#### HB2528

#### SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

30 ILCS 105/5.990 new 110 ILCS 205/9.43 new

Amends the Board of Higher Education Act. Requires the Board of Higher Education to establish a hunger-free campus grant program. Provides that the hunger-free campus grant program shall provide grants to public institutions of higher education that have one or more campuses designated by the Board as hunger-free campuses. Provides for requirements for being designated a hunger-free campus. Provides that the Board shall determine the amount of each grant that shall be used by the public institution of higher education to further address food insecurity among students enrolled in the public institution of higher education. Provides that the Board shall prioritize grants to public institutions of higher education with campuses that serve primarily minority and low-income students and have a high percentage of Pell Grant recipients. Provides that the Board shall submit a report to the Governor and the General Assembly no later than 2 years after the establishment of the grant program. Provides for rulemaking. Amends the State Finance Act to create the Hunger-Free Campus Grant Fund as a special fund in the State treasury. Effective immediately.

# Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- 4 Section 5. The State Finance Act is amended by adding 5 Section 5.990 as follows:

- 12 (a) The Board shall establish a hunger-free campus grant
   13 program for the purposes set forth under subsection (b).
- 14 <u>(b) The purpose of the hunger-free campus grant program</u> 15 <u>shall be to provide grants to public institutions of higher</u> 16 <u>education that have one or more campuses designated by the</u> 17 <u>Board as hunger-free campuses under subsection (c). The</u> 18 <u>purpose of the grant funding shall be to:</u>
- 19 <u>(1) address student hunger;</u>
- 20(2) leverage more sustainable solutions to address21basic food needs on campus;

3	(4) continue to build strategic partnerships at the

## designate a certain amount of money for free meal vouchers for students; and

3 (7) annually conduct a student survey on hunger, developed by the Board, and submit the results of the 4 5 survey to the Board at a time prescribed by the Board for inclusion in a comparative profile of each campus 6 7 designated as a hunger-free campus. Survey data on student 8 hunger shall be disaggregated by race, gender identity, 9 sexual orientation, parenting status, and financial aid 10 status of students. In the development of the survey, the 11 Board may utilize any existing surveys designed to collect 12 information on food insecurity among students enrolled in 13 public institutions of higher education.

14 (d) The Board shall allocate grant funding to each public institution of higher education that has one or more campuses 15 16 designated by the Board as a hunger-free campus under 17 subsection (c). The Board shall determine the amount of each grant that shall be used by the public institution of higher 18 19 education to further address food insecurity among students 20 enrolled in the public institution of higher education. The 21 Board shall prioritize grants to public institutions of higher 22 education with campuses that serve primarily minority and 23 low-income students and have a high percentage of Pell Grant 24 recipients.

## 25 <u>(e) The Board shall submit a report to the Governor and to</u> 26 <u>the General Assembly no later than 2 years after the</u>

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1 establishment of the hunger-free campus grant program. The 2 report shall include, but not be limited to, the number and amount of the grant awards, the impact the hunger-free campus 3 4 grant program has on establishing additional hunger-free campuses at public institutions of higher education and 5 6 reducing the number of students experiencing food insecurity, 7 disaggregated data on those students served reflecting the students' race, gender identity, sexual orientation, parenting 8 9 status, and financial aid status, and recommendations on the 10 expansion of the hunger-free campus grant program.

11 (f) The Hunger-Free Campus Grant Fund is created as a 12 special fund in the State treasury. All money in the Fund shall 13 be used, subject to appropriation, by the Board for the 14 hunger-free campus grant program.

15 (g) The Board may adopt any rules necessary to implement 16 <u>this Section.</u>

Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect uponbecoming law.
