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1 AMENDMENT TO HOUSE BILL 136

2 AMENDMENT NO. _____. Amend House Bill 136 by replacing
3 everything after the enacting clause with the following:

4 "Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the
5 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum Act.

6 Section 5. Definitions. As used in this Act:

7 "Agency" means the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
8 and Museum.

9 "Board" means the Board of Trustees of the Abraham Lincoln
10 Presidential Library and Museum.

11 "Executive Director" means the Executive Director of the
12 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

13 "Library" means the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library.

14 "Museum" means the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum.

15 Section 10. Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and

1 Museum; establishment.

2 (a) The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum,
3 formerly a constituent unit of the Illinois Historic
4 Preservation Agency, is created as an independent State agency
5 within the Executive Branch of State government.

6 (b) The Agency shall have control and custody of the
7 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum complex,
8 including the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum,
9 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum's parking
10 garage, Union Station, and Union Park, in Springfield.

11 (c) The Agency shall be under the supervision and direction
12 of the Executive Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential
13 Library and Museum.

14 Section 15. Board. There shall be a Board of Trustees of
15 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum to set
16 policy and advise the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and
17 Museum and the Executive Director on programs related to the
18 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum and to exercise
19 the powers and duties given to it under Section 25 of this Act.
20 The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum and the
21 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library Foundation shall mutually
22 co-operate to maximize resources available to the Abraham
23 Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum and to support,
24 sustain, and provide educational programs and collections at
25 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum. Any

1 membership fees collected by the Abraham Lincoln Presidential
2 Library Foundation may be used to support the Abraham Lincoln
3 Presidential Library and Museum programs or collections at the
4 Foundation's discretion.

5 Section 20. Composition of the Board. The Board of Trustees
6 shall consist of 11 members to be appointed by the Governor,
7 with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Board shall
8 consist of members with the following qualifications:

9 (1) One member shall have recognized knowledge and ability
10 in matters related to business administration.

11 (2) One member shall have recognized knowledge and ability
12 in matters related to the history of Abraham Lincoln.

13 (3) One member shall have recognized knowledge and ability
14 in matters related to the history of Illinois.

15 (4) One member shall have recognized knowledge and ability
16 in matters related to library and museum studies.

17 (5) One member shall have recognized knowledge and ability
18 in matters related to historic preservation.

19 (6) One member shall have recognized knowledge and ability
20 in matters related to cultural tourism.

21 (7) One member shall have recognized knowledge and ability
22 in matters related to conservation, digitization, and
23 technological innovation.

24 The initial terms of office shall be designated by the
25 Governor as follows: one member to serve for a term of one

1 year, 2 members to serve for a term of 2 years, 2 members to
2 serve for a term of 3 years, 2 members to serve for a term of 4
3 years, 2 members to serve for a term of 5 years, and 2 members
4 to serve for a term of 6 years. Thereafter, all appointments
5 shall be for a term of 6 years. The Governor shall appoint one
6 of the members to serve as chairperson at the pleasure of the
7 Governor.

8 The members of the Board shall serve without compensation
9 but shall be entitled to reimbursement for all necessary
10 expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties
11 as members of the Board from funds appropriated for that
12 purpose.

13 To facilitate communication and cooperation between the
14 Agency and the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
15 Foundation, the Foundation CEO shall serve as a non-voting,
16 ex-officio member of the Board.

17 Section 25. Powers and duties of the Board. The Board
18 shall:

19 (a) Set policies and establish programs for implementation
20 in support of the mission and goals of the Agency.

21 (b) Create and execute such seminars, symposia, or other
22 conferences as may be necessary or advisable to the Agency.

23 (c) Report annually to the Governor and the General
24 Assembly on the status of the Agency and its programs.

25 (d) Accept, hold, maintain, and administer, as trustee,

1 property given in trust for education or historic purposes for
2 the benefit of the people of the State of Illinois and dispose
3 of any property under the terms of the instrument creating the
4 trust.

5 (e) Accept, hold, maintain, and administer donated
6 property of historical significance, such as books, papers,
7 records, and personal property of any kind, including
8 electronic and digital property, pursuant to gifting
9 instruments, agreements, or deeds of gift, including but not
10 limited to the King Hostick Public Trust Fund, and enter into
11 such agreements as may be necessary to carry out the Board's
12 duties and responsibilities under this Section.

13 (f) Lease concessions at the Library and Museum. All
14 leases, for whatever period, shall be made subject to the
15 written approval of the Governor's Office of Management and
16 Budget. All concession leases extending for a period in excess
17 of 10 years shall contain provisions for the Agency to
18 participate, on a percentage basis, in the revenues generated
19 by any concession operation.

20 (g) Enforce the laws of the State and the rules of the
21 Agency.

22 (h) Cooperate with private organizations and agencies of
23 the State of Illinois by providing areas and the use of staff
24 personnel where feasible for the sale of publications on the
25 historic and cultural heritage of the State and craft items
26 made by Illinois craftsmen. These sales shall not conflict with

1 existing concession agreements. The Board is authorized to
2 negotiate and approve agreements with the organizations and
3 agencies for a portion of the moneys received from sales to be
4 returned to the Agency for the furtherance of interpretative
5 and restoration programs.

6 (i) Accept offers of gifts, gratuities, or grants from the
7 federal government, its agencies, or offices, or from any
8 person, firm, or corporation.

9 (j) Subject to the provisions of the Illinois
10 Administrative Procedure Act, make reasonable rules as may be
11 necessary to discharge the duties of the Agency.

12 (k) Charge and collect admission fees and rental for access
13 to and use of the facilities of the Library and Museum.

14 (l) Operate a restaurant, cafe, or other food serving
15 facility at the Museum or lease the operation of such a
16 facility under reasonable terms and conditions, and provide
17 vending services for food, beverages, or other products deemed
18 necessary and proper, consistent with the purposes of the
19 Library and Museum.

20 (m) Engage in marketing activities designed to promote the
21 Library and Museum. In undertaking these activities, the Board
22 may take all necessary steps with respect to products and
23 services, including, but not limited to, retail sales,
24 wholesale sales, direct marketing, mail order sales, telephone
25 sales, advertising and promotion, purchase of product and
26 materials inventory, design and printing and manufacturing of

1 new products, reproductions, and adaptations, copyright and
2 trademark licensing and royalty agreements, and payment of
3 applicable taxes. In addition, the Board shall have the
4 authority to sell advertising in its publications and printed
5 materials.

6 Section 30. Administration of the Agency. The Board shall
7 appoint an Executive Director of the Agency. The Executive
8 Director shall serve at the pleasure of the Board for a term of
9 4 years. The Executive Director shall, subject to applicable
10 provisions of law, execute and discharge the powers and duties
11 of the Agency. The Executive Director shall have hiring power
12 and shall appoint (a) a Library Facilities Operations Director;
13 and (b) a Director of the Library. The Executive Director shall
14 appoint those other employees of the Agency as he or she deems
15 appropriate and shall fix the compensation of the Library
16 Facilities Operations Director, the Director of the Library and
17 other employees. The Executive Director may make provision to
18 establish and collect admission and registration fees, operate
19 a gift shop, and publish and sell educational and informational
20 materials.

21 Section 35. Executive Director; exchange historical
22 records. The Executive Director shall make all necessary rules,
23 regulations, and bylaws not inconsistent with law to carry into
24 effect the purposes of this Act and to procure from time to

1 time as may be possible and practicable, at reasonable costs,
2 all books, pamphlets, manuscripts, monographs, writings, and
3 other material of historical interest and useful to the
4 historian bearing upon the political, physical, religious, or
5 social history of the State of Illinois from the earliest known
6 period of time. The Executive Director may, with the consent of
7 the Board, exchange any books, pamphlets, manuscripts,
8 records, or other materials which such library may acquire that
9 are of no historical interest or for any reason are of no value
10 to it, with any other library, school or historical society.
11 The Executive Director shall distribute volumes of the series
12 known as the Illinois Historical Collections now in print, and
13 to be printed, to all who may apply for same and who pay to the
14 Library and Museum for such volumes an amount fixed by the
15 Executive Director sufficient to cover the expenses of printing
16 and distribution of each volume received by such applicants.
17 However, the Executive Director shall have authority to furnish
18 25 of each of the volumes of the Illinois Historical
19 Collections, free of charge, to each of the authors and editors
20 of the Collections or parts thereof; to furnish, as in his or
21 her discretion he or she deems necessary or desirable, a
22 reasonable number of each of the volumes of the Collections
23 without charge to archives, libraries, and similar
24 institutions from which material has been drawn or assistance
25 has been given in the preparation of such Collections, and to
26 the officials thereof; and to furnish, as in his or her

1 discretion he or she deems necessary or desirable, a reasonable
2 number of each of the volumes of the Collections without charge
3 to the University of Illinois Library and to instructors and
4 officials of that University, and to public libraries in the
5 State of Illinois. The Executive Director may, with the consent
6 of the Board, also make exchanges of the Historical Collections
7 with any other library, school or historical society, and
8 distribute volumes of the Collections for review purposes.

9 Section 40. Illinois State Historian; appointment. The
10 Executive Director, with the advice and consent of the Board,
11 shall appoint the Illinois State Historian, who shall provide
12 historical expertise, support, and service on civic engagement
13 to educators and not-for-profit educational groups, including
14 historical societies. The State Historian is the State's
15 leading authority on the history of Illinois.

16 Section 45. State Historian; historical records. The State
17 Historian shall establish and supervise a program within the
18 Agency designed to preserve as historical records selected past
19 editions of newspapers of this State. Such editions shall be
20 preserved in accordance with industry standards. The negatives
21 of microphotographs and other materials shall be stored in a
22 place provided by the Agency.

23 The State Historian shall determine on the basis of
24 historical value the various newspaper edition files which

1 shall be preserved and shall arrange a schedule for such
2 preservation. The State Historian shall supervise the making of
3 arrangements for acquiring access to past edition files with
4 the editors or publishers of the various newspapers.

5 The method of microphotography to be employed in this
6 program shall conform to the standards established pursuant to
7 Section 17 of The State Records Act.

8 Upon payment to the Agency of the required fee, any person
9 or organization shall be supplied with any prints requested to
10 be made from the newspapers and all records. The fee required
11 shall be determined by the State Historian and shall be equal
12 in amount to the costs incurred by the Agency in supplying the
13 requested prints.

14 Section 50. Gifts to the Illinois State Historical Library.
15 Those programs, collections, and functions heretofore
16 administered by the Illinois State Historical Library or the
17 Historic Preservation Agency's Historical Library Division
18 shall be administered by the Agency. All gifts made
19 specifically to the Illinois State Historical Library shall
20 remain at all times within the Agency.

21 Section 55. Director of the Library; historical
22 collections. The Director of the Library shall make all
23 necessary rules, regulations, and bylaws not inconsistent with
24 law to carry into effect the purpose of this Act and to procure

1 from time to time as may be possible and practicable, at
2 reasonable costs, all books, pamphlets, manuscripts,
3 monographs, writings, and other material of historical
4 interest and useful to the historian bearing upon the
5 political, physical, religious, or social history of the State
6 of Illinois from the earliest known period of time. The
7 Director of the Library may exchange any books, pamphlets,
8 manuscripts, records or other material which the Library may
9 acquire that are of no historical interest or for any reason
10 are of no value to it, with another library, school, or
11 historical society. The Director of the Library shall
12 distribute volumes of the series known as the Illinois
13 Historical Collections now in print, and to be printed, to all
14 who may apply for same and who pay to the Library for such
15 volumes an amount fixed by the Director sufficient to cover the
16 expenses of printing and distributing each volume received by
17 such applicants. However, the Director of the Library shall
18 have authority to furnish 25 of each of the volumes of the
19 Illinois Historical Collections, free of charge, to each of the
20 authors and editors of the Collections or parts thereof, to
21 furnish, as in his or her discretion he or she deems necessary
22 or desirable, a reasonable number of each of the volumes of the
23 Collections without charge to archives, libraries and similar
24 institutions from which materials has been drawn or assistance
25 has been given in the preparation of such Collections, and to
26 the officials thereof, and to furnish, as in his or her

1 discretion he or she deems necessary or desirable, a reasonable
2 number of each of the volumes of the Collections without charge
3 to the University of Illinois Library and to instructors and
4 officials of that University, and to the public libraries in
5 the State of Illinois. The Director of the Library may also
6 make exchanges of the Historical Collections with any other
7 library, school, or historical society, and distribute volumes
8 of the Collections for review purposes.

9 Section 60. State Historical Library. The rights, powers,
10 and duties vested by law in the State Historical Library or any
11 office, division, or bureau thereof are hereby transferred to
12 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

13 Section 65. Separation from the Historic Preservation
14 Agency. On the effective date of this Act, all of the powers,
15 duties, assets, liabilities, employees, contracts, property
16 (real and personal), including any items formerly contained in
17 the Illinois State Historical Library now presently held in the
18 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum, records,
19 pending business, and unexpended appropriations of the
20 Historic Preservation Agency related to the administration and
21 enforcement of Sections 17, 32, and 33 of the Historic
22 Preservation Agency Act are transferred to the Agency created
23 under this Act. The status and rights of the transferred
24 employees, and the rights of the State of Illinois and its

1 agencies, under the Personnel Code and applicable collective
2 bargaining agreements or under any pension, retirement, or
3 annuity plan are not affected (except as provided in Sections
4 14-110 and 18-127 of the Illinois Pension Code) by that
5 transfer or by any other provision of this Act.

6 Section 70. Rulemaking authority. The Agency may adopt
7 rules in contravention of this Act in order to comply with
8 federal laws or regulations that apply to Presidential
9 Libraries administered by the Office of Presidential Libraries
10 under the National Archives and Records Administration,
11 including, but not limited to, 44 U.S.C. 21, 44 U.S.C. 22, and
12 36 CFR 1270.

13 Section 75. The Historic Preservation Agency Act is amended
14 by changing Sections 2 and 4 as follows:

15 (20 ILCS 3405/2) (from Ch. 127, par. 2702)

16 Sec. 2. For the purposes of this Act:

17 (a) "Agency" means the Historic Preservation Agency;

18 (b) "Board" means the Board of Trustees of the Historic
19 Preservation Agency;

20 (c) "Director" means the Director of Historic Sites and
21 Preservation;

22 (d) (Blank); ~~"Advisory Board" means the Advisory Board of~~
23 ~~the Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum;~~

1 (e) (Blank); ~~"Lincoln Presidential Library" means the~~
2 ~~Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum;~~

3 (f) (Blank); and ~~"Library Director" means the Director of~~
4 ~~the Lincoln Presidential Library; and~~

5 (g) "Historic Sites and Preservation Division" means that
6 part of the Agency that is headed by the Director of Historic
7 Sites and Preservation.

10 Sec. 4. The Board shall be responsible for setting and
11 determining policy for the Agency. Within the Agency, there
12 shall be a Historic Sites and Preservation Division. ~~The Agency~~
13 ~~shall consist of: (1) an Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library~~
14 ~~and Museum and (2) a Historic Sites and Preservation Division.~~
15 Except as otherwise provided in this Act, any reference in any
16 other Act to the Historic Preservation Agency shall be deemed
17 to be a reference to the Historic Sites and Preservation
18 Division and any reference to the Director of Historic
19 Preservation shall be deemed to be a reference to the Director
20 of Historic Sites and Preservation, unless the context clearly
21 indicates otherwise.

22 The Board shall appoint a chief executive officer of the
23 Agency who shall be known as the Director of Historic Sites and
24 Preservation. The Director shall serve at the pleasure of the
25 Board. The Director shall, subject to applicable provisions of

1 law, execute the powers and discharge the duties vested in the
2 Historic Sites and Preservation Division of the Agency by law
3 and implement the policies set by the Board. The Director shall
4 manage the Historic Sites and Preservation Division of the
5 Agency. The Director, with the concurrence of the Board, shall
6 appoint Division Chiefs and the Deputy Director of the Historic
7 Sites and Preservation Division of the Agency. Subject to
8 concurrence by the Board, the Director shall appoint such other
9 employees of the Historic Sites and Preservation Division of
10 the Agency as he or she deems appropriate and shall fix the
11 compensation of such Division Chiefs, the Deputy Director and
12 other employees. ~~The Board shall appoint the Illinois State
13 Historian, who shall provide historical expertise, support,
14 and service to all divisions of the Historic Preservation
15 Agency. The State Historian is the State's authority on Abraham
16 Lincoln and the history of Illinois.~~

23 Section 80. The Historic Preservation Agency Act is amended
24 by repealing Sections 17, 30, 31, 32, and 33.

1 Section 85. The Illinois Historic Preservation Act is
2 amended by changing Section 3 as follows:

3 (20 ILCS 3410/3) (from Ch. 127, par. 133d3)

4 Sec. 3. There is recognized and established hereunder the
5 Illinois Historic Sites Advisory Council, previously
6 established pursuant to Federal regulations, hereafter called
7 the Council. The Council shall consist of 15 members. Of these,
8 there shall be at least 3 historians, at least 3 architectural
9 historians, or architects with a preservation background, and
10 at least 3 archeologists. The remaining 6 members shall be
11 drawn from supporting fields and have a preservation interest.
12 Supporting fields shall include but not be limited to
13 historical geography, law, urban planning, local government
14 officials, and members of other preservation commissions. All
15 shall be appointed by the Director of Historic Sites and
16 Preservation, with the consent of the Board.

17 The Council Chairperson shall be appointed by the Director
18 of Historic Sites and Preservation from the Council membership
19 and shall serve at the Director's pleasure.

20 The Executive Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential
21 Library and Museum and the Director of the Illinois State
22 Museum shall serve on the Council in advisory capacity as
23 non-voting members.

24 Terms of membership shall be 3 years and shall be staggered
25 by the Director to assure continuity of representation.

1 The Council shall meet at least 3 times each year.
2 Additional meetings may be held at the call of the chairperson
3 or at the call of the Director.

4 Members shall serve without compensation, but shall be
5 reimbursed for actual expenses incurred in the performance of
6 their duties.

8 Section 90. The State Historical Library Act is amended by
9 changing Section 5.1 as follows:

10 (20 ILCS 3425/5.1) (from Ch. 128, par. 16.1)

11 Sec. 5.1. The State Historian shall establish and supervise
12 a program within the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and
13 Museum designed to preserve as historical records selected past
14 editions of newspapers of this State. Such editions shall be
15 preserved in accordance with industry standards
16 ~~microphotographed~~. The negatives of ~~such~~ microphotographs and
17 other materials shall be stored in a place provided by the
18 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

19 The State Historian shall determine on the basis of
20 historical value the various newspaper edition files which
21 shall be preserved ~~microphotographed~~ and shall arrange a
22 schedule for such preservation ~~microphotographing~~. The State
23 Historian shall supervise the making of arrangements for
24 acquiring access to past edition files with the editors or

4 Section 17 of "The State Records Act", approved July 6, 1957.

5 Upon payment to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
6 and Museum of the required fee, any person or organization
7 shall be supplied with any prints requested to be made from the
8 newspapers and all records. ~~negatives of the microphotographs.~~
9 The fee required shall be determined by the State Historian and
10 shall be equal in amount to the cost incurred by the Abraham
11 Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum in supplying the
12 requested prints.

14 Section 95. The Old State Capitol Act is amended by
15 changing Section 1 as follows:

16 (20 ILCS 3430/1) (from Ch. 123, par. 52)

17 Sec. 1. As used in this Act,

18 (a) "Old State Capitol Complex" means the old State capitol
19 reconstructed under the "1961 Act" in Springfield and includes
20 space also occupied by the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
21 and Museum and an underground parking garage;

22 (b) "1961 Act" means "An Act providing for the
23 reconstruction and restoration of the old State Capitol at
24 Springfield and providing for the custody thereof", approved

1 August 24, 1961, as amended;

2 (c) "Board of Trustees" means the Board of Trustees of the
3 Historic Preservation Agency.

5 Section 100. The Illinois Municipal Code is amended by
6 changing Section 11-48-1 as follows:

7 (65 ILCS 5/11-48-1) (from Ch. 24, par. 11-48-1)

8 Sec. 11-48-1. The city council or board of trustees of
9 every city, incorporated town or village may, by order or
10 resolution authorize and direct to be transferred to the
11 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum, the State
12 Archives or to the State University Library at Urbana,
13 Illinois, or to any historical society duly incorporated and
14 located within their respective counties, such official
15 papers, drawings, maps, writings and records of every
16 description as may be deemed of historic interest or value, and
17 as may be in the custody of any officer of such county, city,
18 incorporated town or village. Accurate copies of the same when
19 so transferred shall be substituted for the original when in
20 the judgment of such city council or board of trustees the same
21 may be deemed necessary.

23 Section 105. The Liquor Control Act of 1934 is amended by

1 changing Section 6-15 as follows:

2 (235 ILCS 5/6-15) (from Ch. 43, par. 130)

3 Sec. 6-15. No alcoholic liquors shall be sold or delivered
4 in any building belonging to or under the control of the State
5 or any political subdivision thereof except as provided in this
6 Act. The corporate authorities of any city, village,
7 incorporated town, township, or county may provide by
8 ordinance, however, that alcoholic liquor may be sold or
9 delivered in any specifically designated building belonging to
10 or under the control of the municipality, township, or county,
11 or in any building located on land under the control of the
12 municipality, township, or county; provided that such township
13 or county complies with all applicable local ordinances in any
14 incorporated area of the township or county. Alcoholic liquor
15 may be delivered to and sold under the authority of a special
16 use permit on any property owned by a conservation district
17 organized under the Conservation District Act, provided that
18 (i) the alcoholic liquor is sold only at an event authorized by
19 the governing board of the conservation district, (ii) the
20 issuance of the special use permit is authorized by the local
21 liquor control commissioner of the territory in which the
22 property is located, and (iii) the special use permit
23 authorizes the sale of alcoholic liquor for one day or less.
24 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at any airport
25 belonging to or under the control of a municipality of more

1 than 25,000 inhabitants, or in any building or on any golf
2 course owned by a park district organized under the Park
3 District Code, subject to the approval of the governing board
4 of the district, or in any building or on any golf course owned
5 by a forest preserve district organized under the Downstate
6 Forest Preserve District Act, subject to the approval of the
7 governing board of the district, or on the grounds within 500
8 feet of any building owned by a forest preserve district
9 organized under the Downstate Forest Preserve District Act
10 during times when food is dispensed for consumption within 500
11 feet of the building from which the food is dispensed, subject
12 to the approval of the governing board of the district, or in a
13 building owned by a Local Mass Transit District organized under
14 the Local Mass Transit District Act, subject to the approval of
15 the governing Board of the District, or in Bicentennial Park,
16 or on the premises of the City of Mendota Lake Park located
17 adjacent to Route 51 in Mendota, Illinois, or on the premises
18 of Camden Park in Milan, Illinois, or in the community center
19 owned by the City of Loves Park that is located at 1000 River
20 Park Drive in Loves Park, Illinois, or, in connection with the
21 operation of an established food serving facility during times
22 when food is dispensed for consumption on the premises, and at
23 the following aquarium and museums located in public parks: Art
24 Institute of Chicago, Chicago Academy of Sciences, Chicago
25 Historical Society, Field Museum of Natural History, Museum of
26 Science and Industry, DuSable Museum of African American

1 History, John G. Shedd Aquarium and Adler Planetarium, or at
2 Lakeview Museum of Arts and Sciences in Peoria, or in
3 connection with the operation of the facilities of the Chicago
4 Zoological Society or the Chicago Horticultural Society on land
5 owned by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, or on any
6 land used for a golf course or for recreational purposes owned
7 by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, subject to the
8 control of the Forest Preserve District Board of Commissioners
9 and applicable local law, provided that dram shop liability
10 insurance is provided at maximum coverage limits so as to hold
11 the District harmless from all financial loss, damage, and
12 harm, or in any building located on land owned by the Chicago
13 Park District if approved by the Park District Commissioners,
14 or on any land used for a golf course or for recreational
15 purposes and owned by the Illinois International Port District
16 if approved by the District's governing board, or at any
17 airport, golf course, faculty center, or facility in which
18 conference and convention type activities take place belonging
19 to or under control of any State university or public community
20 college district, provided that with respect to a facility for
21 conference and convention type activities alcoholic liquors
22 shall be limited to the use of the convention or conference
23 participants or participants in cultural, political or
24 educational activities held in such facilities, and provided
25 further that the faculty or staff of the State university or a
26 public community college district, or members of an

1 organization of students, alumni, faculty or staff of the State
2 university or a public community college district are active
3 participants in the conference or convention, or in Memorial
4 Stadium on the campus of the University of Illinois at
5 Urbana-Champaign during games in which the Chicago Bears
6 professional football team is playing in that stadium during
7 the renovation of Soldier Field, not more than one and a half
8 hours before the start of the game and not after the end of the
9 third quarter of the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the
10 campus of the University of Illinois at Chicago during games in
11 which the Chicago Storm professional soccer team is playing in
12 that facility, not more than one and a half hours before the
13 start of the game and not after the end of the third quarter of
14 the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the campus of the
15 University of Illinois at Chicago during games in which the
16 WNBA professional women's basketball team is playing in that
17 facility, not more than one and a half hours before the start
18 of the game and not after the 10-minute mark of the second half
19 of the game, or by a catering establishment which has rented
20 facilities from a board of trustees of a public community
21 college district, or in a restaurant that is operated by a
22 commercial tenant in the North Campus Parking Deck building
23 that (1) is located at 1201 West University Avenue, Urbana,
24 Illinois and (2) is owned by the Board of Trustees of the
25 University of Illinois, or, if approved by the District board,
26 on land owned by the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater

1 Chicago and leased to others for a term of at least 20 years.
2 Nothing in this Section precludes the sale or delivery of
3 alcoholic liquor in the form of original packaged goods in
4 premises located at 500 S. Racine in Chicago belonging to the
5 University of Illinois and used primarily as a grocery store by
6 a commercial tenant during the term of a lease that predates
7 the University's acquisition of the premises; but the
8 University shall have no power or authority to renew, transfer,
9 or extend the lease with terms allowing the sale of alcoholic
10 liquor; and the sale of alcoholic liquor shall be subject to
11 all local laws and regulations. After the acquisition by
12 Winnebago County of the property located at 404 Elm Street in
13 Rockford, a commercial tenant who sold alcoholic liquor at
14 retail on a portion of the property under a valid license at
15 the time of the acquisition may continue to do so for so long
16 as the tenant and the County may agree under existing or future
17 leases, subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the
18 sale of alcoholic liquor. Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to
19 and sold at Memorial Hall, located at 211 North Main Street,
20 Rockford, under conditions approved by Winnebago County and
21 subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the sale of
22 alcoholic liquor. Each facility shall provide dram shop
23 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save
24 harmless the State, municipality, State university, airport,
25 golf course, faculty center, facility in which conference and
26 convention type activities take place, park district, Forest

1 Preserve District, public community college district,
2 aquarium, museum, or sanitary district from all financial loss,
3 damage or harm. Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in
4 buildings of golf courses owned by municipalities or Illinois
5 State University in connection with the operation of an
6 established food serving facility during times when food is
7 dispensed for consumption upon the premises. Alcoholic liquors
8 may be delivered to and sold at retail in any building owned by
9 a fire protection district organized under the Fire Protection
10 District Act, provided that such delivery and sale is approved
11 by the board of trustees of the district, and provided further
12 that such delivery and sale is limited to fundraising events
13 and to a maximum of 6 events per year. However, the limitation
14 to fundraising events and to a maximum of 6 events per year
15 does not apply to the delivery, sale, or manufacture of
16 alcoholic liquors at the building located at 59 Main Street in
17 Oswego, Illinois, owned by the Oswego Fire Protection District
18 if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed as approved by the
19 Oswego Fire Protection District and the property is no longer
20 being utilized for fire protection purposes.

21 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
22 the control of the Board of Trustees of the University of
23 Illinois for events that the Board may determine are public
24 events and not related student activities. The Board of
25 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months of August
26 15, 2008 (the effective date of Public Act 95-847) ~~this~~

1 ~~amendatory Act of the 95th General Assembly~~ concerning the
2 types of events that would be eligible for an exemption.
3 Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised, updated,
4 new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and appropriate.
5 In preparing its written policy, the Board of Trustees shall,
6 among other factors it considers relevant and important, give
7 consideration to the following: (i) whether the event is a
8 student activity or student related activity; (ii) whether the
9 physical setting of the event is conducive to control of liquor
10 sales and distribution; (iii) the ability of the event operator
11 to ensure that the sale or serving of alcoholic liquors and the

7 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
8 the control of the Board of Trustees of Northern Illinois
9 University for events that the Board may determine are public
10 events and not student-related activities. The Board of
11 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months after
12 June 28, 2011 (the effective date of Public Act 97-45)
13 concerning the types of events that would be eligible for an
14 exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised,
15 updated, new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and
16 appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the Board of
17 Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it considers
18 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:

14 concerning the types of events that would be eligible for an
15 exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised,
16 updated, new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and
17 appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the Board of
18 Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it considers
19 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:
20 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student-related
21 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is
22 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)
23 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or

15 August 12, 2016 (the effective date of Public Act 99-795) ~~this~~
16 ~~amendatory Act of the 99th General Assembly~~ concerning the
17 types of events that would be eligible for an exemption.
18 Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised, updated,
19 new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and appropriate.
20 In preparing its written policy, the Board of Trustees shall,
21 in addition to other factors it considers relevant and
22 important, give consideration to the following: (i) whether the
23 event is a student activity or student-related activity; (ii)
24 whether the physical setting of the event is conducive to
25 control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii) the ability of

17 Section on or before July 15, 2016 (the effective date of
18 Public Act 99-550) ~~this amendatory Act of the 99th General~~
19 ~~Assembly~~, then that Board of Trustees shall issue a written
20 policy within 6 months after July 15, 2016 (the effective date
21 of Public Act 99-550) ~~this amendatory Act of the 99th General~~
22 ~~Assembly~~ concerning the types of events that would be eligible
23 for an exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue
24 revised, updated, new, or amended policies as it deems
25 necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the
26 Board of Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it

1 considers relevant and important, give consideration to the
2 following: (i) whether the event is a student activity or
3 student-related activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of

23 the control of the Board of Trustees of a community college
24 district for events that the Board of Trustees of that
25 community college district may determine are public events and
26 not student-related activities. The Board of Trustees shall

1 issue a written policy within 6 months after July 15, 2016 (the
2 effective date of Public Act 99-550) ~~this amendatory Act of the~~
3 ~~99th General Assembly~~ concerning the types of events that would
4 be eligible for an exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees
5 may issue revised, updated, new, or amended policies as it
6 deems necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written
7 policy, the Board of Trustees shall, in addition to other
8 factors it considers relevant and important, give
9 consideration to the following: (i) whether the event is a
10 student activity or student-related activity; (ii) whether the
11 physical setting of the event is conducive to control of liquor
12 sales and distribution; (iii) the ability of the event operator

26 Alcoholic liquor may be delivered to and sold at retail in

1 the Dorchester Senior Business Center owned by the Village of
2 Dolton if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
3 connection with organized functions for which the planned
4 attendance is 20 or more persons, and if the person or facility
5 selling or dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram
6 shop liability insurance in maximum limits so as to hold
7 harmless the Village of Dolton and the State from all financial
8 loss, damage and harm.

9 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
10 any building used as an Illinois State Armory provided:

11 (i) the Adjutant General's written consent to the
12 issuance of a license to sell alcoholic liquor in such
13 building is filed with the Commission;

14 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
15 connection with organized functions held on special
16 occasions;

17 (iii) the organized function is one for which the
18 planned attendance is 25 or more persons; and

19 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic
20 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in
21 maximum limits so as to save harmless the facility and the
22 State from all financial loss, damage or harm.

23 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
24 the Chicago Civic Center, provided that:

25 (i) the written consent of the Public Building
26 Commission which administers the Chicago Civic Center is

1 filed with the Commission;

2 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
3 connection with organized functions held on special
4 occasions;

5 (iii) the organized function is one for which the
6 planned attendance is 25 or more persons;

7 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic
8 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in
9 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Civic Center, the
10 City of Chicago and the State from all financial loss,
11 damage or harm; and

12 (v) all applicable local ordinances are complied with.

13 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered or sold in any building
14 belonging to or under the control of any city, village or
15 incorporated town where more than 75% of the physical
16 properties of the building is used for commercial or
17 recreational purposes, and the building is located upon a pier
18 extending into or over the waters of a navigable lake or stream
19 or on the shore of a navigable lake or stream. In accordance
20 with a license issued under this Act, alcoholic liquor may be
21 sold, served, or delivered in buildings and facilities under
22 the control of the Department of Natural Resources during
23 events or activities lasting no more than 7 continuous days
24 upon the written approval of the Director of Natural Resources
25 acting as the controlling government authority. The Director of
26 Natural Resources may specify conditions on that approval,

1 including but not limited to requirements for insurance and
2 hours of operation. Notwithstanding any other provision of this
3 Act, alcoholic liquor sold by a United States Army Corps of
4 Engineers or Department of Natural Resources concessionaire
5 who was operating on June 1, 1991 for on-premises consumption
6 only is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.
7 Beer and wine may be sold on the premises of the Joliet Park
8 District Stadium owned by the Joliet Park District when written
9 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in
10 such premises is filed with the local liquor commissioner by
11 the Joliet Park District. Beer and wine may be sold in
12 buildings on the grounds of State veterans' homes when written
13 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in
14 such buildings is filed with the Commission by the Department
15 of Veterans' Affairs, and the facility shall provide dram shop
16 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save
17 the facility harmless from all financial loss, damage or harm.
18 Such liquors may be delivered to and sold at any property owned
19 or held under lease by a Metropolitan Pier and Exposition
20 Authority or Metropolitan Exposition and Auditorium Authority.

21 Beer and wine may be sold and dispensed at professional
22 sporting events and at professional concerts and other
23 entertainment events conducted on premises owned by the Forest
24 Preserve District of Kane County, subject to the control of the
25 District Commissioners and applicable local law, provided that
26 dram shop liability insurance is provided at maximum coverage

1 limits so as to hold the District harmless from all financial
2 loss, damage and harm.

3 Nothing in this Section shall preclude the sale or delivery
4 of beer and wine at a State or county fair or the sale or
5 delivery of beer or wine at a city fair in any otherwise lawful
6 manner.

7 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in
8 State parks under the control of the Department of Natural
9 Resources, provided:

10 a. the State park has overnight lodging facilities with
11 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight
12 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve
13 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

14 b. (blank), and

15 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the State park
16 lodge or restaurant concessionaire only during the hours
17 from 11 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.
18 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, alcoholic
19 liquor sold by the State park or restaurant concessionaire
20 is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.

21 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings on
22 properties under the control of the Historic Sites and
23 Preservation Division of the Historic Preservation Agency or
24 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum provided:

25 a. the property has overnight lodging facilities with
26 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight

1 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve
2 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

3 b. consent to the issuance of a license to sell
4 alcoholic liquors in the buildings has been filed with the
5 commission by the Historic Sites and Preservation Division
6 of the Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln
7 Presidential Library and Museum, and

8 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the lodge or
9 restaurant concessionaire only during the hours from 11
10 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.

11 The sale of alcoholic liquors pursuant to this Section does
12 not authorize the establishment and operation of facilities
13 commonly called taverns, saloons, bars, cocktail lounges, and
14 the like except as a part of lodge and restaurant facilities in
15 State parks or golf courses owned by Forest Preserve Districts
16 with a population of less than 3,000,000 or municipalities or
17 park districts.

18 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in the Springfield
19 Administration Building of the Department of Transportation
20 and the Illinois State Armory in Springfield; provided, that
21 the controlling government authority may consent to such sales
22 only if

23 a. the request is from a not-for-profit organization;

24 b. such sales would not impede normal operations of the
25 departments involved;

26 c. the not-for-profit organization provides dram shop

1 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits and agrees
2 to defend, save harmless and indemnify the State of
3 Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm;

4 d. no such sale shall be made during normal working
5 hours of the State of Illinois; and

6 e. the consent is in writing.

7 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in
8 recreational areas of river conservancy districts under the
9 control of, or leased from, the river conservancy districts.
10 Such sales are subject to reasonable local regulations as
11 provided in Article IV; however, no such regulations may
12 prohibit or substantially impair the sale of alcoholic liquors
13 on Sundays or Holidays.

14 Alcoholic liquors may be provided in long term care
15 facilities owned or operated by a county under Division 5-21 or
16 5-22 of the Counties Code, when approved by the facility
17 operator and not in conflict with the regulations of the
18 Illinois Department of Public Health, to residents of the
19 facility who have had their consumption of the alcoholic
20 liquors provided approved in writing by a physician licensed to
21 practice medicine in all its branches.

22 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and dispensed in
23 State housing assigned to employees of the Department of
24 Corrections. No person shall furnish or allow to be furnished
25 any alcoholic liquors to any prisoner confined in any jail,
26 reformatory, prison or house of correction except upon a

1 physician's prescription for medicinal purposes.

2 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the
3 Willard Ice Building in Springfield, at the State Library in
4 Springfield, and at Illinois State Museum facilities by (1) an
5 agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or
6 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written
7 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the
8 controlling government authority, or by (2) a not-for-profit
9 organization, provided that such organization:

10 a. Obtains written consent from the controlling
11 government authority;

12 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
13 that does not impair normal operations of State offices
14 located in the building;

15 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
16 connection with an official activity in the building;

17 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
18 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
19 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
20 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
21 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
22 alcoholic liquors.

23 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
24 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
25 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
26 alcoholic liquors at authorized functions.

1 The controlling government authority for the Willard Ice
2 Building in Springfield shall be the Director of the Department
3 of Revenue. The controlling government authority for Illinois
4 State Museum facilities shall be the Director of the Illinois
5 State Museum. The controlling government authority for the
6 State Library in Springfield shall be the Secretary of State.

7 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or
8 dispensed at any facility, property or building under the
9 jurisdiction of the Historic Sites and Preservation Division of
10 the Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln
11 Presidential Library and Museum where the delivery, sale or
12 dispensing is by (1) an agency of the State, whether
13 legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such agency
14 first obtains written permission to sell or dispense alcoholic
15 liquors from a controlling government authority, or by (2) an
16 individual or organization provided that such individual or
17 organization:

18 a. Obtains written consent from the controlling
19 government authority;

20 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
21 that does not impair normal workings of State offices or
22 operations located at the facility, property or building;

23 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
24 connection with an official activity of the individual or
25 organization in the facility, property or building;

26 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram

1 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
2 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
3 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
4 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
5 alcoholic liquors.

6 The controlling government authority for the Historic
7 Sites and Preservation Division of the Historic Preservation
8 Agency shall be the Director of the Historic Sites and
9 Preservation, and the controlling government authority for the
10 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum shall be the
11 Executive Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
12 and Museum.

13 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or
14 dispensed for consumption at the Michael Bilandic Building at
15 160 North LaSalle Street, Chicago IL 60601, after the normal
16 business hours of any day care or child care facility located
17 in the building, by (1) a commercial tenant or subtenant
18 conducting business on the premises under a lease made pursuant
19 to Section 405-315 of the Department of Central Management
20 Services Law (20 ILCS 405/405-315), provided that such tenant
21 or subtenant who accepts delivery of, sells, or dispenses
22 alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram shop
23 liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in which the
24 carrier agrees to defend, indemnify, and save harmless the
25 State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage, or harm
26 arising out of the delivery, sale, or dispensing of alcoholic

1 liquors, or by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative,
2 judicial, or executive, provided that such agency first obtains
3 written permission to accept delivery of and sell or dispense
4 alcoholic liquors from the Director of Central Management
5 Services, or by (3) a not-for-profit organization, provided
6 that such organization:

7 a. obtains written consent from the Department of
8 Central Management Services;

9 b. accepts delivery of and sells or dispenses the
10 alcoholic liquors in a manner that does not impair normal
11 operations of State offices located in the building;

12 c. accepts delivery of and sells or dispenses alcoholic
13 liquors only in connection with an official activity in the
14 building; and

15 d. provides, or its catering service provides, dram
16 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
17 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless, and
18 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
19 damage, or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
20 alcoholic liquors.

21 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
22 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
23 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
24 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Director of
25 Central Management Services.

26 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the

1 James R. Thompson Center in Chicago, subject to the provisions
2 of Section 7.4 of the State Property Control Act, and 222 South
3 College Street in Springfield, Illinois by (1) a commercial
4 tenant or subtenant conducting business on the premises under a
5 lease or sublease made pursuant to Section 405-315 of the
6 Department of Central Management Services Law (20 ILCS
7 405/405-315), provided that such tenant or subtenant who sells
8 or dispenses alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram
9 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
10 which the carrier agrees to defend, indemnify and save harmless
11 the State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm
12 arising out of the sale or dispensing of alcoholic liquors, or
13 by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or
14 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written
15 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the
16 Director of Central Management Services, or by (3) a
17 not-for-profit organization, provided that such organization:

18 a. Obtains written consent from the Department of
19 Central Management Services;

20 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
21 that does not impair normal operations of State offices
22 located in the building;

23 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
24 connection with an official activity in the building;

25 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
26 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in

1 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
2 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
3 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
4 alcoholic liquors.

5 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
6 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
7 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
8 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Director of
9 Central Management Services.

10 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered at any facility
11 owned by the Illinois Sports Facilities Authority provided that
12 dram shop liability insurance has been made available in a
13 form, with such coverage and in such amounts as the Authority
14 reasonably determines is necessary.

15 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the
16 Rockford State Office Building by (1) an agency of the State,
17 whether legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such
18 agency first obtains written permission to sell or dispense
19 alcoholic liquors from the Department of Central Management
20 Services, or by (2) a not-for-profit organization, provided
21 that such organization:

22 a. Obtains written consent from the Department of
23 Central Management Services;

24 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
25 that does not impair normal operations of State offices
26 located in the building;

1 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
2 connection with an official activity in the building;

3 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
4 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
5 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
6 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
7 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
8 alcoholic liquors.

9 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
10 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
11 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
12 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Department of
13 Central Management Services.

14 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in a building
15 that is owned by McLean County, situated on land owned by the
16 county in the City of Bloomington, and used by the McLean
17 County Historical Society if the sale or delivery is approved
18 by an ordinance adopted by the county board, and the
19 municipality in which the building is located may not prohibit
20 that sale or delivery, notwithstanding any other provision of
21 this Section. The regulation of the sale and delivery of
22 alcoholic liquor in a building that is owned by McLean County,
23 situated on land owned by the county, and used by the McLean
24 County Historical Society as provided in this paragraph is an
25 exclusive power and function of the State and is a denial and
26 limitation under Article VII, Section 6, subsection (h) of the

1 Illinois Constitution of the power of a home rule municipality
2 to regulate that sale and delivery.

3 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in any building
4 situated on land held in trust for any school district
5 organized under Article 34 of the School Code, if the building
6 is not used for school purposes and if the sale or delivery is
7 approved by the board of education.

8 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
9 any building owned by a public library district, provided that
10 the delivery and sale is approved by the board of trustees of
11 that public library district and is limited to library
12 fundraising events or programs of a cultural or educational
13 nature. Before the board of trustees of a public library
14 district may approve the delivery and sale of alcoholic
15 liquors, the board of trustees of the public library district
16 must have a written policy that has been approved by the board
17 of trustees of the public library district governing when and
18 under what circumstances alcoholic liquors may be delivered to
19 and sold at retail on property owned by that public library
20 district. The written policy must (i) provide that no alcoholic
21 liquor may be sold, distributed, or consumed in any area of the
22 library accessible to the general public during the event or
23 program, (ii) prohibit the removal of alcoholic liquor from the
24 venue during the event, and (iii) require that steps be taken
25 to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic liquor to
26 persons under the age of 21. Any public library district that

1 has alcoholic liquor delivered to or sold at retail on property
2 owned by the public library district shall provide dram shop
3 liability insurance in maximum insurance coverage limits so as
4 to save harmless the public library districts from all
5 financial loss, damage, or harm.

6 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in buildings
7 owned by the Community Building Complex Committee of Boone
8 County, Illinois if the person or facility selling or
9 dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram shop
10 liability insurance with coverage and in amounts that the
11 Committee reasonably determines are necessary.

12 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in the building
13 located at 1200 Centerville Avenue in Belleville, Illinois and
14 occupied by either the Belleville Area Special Education
15 District or the Belleville Area Special Services Cooperative.

16 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the Louis
17 Joliet Renaissance Center, City Center Campus, located at 214
18 N. Ottawa Street, Joliet, and the Food Services/Culinary Arts
19 Department facilities, Main Campus, located at 1215 Houbolt
20 Road, Joliet, owned by or under the control of Joliet Junior
21 College, Illinois Community College District No. 525.

22 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at Triton
23 College, Illinois Community College District No. 504.

24 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the
25 College of DuPage, Illinois Community College District No. 502.

26 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold on any

1 property owned, operated, or controlled by Lewis and Clark
2 Community College, Illinois Community College District No.
3 536.

4 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the
5 building located at 446 East Hickory Avenue in Apple River,
6 Illinois, owned by the Apple River Fire Protection District,
7 and occupied by the Apple River Community Association if the
8 alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in connection with
9 organized functions approved by the Apple River Community
10 Association for which the planned attendance is 20 or more
11 persons and if the person or facility selling or dispensing the
12 alcoholic liquor has provided dram shop liability insurance in
13 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Apple River Fire
14 Protection District, the Village of Apple River, and the Apple
15 River Community Association from all financial loss, damage,
16 and harm.

17 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the Sikia
18 Restaurant, Kennedy King College Campus, located at 740 West
19 63rd Street, Chicago, and at the Food Services in the Great
20 Hall/Washburne Culinary Institute Department facility, Kennedy
21 King College Campus, located at 740 West 63rd Street, Chicago,
22 owned by or under the control of City Colleges of Chicago,
23 Illinois Community College District No. 508.
