1 AMENDMENT TO SENATE BILL 1624

2 AMENDMENT NO. _____. Amend Senate Bill 1624 by replacing
3 everything after the enacting clause with the following:

4 "Section 5. The University of Illinois Act is amended by

26 applicant's enrollment in a charter school established

5 who are admitted to the formal organized special
6 assistance programs that are tailored to the needs of such
7 students, providing that in either case, the institution
8 incorporates in the applicant's baccalaureate curriculum
9 courses or other academic activities that compensate for
10 course deficiencies; and

11 (3) except that up to 3 of the 15 units of coursework
12 required by paragraph (1) of this subsection may be
13 distributed by deducting no more than one unit each from
14 the categories of social studies, mathematics, sciences
15 and electives and completing those 3 units in any of the 5

22 (a) No new student shall be admitted to instruction in any

24 University unless such student also has satisfactorily

2 (1) at least 15 units of high school coursework from

4 (A) 4 years of English (emphasizing written and
5 oral communications and literature), of which up to 2
6 years may be collegiate level instruction;

7 (B) 3 years of social studies (emphasizing history

9 (C) 3 years of mathematics (introductory through
10 advanced algebra, geometry, trigonometry, or
11 fundamentals of computer programming);

12 (D) 3 years of science (laboratory sciences or
13 agricultural sciences); and

14 (E) 2 years of electives in foreign language
15 (which may be deemed to include American Sign
16 Language), music, career and technical education
17 ~~vocational education~~, agricultural education, or art;

18 (2) except that Western Illinois University may admit
19 individual applicants if it determines through assessment
20 or through evaluation based on learning outcomes of the
21 coursework taken, including career and technical education
22 ~~vocational education~~ courses and courses taken in a
23 charter school established under Article 27A of the School
24 Code, that the applicant demonstrates knowledge and skills
25 substantially equivalent to the knowledge and skills

1 required for admission. The Board of Trustees of Western
2 Illinois University shall not discriminate in the

4 admission because of the applicant's enrollment in a

7 applicants who did not have an opportunity to complete the
8 minimum college preparatory curriculum in high school, and
9 (ii) educationally disadvantaged applicants who are
10 admitted to the formal organized special assistance
11 programs that are tailored to the needs of such students,
12 providing that in either case, the institution
13 incorporates in the applicant's baccalaureate curriculum
14 courses or other academic activities that compensate for
15 course deficiencies; and

16 (3) except that up to 3 of 15 units of coursework

19 the categories of social studies, mathematics, sciences

22 (b) When allocating funds, local boards of education shall

25 (c) A student who has graduated from high school and has
26 scored within the University's accepted range on the ACT or

2 test as a prerequisite to admission.

3 (d) The Board shall establish an admissions process in
4 which honorably discharged veterans are permitted to submit an
5 application for admission to the University as a freshman
6 student enrolling in the spring semester if the veteran was on
7 active duty during the fall semester. The University may
8 request that the Department of Veterans' Affairs confirm the
9 status of an applicant as an honorably discharged veteran who
10 was on active duty during the fall semester.
