

100TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY State of Illinois 2017 and 2018 HB3238

SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

625 ILCS 5/6-117 755 ILCS 50/5-20 from Ch. 95 1/2, par. 6-117 was 755 ILCS 50/5

Amends the Illinois Vehicle Code. Provides that the Secretary of State shall offer to each applicant for issuance or renewal of a driver's license or identification card who is 18 years of age or older the opportunity to have his or her name excluded from (rather than included in) the First Person Consent organ and tissue donor registry. Provides that if an individual does not exclude his or her name from the registry, the Secretary shall note the individual's agreement to be included in the registry. Amends the Illinois Anatomical Gift Act. Provides that a donor may make an anatomical gift by declining to deny issuance of a statement or symbol indicating that the donor has made an anatomical gift to be imprinted on the donor's driver's license or identification card. Makes conforming changes. Effective immediately.

1 AN ACT concerning transportation.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Illinois Vehicle Code is amended by changing

 Section 6-117 as follows:
- 6 (625 ILCS 5/6-117) (from Ch. 95 1/2, par. 6-117)
- 7 Sec. 6-117. Records to be kept by the Secretary of State.
- 8 (a) The Secretary of State shall file every application for
- 9 a license or permit accepted under this Chapter, and shall
- 10 maintain suitable indexes thereof. The records of the Secretary
- of State shall indicate the action taken with respect to such
- 12 applications.
- 13 (b) The Secretary of State shall maintain appropriate
- 14 records of all licenses and permits refused, cancelled,
- 15 disqualified, revoked, or suspended and of the revocation,
- 16 suspension, and disqualification of driving privileges of
- persons not licensed under this Chapter, and such records shall
- 18 note the reasons for such action.
- 19 (c) The Secretary of State shall maintain appropriate
- 20 records of convictions reported under this Chapter. Records of
- 21 conviction may be maintained in a computer processible medium.
- 22 (d) The Secretary of State may also maintain appropriate
- 23 records of any accident reports received.

- (e) The Secretary of State shall also maintain appropriate records of any disposition of supervision or records relative to a driver's referral to a driver remedial or rehabilitative program, as required by the Secretary of State or the courts. Such records shall only be available for use by the Secretary, the driver licensing administrator of any other state, law enforcement agencies, the courts, and the affected driver or, upon proper verification, such affected driver's attorney.
- (f) The Secretary of State shall also maintain or contract to maintain appropriate records of all photographs and signatures obtained in the process of issuing any driver's license, permit, or identification card. The record shall be confidential and shall not be disclosed except to those entities listed under Section 6-110.1 of this Code.
- (g) The Secretary of State may establish a First Person Consent organ and tissue donor registry in compliance with subsection (b-1) of Section 5-20 of the Illinois Anatomical Gift Act, as follows:
 - (1) The Secretary shall offer, to each applicant for issuance or renewal of a driver's license or identification card who is 18 years of age or older, the opportunity to have his or her name excluded from included in the First Person Consent organ and tissue donor registry. The Secretary must advise the applicant or licensee that he or she is under no compulsion to have his or her name included in the registry. An individual who does not exclude agrees

to having his or her name <u>from</u> included in the First Person Consent organ and tissue donor registry has given full legal consent to the donation of any of his or her organs or tissue upon his or her death. A brochure explaining this method of executing an anatomical gift must be given to each applicant for issuance or renewal of a driver's license or identification card. The brochure must advise the applicant or licensee (i) that he or she is under no compulsion to have his or her name included in this registry and (ii) that he or she may wish to consult with family, friends, or clergy before doing so.

- (2) The Secretary of State may establish additional methods by which an individual may have his or her name included in the First Person Consent organ and tissue donor registry.
- his or her name from included in the First Person Consent organ and tissue donor registry, the Secretary of State shall note the individual's that agreement to be included in the First Person consent organ and tissue donor registry. Representatives of federally designated organ procurement agencies and tissue banks and the offices of Illinois county coroners and medical examiners may inquire of the Secretary of State whether a potential organ donor's name is included in the First Person Consent organ and tissue donor registry, and the Secretary of State may

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- 1 provide that information to the representative.
- 2 (4) An individual may withdraw his or her consent to be 3 listed in the First Person Consent organ and tissue donor 4 registry maintained by the Secretary of State by notifying 5 the Secretary of State in writing, or by any other means 6 approved by the Secretary, of the individual's decision to 7 have his or her name removed from the registry.
 - (5) The Secretary of State may undertake additional efforts, including education and awareness activities, to promote organ and tissue donation.
- 11 (6) In the absence of gross negligence or willful
 12 misconduct, the Secretary of State and his or her employees
 13 are immune from any civil or criminal liability in
 14 connection with an individual's consent to be listed in the
 15 organ and tissue donor registry.

- Section 10. The Illinois Anatomical Gift Act is amended by changing Section 5-20 as follows:
- 20 (755 ILCS 50/5-20) (was 755 ILCS 50/5)
- Sec. 5-20. Manner of Executing Anatomical Gifts.
- 22 (a) A donor may make an anatomical gift:
- 23 (1) by <u>declining to deny issuance of authorizing</u> a 24 statement or symbol indicating that the donor has made an

- anatomical gift to be imprinted on the donor's driver's license or identification card;
 - (2) in a will;
 - (3) during a terminal illness or injury of the donor, by any form of communication addressed to at least 2 adults, at least one of whom is a disinterested witness; or
 - (4) as provided in subsection (b) of this Section.
 - (b) A donor or other person authorized to make an anatomical gift under subsection (a) of Section 5-5 may make a gift by a donor card or other record signed by the donor or other person making the gift or by authorizing that a statement or symbol indicating that the donor has made an anatomical gift be included on a donor registry. If the donor or other person is physically unable to sign a record, the record may be signed by another individual at the direction of the donor or other person and must:
 - (1) be witnessed by at least 2 adults, at least one of whom is a disinterested witness, who have signed at the request of the donor or the other person; and
 - (2) state that it has been signed and witnessed as provided in paragraph (1) of this subsection (b).
 - (b-1) A gift under Section 5-5 (a) may also be made by an individual <u>declining to exclude consenting to have</u> his or her name <u>from included in</u> the First Person Consent organ and tissue donor registry maintained by the Secretary of State under Section 6-117 of the Illinois Vehicle Code. An individual

- declining to exclude individual's consent to have his or her name from included in the First Person Consent organ and tissue donor registry constitutes full legal authority for the donation of any of his or her organs or tissue for purposes of transplantation, therapy, or research. Declining Consenting to be excluded from included in the First Person Consent organ and tissue donor registry is effective without regard to the presence or signature of witnesses.
- (b-5) Revocation, suspension, expiration, or cancellation of a driver's license or identification card upon which an anatomical gift is indicated does not invalidate the gift.
- 12 (b-10) An anatomical gift made by will takes effect upon 13 the donor's death whether or not the will is probated. 14 Invalidation of the will after the donor's death does not 15 invalidate the gift.
 - (c) The anatomical gift may be made to a specified donee or without specifying a donee. If the gift is made to a specified donee who is not available at the time and place of death, then if made for the purpose of transplantation, it shall be effectuated in accordance with Section 5-25.
 - (d) The donee or other person authorized to accept the gift pursuant to Section 5-12 may employ or authorize any qualified technician, surgeon, or physician to perform the recovery.
 - (e) A person authorized to make an anatomical gift under subsection (b) of Section 5-5 may make an anatomical gift by a document of gift signed by the person making the gift or by

- that person's oral communication that is electronically recorded or is contemporaneously reduced to a record and signed by the individual receiving the oral communication.
 - (e-5) An anatomical gift by a person authorized under subsection (b) of Section 5-5 may be amended or revoked orally or in a record by a member of a prior class who is reasonably available for the giving of authorization or refusal. If more than one member of the prior class is reasonably available for the giving of authorization or refusal, the gift made by a person authorized under subsection (b) of Section 5-5 may be:
 - (1) amended only if a majority of the class members reasonably available for the giving of authorization or refusal agree to the amending of the gift; or
 - (2) revoked only if a majority of the class members reasonably available for the giving of authorization or refusal agree to the revoking of the gift or if they are equally divided as to whether to revoke the gift.
 - (e-10) A revocation under subsection (e-5) is effective only if, before an incision has been made to remove a part from the donor's body or before invasive procedures have been commenced to prepare the recipient, the procurement organization, non-transplant anatomic bank, transplant hospital, or physician or technician knows of the revocation.
 - (f) When there is a suitable candidate for organ donation and a donation or consent to donate has not yet been given, procedures to preserve the decedent's body for possible organ

and tissue donation may be implemented under the authorization 1 2 of the applicable organ procurement organization, at its own 3 expense, prior to making a donation request pursuant to Section 5-25. If the organ procurement organization does not locate a 5 person authorized to consent to donation or consent to donation 6 is denied, then procedures to preserve the decedent's body 7 shall be ceased and no donation shall be made. The organ 8 procurement organization shall respect the religious tenets of 9 the decedent, if known, such as a pause after death, before 10 initiating preservation services. Nothing in this Section 11 shall be construed to authorize interference with the coroner 12 in carrying out an investigation or autopsy.
