Nothing in this Act shall prohibit individuals not
22 licensed under the provisions of this Act who work in
23 self-help groups or programs or not-for-profit organizations
24 from providing services in those groups, programs, or
25 organizations, provided that such persons are not in any
26 manner held out to the public as rendering clinical

1 psychological services as defined in paragraph 7 of Section 2
2 of this Act.

3 (h) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to prevent a
4 person from practicing hypnosis without a license issued under
5 this Act provided that the person (1) does not otherwise
6 engage in the practice of clinical psychology, including, but
7 not limited to, the independent evaluation, classification,
8 and treatment of mental, emotional, behavioral, or nervous
9 disorders or conditions, developmental disabilities,
10 alcoholism and substance abuse, disorders of habit or conduct,
11 and the psychological aspects of physical illness, (2) does
12 not otherwise engage in the practice of medicine, including,
13 but not limited to, the diagnosis or treatment of physical or
14 mental ailments or conditions, and (3) does not hold the
15 person ~~himself or herself~~ out to the public by a title or
16 description stating or implying that the individual is a
17 clinical psychologist or is licensed to practice clinical
18 psychology.

19 (i) Every licensee under this Act shall prominently
20 display the license at the licensee's principal office, place
21 of business, or place of employment and, whenever requested by
22 any representative of the Department, must exhibit the
23 license.

2 Sec. 4. Exemptions ~~Application of Act.~~

3 (a) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to limit the
4 activities of and services of a student, intern or resident in
5 psychology seeking to fulfill educational requirements or the
6 experience requirements in order to qualify for a license
7 under this Act, or an individual seeking to fulfill the
8 postdoctoral experience requirements in order to qualify for
9 licensure under this Act provided that such activities and
10 services are under the direct supervision, order, control and
11 full professional responsibility of a licensed clinical
12 psychologist and provided that such student, intern, or
13 resident be designated by a title "intern" or "resident" or
14 other designation of trainee status. Supervised experience in
15 which the supervisor receives monetary payment or other
16 considerations from the supervisee or in which the supervisor
17 is hired by or otherwise employed by the supervisee shall not
18 be accepted by the Department as fulfilling the practicum,
19 internship or 2 years of satisfactory supervised experience
20 requirements for licensure. Nothing contained in this Section
21 shall be construed as permitting such students, interns, or
22 residents to offer their services as clinical psychologists to
23 any other person or persons and to accept remuneration for
24 such clinical psychological services other than as
25 specifically excepted herein, unless they have been licensed
26 under the provisions of this Act. Students, interns, and

1 residents providing services pursuant to the exemption under
2 this subsection (a) who violate any provision of this Act or
3 its rules shall be subject to the provisions of Sections 16.5
4 and 27.2.

5 (b) Nothing in this Act shall be construed as permitting
6 persons licensed as clinical psychologists to engage in any
7 manner in the practice of medicine as defined in the laws of
8 this State. Persons licensed as clinical psychologists who
9 render services to persons in need of mental treatment or who
10 are mentally ill shall as appropriate initiate genuine
11 collaboration with a physician licensed in Illinois to
12 practice medicine in all its branches.

13 (c) Nothing in this Act shall be construed as restricting
14 an individual certified as a school psychologist by the State
15 Board of Education, who is at least 21 years of age and has had
16 at least 3 years of full-time experience as a certified school
17 psychologist, from using the title school psychologist and
18 offering school psychological services limited to those
19 services set forth in the rules and regulations that govern
20 the administration and operation of special education
21 pertaining to children and youth ages 0-21 prepared by the
22 State Board of Education. Anyone offering such services under
23 the provisions of this paragraph shall use the term school
24 psychologist and describe such services as "School
25 Psychological Services". This exemption shall be limited to
26 the practice of school psychology only as manifested through

1 psychoeducational problems, and shall not be construed to
2 allow a school psychologist to function as a general
3 practitioner of clinical psychology, unless otherwise licensed
4 under this Act. However, nothing in this paragraph prohibits a
5 school psychologist from making evaluations, recommendations
6 or interventions regarding the placement of children in
7 educational programs or special education classes, nor shall
8 it prohibit school psychologists from providing clinical
9 psychological services under the supervision of a licensed
10 clinical psychologist. This paragraph shall not be construed
11 to mandate insurance companies to reimburse school
12 psychologists directly for the services of school
13 psychologists. Nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to
14 exclude anyone duly licensed under this Act from offering
15 psychological services in the school setting. School
16 psychologists providing services under the provisions of this
17 paragraph shall not provide such services outside their
18 employment to any child who is a student in the district or
19 districts which employ such school psychologist. School
20 psychologists, as described in this paragraph, shall be under
21 the regulatory authority of the State Board of Education and
22 the State Teacher Certification Board.

23 (d) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to limit the
24 activities and use of the official title of "psychologist" on
25 the part of a person not licensed under this Act who possesses
26 a doctoral degree earned in a program concentrated primarily

1 on the study of psychology and is an academic employee of a
2 duly chartered institution of higher education insofar as such
3 person engages in public speaking with or without
4 remuneration, provided that such person is not in any manner
5 held out to the public as practicing clinical psychology as
6 defined in paragraph 5 of Section 2 of this Act, unless the
7 person ~~he or she~~ has been licensed under the provisions of this
8 Act.

9 (e) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to regulate,
10 control, or restrict the clinical practice of any person
11 licensed, registered, or certified in this State under any
12 other Act, provided that such person is not in any manner held
13 out to the public as rendering clinical psychological services
14 as defined in paragraph 7 of Section 2 of this Act.

15 (f) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to limit the
16 activities and use of the title "psychologist" on the part of a
17 person who practices psychology and (i) who possesses a
18 doctoral degree earned in a program concentrated primarily on
19 the study of psychology; and (ii) whose services involve the
20 development and application of psychological theory and
21 methodology to problems of organizations and problems of
22 individuals and groups in organizational settings; and
23 provided further that such person is not in any manner held out
24 to the public as practicing clinical psychology and is not
25 held out to the public by any title, description or
26 designation stating or implying that the person ~~he or she~~ is a

1 clinical psychologist unless the person ~~he or she~~ has been
2 licensed under the provisions of this Act.

3 (g) This Act shall not apply to persons lawfully carrying
4 on the person's particular profession or business under any
5 valid existing regulatory Act of the State.

9 Sec. 4.3. Written collaborative agreements.

10 (a) A written collaborative agreement is required for all
11 prescribing psychologists practicing under a prescribing
12 psychologist license issued pursuant to Section 4.2 of this
13 Act.

14 (b) A written delegation of prescriptive authority by a
15 collaborating physician may only include medications for the
16 treatment of mental health disease or illness the
17 collaborating physician generally provides to the
18 collaborating physician's ~~his or her~~ patients in the normal
19 course of the collaborating physician's ~~his or her~~ clinical
20 practice with the exception of the following:

21 (1) patients who are less than 17 years of age or over
22 65 years of age;

23 (2) patients during pregnancy;

24 (3) patients with serious medical conditions, such as
25 heart disease, cancer, stroke, or seizures, and with

1 developmental disabilities and intellectual disabilities;
2 and

3 (4) prescriptive authority for benzodiazepine Schedule
4 III controlled substances.

5 (c) The collaborating physician shall file with the
6 Department notice of delegation of prescriptive authority and
7 termination of the delegation, in accordance with rules of the
8 Department. Upon receipt of this notice delegating authority
9 to prescribe any nonnarcotic Schedule III through V controlled
10 substances, the licensed clinical psychologist shall be
11 eligible to register for a mid-level practitioner controlled
12 substance license under Section 303.05 of the Illinois
13 Controlled Substances Act.

14 (d) All of the following shall apply to delegation of
15 prescriptive authority:

16 (1) Any delegation of Schedule III through V
17 controlled substances shall identify the specific
18 controlled substance by brand name or generic name. No
19 controlled substance to be delivered by injection may be
20 delegated. No Schedule II controlled substance shall be
21 delegated.

22 (2) A prescribing psychologist shall not prescribe
23 narcotic drugs, as defined in Section 102 of the Illinois
24 Controlled Substances Act.

25 Any prescribing psychologist who writes a prescription for
26 a controlled substance without having valid and appropriate

1 authority may be fined by the Department not more than \$50 per
2 prescription and the Department may take any other
3 disciplinary action provided for in this Act.

4 All prescriptions written by a prescribing psychologist
5 must contain the name of the prescribing psychologist and the
6 prescribing psychologist's ~~his or her~~ signature. The
7 prescribing psychologist shall sign the prescribing
8 psychologist's ~~his or her~~ own name.

9 (e) The written collaborative agreement shall describe the
10 working relationship of the prescribing psychologist with the
11 collaborating physician and shall delegate prescriptive
12 authority as provided in this Act. Collaboration does not
13 require an employment relationship between the collaborating
14 physician and prescribing psychologist. Absent an employment
15 relationship, an agreement may not restrict third-party
16 payment sources accepted by the prescribing psychologist. For
17 the purposes of this Section, "collaboration" means the
18 relationship between a prescribing psychologist and a
19 collaborating physician with respect to the delivery of
20 prescribing services in accordance with (1) the prescribing
21 psychologist's training, education, and experience and (2)
22 collaboration and consultation as documented in a jointly
23 developed written collaborative agreement.

24 (f) The agreement shall promote the exercise of
25 professional judgment by the prescribing psychologist
26 corresponding to the prescribing psychologist's ~~his or her~~

1 education and experience.

2 (g) The collaborative agreement shall not be construed to
3 require the personal presence of a physician at the place
4 where services are rendered. Methods of communication shall be
5 available for consultation with the collaborating physician in
6 person or by telecommunications in accordance with established
7 written guidelines as set forth in the written agreement.

8 (h) Collaboration and consultation pursuant to all
9 collaboration agreements shall be adequate if a collaborating
10 physician does each of the following:

11 (1) participates in the joint formulation and joint
12 approval of orders or guidelines with the prescribing
13 psychologist and the collaborating physician ~~he or she~~
14 periodically reviews the prescribing psychologist's orders
15 and the services provided patients under the orders in
16 accordance with accepted standards of medical practice and
17 prescribing psychologist practice;

18 (2) provides collaboration and consultation with the
19 prescribing psychologist in person at least once a month
20 for review of safety and quality clinical care or
21 treatment;

22 (3) is available through telecommunications for
23 consultation on medical problems, complications,
24 emergencies, or patient referral; and

25 (4) reviews medication orders of the prescribing
26 psychologist no less than monthly, including review of

laboratory tests and other tests as available.

(i) The written collaborative agreement shall contain provisions detailing notice for termination or change of status involving a written collaborative agreement, except when the notice is given for just cause.

(j) A copy of the signed written collaborative agreement shall be available to the Department upon request to either the prescribing psychologist or the collaborating physician.

(k) Nothing in this Section shall be construed to limit the authority of a prescribing psychologist to perform all duties authorized under this Act.

(l) A prescribing psychologist shall inform each collaborating physician of all collaborative agreements the prescribing psychologist ~~he or she~~ has signed and provide a copy of these to any collaborating physician.

(m) No collaborating physician shall enter into more than 3 collaborative agreements with prescribing psychologists.

Sec. 4.5. Endorsement; prescribing psychologists.

(a) Individuals who are already licensed as medical or prescribing psychologists in another state may apply for an Illinois prescribing psychologist license by endorsement from that state, or acceptance of that state's examination if they

1 meet the requirements set forth in this Act and its rules,
2 including proof of successful completion of the educational,
3 testing, and experience standards. Applicants from other
4 states may not be required to pass the examination required
5 for licensure as a prescribing psychologist in Illinois if
6 they meet requirements set forth in this Act and its rules,
7 such as proof of education, testing, payment of any fees, and
8 experience.

9 (b) Individuals who graduated from the Department of
10 Defense Psychopharmacology Demonstration Project may apply for
11 an Illinois prescribing psychologist license by endorsement.
12 Applicants from the Department of Defense Psychopharmacology
13 Demonstration Project may not be required to pass the
14 examination required for licensure as a prescribing
15 psychologist in Illinois if they meet requirements set forth
16 in this Act and its rules, such as proof of education, testing,
17 payment of any fees, and experience.

18 (c) Individuals applying for a prescribing psychologist
19 license by endorsement shall be required to first obtain a
20 clinical psychologist license under this Act.

18 for collection of fees or moneys for which services are
19 not rendered.

25 suspected abuse, neglect, financial exploitation, or

2 (26) Being named as an abuser in a verified report by
3 the Department on Aging and under the Adult Protective
4 Services Act and upon proof by clear and convincing
5 evidence that the licensee abused, neglected, or
6 financially exploited an eligible adult as defined in the
7 Adult Protective Services Act.

9 (c) The determination by a circuit court that a licensee
10 is subject to involuntary admission or judicial admission, as
11 provided in the Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities
12 Code, operates as an automatic suspension. The suspension will
13 terminate only upon a finding by a court that the patient is no
14 longer subject to involuntary admission or judicial admission
15 and the issuance of an order so finding and discharging the
16 patient, and upon the recommendation of the Board to the
17 Secretary that the licensee be allowed to resume the

6 disciplinary agency of another jurisdiction solely on the
7 basis of having authorized, recommended, aided, assisted,
8 referred for, or otherwise participated in health care shall
9 not be denied such licensure, certification, or authorization,
10 unless the Department determines that such action would have
11 constituted professional misconduct in this State; however,
12 nothing in this Section shall be construed as prohibiting the
13 Department from evaluating the conduct of such applicant and
14 making a determination regarding the licensure, certification,

12 licensee or applicant. No information, report, record, or
13 other documents in any way related to the examination shall be
14 excluded by reason of any common law or statutory privilege
15 relating to communications between the licensee or applicant
16 and the examining physician or any member of the
17 multidisciplinary team. No authorization is necessary from the
18 licensee or applicant ordered to undergo an examination for
19 the examining physician or any member of the multidisciplinary
20 team to provide information, reports, records, or other
21 documents or to provide any testimony regarding the
22 examination and evaluation.

23 The individual to be examined may have, at the
24 individual's ~~his or her~~ own expense, another physician of the
25 individual's ~~his or her~~ choice present during all aspects of
26 this examination. However, that physician shall be present

1 only to observe and may not interfere in any way with the
2 examination.

3 Failure of an individual to submit to a mental or physical
4 examination, when ordered, shall result in an automatic
5 suspension of the individual's ~~his or her~~ license until the
6 individual submits to the examination.

7 If the Department or Board finds an individual unable to

9 Department or Board may require that individual to submit to
10 care, counseling, or treatment by physicians approved or

11 potential licensee is more than 30 days delinquent in the

15 or may take other disciplinary action against that person
16 based solely upon the certification of delinquency made by the
17 Department of Healthcare and Family Services in accordance
18 with item (5) of subsection (a) of Section 2105-15 of the Civil

21 is subject to involuntary admission or judicial admission, as

8 physician to present testimony concerning the mental or

6 All members shall be residents of the State, not more than 8 of
7 whom shall be members of the same political party. All members
8 shall be voting members. Eight members shall be physicians
9 licensed to practice medicine in all of its branches in
10 Illinois possessing the degree of doctor of medicine. Two
11 members shall be physicians licensed to practice medicine in
12 all its branches in Illinois possessing the degree of doctor

21 (B) Members of the Medical Board shall be appointed for
22 terms of 4 years. Upon the expiration of the term of any
23 member, their successor shall be appointed for a term of 4
24 years by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the
25 Senate. The Governor shall fill any vacancy for the remainder
26 of the unexpired term with the advice and consent of the

1 Senate. Upon recommendation of the Medical Board, any member
2 of the Medical Board may be removed by the Governor for
3 misfeasance, malfeasance, or willful neglect of duty, after
4 notice, and a public hearing, unless such notice and hearing
5 shall be expressly waived in writing. Each member shall serve
6 on the Medical Board until their successor is appointed and
7 qualified. No member of the Medical Board shall serve more
8 than 2 consecutive 4-year terms.

9 In making appointments the Governor shall attempt to
10 ensure that the various social and geographic regions of the
11 State of Illinois are properly represented.

12 In making the designation of persons to act for the
13 several professions represented on the Medical Board, the
14 Governor shall give due consideration to recommendations by
15 members of the respective professions and by organizations
16 therein.

17 (C) The Medical Board shall annually elect one of its
18 voting members as chairperson and one as vice chairperson. No
19 officer shall be elected more than twice in succession to the

2 special meeting and each such resolution shall take effect
3 immediately. The Medical Board shall meet at least quarterly.

11 compensation. The Secretary shall assign at least one medical

16 coordinator to a region composed of the balance of counties in

15 limitation: (i) a statement from the dean of the
16 medical school at which the applicant will be employed

7 operated pursuant to the Ambulatory Surgical Treatment

9 (d) that the temporary visiting physician permit
10 shall only permit the holder to practice medicine in

12 ailments without the use of drugs and without
13 operative surgery within the scope of the medical,

15 conjunction with the state or national medical,
16 osteopathic, or chiropractic professional association
17 or society conference or meeting, for which the holder

15 physician in an Illinois patient care clinic or
16 facility that is affiliated with the out-of-State post

18 (e) that the temporary visiting resident permit
19 shall only permit the holder to practice medicine in
20 all of its branches or practice the treatment of human
21 ailments without the use of drugs and without
22 operative surgery within the scope of the medical,
23 osteopathic, chiropractic, or clinical studies for
24 which the holder was invited or appointed.

25 (2) The application for the temporary visiting
26 resident permit shall be made to the Department, in

1 writing, on forms prescribed by the Department, and shall
2 be accompanied by the required fee established by rule.
3 The application shall require information that, in the
4 judgment of the Department, will enable the Department to
5 pass on the qualifications of the applicant.

6 (3) A temporary visiting resident permit shall be
7 valid for 180 days from the date of issuance or until the
8 time the medical, osteopathic, chiropractic, or clinical
9 studies are completed, whichever occurs first.

10 (4) The applicant for a temporary visiting resident
11 permit may be required to appear before the Medical Board
12 for an interview prior to, and as a requirement for, the
13 issuance of a temporary visiting resident permit.

14 (D) Postgraduate training exemption period; visiting
15 rotations. A person may participate in visiting rotations in
16 an approved postgraduate training program, not to exceed a
17 total of 90 days for all rotations, if the following
18 information is submitted in writing or electronically to the
19 Department by the patient care clinics or facilities where the
20 person will be performing the training or by an affiliated
21 program:

22 (1) The person who has been invited or appointed to
23 perform a portion of their postgraduate clinical training
24 program in Illinois.

25 (2) The name and address of the primary patient care
26 clinic or facility, the date the training is to begin, and

1 the length of time of the invitation or appointment.

2 (3) The name and license number of the Illinois
3 physician who will be responsible for supervising the
4 trainee and the medical director or division director of
5 the department or facility.

6 (4) Certification from the postgraduate training
7 program that the person is approved and enrolled in a
8 graduate training program approved by the Department in
9 their home state.

14 disposition and collection of fees.

15 (A) Renewal. The expiration date and renewal period for
16 each license issued under this Act shall be set by rule. The
17 holder of a license may renew the license by paying the
18 required fee. The holder of a license may also renew the
19 license within 90 days after its expiration by complying with
20 the requirements for renewal and payment of an additional fee.
21 A license renewal within 90 days after expiration shall be
22 effective retroactively to the expiration date.

23 The Department shall attempt to provide through electronic
24 means to each licensee under this Act, at least 60 days in
25 advance of the expiration date of the ~~his or her~~ license, a

1 renewal notice. No such license shall be deemed to have lapsed
2 until 90 days after the expiration date and after the
3 Department has attempted to provide such notice as herein
4 provided.

5 (B) Reinstatement. Any licensee who has permitted the
6 licensee's ~~his or her~~ license to lapse or who has had the
7 licensee's ~~his or her~~ license on inactive status may have the
8 licensee's ~~his or her~~ license reinstated by making application
9 to the Department and filing proof acceptable to the
10 Department of the licensee's ~~his or her~~ fitness to have the

12 the fee for a license under Section 19 of this Act is \$500.

13 (4) Before July 1, 2018, the fee for the renewal of a
14 license for a resident of Illinois shall be calculated at
15 the rate of \$230 per year, and beginning on July 1, 2018
16 and until January 1, 2020, the fee for the renewal of a
17 license shall be \$167, except for licensees who were
18 issued a license within 12 months of the expiration date
19 of the license, before July 1, 2018, the fee for the
20 renewal shall be \$230, and beginning on July 1, 2018 and
21 until January 1, 2020 that fee will be \$167. Before July 1,
22 2018, the fee for the renewal of a license for a
23 nonresident shall be calculated at the rate of \$460 per
24 year, and beginning on July 1, 2018 and until January 1,
25 2020, the fee for the renewal of a license for a
26 nonresident shall be \$250, except for licensees who were

1 issued a license within 12 months of the expiration date
2 of the license, before July 1, 2018, the fee for the
3 renewal shall be \$460, and beginning on July 1, 2018 and
4 until January 1, 2020 that fee will be \$250. Beginning on
5 January 1, 2020, the fee for renewal of a license for a
6 resident or nonresident is \$181 per year.

7 (5) The fee for the reinstatement of a license other
8 than from inactive status, is \$230. In addition, payment
9 of all lapsed renewal fees not to exceed \$1,400 is
10 required.

11 (6) The fee for a 3-year temporary license under
12 Section 17 is \$230.

13 (7) The fee for the issuance of a license with a change
14 of name or address other than during the renewal period is
15 \$20. No fee is required for name and address changes on
16 Department records when no updated license is issued.

17 (8) The fee to be paid for a license record for any
18 purpose is \$20.

19 (9) The fee to be paid to have the scoring of an
20 examination, administered by the Department, reviewed and
21 verified, is \$20 plus any fees charged by the applicable
22 testing service.

23 (F) Any person who delivers a check or other payment to the
24 Department that is returned to the Department unpaid by the
25 financial institution upon which it is drawn shall pay to the
26 Department, in addition to the amount already owed to the

1 Department, a fine of \$50. The fines imposed by this Section
2 are in addition to any other discipline provided under this
3 Act for unlicensed practice or practice on a nonrenewed
4 license. The Department shall notify the person that payment
5 of fees and fines shall be paid to the Department by certified
6 check or money order within 30 calendar days of the
7 notification. If, after the expiration of 30 days from the
8 date of the notification, the person has failed to submit the
9 necessary remittance, the Department shall automatically
10 terminate the license or permit or deny the application,
11 without hearing. If, after termination or denial, the person
12 seeks a license or permit, the person ~~he or she~~ shall apply to
13 the Department for reinstatement or issuance of the license or
14 permit and pay all fees and fines due to the Department. The
15 Department may establish a fee for the processing of an
16 application for reinstatement of a license or permit to pay
17 all expenses of processing this application. The Secretary may
18 waive the fines due under this Section in individual cases
19 where the Secretary finds that the fines would be unreasonable
20 or unnecessarily burdensome.

1 (A) The Department may revoke, suspend, place on
2 probation, reprimand, refuse to issue or renew, or take any
3 other disciplinary or non-disciplinary action as the
4 Department may deem proper with regard to the license or
5 permit of any person issued under this Act, including imposing
6 fines not to exceed \$10,000 for each violation, upon any of the
7 following grounds:

8 (1) (Blank).

9 (2) (Blank).

10 (3) A plea of guilty or nolo contendere, finding of
11 guilt, jury verdict, or entry of judgment or sentencing,
12 including, but not limited to, convictions, preceding
13 sentences of supervision, conditional discharge, or first
14 offender probation, under the laws of any jurisdiction of
15 the United States of any crime that is a felony.

16 (4) Gross negligence in practice under this Act.

17 (5) Engaging in dishonorable, unethical, or
18 unprofessional conduct of a character likely to deceive,
19 defraud, or harm the public.

20 (6) Obtaining any fee by fraud, deceit, or
21 misrepresentation.

22 (7) Habitual or excessive use or abuse of drugs
23 defined in law as controlled substances, of alcohol, or of
24 any other substances which results in the inability to

2 (9) Fraud or misrepresentation in applying for, or

9 physician, including, but not limited to, false records to
10 support claims against the medical assistance program of
11 the Department of Healthcare and Family Services (formerly
12 Department of Public Aid) under the Illinois Public Aid
13 Code.

14 (22) Willful omission to file or record, or willfully
15 impeding the filing or recording, or inducing another
16 person to omit to file or record, medical reports as
17 required by law, or willfully failing to report an
18 instance of suspected abuse or neglect as required by law.

19 (23) Being named as a perpetrator in an indicated
20 report by the Department of Children and Family Services
21 under the Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act, and
22 upon proof by clear and convincing evidence that the
23 licensee has caused a child to be an abused child or
24 neglected child as defined in the Abused and Neglected
25 Child Reporting Act.

26 (24) Solicitation of professional patronage by any

1 corporation, agents, or persons, or profiting from those
2 representing themselves to be agents of the licensee.

3 (25) Gross, ~~and~~ willful, and continued overcharging
4 for professional services, including filing false
5 statements for collection of fees for which services are
6 not rendered, including, but not limited to, filing such
7 false statements for collection of monies for services not
8 rendered from the medical assistance program of the
9 Department of Healthcare and Family Services (formerly
10 Department of Public Aid) under the Illinois Public Aid
11 Code.

12 (26) A pattern of practice or other behavior which
13 demonstrates incapacity or incompetence to practice under
14 this Act.

15 (27) Mental illness or disability which results in the
16 inability to practice under this Act with reasonable
17 judgment, skill, or safety.

18 (28) Physical illness, including, but not limited to,
19 deterioration through the aging process, or loss of motor
20 skill which results in a physician's inability to practice
21 under this Act with reasonable judgment, skill, or safety.

22 (29) Cheating on or attempting to subvert the
23 licensing examinations administered under this Act.

24 (30) Willfully or negligently violating the
25 confidentiality between physician and patient except as
26 required by law.

1 (31) The use of any false, fraudulent, or deceptive
2 statement in any document connected with practice under
3 this Act.

4 (32) Aiding and abetting an individual not licensed
5 under this Act in the practice of a profession licensed
6 under this Act.

7 (33) Violating State or federal laws or regulations
8 relating to controlled substances, legend drugs, or
9 ephedra as defined in the Ephedra Prohibition Act.

10 (34) Failure to report to the Department any adverse
11 final action taken against them by another licensing
12 jurisdiction (any other state or any territory of the
13 United States or any foreign state or country), by any
14 peer review body, by any health care institution, by any
15 professional society or association related to practice
16 under this Act, by any governmental agency, by any law
17 enforcement agency, or by any court for acts or conduct
18 similar to acts or conduct which would constitute grounds
19 for action as defined in this Section.

20 (35) Failure to report to the Department surrender of
21 a license or authorization to practice as a medical
22 doctor, a doctor of osteopathy, a doctor of osteopathic
23 medicine, or doctor of chiropractic in another state or
24 jurisdiction, or surrender of membership on any medical
25 staff or in any medical or professional association or
26 society, while under disciplinary investigation by any of

1 those authorities or bodies, for acts or conduct similar
2 to acts or conduct which would constitute grounds for
3 action as defined in this Section.

4 (36) Failure to report to the Department any adverse
5 judgment, settlement, or award arising from a liability
6 claim related to acts or conduct similar to acts or
7 conduct which would constitute grounds for action as
8 defined in this Section.

9 (37) Failure to provide copies of medical records as
10 required by law.

11 (38) Failure to furnish the Department, or its
12 investigators or representatives, relevant information,
13 legally requested by the Department after consultation
14 with the Chief Medical Coordinator or the Deputy Medical
15 Coordinator.

16 (39) Violating the Health Care Worker Self-Referral
17 Act.

18 (40) (Blank) .

19 (41) Failure to establish and maintain records of
20 patient care and treatment as required by this law.

21 (42) Entering into an excessive number of written
22 collaborative agreements with licensed advanced practice
23 registered nurses resulting in an inability to adequately
24 collaborate.

25 (43) Repeated failure to adequately collaborate with a
26 licensed advanced practice registered nurse.

1 (44) Violating the Compassionate Use of Medical
2 Cannabis Program Act.

3 (45) Entering into an excessive number of written
4 collaborative agreements with licensed prescribing
5 psychologists resulting in an inability to adequately
6 collaborate.

7 (46) Repeated failure to adequately collaborate with a
8 licensed prescribing psychologist.

9 (47) Willfully failing to report an instance of
10 suspected abuse, neglect, financial exploitation, or
11 self-neglect of an eligible adult as defined in and
12 required by the Adult Protective Services Act.

13 (48) Being named as an abuser in a verified report by
14 the Department on Aging under the Adult Protective
15 Services Act, and upon proof by clear and convincing
16 evidence that the licensee abused, neglected, or
17 financially exploited an eligible adult as defined in the
18 Adult Protective Services Act.

19 (49) Entering into an excessive number of written
20 collaborative agreements with licensed physician
21 assistants resulting in an inability to adequately
22 collaborate.

23 (50) Repeated failure to adequately collaborate with a
24 physician assistant.

25 All proceedings to take disciplinary action as the
26 Department may deem proper, with regard to a license, must be

1 commenced within 5 years after the date of the Department's
2 receipt of a complaint alleging the commission of or notice of
3 a conviction order for any of the violations described herein.
4 Ground number (26) is exempt from this 5-year limitation. No
5 action shall be commenced more than 10 years after the date of
6 the incident or act alleged to have violated this Section.
7 Ground numbers (8), (9), (26), and (29) are exempt from this
8 10-year limitation. Except for actions involving the ground
9 numbered (26), all proceedings to suspend, revoke, place on
10 probationary status, or take any other disciplinary action as
11 the Department may deem proper, with regard to a license on any
12 of the foregoing grounds, must be commenced within 5 years
13 next after receipt by the Department of a complaint alleging
14 the commission of or notice of the conviction order for any of
15 the acts described herein. Except for the grounds numbered
16 (8), (9), (26), and (29), no action shall be commenced more
17 than 10 years after the date of the incident or act alleged to
18 have violated this Section. For actions involving the ground
19 numbered (26), a pattern of practice or other behavior
20 includes all incidents alleged to be part of the pattern of
21 practice or other behavior that occurred, or a report pursuant
22 to Section 23 of this Act received, within the 10-year period
23 preceding the filing of the complaint. In the event of the
24 settlement of any claim or cause of action in favor of the
25 claimant or the reduction to final judgment of any civil
26 action in favor of the plaintiff, such claim, cause of action,

1 or civil action being grounded on the allegation that a person
2 licensed under this Act was negligent in providing care, the
3 Department shall be exempt from the 10-year limitation and
4 shall have 5 years from receipt of the report ~~have an~~
5 ~~additional period of 2 years from the date of notification to~~
6 ~~the Department~~ under Section 23 of this Act of such settlement
7 or final judgment in which to investigate and commence formal
8 disciplinary proceedings under Section 36 of this Act, except
9 as otherwise provided by law. The time during which the holder
10 of the license was outside the State of Illinois shall not be
11 included within any period of time limiting the commencement
12 of disciplinary action by the Department.

13 The entry of an order or judgment by any circuit court
14 establishing that any person holding a license under this Act
15 is a person in need of mental treatment operates as a
16 suspension of that license. That person may resume ~~his or her~~
17 practice only upon the entry of a Departmental order based
18 upon a finding by the Medical Board that the person has been
19 determined to be recovered from mental illness by the court
20 and upon the Medical Board's recommendation that the person be
21 permitted to resume ~~his or her~~ practice.

22 The Department may refuse to issue or take disciplinary
23 action concerning the license of any person who fails to file a
24 return, or to pay the tax, penalty, or interest shown in a
25 filed return, or to pay any final assessment of tax, penalty,
26 or interest, as required by any tax Act administered by the

1 Illinois Department of Revenue, until such time as the
2 requirements of any such tax Act are satisfied as determined
3 by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

4 The Department, upon the recommendation of the Medical
5 Board, shall adopt rules which set forth standards to be used
6 in determining:

7 (a) when a person will be deemed sufficiently
8 rehabilitated to warrant the public trust;

9 (b) what constitutes dishonorable, unethical, or
10 unprofessional conduct of a character likely to deceive,
11 defraud, or harm the public;

12 (c) what constitutes immoral conduct in the commission
13 of any act, including, but not limited to, commission of
14 an act of sexual misconduct related to the licensee's
15 practice; and

16 (d) what constitutes gross negligence in the practice
17 of medicine.

18 However, no such rule shall be admissible into evidence in
19 any civil action except for review of a licensing or other
20 disciplinary action under this Act.

21 In enforcing this Section, the Medical Board, upon a
22 showing of a possible violation, may compel any individual who
23 is licensed to practice under this Act or holds a permit to
24 practice under this Act, or any individual who has applied for
25 licensure or a permit pursuant to this Act, to submit to a
26 mental or physical examination and evaluation, or both, which

1 may include a substance abuse or sexual offender evaluation,
2 as required by the Medical Board and at the expense of the
3 Department. The Medical Board shall specifically designate the
4 examining physician licensed to practice medicine in all of
5 its branches or, if applicable, the multidisciplinary team
6 involved in providing the mental or physical examination and
7 evaluation, or both. The multidisciplinary team shall be led
8 by a physician licensed to practice medicine in all of its
9 branches and may consist of one or more or a combination of
10 physicians licensed to practice medicine in all of its
11 branches, licensed chiropractic physicians, licensed clinical
12 psychologists, licensed clinical social workers, licensed
13 clinical professional counselors, and other professional and
14 administrative staff. Any examining physician or member of the
15 multidisciplinary team may require any person ordered to
16 submit to an examination and evaluation pursuant to this
17 Section to submit to any additional supplemental testing
18 deemed necessary to complete any examination or evaluation
19 process, including, but not limited to, blood testing,
20 urinalysis, psychological testing, or neuropsychological
21 testing. The Medical Board or the Department may order the
22 examining physician or any member of the multidisciplinary
23 team to provide to the Department or the Medical Board any and
24 all records, including business records, that relate to the
25 examination and evaluation, including any supplemental testing
26 performed. The Medical Board or the Department may order the

1 examining physician or any member of the multidisciplinary
2 team to present testimony concerning this examination and
3 evaluation of the licensee, permit holder, or applicant,
4 including testimony concerning any supplemental testing or
5 documents relating to the examination and evaluation. No
6 information, report, record, or other documents in any way
7 related to the examination and evaluation shall be excluded by
8 reason of any common law or statutory privilege relating to
9 communication between the licensee, permit holder, or
10 applicant and the examining physician or any member of the
11 multidisciplinary team. No authorization is necessary from the
12 licensee, permit holder, or applicant ordered to undergo an
13 evaluation and examination for the examining physician or any
14 member of the multidisciplinary team to provide information,
15 reports, records, or other documents or to provide any
16 testimony regarding the examination and evaluation. The
17 individual to be examined may have, at the individual's ~~his or~~
18 ~~her~~ own expense, another physician of the individual's ~~his or~~
19 ~~her~~ choice present during all aspects of the examination.
20 Failure of any individual to submit to mental or physical
21 examination and evaluation, or both, when directed, shall
22 result in an automatic suspension, without hearing, until such
23 time as the individual submits to the examination. If the
24 Medical Board finds a physician unable to practice following
25 an examination and evaluation because of the reasons set forth
26 in this Section, the Medical Board shall require such

1 physician to submit to care, counseling, or treatment by
2 physicians, or other health care professionals, approved or
3 designated by the Medical Board, as a condition for issued,
4 continued, reinstated, or renewed licensure to practice. Any
5 physician, whose license was granted pursuant to Section 9,
6 17, or 19 of this Act, or, continued, reinstated, renewed,
7 disciplined, or supervised, subject to such terms, conditions,
8 or restrictions who shall fail to comply with such terms,
9 conditions, or restrictions, or to complete a required program
10 of care, counseling, or treatment, as determined by the Chief
11 Medical Coordinator or Deputy Medical Coordinators, shall be
12 referred to the Secretary for a determination as to whether
13 the licensee shall have the licensee's ~~his or her~~ license
14 suspended immediately, pending a hearing by the Medical Board.
15 In instances in which the Secretary immediately suspends a
16 license under this Section, a hearing upon such person's
17 license must be convened by the Medical Board within 15 days
18 after such suspension and completed without appreciable delay.
19 The Medical Board shall have the authority to review the
20 subject physician's record of treatment and counseling
21 regarding the impairment, to the extent permitted by
22 applicable federal statutes and regulations safeguarding the
23 confidentiality of medical records.

24 An individual licensed under this Act, affected under this
25 Section, shall be afforded an opportunity to demonstrate to
26 the Medical Board that the individual ~~he or she~~ can resume

1 practice in compliance with acceptable and prevailing
2 standards under the provisions of the individual's ~~his or her~~
3 license.

4 The Medical Board, in determining mental capacity of an
5 individual licensed under this Act, shall consider the latest
6 recommendations of the Federation of State Medical Boards.

7 The Department may promulgate rules for the imposition of
8 fines in disciplinary cases, not to exceed \$10,000 for each
9 violation of this Act. Fines may be imposed in conjunction
10 with other forms of disciplinary action, but shall not be the
11 exclusive disposition of any disciplinary action arising out
12 of conduct resulting in death or injury to a patient. Any funds
13 collected from such fines shall be deposited into ~~in~~ the
14 Illinois State Medical Disciplinary Fund.

15 All fines imposed under this Section shall be paid within
16 60 days after the effective date of the order imposing the fine
17 or in accordance with the terms set forth in the order imposing
18 the fine.

19 (B) The Department shall revoke the license or permit
20 issued under this Act to practice medicine of a chiropractic
21 physician who has been convicted a second time of committing
22 any felony under the Illinois Controlled Substances Act or the
23 Methamphetamine Control and Community Protection Act, or who
24 has been convicted a second time of committing a Class 1 felony
25 under Sections 8A-3 and 8A-6 of the Illinois Public Aid Code. A
26 person whose license or permit is revoked under this

1 subsection (B) shall be prohibited from practicing medicine or
2 treating human ailments without the use of drugs and without
3 operative surgery.

4 (C) The Department shall not revoke, suspend, place on
5 probation, reprimand, refuse to issue or renew, or take any
6 other disciplinary or non-disciplinary action against a
7 person's authorization to practice under this Act:

8 (1) based solely upon the recommendation of the person
9 to an eligible patient regarding, or prescription for, or
10 treatment with, an investigational drug, biological
11 product, or device;

12 (2) for experimental treatment for Lyme disease or
13 other tick-borne diseases, including, but not limited to,
14 the prescription of or treatment with long-term
15 antibiotics;

16 (3) based solely upon the person providing,
17 authorizing, recommending, aiding, assisting, referring
18 for, or otherwise participating in any health care
19 service, so long as the care was not unlawful under the
20 laws of this State, regardless of whether the patient was
21 a resident of this State or another state; or

22 (4) based upon the person's license, registration, or
23 permit being revoked or suspended, or the person being
24 otherwise disciplined, by any other state if that
25 revocation, suspension, or other form of discipline was
26 based solely on the person violating another state's laws

1 prohibiting the provision of, authorization of,
2 recommendation of, aiding or assisting in, referring for,
3 or participation in any health care service if that health
4 care service as provided would not have been unlawful
5 under the laws of this State and is consistent with the
6 applicable standard of conduct for the person practicing
7 in Illinois under this Act.

8 (D) (Blank).

9 (E) The conduct specified in subsection (C) shall not
10 trigger reporting requirements under Section 23, constitute
11 grounds for suspension under Section 25, or be included on the
12 physician's profile required under Section 10 of the Patients'
13 Right to Know Act.

14 (F) An applicant seeking licensure, certification, or
15 authorization pursuant to this Act and who has been subject to
16 disciplinary action by a duly authorized professional
17 disciplinary agency of another jurisdiction solely on the
18 basis of having provided, authorized, recommended, aided,
19 assisted, referred for, or otherwise participated in health
20 care shall not be denied such licensure, certification, or
21 authorization, unless the Department determines that the
22 action would have constituted professional misconduct in this
23 State; however, nothing in this Section shall be construed as
24 prohibiting the Department from evaluating the conduct of the
25 applicant and making a determination regarding the licensure,
26 certification, or authorization to practice a profession under

1 this Act.

2 (G) The Department may adopt rules to implement,
3 administer, and enforce this Section ~~Public Act 102-1117~~.

9 (a) A licensee under this Act may not directly or
10 indirectly divide, share or split any professional fee or
11 other form of compensation for professional services with
12 anyone in exchange for a referral or otherwise, other than as
13 provided in this Section 22.2.

14 (b) Nothing contained in this Section abrogates the right
15 of 2 or more licensed health care workers as defined in the
16 Health Care Worker Self-referral Act to each receive adequate
17 compensation for concurrently rendering services to a patient
18 and to divide the fee for such service, provided that the
19 patient has full knowledge of the division and the division is
20 made in proportion to the actual services personally performed
21 and responsibility assumed by each licensee consistent with
22 the licensee's ~~his or her~~ license, except as prohibited by
23 law.

24 (c) Nothing contained in this Section prohibits a licensee
25 under this Act from practicing medicine through or within any

1 form of legal entity authorized to conduct business in this
2 State or from pooling, sharing, dividing, or apportioning the
3 professional fees and other revenues in accordance with the
4 agreements and policies of the entity provided:

5 (1) each owner of the entity is licensed under this
6 Act;

7 (2) the entity is organized under the Medical
8 Corporation Act, the Professional Services Corporation
9 Act, the Professional Association Act, or the Professional
10 Limited Liability Company Act;

11 (3) the entity is allowed by Illinois law to provide
12 physician services or employ physicians such as a licensed
13 hospital or hospital affiliate or licensed ambulatory
14 surgical treatment center owned in full or in part by
15 Illinois-licensed physicians;

16 (4) the entity is a combination or joint venture of
17 the entities authorized under this subsection (c); or

18 (5) the entity is an Illinois not-for-profit ~~not-for~~
19 ~~profit~~ corporation that is recognized as exempt from the
20 payment of federal income taxes as an organization
21 described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue
22 Code and all of its members are full-time faculty members
23 of a medical school that offers an ~~a~~ M.D. degree program
24 that is accredited by the Liaison Committee on Medical
25 Education and a program of graduate medical education that
26 is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Graduate

1 Medical Education.

2 (d) Nothing contained in this Section prohibits a licensee
3 under this Act from paying a fair market value fee to any
4 person or entity whose purpose is to perform billing,
5 administrative preparation, or collection services based upon
6 a percentage of professional service fees billed or collected,
7 a flat fee, or any other arrangement that directly or
8 indirectly divides professional fees, for the administrative
9 preparation of the licensee's claims or the collection of the
10 licensee's charges for professional services, provided that:

11 (i) the licensee or the licensee's practice under
12 subsection (c) of this Section at all times controls the
13 amount of fees charged and collected; and

14 (ii) all charges collected are paid directly to the
15 licensee or the licensee's practice or are deposited
16 directly into an account in the name of and under the sole
17 control of the licensee or the licensee's practice or
18 deposited into a "Trust Account" by a licensed collection
19 agency in accordance with the requirements of Section 8(c)
20 of the Illinois Collection Agency Act.

21 (e) Nothing contained in this Section prohibits the
22 granting of a security interest in the accounts receivable or
23 fees of a licensee under this Act or the licensee's practice
24 for bona fide advances made to the licensee or licensee's
25 practice provided the licensee retains control and
26 responsibility for the collection of the accounts receivable

1 and fees.

2 (f) Excluding payments that may be made to the owners of or
3 licensees in the licensee's practice under subsection (c), a
4 licensee under this Act may not divide, share or split a
5 professional service fee with, or otherwise directly or
6 indirectly pay a percentage of the licensee's professional
7 service fees, revenues or profits to anyone for: (i) the
8 marketing or management of the licensee's practice, (ii)
9 including the licensee or the licensee's practice on any
10 preferred provider list, (iii) allowing the licensee to
11 participate in any network of health care providers, (iv)
12 negotiating fees, charges or terms of service or payment on
13 behalf of the licensee, or (v) including the licensee in a
14 program whereby patients or beneficiaries are provided an
15 incentive to use the services of the licensee.

16 (g) A violation of any of the provisions of this Section
17 constitutes an unlawful practice under the Consumer Fraud and
18 Deceptive Business Practices Act. All remedies, penalties, and
19 authority granted to the Attorney General by the Consumer
20 Fraud and Deceptive Business Practices Act shall be available
21 to him or her for the enforcement of this Section. This
22 subsection does not apply to hospitals and hospital affiliates
23 licensed in Illinois.

3 capacity.

4 (A) Entities required to report.

5 (1) Health care institutions. The chief administrator
6 or executive officer of any health care institution
7 licensed by the Illinois Department of Public Health shall
8 report to the Medical Board when any person's clinical
9 privileges are terminated or are restricted based on a
10 final determination made in accordance with that
11 institution's by-laws or rules and regulations that a
12 person has either committed an act or acts which may
13 directly threaten patient care or that a person may have a
14 mental or physical disability that may endanger patients
15 under that person's care. Such officer also shall report
16 if a person accepts voluntary termination or restriction
17 of clinical privileges in lieu of formal action based upon
18 conduct related directly to patient care or in lieu of
19 formal action seeking to determine whether a person may
20 have a mental or physical disability that may endanger
21 patients under that person's care. The Medical Board
22 shall, by rule, provide for the reporting to it by health
23 care institutions of all instances in which a person,
24 licensed under this Act, who is impaired by reason of age,
25 drug or alcohol abuse, or physical or mental impairment,
26 is under supervision and, where appropriate, is in a

1 program of rehabilitation. Such reports shall be strictly
2 confidential and may be reviewed and considered only by
3 the members of the Medical Board, or by authorized staff
4 as provided by rules of the Medical Board. Provisions
5 shall be made for the periodic report of the status of any
6 such person not less than twice annually in order that the
7 Medical Board shall have current information upon which to
8 determine the status of any such person. Such initial and
9 periodic reports of impaired physicians shall not be
10 considered records within the meaning of the State Records
11 Act and shall be disposed of, following a determination by
12 the Medical Board that such reports are no longer
13 required, in a manner and at such time as the Medical Board
14 shall determine by rule. The filing of such reports shall
15 be construed as the filing of a report for purposes of
16 subsection (C) of this Section. Such health care
17 institution shall not take any adverse action, including,
18 but not limited to, restricting or terminating any
19 person's clinical privileges, as a result of an adverse
20 action against a person's license, registration, permit,
21 or clinical privileges or other disciplinary action by
22 another state or health care institution that resulted
23 from the person's provision of, authorization of,
24 recommendation of, aiding or assistance with, referral
25 for, or participation in any health care service if the
26 adverse action was based solely on a violation of the

1 other state's law prohibiting the provision of such health
2 care and related services in the state or for a resident of
3 the state if that health care service would not have been
4 unlawful under the laws of this State and is consistent
5 with the applicable standard of conduct for a person
6 practicing in Illinois under this Act.

7 (1.5) Clinical training programs. The program director
8 of any post-graduate clinical training program shall
9 report to the Medical Board if a person engaged in a
10 post-graduate clinical training program at the
11 institution, including, but not limited to, a residency or
12 fellowship, separates from the program for any reason
13 prior to its conclusion. The program director shall
14 provide all documentation relating to the separation if,
15 after review of the report, the Medical Board determines
16 that a review of those documents is necessary to determine
17 whether a violation of this Act occurred.

18 (2) Professional associations. The President or chief
19 executive officer of any association or society, of
20 persons licensed under this Act, operating within this
21 State shall report to the Medical Board when the
22 association or society renders a final determination that
23 a person has committed unprofessional conduct related
24 directly to patient care or that a person may have a mental
25 or physical disability that may endanger patients under
26 that person's care.

1 (3) Professional liability insurers. Every insurance
2 company which offers policies of professional liability
3 insurance to persons licensed under this Act, or any other
4 entity which seeks to indemnify the professional liability
5 of a person licensed under this Act, shall report to the
6 Medical Board the settlement of any claim or cause of
7 action, or final judgment rendered in any cause of action,
8 which alleged negligence in the furnishing of medical care
9 by such licensed person when such settlement or final
10 judgment is in favor of the plaintiff. Such insurance
11 company shall not take any adverse action, including, but
12 not limited to, denial or revocation of coverage, or rate
13 increases, against a person authorized to practice under
14 this Act with respect to coverage for services provided in
15 the State if based solely on the person providing,
16 authorizing, recommending, aiding, assisting, referring
17 for, or otherwise participating in health care services in
18 this State in violation of another state's law, or a
19 revocation or other adverse action against the person's
20 license, registration, or permit in another state for
21 violation of such law if that health care service as
22 provided would have been lawful and consistent with the
23 applicable standard of conduct for a person practicing in
24 Illinois under this Act. Notwithstanding this provision,
25 it is against public policy to require coverage for an
26 illegal action.

1 (4) State's Attorneys. The State's Attorney of each
2 county shall report to the Medical Board, within 5 days,
3 any instances in which a person licensed under this Act is
4 convicted of any felony or Class A misdemeanor.

5 (5) State agencies. All agencies, boards, commissions,
6 departments, or other instrumentalities of the government
7 of the State of Illinois shall report to the Medical Board
8 any instance arising in connection with the operations of
9 such agency, including the administration of any law by
10 such agency, in which a person licensed under this Act has
11 either committed an act or acts which may be a violation of
12 this Act or which may constitute unprofessional conduct
13 related directly to patient care or which indicates that a
14 person licensed under this Act may have a mental or
15 physical disability that may endanger patients under that
16 person's care.

17 (B) Mandatory reporting. All reports required by items
18 (34), (35), and (36) of subsection (A) of Section 22 and by
19 this Section 23 shall be submitted to the Medical Board in a
20 timely fashion. Unless otherwise provided in this Section, the
21 reports shall be filed in writing within 60 days after a
22 determination that a report is required under this Act. All
23 reports shall contain the following information:

24 (1) The name, address, and telephone number of the
25 person making the report.

26 (2) The name, address, and telephone number of the

1 person who is the subject of the report.

2 (3) The name and date of birth of any patient or
3 patients whose treatment is a subject of the report, if
4 available, or other means of identification if such
5 information is not available, identification of the
6 hospital or other health care facility where the care at
7 issue in the report was rendered, provided, however, no
8 medical records may be revealed.

9 (4) A brief description of the facts which gave rise
10 to the issuance of the report, including the dates of any
11 occurrences deemed to necessitate the filing of the
12 report.

13 (5) If court action is involved, the identity of the
14 court in which the action is filed, along with the docket
15 number and date of filing of the action.

16 (6) Any further pertinent information which the
17 reporting party deems to be an aid in the evaluation of the
18 report.

19 The Medical Board or Department may also exercise the
20 power under Section 38 of this Act to subpoena copies of
21 hospital or medical records in mandatory report cases alleging
22 death or permanent bodily injury. Appropriate rules shall be
23 adopted by the Department with the approval of the Medical
24 Board.

25 When the Department has received written reports
26 concerning incidents required to be reported in items (34),

1 (35), and (36) of subsection (A) of Section 22, the licensee's
2 failure to report the incident to the Department under those
3 items shall not be the sole grounds for disciplinary action.

4 Nothing contained in this Section shall act to, in any
5 way, waive or modify the confidentiality of medical reports
6 and committee reports to the extent provided by law. Any
7 information reported or disclosed shall be kept for the
8 confidential use of the Medical Board, the Medical
9 Coordinators, the Medical Board's attorneys, the medical
10 investigative staff, and authorized clerical staff, as
11 provided in this Act, and shall be afforded the same status as
12 is provided information concerning medical studies in Part 21
13 of Article VIII of the Code of Civil Procedure, except that the
14 Department may disclose information and documents to a
15 federal, State, or local law enforcement agency pursuant to a
16 subpoena in an ongoing criminal investigation or to a health
17 care licensing body or medical licensing authority of this
18 State or another state or jurisdiction pursuant to an official
19 request made by that licensing body or medical licensing
20 authority. Furthermore, information and documents disclosed to
21 a federal, State, or local law enforcement agency may be used
22 by that agency only for the investigation and prosecution of a
23 criminal offense, or, in the case of disclosure to a health
24 care licensing body or medical licensing authority, only for
25 investigations and disciplinary action proceedings with regard
26 to a license. Information and documents disclosed to the

1 Department of Public Health may be used by that Department
2 only for investigation and disciplinary action regarding the
3 license of a health care institution licensed by the
4 Department of Public Health.

5 (C) Immunity from prosecution. Any individual or
6 organization acting in good faith, and not in a willful ~~willful~~
7 and wanton manner, in complying with this Act by providing any
8 report or other information to the Medical Board or a peer
9 review committee, or assisting in the investigation or
10 preparation of such information, or by voluntarily reporting
11 to the Medical Board or a peer review committee information
12 regarding alleged errors or negligence by a person licensed
13 under this Act, or by participating in proceedings of the
14 Medical Board or a peer review committee, or by serving as a
15 member of the Medical Board or a peer review committee, shall
16 not, as a result of such actions, be subject to criminal
17 prosecution or civil damages.

18 (D) Indemnification. Members of the Medical Board, the
19 Medical Coordinators, the Medical Board's attorneys, the
20 medical investigative staff, physicians retained under
21 contract to assist and advise the medical coordinators in the
22 investigation, and authorized clerical staff shall be
23 indemnified by the State for any actions occurring within the
24 scope of services on the Medical Board, done in good faith and
25 not willful ~~willful~~ and wanton in nature. The Attorney General
26 shall defend all such actions unless the Attorney General ~~he~~

1 ~~or she~~ determines either that there would be a conflict of
2 interest in such representation or that the actions complained
3 of were not in good faith or were willful ~~wilful~~ and wanton.

4 Should the Attorney General decline representation, the
5 member shall have the right to employ counsel of the member's
6 ~~his or her~~ choice, whose fees shall be provided by the State,
7 after approval by the Attorney General, unless there is a
8 determination by a court that the member's actions were not in
9 good faith or were willful ~~wilful~~ and wanton.

10 The member must notify the Attorney General within 7 days
11 of receipt of notice of the initiation of any action involving
12 services of the Medical Board. Failure to so notify the
13 Attorney General shall constitute an absolute waiver of the
14 right to a defense and indemnification.

15 The Attorney General shall determine within 7 days after
16 receiving such notice, whether the Attorney General ~~he or she~~
17 will undertake to represent the member.

18 (E) Deliberations of Medical Board. Upon the receipt of
19 any report called for by this Act, other than those reports of
20 impaired persons licensed under this Act required pursuant to
21 the rules of the Medical Board, the Medical Board shall notify
22 in writing, by mail or email, the person who is the subject of
23 the report. Such notification shall be made within 30 days of
24 receipt by the Medical Board of the report.

25 The notification shall include a written notice setting
26 forth the person's right to examine the report. Included in

1 such notification shall be the address at which the file is
2 maintained, the name of the custodian of the reports, and the
3 telephone number at which the custodian may be reached. The
4 person who is the subject of the report shall submit a written
5 statement responding, clarifying, adding to, or proposing the
6 amending of the report previously filed. The person who is the
7 subject of the report shall also submit with the written
8 statement any medical records related to the report. The
9 statement and accompanying medical records shall become a
10 permanent part of the file and must be received by the Medical
11 Board no more than 30 days after the date on which the person
12 was notified by the Medical Board of the existence of the
13 original report.

14 The Medical Board shall review all reports received by it,
15 together with any supporting information and responding
16 statements submitted by persons who are the subject of
17 reports. The review by the Medical Board shall be in a timely
18 manner but in no event, shall the Medical Board's initial
19 review of the material contained in each disciplinary file be

(a) Physicians licensed to practice medicine in all its branches may delegate care and treatment responsibilities to a physician assistant under guidelines in accordance with the requirements of the Physician Assistant Practice Act of 1987. A physician licensed to practice medicine in all its branches may enter into collaborative agreements with no more than 7 full-time equivalent physician assistants, except in a hospital, hospital affiliate, or ambulatory surgical treatment center as set forth by Section 7.7 of the Physician Assistant Practice Act of 1987 and as provided in subsection (a-5).

(a-5) A physician licensed to practice medicine in all its branches may collaborate with more than 7 physician assistants when the services are provided in a federal primary care health professional shortage area with a Health Professional

1 Shortage Area score greater than or equal to 12, as determined
2 by the United States Department of Health and Human Services.

3 The collaborating physician must keep appropriate
4 documentation of meeting this exemption and make it available
5 to the Department upon request.

6 (b) A physician licensed to practice medicine in all its
7 branches in active clinical practice may collaborate with an
8 advanced practice registered nurse in accordance with the
9 requirements of the Nurse Practice Act. Collaboration is for
10 the purpose of providing medical consultation, and no
11 employment relationship is required. A written collaborative
12 agreement shall conform to the requirements of Section 65-35
13 of the Nurse Practice Act. The written collaborative agreement
14 shall be for services for which the collaborating physician
15 can provide adequate collaboration. A written collaborative
16 agreement shall be adequate with respect to collaboration with
17 advanced practice registered nurses if all of the following
18 apply:

19 (1) The agreement is written to promote the exercise

17 services will improve the welfare of Illinois residents
18 and non-residents requiring health care services.

19 (2) The applicant has graduated from a medical program
20 officially recognized by the jurisdiction in which it is
21 located for the purpose of receiving a license to practice
22 medicine in all of its branches, and maintains an
23 equivalent authorization to practice medicine in good
24 standing in the applicant's current state or territory of
25 licensure; and the applicant can furnish the Department

1 with a certified letter upon request from that
2 jurisdiction attesting to the fact that the applicant has
3 no pending action or violations against the applicant's
4 license.

5 The Department will not consider a physician's license
6 being revoked or otherwise disciplined by any state or
7 territory based solely on the physician providing,
8 authorizing, recommending, aiding, assisting, referring
9 for, or otherwise participating in any health care service
10 that is unlawful or prohibited in that state or territory,
11 if the provision of, authorization of, or participation in
12 that health care, medical service, or procedure related to
