SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/10-17a

from Ch. 122, par. 10-17a

Amends the School Code. Provides that the State Board of Education's school report cards must include the most current data on the percentage of students who participated in job shadowing, the percentage of students who have completed an internship, and whether a school offered its students vocational training opportunities. Makes a related change for the State report card. Effective July 1, 2020.

A BILL FOR

1 AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section
10-17a as follows:

6 (105 ILCS 5/10-17a) (from Ch. 122, par. 10-17a)

8 Sec. 10-17a. State, school district, and school report 9 cards.

(1) By October 31, 2013 and October 31 of each subsequent 10 school year, the State Board of Education, through the State 11 Superintendent of Education, shall prepare a State report card, 12 school district report cards, and school report cards, and 13 14 shall by the most economic means provide to each school district in this State, including special charter districts and 15 16 districts subject to the provisions of Article 34, the report cards for the school district and each of its schools. 17

18 (2) In addition to any information required by federal law, 19 the State Superintendent shall determine the indicators and 20 presentation of the school report card, which must include, at 21 a minimum, the most current data collected and maintained by 22 the State Board of Education related to the following:

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(A) school characteristics and student demographics,

1 including average class size, average teaching experience, 2 student racial/ethnic breakdown, and the percentage of 3 students classified as low-income; the percentage of students classified as English learners; the percentage of 4 5 students who have individualized education plans or 504 6 plans that provide for special education services; the 7 number and percentage of all students who have been 8 assessed for placement in a gifted education or advanced 9 academic program and, of those students: (i) the racial and 10 ethnic breakdown, (ii) the percentage who are classified as 11 low-income, and (iii) the number and percentage of students 12 who received direct instruction from a teacher who holds a 13 gifted education endorsement and, of those students, the 14 percentage who are classified as low-income: the 15 percentage of students scoring at the "exceeds 16 expectations" level on the assessments required under 17 Section 2-3.64a-5 of this Code; the percentage of students who annually transferred in or out of the school district; 18 19 per-pupil operating expenditure of the school the 20 district; and the per-pupil State average operating expenditure for the district type (elementary, high 21 22 school, or unit);

23 curriculum information, (B) including, where 24 applicable, Advanced Placement, International 25 Baccalaureate or equivalent courses, dual enrollment 26 courses, foreign language classes, school personnel

resources (including Career Technical Education teachers), 1 2 before and after school programs, extracurricular 3 activities, subjects in which elective classes are offered, health and wellness initiatives (including the 4 average number of days of Physical Education per week per 5 6 student), approved programs of study, awards received, community partnerships, and special programs such as 7 8 programming for the gifted and talented, students with 9 disabilities, and work-study students;

10 (C) student outcomes, including, where applicable, the 11 percentage of students deemed proficient on assessments of 12 State standards, the percentage of students in the eighth 13 grade who pass Algebra, the percentage of students who 14 participated in job shadowing, the percentage of students who have completed an internship, the percentage of 15 16 students enrolled in post-secondary institutions 17 (including colleges, universities, community colleges, trade/vocational schools, and training programs leading to 18 career certification within 2 semesters of high school 19 20 graduation), the percentage of students graduating from high school who are college and career ready, and the 21 22 percentage of graduates enrolled in community colleges, 23 colleges, and universities who are in one or more courses 24 that the community college, college, or university 25 identifies as a developmental course;

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(D) student progress, including, where applicable, the

percentage of students in the ninth grade who have earned 5 credits or more without failing more than one core class, a measure of students entering kindergarten ready to learn, a measure of growth, and the percentage of students who enter high school on track for college and career readiness;

6 (E) the school environment, including, where 7 applicable, the percentage of students with less than 10 absences in a school year, the percentage of teachers with 8 9 less than 10 absences in a school year for reasons other 10 than professional development, leaves taken pursuant to 11 the federal Family Medical Leave Act of 1993, long-term 12 disability, or parental leaves, the 3-year average of the 13 percentage of teachers returning to the school from the 14 previous year, the number of different principals at the 15 school in the last 6 years, the number of teachers who hold 16 a gifted education endorsement, the process and criteria used by the district to determine whether a student is 17 18 eligible for participation in a gifted education program or 19 advanced academic program and the manner in which parents 20 and guardians are made aware of the process and criteria, 2 21 or more indicators from any school climate survey selected 22 or approved by the State and administered pursuant to 23 Section 2-3.153 of this Code, with the same or similar 24 indicators included on school report cards for all surveys 25 selected or approved by the State pursuant to Section 26 2-3.153 of this Code, and the combined percentage of

teachers rated as proficient or excellent in their most recent evaluation;

3 (F) a school district's and its individual schools'
4 balanced accountability measure, in accordance with
5 Section 2-3.25a of this Code;

6 (G) the total and per pupil normal cost amount the 7 State contributed to the Teachers' Retirement System of the 8 State of Illinois in the prior fiscal year for the school's 9 employees, which shall be reported to the State Board of 10 Education by the Teachers' Retirement System of the State 11 of Illinois;

12 (H) for a school district organized under Article 34 of 13 this Code only, State contributions to the Public School 14 Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago and State 15 contributions for health care for employees of that school 16 district;

(I) a school district's Final Percent of Adequacy, as
defined in paragraph (4) of subsection (f) of Section
18-8.15 of this Code;

(J) a school district's Local Capacity Target, as
defined in paragraph (2) of subsection (c) of Section
18-8.15 of this Code, displayed as a percentage amount;

(K) a school district's Real Receipts, as defined in
paragraph (1) of subsection (d) of Section 18-8.15 of this
Code, divided by a school district's Adequacy Target, as
defined in paragraph (1) of subsection (b) of Section

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18-8.15 of this Code, displayed as a percentage amount; and

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(L) a school district's administrative costs;-

3 (M) (L) whether or not the school has participated in 4 the Illinois Youth Survey. In this paragraph (M) (L), 5 "Illinois Youth Survey" means a self-report survey, 6 administered in school settings every 2 years, designed to 7 gather information about health and social indicators, 8 including substance abuse patterns and the attitudes of 9 students in grades 8, 10, and 12; and -

(N) whether the school offered its students vocational
 training opportunities.

12 The school report card shall also provide information that 13 allows for comparing the current outcome, progress, and 14 environment data to the State average, to the school data from 15 the past 5 years, and to the outcomes, progress, and 16 environment of similar schools based on the type of school and 17 enrollment of low-income students, special education students, and English learners. 18

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As used in this subsection (2):

20 "Administrative costs" means costs associated with 21 executive, administrative, or managerial functions within the 22 school district that involve planning, organizing, managing, 23 or directing the school district.

24 "Advanced academic program" means a course of study to 25 which students are assigned based on advanced cognitive ability 26 or advanced academic achievement compared to local age peers 1 and in which the curriculum is substantially differentiated 2 from the general curriculum to provide appropriate challenge 3 and pace.

Gifted education" means educational services, including
differentiated curricula and instructional methods, designed
to meet the needs of gifted children as defined in Article 14A
of this Code.

8 (3) At the discretion of the State Superintendent, the 9 school district report card shall include a subset of the 10 information identified in paragraphs (A) through (E) of 11 subsection (2) of this Section, as well as information relating 12 to the operating expense per pupil and other finances of the school district, and the State report card shall include a 13 14 subset of the information identified in paragraphs (A) through 15 (E) and paragraph (N) of subsection (2) of this Section.

16 (4) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this 17 Section, in consultation with key education stakeholders, the 18 State Superintendent shall at any time have the discretion to 19 amend or update any and all metrics on the school, district, or 20 State report card.

(5) Annually, no more than 30 calendar days after receipt of the school district and school report cards from the State Superintendent of Education, each school district, including special charter districts and districts subject to the provisions of Article 34, shall present such report cards at a regular school board meeting subject to applicable notice

requirements, post the report cards on the school district's 1 2 Internet web site, if the district maintains an Internet web 3 site, make the report cards available to a newspaper of general circulation serving the district, and, upon request, send the 4 5 report cards home to a parent (unless the district does not maintain an Internet web site, in which case the report card 6 7 shall be sent home to parents without request). If the district 8 posts the report card on its Internet web site, the district 9 shall send a written notice home to parents stating (i) that 10 the report card is available on the web site, (ii) the address 11 of the web site, (iii) that a printed copy of the report card 12 will be sent to parents upon request, and (iv) the telephone number that parents may call to request a printed copy of the 13 14 report card.

1 (H) for a school district organized under Article 34 of 2 this Code only, State contributions to the Public School 3 Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago and State 4 contributions for health care for employees of that school 5 district;

(I) a school district's Final Percent of Adequacy, as
defined in paragraph (4) of subsection (f) of Section
18-8.15 of this Code;

9 (J) a school district's Local Capacity Target, as 10 defined in paragraph (2) of subsection (c) of Section 11 18-8.15 of this Code, displayed as a percentage amount;

12 (K) a school district's Real Receipts, as defined in 13 paragraph (1) of subsection (d) of Section 18-8.15 of this 14 Code, divided by a school district's Adequacy Target, as 15 defined in paragraph (1) of subsection (b) of Section 16 18-8.15 of this Code, displayed as a percentage amount; and

25 (N) whether the school offered its students vocational

1 The school report card shall also provide information that 2 allows for comparing the current outcome, progress, and 3 environment data to the State average, to the school data from 4 the past 5 years, and to the outcomes, progress, and 5 environment of similar schools based on the type of school and 6 enrollment of low-income students, special education students, 7 and English learners.

8 As used in this subsection (2):

9 "Administrative costs" means costs associated with 10 executive, administrative, or managerial functions within the 11 school district that involve planning, organizing, managing, 12 or directing the school district.

13 "Advanced academic program" means a course of study to 14 which students are assigned based on advanced cognitive ability 15 or advanced academic achievement compared to local age peers 16 and in which the curriculum is substantially differentiated 17 from the general curriculum to provide appropriate challenge 18 and pace.

19 "Gifted education" means educational services, including 20 differentiated curricula and instructional methods, designed 21 to meet the needs of gifted children as defined in Article 14A 22 of this Code.

For the purposes of paragraph (A) of this subsection (2), waverage daily attendance" means the average of the actual number of attendance days during the previous school year for any enrolled student who is subject to compulsory attendance by

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Section 26-1 of this Code at each school and charter school.

(3) At the discretion of the State Superintendent, the 2 school district report card shall include a subset of the 3 information identified in paragraphs (A) through (E) 4 of 5 subsection (2) of this Section, as well as information relating to the operating expense per pupil and other finances of the 6 7 school district, and the State report card shall include a 8 subset of the information identified in paragraphs (A) through 9 (E) and paragraph (N) of subsection (2) of this Section. The 10 school district report card shall include the average daily 11 attendance, as that term is defined in subsection (2) of this 12 Section, of students who have individualized education 13 programs and students who have 504 plans that provide for 14 special education services within the school district.

15 (4) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this 16 Section, in consultation with key education stakeholders, the 17 State Superintendent shall at any time have the discretion to 18 amend or update any and all metrics on the school, district, or 19 State report card.

(5) Annually, no more than 30 calendar days after receipt of the school district and school report cards from the State Superintendent of Education, each school district, including special charter districts and districts subject to the provisions of Article 34, shall present such report cards at a regular school board meeting subject to applicable notice requirements, post the report cards on the school district's

Internet web site, if the district maintains an Internet web 1 2 site, make the report cards available to a newspaper of general 3 circulation serving the district, and, upon request, send the report cards home to a parent (unless the district does not 4 5 maintain an Internet web site, in which case the report card 6 shall be sent home to parents without request). If the district 7 posts the report card on its Internet web site, the district 8 shall send a written notice home to parents stating (i) that 9 the report card is available on the web site, (ii) the address 10 of the web site, (iii) that a printed copy of the report card 11 will be sent to parents upon request, and (iv) the telephone 12 number that parents may call to request a printed copy of the 13 report card.
