SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/10-22.39 105 ILCS 5/34-18.7

from Ch. 122, par. 34-18.7

Amends the School Code. Requires a school board to adopt and implement a policy on how to recognize mental health issues and how to properly address them. Provides that, as part of this policy, a school board shall require in-service training of licensed school personnel and administrators to include, at least once every 2 years, training on the current best practices regarding the identification of and recommended courses of action for mental health issues. Effective July 1, 2018.

STATE MANDATES ACT MAY REQUIRE REIMBURSEMENT 1 AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- 4 Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Sections
- 5 10-22.39 and 34-18.7 as follows:
- 6 (105 ILCS 5/10-22.39)
- 7 Sec. 10-22.39. In-service training programs.
- 8 (a) To conduct in-service training programs for teachers.
- 9 (b) In addition to other topics at in-service training

programs, school guidance counselors, teachers, school social

- 11 workers, and other school personnel who work with pupils in
- grades 7 through 12 shall be trained to identify the warning
- signs of mental illness and suicidal behavior in adolescents
- 14 and teens and shall be taught appropriate intervention and
- 15 referral techniques.

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- Each school board must adopt and implement a policy on how
- to recognize mental health issues and how to properly address
- 18 them. As part of this policy, a school board shall require
- 19 in-service training of licensed school personnel and
- 20 administrators to include, at least once every 2 years,
- 21 training on the current best practices regarding the
- identification of and recommended courses of action for mental
- 23 health issues.

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- (c) School guidance counselors, nurses, teachers and other school personnel who work with pupils may be trained to have a basic knowledge of matters relating to acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS), including the nature of the disease, its causes and effects, the means of detecting it and transmission, and its the availability of appropriate sources of counseling and referral, and any other information that may be appropriate considering the age and grade level of such pupils. The School Board shall supervise such training. The State Board of Education and the Department of Public Health shall jointly develop standards for such training.
- (d) In this subsection (d):
- "Domestic violence" means abuse by a family or household
 member, as "abuse" and "family or household members" are
 defined in Section 103 of the Illinois Domestic Violence Act of
 1986.
- "Sexual violence" means sexual assault, abuse, or stalking 18 of an adult or minor child proscribed in the Criminal Code of 19 20 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012 in Sections 11-1.20, 11-1.30, 11-1.40, 11-1.50, 11-1.60, 12-7.3, 12-7.4, 12-7.5, 12-12, 21 22 12-13, 12-14, 12-14.1, 12-15, and 12-16, including sexual 23 violence committed by perpetrators who are strangers to the victim and sexual violence committed by perpetrators who are 24 25 known or related by blood or marriage to the victim.
- 26 At least once every 2 years, an in-service training program

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for school personnel who work with pupils, including, but not 1 2 limited to, school and school district administrators, teachers, school guidance counselors, school social workers, 3 school counselors, school psychologists, and school nurses, 5 must be conducted by persons with expertise in domestic and sexual violence and the needs of expectant and parenting youth 6 and shall include training concerning (i) communicating with 7 and listening to youth victims of domestic or sexual violence 8 9 and expectant and parenting youth, (ii) connecting youth victims of domestic or sexual violence and expectant and 10 parenting youth to appropriate in-school services and other 11 12 agencies, programs, and services as needed, and (iii) 13 implementing the school district's policies, procedures, and 14 with regard to such youth, including 15 confidentiality. At a minimum, school personnel must be trained 16 to understand, provide information and referrals, and address 17 issues pertaining to youth who are parents, expectant parents, or victims of domestic or sexual violence. 18

- (e) At least every 2 years, an in-service training program for school personnel who work with pupils must be conducted by persons with expertise in anaphylactic reactions and management.
- 23 (f) At least once every 2 years, a school board shall 24 conduct in-service training on educator ethics, 25 teacher-student conduct, and school employee-student conduct 26 for all personnel.

- 5 <u>(a)</u> School guidance counselors, teachers, school social
- 6 workers, and other school personnel who work with pupils in
- 7 grades 7 through 12 shall be trained to identify the warning
- 8 signs of mental illness and suicidal behavior in adolescents
- 9 and teens and shall be taught various intervention techniques.
- 10 Such training shall be provided within the framework of
- 11 existing in-service training programs offered by the Board or
- 12 as part of the professional development activities required
- under Section 21-14 of this Code.
- 14 (b) The board must adopt and implement a policy on how to
- 15 recognize mental health issues and how to properly address
- 16 them. As part of this policy, the board shall require
- 17 in-service training of licensed school personnel and
- 18 <u>administrators to include</u>, at least once every 2 years,
- 19 <u>training on the current best</u> practices regarding the
- 20 identification of and recommended courses of action for mental
- 21 health issues.
