SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

725 ILCS 5/108-1

from Ch. 38, par. 108-1

Amends the Code of Criminal Procedure of 1963. Provides that a law enforcement officer may not search or inspect a motor vehicle, its contents, the driver, or a passenger solely because the driver or passenger consented to the search. Provides conditions where a law enforcement officer may carry out these inspections.

1 AN ACT concerning criminal law.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Code of Criminal Procedure of 1963 is amended by changing Section 108-1 as follows:
- 6 (725 ILCS 5/108-1) (from Ch. 38, par. 108-1)
- 7 Sec. 108-1. Search without warrant.
- 8 (1) When a lawful arrest is effected a peace officer may
 9 reasonably search the person arrested and the area within such
 10 person's immediate presence for the purpose of:
- 11 (a) protecting the officer from attack; or
- 12 (b) preventing the person from escaping; or
- 13 (c) discovering the fruits of the crime; or
- (d) discovering any instruments, articles, or things
 which may have been used in the commission of, or which may
 constitute evidence of, an offense.
- 17 (2) (Blank).
- 18 (3) A law enforcement officer may not search or inspect a 19 motor vehicle, its contents, the driver, or a passenger solely 20 because of a violation of Section 12-603.1 of the Illinois 21 Vehicle Code.
- 22 <u>(4) A law enforcement officer may not search or inspect a</u>
 23 <u>motor vehicle, its contents, the driver, or a passenger solely</u>

1	because the driver or passenger consented to the search. A law
2	enforcement officer may only search or inspect a motor
3	vehicle, its contents, the driver, or a passenger:
4	(a) under a warrant for that search issued under this
5	Article;
6	(b) under the conditions described in subsection (1)
7	of this Section; or
8	(c) if the law enforcement officer has probable cause
9	that an offense or ordinance violation has been committed
10	by the driver or passenger.
