

## 100TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY State of Illinois 2017 and 2018 SB2226

Introduced 8/17/2017, by Sen. Chris Nybo

## SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

20 ILCS 2610/40 50 ILCS 705/10.19 225 ILCS 60/65 new 410 ILCS 125/30 new

Amends the State Police Act. Provides that a physician, physician's assistant with prescriptive authority, or advanced practice registered nurse with prescriptive authority who provides a standing order or prescription for epinephrine auto-injectors in the name of the Department of State Police shall incur no civil or professional liability, except for willful and wanton conduct, as a result of any injury or death arising from the use of an epinephrine auto-injector. Amends the Illinois Police Training Act. Provides that a physician, physician's assistant with prescriptive authority, or advanced practice registered nurse with prescriptive authority who provides a standing order or prescription for epinephrine auto-injectors in the name of a local governmental agency shall incur no civil or professional liability, except for willful and wanton conduct, as a result of any injury or death arising from the use of an epinephrine auto-injector. Makes conforming changes to the Medical Practice Act of 1987 and the Public Health Standing Orders Act. Effective immediately.

1 AN ACT concerning civil law.

## Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The State Police Act is amended by changing Section 40 as follows:
- 6 (20 ILCS 2610/40)
- 7 Sec. 40. Training; administration of epinephrine.
- 8 (a) This Section, along with Section 10.19 of the Illinois
- 9 Police Training Act, may be referred to as the Annie LeGere
- 10 Law.
- 11 (b) For the purposes of this Section, "epinephrine
- 12 auto-injector" means a single-use device used for the automatic
- injection of a pre-measured dose of epinephrine into the human
- 14 body prescribed in the name of the Department.
- 15 (c) The Department may conduct or approve a training
- 16 program for State Police officers to recognize and respond to
- anaphylaxis, including, but not limited to:
- 18 (1) how to recognize symptoms of an allergic reaction;
- 19 (2) how to respond to an emergency involving an allergic reaction;
- 21 (3) how to administer an epinephrine auto-injector;
- 22 (4) how to respond to an individual with a known
- 23 allergy as well as an individual with a previously unknown

1 allergy;

- 2 (5) a test demonstrating competency of the knowledge 3 required to recognize anaphylaxis and administer an 4 epinephrine auto-injector; and
- 5 (6) other criteria as determined in rules adopted by 6 the Department.
  - (d) The Department may authorize a State Police officer who has completed the training program under subsection (c) to carry, administer, or assist with the administration of epinephrine auto-injectors whenever he or she is performing official duties.
  - (e) The Department must establish a written policy to control the acquisition, storage, transportation, administration, and disposal of epinephrine auto-injectors before it allows any State Police officer to carry and administer epinephrine auto-injectors.
  - (f) A physician, physician's assistant with prescriptive authority, or advanced practice registered nurse with prescriptive authority may provide a standing protocol or prescription for epinephrine auto-injectors in the name of the Department to be maintained for use when necessary.
  - (g) When a State Police officer administers <u>an</u> epinephrine auto-injector in good faith, the officer and the Department, and its employees and agents, <u>including a physician</u>, <u>physician's assistant with prescriptive authority</u>, or advanced practice registered nurse with prescriptive authority who

- 2 auto-injector, incur no civil or professional liability,
- 3 except for willful and wanton conduct, as a result of any
- 4 injury or death arising from the use of an epinephrine
- 5 auto-injector. A health care professional shall not be subject
- 6 to civil or professional liability for not providing an
- 7 epinephrine auto-injector standing order or prescription.

- 9 Section 10. The Illinois Police Training Act is amended by
- 10 changing Section 10.19 as follows:
- 11 (50 ILCS 705/10.19)
- 12 Sec. 10.19. Training; administration of epinephrine.
- 13 (a) This Section, along with Section 40 of the State Police
- 14 Act, may be referred to as the Annie LeGere Law.
- 15 (b) For purposes of this Section, "epinephrine
- 16 auto-injector" means a single-use device used for the automatic
- injection of a pre-measured dose of epinephrine into the human
- 18 body prescribed in the name of a local governmental agency.
- 19 (c) The Board shall conduct or approve an optional advanced
- training program for police officers to recognize and respond
- 21 to anaphylaxis, including the administration of an epinephrine
- 22 auto-injector. The training must include, but is not limited
- 23 to:
- 24 (1) how to recognize symptoms of an allergic reaction;

- 1 (2) how to respond to an emergency involving an allergic reaction;
  - (3) how to administer an epinephrine auto-injector;
  - (4) how to respond to an individual with a known allergy as well as an individual with a previously unknown allergy;
    - (5) a test demonstrating competency of the knowledge required to recognize anaphylaxis and administer an epinephrine auto-injector; and
  - (6) other criteria as determined in rules adopted by the Board.
    - (d) A local governmental agency may authorize a police officer who has completed an optional advanced training program under subsection (c) to carry, administer, or assist with the administration of epinephrine auto-injectors provided by the local governmental agency whenever he or she is performing official duties.
    - (e) A local governmental agency that authorizes its officers to carry and administer epinephrine auto-injectors under subsection (d) must establish a policy to control the acquisition, storage, transportation, administration, and disposal of epinephrine auto-injectors and to provide continued training in the administration of epinephrine auto-injectors.
- 25 (f) A physician, physician's assistant with prescriptive 26 authority, or advanced practice registered nurse with

- 1 prescriptive authority may provide a standing protocol or
- 2 prescription for epinephrine auto-injectors in the name of a
- 3 local governmental agency to be maintained for use when
- 4 necessary.
- 5 (g) When a police officer administers an epinephrine
- 6 auto-injector in good faith, the police officer and local
- 7 governmental agency, and its employees and agents, <u>including a</u>
- 8 physician, physician's assistant with prescriptive authority,
- 9 or advanced practice registered nurse with prescriptive
- 10 authority who provides a standing order or prescription for an
- 11 epinephrine auto-injector, incur no civil or professional
- 12 liability, except for willful and wanton conduct, as a result
- of any injury or death arising from the use of an epinephrine
- 14 auto-injector. A health care professional shall not be subject
- 15 to civil or professional liability for not providing an
- epinephrine auto-injector standing order or prescription.

- 19 adding Section 65 as follows:
- 20 (225 ILCS 60/65 new)
- Sec. 65. Annie LeGere Law; epinephrine auto-injector. A
- 22 licensee under this Act may not be subject to discipline for
- providing or not providing a standing order or prescription for
- an epinephrine auto-injector in accordance with Section 40 of

- 1 the State Police Act or Section 10.19 of the Illinois Police
- 2 Training Act.
- 3 Section 20. The Public Health Standing Orders Act is
- 4 amended by adding Section 30 as follows:
- 5 (410 ILCS 125/30 new)
- 6 Sec. 30. Annie LeGere Law; epinephrine auto-injector.
- 7 Health care personnel may not be subject to civil or
- 8 professional liability for providing or not providing a
- 9 standing order or prescription for an epinephrine
- 10 auto-injector in accordance with Section 40 of the State Police
- 11 Act or Section 10.19 of the Illinois Police Training Act.
- 12 Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon
- 13 becoming law.
