Amends the Higher Education Student Assistance Act. Provides that, notwithstanding any other law of this State to the contrary, effective on January 1, 2025, or as soon thereafter as is feasible, the Illinois Student Assistance Commission shall release from remaining repayment obligations any recipient of a scholarship, grant, or waiver that has been or may be converted to a student loan under a State program for which the Commission is responsible for collections. In provisions concerning the Minority Teachers of Illinois scholarship program, the Golden Apple Scholars of Illinois Program, special education teacher scholarships, the Optometric Education Scholarship Program, Post-Master of Social Work School Social Work Professional Educator License scholarships, and the iGROW Tech Scholarship Program, removes provisions concerning repaying funds received due to the specified failure of the recipient to fulfill scholarship, grant, or waiver obligations. In provisions concerning special education teacher scholarships and Post-Master of Social Work School Social Work Professional Educator License scholarships, provides that a recipient shall sign an agreement that the recipient will meet specified qualifications and provide evidence to the Commission that the recipient is fulfilling or fulfilled the terms of the agreement (instead of specifying that an applicant shall meet the specified qualifications) Amends the Nursing Education Scholarship Law to make similar changes.

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## A BILL FOR

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AN ACT concerning education.

# Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Higher Education Student Assistance Act is
amended by changing Sections 20, 50, 52, 65.15, 65.70, 65.110,
and 65.120 as follows:

7 (110 ILCS 947/20)

8 Sec. 20. Functions of Commission.

9 (a) The Commission, in accordance with this Act, shall prepare and supervise the issuance of public information 10 concerning its provisions; prescribe the form and regulate the 11 submission of applications for assistance; provide for and 12 13 conduct, or cause to be conducted, all eligibility 14 determinations of applicants; award the appropriate financial assistance; and, upon request by a member of the General 15 16 Assembly, nominate or evaluate and recommend for nomination applicants for General Assembly scholarships in accordance 17 with criteria specified by the member under Section 30-9 of 18 19 the School Code.

20 (b) The Commission is authorized to participate in any 21 programs for monetary assistance to students and to receive, 22 hold, and disburse all such funds made available by any agency 23 or organization for the purpose or purposes for which they are - 2 - LRB103 38559 RJT 68695 b

made available. The Commission is authorized to administer a 1 2 program of grant assistance as authorized by the Baccalaureate Savings Act. The Commission is authorized to participate in 3 any programs established to improve student financial aid 4 5 services or the proficiency of persons engaged in student financial aid services and to receive, hold, and disburse all 6 7 funds made available by any agency or organization for the 8 purpose or purposes for which they are made available subject 9 to the appropriations of the General Assembly.

10 (c) The Commission is authorized to deny a scholarship or 11 a grant to any person who has defaulted on a guaranteed student 12 loan and who is not maintaining a satisfactory repayment record. If a person has a defaulted guaranteed student loan 13 14 but is otherwise eligible for assistance pursuant to Section 15 40, the Commission shall award one term of assistance during 16 which a satisfactory repayment record must be established. If 17 such a repayment record is not established, additional assistance shall be denied until a satisfactory repayment 18 record is established. 19

(d) The Commission is authorized to participate with federal, state, county, local, and university law enforcement agencies in cooperative efforts to detect and prosecute incidents of fraud in student assistance programs.

(e) The Administrative Review Law shall apply to and
 govern all proceedings for the judicial review of final
 administrative decisions of the Commission.

1 (f) The Commission is authorized to make all necessary and 2 proper rules, not inconsistent with this Act, for the 3 efficient exercise of the foregoing functions.

4 (g) Unless otherwise provided by statute, the functions of 5 the Commission shall be exercised without regard to any 6 applicant's race, creed, sex, color, national origin, or 7 ancestry.

(h) The Commission is authorized to establish systems and 8 9 encourage employers programs to to match employee 10 contributions to prepaid programs of college savings by making 11 donations to the Commission for prepaid programs of college 12 savings to make higher education affordable for all residents 13 of the State and to receive, hold, and disburse all such funds 14 made available through those programs for the purposes for 15 which they are authorized by rule or by law.

16 (i) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the 17 contrary, effective on January 1, 2025, or as soon thereafter as is feasible, the Commission shall release from remaining 18 19 repayment obligations any recipient of a scholarship, grant, 20 or waiver that has been or may be converted to a student loan under a State program for which the Commission is responsible 21 22 for collections, including, but not limited to, any such repayment obligation pursuant to Sections 50, 52, 65.15, 23 24 65.70, 65.110, or 65.120, to the Nursing Education Scholarship 25 Law, or to any other similarly structured state scholarship, grant, or waiver program that the Commission is responsible 26

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1 for collections.

2	The release from repayment obligations under this
3	subsection (i) applies only to repayment obligations resulting
4	from a recipient's failure to complete any required employment
5	obligation under the terms of the scholarship, grant, or
6	waiver. The release does not apply to amounts owed to the
7	Commission for other reasons, including, but not limited to,
8	error, fraud, rescission of funds, or because a recipient
9	ceased to be eligible for the amount initially awarded.

Sec. 50. Minority Teachers of Illinois scholarshipprogram.

14 (a) As used in this Section:

"Eligible applicant" means a minority student who has graduated from high school or has received a State of Illinois High School Diploma and has maintained a cumulative grade point average of no less than 2.5 on a 4.0 scale, and who by reason thereof is entitled to apply for scholarships to be awarded under this Section.

21 "Minority student" means a student who is any of the 22 following:

(1) American Indian or Alaska Native (a person
having origins in any of the original peoples of North
and South America, including Central America, and who

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maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment).

2 (2) Asian (a person having origins in any of the 3 original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or 4 the Indian subcontinent, including, but not limited 5 to, Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, 6 Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and 7 Vietnam).

8 (3) Black or African American (a person having
9 origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa).

(4) Hispanic or Latino (a person of Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race).

13 (5) Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander (a
14 person having origins in any of the original peoples
15 of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands).

16 "Qualified bilingual minority applicant" means a 17 qualified student who demonstrates proficiency in a 18 language other than English by (i) receiving a State Seal 19 of Biliteracy from the State Board of Education or (ii) 20 receiving a passing score on an educator licensure target 21 language proficiency test.

"Qualified student" means a person (i) who is a resident of this State and a citizen or permanent resident of the United States; (ii) who is a minority student, as defined in this Section; (iii) who, as an eligible applicant, has made a timely application for a minority

teaching scholarship under this Section; (iv) who is 1 2 enrolled on at least a half-time basis at a qualified 3 Illinois institution of higher learning; (v) who is enrolled in a course of study leading to teacher 4 5 licensure, including alternative teacher licensure, or, if the student is already licensed to teach, in a course of 6 7 study leading to an additional teaching endorsement or a 8 master's degree in an academic field in which he or she is 9 teaching or plans to teach or who has received one or more College and Career Pathway Endorsements pursuant to 10 11 Section 80 of the Postsecondary and Workforce Readiness 12 Act and commits to enrolling in a course of study leading 13 teacher licensure, including alternative teacher to 14 licensure; (vi) who maintains a grade point average of no 15 less than 2.5 on a 4.0 scale; and (vii) who continues to 16 advance satisfactorily toward the attainment of a degree.

17 (b) In order to encourage academically talented Illinois minority students to pursue teaching careers at the preschool 18 or elementary or secondary school level and to address and 19 20 alleviate the teacher shortage crisis in this State described under the provisions of the Transitions in Education Act, each 21 22 qualified student shall be awarded a minority teacher 23 scholarship to any qualified Illinois institution of higher learning. However, preference may be given to qualified 24 25 applicants enrolled at or above the junior level.

26 (c) Each minority teacher scholarship awarded under this

Section shall be in an amount sufficient to pay the tuition and 1 2 fees and room and board costs of the qualified Illinois 3 institution of higher learning at which the recipient is enrolled, up to an annual maximum of \$5,000; except that in the 4 5 case of a recipient who does not reside on-campus at the institution at which he or she is enrolled, the amount of the 6 scholarship shall be sufficient to pay tuition and fee 7 8 expenses and a commuter allowance, up to an annual maximum of 9 \$5,000. However, if at least \$2,850,000 is appropriated in a 10 given fiscal year for the Minority Teachers of Illinois 11 scholarship program, then, in each fiscal year thereafter, 12 each scholarship awarded under this Section shall be in an amount sufficient to pay the tuition and fees and room and 13 14 board costs of the qualified Illinois institution of higher 15 learning at which the recipient is enrolled, up to an annual 16 maximum of \$7,500; except that in the case of a recipient who 17 does not reside on-campus at the institution at which he or she is enrolled, the amount of the scholarship shall be sufficient 18 19 to pay tuition and fee expenses and a commuter allowance, up to 20 an annual maximum of \$7,500.

(d) The total amount of minority teacher scholarship assistance awarded by the Commission under this Section to an individual in any given fiscal year, when added to other financial assistance awarded to that individual for that year, shall not exceed the cost of attendance at the institution at which the student is enrolled. If the amount of minority

teacher scholarship to be awarded to a qualified student as provided in subsection (c) of this Section exceeds the cost of attendance at the institution at which the student is enrolled, the minority teacher scholarship shall be reduced by an amount equal to the amount by which the combined financial assistance available to the student exceeds the cost of attendance.

8 (e) The maximum number of academic terms for which a 9 qualified student can receive minority teacher scholarship 10 assistance shall be 8 semesters or 12 quarters.

(f) In any academic year for which an eligible applicant under this Section accepts financial assistance through the Paul Douglas Teacher Scholarship Program, as authorized by Section 551 et seq. of the Higher Education Act of 1965, the applicant shall not be eligible for scholarship assistance awarded under this Section.

17 (g) All applications for minority teacher scholarships to be awarded under this Section shall be made to the Commission 18 on forms which the Commission shall provide for eligible 19 20 applicants. The form of applications and the information required to be set forth therein shall be determined by the 21 22 Commission, and the Commission shall require eligible 23 applicants to submit with their applications such supporting the Commission 24 documents or recommendations as deems 25 necessary.

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(h) Subject to a separate appropriation for such purposes,

payment of any minority teacher scholarship awarded under this 1 2 Section shall be determined by the Commission. All scholarship funds distributed in accordance with this subsection shall be 3 paid to the institution and used only for payment of the 4 5 tuition and fee and room and board expenses incurred by the student in connection with his or her attendance at a 6 7 qualified Illinois institution of higher learning. Any 8 minority teacher scholarship awarded under this Section shall 9 be applicable to 2 semesters or 3 quarters of enrollment. If a 10 qualified student withdraws from enrollment prior to 11 completion of the first semester or quarter for which the 12 minority teacher scholarship is applicable, the school shall 13 refund to the Commission the full amount of the minority 14 teacher scholarship.

(i) The Commission shall administer the minority teacher
scholarship aid program established by this Section and shall
make all necessary and proper rules not inconsistent with this
Section for its effective implementation.

19 (j) When an appropriation to the Commission for a given 20 fiscal year is insufficient to provide scholarships to all 21 qualified students, the Commission shall allocate the 22 appropriation in accordance with this subsection. If funds are 23 insufficient to provide all qualified students with а scholarship as authorized by this Section, the Commission 24 25 shall allocate the available scholarship funds for that fiscal 26 year to qualified students who submit a complete application

- 1 form on or before a date specified by the Commission based on 2 the following order of priority:
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Section in the prior academic year and who remain eligible for a minority teacher scholarship under this Section.

(1) To students who received a scholarship under this

6 (2) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (k), to 7 students who demonstrate financial need, as determined by 8 the Commission.

9 (k) Notwithstanding paragraph (2) of subsection (j), at 10 least 35% of the funds appropriated for scholarships awarded 11 under this Section in each fiscal year shall be reserved for 12 qualified male minority applicants, with priority being given to qualified Black male applicants beginning with fiscal year 13 2023. If the Commission does not receive enough applications 14 15 from qualified male minorities on or before January 1 of each 16 fiscal year to award 35% of the funds appropriated for these 17 scholarships to qualified male minority applicants, then the Commission may award a portion of the reserved funds to 18 qualified female minority applicants in accordance with 19 20 subsection (j).

Beginning with fiscal year 2023, if at least \$2,850,000 but less than \$4,200,000 is appropriated in a given fiscal year for scholarships awarded under this Section, then at least 10% of the funds appropriated shall be reserved for qualified bilingual minority applicants, with priority being given to qualified bilingual minority applicants who are

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1 enrolled in educator preparation program an with 2 concentration in bilingual, bicultural education. Beginning with fiscal year 2023, if at least \$4,200,000 is appropriated 3 in a given fiscal year for the Minority Teachers of Illinois 4 5 scholarship program, then at least 30% of the funds appropriated shall be reserved for qualified 6 bilingual 7 minority applicants, with priority being given to qualified 8 bilingual minority applicants who are enrolled in an educator 9 preparation program with a concentration in bilingual, bicultural education. Beginning with fiscal year 2023, if at 10 11 least \$2,850,000 is appropriated in a given fiscal year for 12 scholarships awarded under this Section but the Commission 13 does not receive enough applications from qualified bilingual minority applicants on or before January 1 of that fiscal year 14 15 to award at least 10% of the funds appropriated to qualified 16 bilingual minority applicants, then the Commission may, in its 17 discretion, award a portion of the reserved funds to other qualified students in accordance with subsection (j).

(1) Prior to receiving scholarship assistance for any 19 20 year, each recipient of a minority academic teacher scholarship awarded under this Section shall be required by 21 22 the Commission to sign an agreement under which the recipient 23 pledges that, within the one-year period following the termination of the program for which the recipient was awarded 24 a minority teacher scholarship, the recipient (i) shall begin 25 26 teaching for a period of not less than one year for each year

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of scholarship assistance he or she was awarded under this 1 2 Section; (ii) shall fulfill this teaching obligation at a nonprofit Illinois public, private, or parochial preschool, 3 4 elementary school, or secondary school at which no less than 5 30% of the enrolled students are minority students in the year 6 during which the recipient begins teaching at the school or 7 may instead, if the recipient received a scholarship as a qualified bilingual minority applicant, fulfill this teaching 8 9 obligation in a program in transitional bilingual education pursuant to Article 14C of the School Code or in a school in 10 11 which 20 or more English learner students in the same language 12 classification are enrolled; and (iii) shall, upon request by 13 the Commission, provide the Commission with evidence that he or she is fulfilling or has fulfilled the terms of the teaching 14 15 agreement provided for in this subsection.

16 (m) (Blank). If a recipient of a minority teacher 17 scholarship awarded under this Section fails to fulfill the teaching obligation set forth in subsection (1) of this 18 19 Section, the Commission shall require the recipient to repay 20 the amount of the scholarships received, prorated according to the fraction of the teaching obligation not completed, at a 21 22 rate of interest equal to 5%, and, if applicable, reasonable 23 collection fees. If a recipient who enters into repayment under this subsection (m) subsequently, within 5 years of 24 25 entering repayment, begins to teach at a school meeting the 26 description under subsection (1) of this Section, <del>the</del>

1 Commission may reduce the amount owed by the recipient in 2 proportion to the amount of the teaching obligation completed. 3 The Commission is authorized to establish rules relating to 4 its collection activities for repayment of scholarships under 5 this Section. All repayments collected under this Section 6 shall be forwarded to the State Comptroller for deposit into 7 the State's General Revenue Fund.

(n) (Blank). A recipient of minority teacher scholarship 8 9 shall not be considered in violation of the agreement entered 10 into pursuant to subsection (1) if the recipient (i) enrolls 11 on a full time basis as a graduate student in a course of study 12 related to the field of teaching at a qualified Illinois institution of higher learning; (ii) is serving, not in excess 13 of 3 years, as a member of the armed services of the United 14 15 States; (iii) is a person with a temporary total disability for a period of time not to exceed 3 years as established by 16 17 sworn affidavit of a qualified physician; (iv) is seeking and unable to find full time employment as a teacher at an Illinois 18 public, private, or parochial preschool or elementary or 19 20 secondary school that satisfies the criteria set forth in subsection (1) of this Section and is able to provide evidence 21 22 of that fact; (v) becomes a person with a permanent total disability as established by sworn affidavit of a qualified 23 physician; (vi) is taking additional courses, on at least a 24 25 half-time basis, needed to obtain licensure as a teacher in Illinois; or (vii) is fulfilling teaching requirements 26

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associated with other programs administered by the Commission and cannot concurrently fulfill them under this Section in a period of time equal to the length of the teaching obligation.

(o) (Blank). Scholarship recipients under this Section who 4 withdraw from a program of teacher education but remain 5 6 enrolled in school to continue their postsecondary studies in 7 another academic discipline shall not be required to commence repayment of their Minority Teachers of Illinois scholarship 8 9 so long as they remain enrolled in school on a full time basis 10 or if they can document for the Commission special 11 circumstances that warrant extension of repayment.

12 If the Minority Teachers of Illinois scholarship (p) 13 program does not expend at least 90% of the amount appropriated for the program in a given fiscal year for 3 14 15 consecutive fiscal years and the Commission does not receive 16 enough applications from the groups identified in subsection 17 (k) on or before January 1 in each of those fiscal years to meet the percentage reserved for those groups under subsection 18 (k), then up to 3% of amount appropriated for the program for 19 20 each of next 3 fiscal years shall be allocated to increasing awareness of the program and for the recruitment of Black male 21 22 applicants. The Commission shall make a recommendation to the 23 General Assembly by January 1 of the year immediately following the end of that third fiscal year regarding whether 24 25 the amount allocated to increasing awareness and recruitment should continue. 26

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(q) Each qualified Illinois institution of higher learning 1 2 that receives funds from the Minority Teachers of Illinois scholarship program shall host an annual information session 3 at the institution about the program for teacher candidates of 4 5 color in accordance with rules adopted by the Commission. institution shall 6 Additionally, the ensure that each scholarship recipient enrolled at the institution meets with 7 8 an academic advisor at least once per academic year to 9 facilitate on-time completion of the recipient's educator 10 preparation program.

(r) The changes made to this Section by Public Act 101-654 will first take effect with awards made for the 2022-2023 academic year.

Sec. 52. Golden Apple Scholars of Illinois Program; GoldenApple Foundation for Excellence in Teaching.

(a) In this Section, "Foundation" means the Golden Apple
 Foundation for Excellence in Teaching, a registered 501(c)(3)
 not-for-profit corporation.

(a-2) In order to encourage academically talented Illinois students, especially minority students, to pursue teaching careers, especially in teacher shortage disciplines (which shall be defined to include early childhood education) or at

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hard-to-staff schools (as defined by the Commission in 1 2 consultation with the State Board of Education), to provide 3 those students with the crucial mentoring, guidance, and in-service support that will significantly increase 4 the 5 likelihood that they will complete their full teaching commitments and elect to continue teaching 6 in targeted 7 disciplines and hard-to-staff schools, and to ensure that 8 students in this State will continue to have access to a pool 9 of highly-qualified teachers, each qualified student shall be 10 awarded a Golden Apple Scholars of Illinois Program 11 scholarship to any Illinois institution of higher learning. 12 The Commission shall administer the Golden Apple Scholars of 13 Illinois Program, which shall be managed by the Foundation 14 pursuant to the terms of a grant agreement meeting the 15 requirements of Section 4 of the Illinois Grant Funds Recovery 16 Act.

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17 (a-3) For purposes of this Section, a qualified student18 shall be a student who meets the following qualifications:

19 (1) is a resident of this State and a citizen or
20 eligible noncitizen of the United States;

(2) is a high school graduate or a person who has
 received a State of Illinois High School Diploma;

23 (3) is enrolled or accepted, on at least a half-time
24 basis, at an institution of higher learning;

(4) is pursuing a postsecondary course of study
 leading to initial certification or pursuing additional

1 course work needed to gain State Board of Education 2 approval to teach, including alternative teacher 3 licensure; and

4 (5) is a participant in programs managed by and is 5 approved to receive a scholarship from the Foundation.

6 (a-5) (Blank).

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(b) (Blank).

(b-5) Funds designated for the Golden Apple Scholars of 8 9 Illinois Program shall be used by the Commission for the 10 payment of scholarship assistance under this Section or for 11 the award of grant funds, subject to the Illinois Grant Funds 12 Recovery Act, to the Foundation. Subject to appropriation, 13 awards of grant funds to the Foundation shall be made on an annual basis and following an application for grant funds by 14 15 the Foundation.

16 (b-10) Each year, the Foundation shall include in its 17 application to the Commission for grant funds an estimate of the amount of scholarship assistance to be provided to 18 19 qualified students during the grant period. Any amount of 20 appropriated funds exceeding the estimated amount of scholarship assistance may be awarded by the Commission to the 21 22 Foundation for management expenses expected to be incurred by 23 the Foundation in providing the mentoring, guidance, and in-service supports that will increase the likelihood that 24 25 qualified students will complete their teaching commitments 26 and elect to continue teaching in hard-to-staff schools. If

the estimate of the amount of scholarship assistance described in the Foundation's application is less than the actual amount required for the award of scholarship assistance to qualified students, the Foundation shall be responsible for using awarded grant funds to ensure all qualified students receive scholarship assistance under this Section.

7 (b-15) All grant funds not expended or legally obligated 8 within the time specified in a grant agreement between the 9 Foundation and the Commission shall be returned to the 10 Commission within 45 days. Any funds legally obligated by the 11 end of a grant agreement shall be liquidated within 45 days or 12 otherwise returned to the Commission within 90 days after the end of the grant agreement that resulted in the award of grant 13 14 funds.

15 (c) Each scholarship awarded under this Section shall be 16 in an amount sufficient to pay the tuition and fees and room 17 and board costs of the Illinois institution of higher learning at which the recipient is enrolled, up to an annual maximum of 18 \$5,000; except that, in the case of a recipient who does not 19 reside on campus at the institution of higher learning at 20 which he or she is enrolled, the amount of the scholarship 21 22 shall be sufficient to pay tuition and fee expenses and a 23 commuter allowance, up to an annual maximum of \$5,000. All 24 scholarship funds distributed in accordance with this Section 25 shall be paid to the institution on behalf of recipients.

(d) The total amount of scholarship assistance awarded by

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the Commission under this Section to an individual in any 1 2 given fiscal year, when added to other financial assistance 3 awarded to that individual for that year, shall not exceed the cost of attendance at the institution of higher learning at 4 5 which the student is enrolled. In any academic year for which a 6 qualified student under this Section accepts financial 7 assistance through any other teacher scholarship program 8 administered by the Commission, a qualified student shall not 9 be eligible for scholarship assistance awarded under this 10 Section.

(e) A recipient may receive up to 8 semesters or 12
quarters of scholarship assistance under this Section.
Scholarship funds are applicable toward 2 semesters or 3
quarters of enrollment each academic year.

15 (f) All applications for scholarship assistance to be 16 awarded under this Section shall be made to the Foundation in a 17 form determined by the Foundation. Each year, the Foundation shall notify the Commission of the individuals awarded 18 19 scholarship assistance under this Section. Each year, at least 20 Apple Scholars of 30% of the Golden Illinois Program scholarships shall be awarded to students residing in counties 21 22 having a population of less than 500,000.

23 (g) (Blank).

(h) The Commission shall administer the payment of
 scholarship assistance provided through the Golden Apple
 Scholars of Illinois Program and shall make all necessary and

1 proper rules not inconsistent with this Section for the 2 effective implementation of this Section.

(i) Prior to receiving scholarship assistance for any 3 academic year, each recipient of a scholarship awarded under 4 5 this Section shall be required by the Foundation to sign an agreement under which the recipient pledges that, within the 6 7 2-year period following the termination of the academic 8 program for which the recipient was awarded a scholarship, the 9 recipient: (i) shall begin teaching for a period of not less 10 than 5 years, (ii) shall fulfill this teaching obligation at a 11 nonprofit Illinois public, private, or parochial preschool or 12 Illinois public elementary or secondary school that an 13 qualifies for teacher loan cancellation under Section 465(a)(2)(A) of the federal Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 14 U.S.C. 1087ee(a)(2)(A)) or other Illinois schools deemed 15 16 eligible for fulfilling the teaching commitment as designated 17 by the Foundation, and (iii) shall, upon request of the Foundation, provide the Foundation with evidence that he or 18 she is fulfilling or has fulfilled the terms of the teaching 19 agreement provided for in this subsection. Upon request, the 20 Foundation shall provide evidence of teacher fulfillment to 21 22 the Commission.

(j) <u>(Blank).</u> If a recipient of a scholarship awarded under this Section fails to fulfill the teaching obligation set forth in subsection (i) of this Section, the Commission shall require the recipient to repay the amount of the scholarships

received, prorated according to the fraction of the teaching 1 2 obligation not completed, plus interest at a rate of 5% and, if applicable, reasonable collection fees. If a recipient who 3 enters into repayment under this subsection (j) subsequently, 4 within 5 years of entering repayment, begins to teach at a 5 school meeting the description under subsection (i) of this 6 7 Section, the Commission may reduce the amount owed by the recipient in proportion to the amount of the teaching 8 obligation completed. Reduction of the amount owed shall not 9 10 be construed as reinstatement in the Golden Apple Scholars 11 program. Reinstatement in the program shall be solely at the 12 discretion of the Colden Apple Foundation on terms determined by the Foundation. Payments received by the Commission under 13 this subsection () shall be remitted to the State Comptroller 14 for deposit into the General Revenue Fund, except that that 15 16 portion of a recipient's repayment that equals the amount in 17 expenses that the Commission has reasonably incurred in attempting collection from that recipient shall be remitted to 18 the State Comptroller for deposit into the ISAC Accounts 19 20 Receivable Fund, a special fund in the State treasury.

(k) <u>(Blank)</u>. A recipient of a scholarship awarded by the Foundation under this Section shall not be considered to have failed to fulfill the teaching obligations of the agreement entered into pursuant to subsection (i) if the recipient (i) enrolls on a full-time basis as a graduate student in a course of study related to the field of teaching at an institution of

higher learning; (ii) is serving as a member of the armed 1 services of the United States; (iii) is a person with a 2 temporary total disability, as established by sworn affidavit 3 of a qualified physician; (iv) is seeking and unable to find 4 5 full time employment as a teacher at a school that satisfies the criteria set forth in subsection (i) and is able to provide 6 7 evidence of that fact; (v) is taking additional courses, on at least a half time basis, needed to obtain certification as a 8 teacher in Illinois; (vi) is fulfilling teaching requirements 9 10 associated with other programs administered by the Commission 11 and cannot concurrently fulfill them under this Section in a 12 period of time equal to the length of the teaching obligation; or (vii) is participating in a program established under 13 Executive Order 10924 of the President of the United States or 14 the federal National Community Service Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 15 16 12501 et seq.). Any such extension of the period during which the teaching requirement must be fulfilled shall be subject to 17 limitations of duration as established by the Commission. 18

(1) (Blank). A recipient who fails to fulfill the teaching
obligations of the agreement entered into pursuant to
subsection (i) of this Section shall repay the amount of
scholarship assistance awarded to them under this Section
within 10 years.

(m) Annually, at a time determined by the Commission in
 consultation with the Foundation, the Foundation shall submit

(9) (blank); the number of scholarship recipients who 1 2 successfully repaid scholarship assistance in full during 3 the previous fiscal year; (10) (blank); the number of scholarship recipients who 4 defaulted on their obligation to repay scholarship 5 6 assistance during the previous fiscal year; 7 (11) (blank); the amount of scholarship assistance 8 subject to collection in accordance with subsection (j) <del>of</del> 9 this Section at the end of the previous fiscal year; (12) (blank); and the amount of collected funds to be 10 11 remitted to the Comptroller in accordance with subsection 12 (j) of this Section at the end of the previous fiscal year;

13 and

14 (13) other information that the Commission may 15 reasonably request.

(n) Nothing in this Section shall affect the rights of the
 Commission to collect <u>information on the completion of</u>
 <u>teaching obligations</u> moneys owed to it by recipients of
 scholarship assistance through the Illinois Future Teacher
 Corps Program, repealed by Public Act 98-533.

(o) The Auditor General shall prepare an annual audit of
the operations and finances of the Golden Apple Scholars of
Illinois Program. This audit shall be provided to the
Governor, General Assembly, and the Commission.

Special education teacher scholarships. 6 (a) There shall be awarded annually 250 scholarships to 7 persons qualifying as members of any of the following groups: (1) Students who are otherwise qualified to receive a 8 9 scholarship as provided in subsections (b) and (c) of this 10 Section and who make application to the Commission for 11 such scholarship and agree to take courses that will 12 prepare the student for the teaching of children described in Section 14-1 of the School Code. 13 14 (2) Persons holding a valid certificate issued under the laws relating to the certification of teachers and who 15 16 make application to the Commission for such scholarship and agree to take courses that will prepare them for the 17 18 teaching of children described in Section 14-1 of the School Code. 19 (3) Persons who (A) have graduated high school; (B) 20 21 have not been certified as a teacher; and (C) make 22 application to the Commission for such scholarship and 23 agree to take courses that will prepare them for the 24 teaching of children described in Section 14-1 of the 25 School Code.

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Scholarships awarded under this Section shall be issued 1 2 pursuant to regulations promulgated by the Commission; 3 provided that no rule or regulation promulgated by the State Board of Education prior to the effective date of this 4 5 amendatory Act of 1993 pursuant to the exercise of any right, power, duty, responsibility or matter of pending business 6 7 transferred from the State Board of Education to the Commission under this Section shall be affected thereby, and 8 9 all such rules and regulations shall become the rules and 10 regulations of the Commission until modified or changed by the 11 Commission in accordance with law.

12 For the purposes of this Section scholarships awarded each 13 school year shall be deemed to be issued on July 1 of the year 14 prior to the start of the postsecondary school term and all 15 calculations for use of the scholarship shall be based on such 16 date. Any holder of a scholarship who fails to register in a special education program of teacher education at the 13 14 university within 10 days after the commencement of the term, 15 quarter or semester immediately following the receipt of the 16 scholarship or who, having registered, withdraws from the 17 university or transfers out of teacher education, shall thereupon forfeit the right to use it and it may be granted to 18 the person having the next highest rank as shown on the list 19 20 held by the Commission. If the person having the next highest rank, within 10 days after notification thereof by the 21 22 Commission, fails to register at any such university in a 23 special education program of teacher education, or who, having registered, withdraws from the university or transfers out of 24 25 teacher education, the scholarship may then be granted to the 26 person shown on the list as having the rank next below such

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1 person.

2 (d) Any person accepting who has accepted a scholarship under the preceding subsections of this Section must sign an 3 4 agreement pledging (i) that, within one year after graduation 5 from or termination of enrollment in a teacher education program, the recipient will begin teaching at a nonprofit 6 7 Illinois public, private, or parochial preschool, or 8 elementary school, or secondary school for a period of at 9 least 2 of the 5 years immediately following that graduation 10 or termination, and (ii) that the recipient will provide the 11 Commission, upon the Commission's request, with evidence that 12 the recipient is fulfilling or has fulfilled the terms of the 13 teaching agreement provided for in this subsection. excluding, however, from the computation of that 5 year period (i) any 14 15 time up to 3 years spent in the military service, whether such 16 service occurs before or after the person graduates; (ii) any 17 time that person is enrolled full time in an academic program related to the field of teaching leading to a graduate or 18 19 postgraduate degree; (iii) the time that person is a person 20 with a temporary total disability for a period of time not to exceed 3 years, as established by the sworn affidavit of a 21 22 qualified physician; (iv) the time that person is seeking and 23 unable to find full time employment as a teacher at an Illinois public, private, or parochial school; (v) the time that person 24 25 is taking additional courses, on at least a half-time basis, 26 needed to obtain certification as a teacher in Illinois;

6 A person who has accepted a scholarship under the 7 preceding subsections of this Section and who has been unable to fulfill the teaching requirements of this Section may 8 9 receive a deferment from the obligation of repayment under 10 this subsection (d) under quidelines established by the 11 Commission; provided that no guideline established for any 12 such purpose by the State Board of Education prior to the effective date of this amendatory Act of 1993 shall -be 13 affected by the transfer to the Commission of the 14 responsibility for administering and implementing the 15 16 provisions of this Section, and all guidelines so established 17 shall become the guidelines of the Commission until modified or changed by the Commission. 18

Any such person who fails to fulfill this teaching 19 20 requirement shall pay to the Commission the amount of tuition 21 waived by virtue of his or her acceptance of the scholarship, 22 together with interest at 5% per year on that amount. However, 23 this obligation to repay the amount of tuition waived plus interest does not apply when the failure to fulfill the 24 25 teaching requirement results from the death or adjudication as 26 a person under legal disability of the person holding the

scholarship, and no claim for repayment may be filed against 1 2 the estate of such a decedent or person under legal disability. If a recipient who enters into repayment under 3 this paragraph subsequently, within 5 years of entering 4 5 repayment, begins to teach at a school meeting the description under this subsection (d), the Commission may reduce the 6 7 amount owed by the recipient in proportion to the amount of the teaching obligation completed. Payments received by the 8 Commission under this subsection (d) shall be remitted to the 9 10 State Treasurer for deposit in the General Revenue Fund. (a) The General Assembly finds and declares that the 13 14 provision of graduate education leading to a doctoral degree 15 in optometry for persons of this State who desire such an 16 education is important to the health and welfare of this State and Nation and, consequently, is an important public purpose. 17 18 Many qualified potential optometrists are deterred by 19 financial considerations from pursuing their optometric 20 education with consequent irreparable loss to the State and 21 Nation of talents vital to health and welfare. A program of 22 scholarships for individuals who pledge to practice, repayment of which may be excused if the individual practices 23 24 professional optometry in this State, will enable such 25 individuals to attend qualified public or private institutions

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1 of their choice in the State.

2 (b) Beginning with the 2003-2004 academic year, the 3 Commission shall, each year, consider applications for 4 scholarship assistance under this Section. An applicant is 5 eligible for a scholarship under this Section if the 6 Commission finds that the applicant is:

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(1) a United States citizen or eligible noncitizen;

(2) a resident of Illinois; and

9 (3) enrolled on a full-time basis in a public or 10 private college of optometry located in this State that 11 awards a doctorate degree in optometry and is approved by 12 the Department of Professional Regulation.

13 (c) Each year the Commission shall award 10 scholarships 14 under this Section among applicants qualified pursuant to 15 subsection (b). Two of these scholarships each shall be 16 awarded to eligible applicants enrolled in their first year, 17 second year, third year, and fourth year. The remaining 2 scholarships shall be awarded to any level of student. The 18 19 Commission shall receive funding for the scholarships through 20 appropriations from the Optometric Licensing and Disciplinary 21 Board Fund. If in any year the number of qualified applicants 22 exceeds the number of scholarships to be awarded, the 23 Commission shall give priority in awarding scholarships to students demonstrating exceptional merit and who are in 24 25 financial need. A scholarship shall be in the amount of \$5,000 26 each year applicable to tuition and fees.

1 (d) The total amount of scholarship assistance awarded by 2 the Commission under this Section to an individual in any 3 given fiscal year, when added to other financial assistance 4 awarded to that individual for that year, shall not exceed the 5 cost of attendance at the institution at which the student is 6 enrolled.

7 (e) A recipient may receive up to 8 semesters or 12
8 quarters of scholarship assistance under this Section.

9 (f) Subject to a separate appropriation made for such 10 purposes, payment of any scholarship awarded under this 11 Section shall be determined by the Commission. All scholarship 12 funds distributed in accordance with this Section shall be 13 paid to the institution on behalf of the recipients. 14 Scholarship funds are applicable toward 2 semesters or 3 15 quarters of enrollment within an academic year.

16 (g) The Commission shall administer the Optometric 17 Education Scholarship Program established by this Section and 18 shall make all necessary and proper rules not inconsistent 19 with this Section for its effective implementation.

17 "Full-time" means the number of credit hours the 18 Commission determines is full-time enrollment for a student 19 for purposes of the program created under this Section.

20 "Minority student" has the same meaning as the term is 21 defined under Section 50 of the Higher Education Student 22 Assistance Act (110 ILCS 947).

23 "Program" means the iGROW Tech Scholarship Program created 24 under this Section.

25 "Qualifying degree" means an associate or a bachelor's

degree granted by a qualified institution in the field of 1 information sciences; 2 computer information technology; 3 information science; computer science; computer systems networking and telecommunications; computer and information 4 5 systems security or information assurance, including cybersecurity; or management information systems. 6

7 "Qualifying job" means a job with an employer in this 8 State performing work that is directly related to the field of 9 study that qualified the candidate for assistance under this 10 Section.

"Qualified student" means a person (i) who is a resident 11 12 of this State; (ii) who, as an eligible applicant, has made a 13 timely application for an iGROW tech scholarship under this Section; (iii) who is enrolled on at least a half-time basis at 14 a qualified institution; (iv) who is enrolled in a course of 15 16 study in the field of computer and information sciences; 17 information technology; information science; computer science; computer systems networking and telecommunications; computer 18 19 and information systems security or information assurance, 20 including cybersecurity; or management information systems; (v) who maintains a grade point average of no less than a 2.5 21 22 а 4.0 scale; and (vi) who continues to advance on 23 satisfactorily toward the attainment of a degree.

24 "Recipient" means an Illinois resident enrolled in a 25 qualified institution who receives an award under this 26 Section.

1 (b) Subject to appropriation, and no sooner than the 2 2024-2025 academic year, there is established the Illinois 3 Graduate and Retain Our Workforce (iGROW) Tech Scholarship 4 Program to recruit and train individuals to work in technology 5 jobs that have a high demand for new employees and offer high 6 wages by awarding scholarships.

7 (c) Each iGROW tech scholarship awarded under this Section 8 shall be determined by the Commission in an amount up to and 9 including the full costs of tuition and fees and room and board 10 of the qualified institution at which the recipient is 11 enrolled if the institution is public, or an equivalent rate 12 established by the Commission for private institutions. 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2 (e) All applications for scholarships awarded under this Section shall be made to the Commission on forms which the 3 Commission shall provide for eligible applicants. The form of 4 5 applications and the information required to be set forth therein shall be determined by the Commission, and the 6 7 Commission shall require eligible applicants to submit with 8 their applications such supporting documents or 9 recommendations as the Commission deems necessary.

10 (f) Subject to appropriation for such purposes, payment of 11 any iGROW tech scholarship awarded under this Section shall be 12 determined the Commission. All scholarship by funds 13 distributed in accordance with this subsection shall be paid to the qualified institution and used only for payment of the 14 15 tuition and fees assessed by the institution and the standard 16 housing and food allowance used for all undergraduate students 17 by the qualified student in connection with his or her attendance at a gualified institution. 18

 on the qualified institution's return of funds policy.

(g) Prior to receiving scholarship assistance for any 3 academic year, each recipient of an iGROW tech scholarship 4 5 awarded under this Section shall be required by the Commission to sign an agreement under which the recipient pledges that 6 7 the recipient (i) shall work in the State in a qualified job for a period of not less than one year for each year of 8 9 scholarship assistance he or she was awarded under this 10 Section; however, in no event shall he or she agree to work in 11 the State in a qualified job for a period of less than 2 years; 12 and (ii) shall, upon request by the Commission, provide the 13 Commission with evidence that he or she is fulfilling or has fulfilled the terms of the agreement provided for in this 14 15 subsection.

(i) If the Program does not expend at least 90% of the
amount appropriated for the Program in a given fiscal year for

to increasing awareness of the program.

11 (a) The General Assembly finds and hereby declares that 12 the provision of a higher education leading to an associate 13 degree in nursing, an associate degree in applied sciences in 14 nursing, a hospital-based diploma in nursing, a baccalaureate 15 degree in nursing, a graduate degree in nursing, or a certificate in practical nursing for persons of this State who 16 17 desire such an education is important to the health, welfare and security of this State and Nation, and consequently is an 18 important public purpose. Many qualified and potential nurses 19 20 are deterred by financial considerations from pursuing their 21 nursing education, with consequent irreparable loss to the State and Nation of talents vital to health, welfare and 22 23 security. A system of scholarships for individuals who plan to work in this State as, repayment of which may be excused if the 24

individual is employed as a registered professional nurse or a 1 2 licensed practical nurse after obtaining an associate degree 3 in nursing, associate degree in applied sciences in nursing, hospital-based diploma in nursing, baccalaureate degree in 4 5 nursing, graduate degree in nursing, or certificate in practical nursing, will enable such individuals to attend 6 7 approved institutions of their choice in the State, public or 8 private.

(13) "Law" means the Nursing Education Scholarship Law.

(14) "Nursing employment obligation" means employment in this State as a registered professional nurse, licensed practical nurse, or advanced practice registered nurse in direct patient care for at least one year for each year of

scholarship assistance received through the Nursing Education
 Scholarship Program.

3 (15) "Part-time student" means a person who is enrolled 4 for at least one-third of the number of hours required per term 5 by a school for its full-time students.

6 (16) "Practical nursing program" means a program offered 7 by an approved institution leading to a certificate in 8 practical nursing.

9 (17) "Registered professional nurse" means a person who is 10 currently licensed as a registered professional nurse by the 11 Department of Professional Regulation under the Nurse Practice 12 Act.

13 (18) "Licensed practical nurse" means a person who is 14 currently licensed as a licensed practical nurse by the 15 Department of Professional Regulation under the Nurse Practice 16 Act.

17 (19) "School term" means an academic term, such as a 18 semester, quarter, trimester, or number of clock hours, as 19 defined by an approved institution.

20 (20) "Student in good standing" means a student 21 maintaining a cumulative grade point average equivalent to at 22 least the academic grade of a "C".

23 (21) <u>(Blank).</u> "Total and permanent disability" means a 24 physical or mental impairment, disease, or loss of a permanent 25 nature that prevents nursing employment with or without 26 reasonable accommodation. Proof of disability shall be a

2 Workers' Compensation Commission, Department of Defense, or an

8 (23) "Nurse educator" means a person who is currently 9 licensed as a registered nurse by the Department of 10 Professional Regulation under the Nurse Practice Act, who has 11 a graduate degree in nursing, and who is employed by an 12 approved academic institution to educate registered nursing 13 students, licensed practical nursing students, and registered 14 nurses pursuing graduate degrees.

15 (24) "Nurse educator employment obligation" means 16 employment in this State as a nurse educator for at least 2 17 years for each year of scholarship assistance received under 18 Section 6.5 of this Law.

19 (25) "Commission" means the Illinois Student Assistance20 Commission.

Payment must begin within 6 months following the date of the occurrence initiating the repayment. All 24 25 repayments must be completed within 6 years from the date of 26 the occurrence initiating the repayment. However, this

repayment obligation may be deferred and re-evaluated every 6 1 2 months when the failure to fulfill the nurse educator employment obligation results from involuntarily leaving the 3 profession due to a decrease in the number of nurses employed 4 5 in this State or when the failure to fulfill the nurse educator employment obligation results from total and permanent 6 7 disability. The repayment obligation shall be excused if the failure to fulfill the nurse educator employment obligation 8 9 results from the death or adjudication as incompetent of the 10 person holding the scholarship. No claim for repayment may be 11 filed against the estate of such a decedent or incompetent.

12 The Department may allow a nurse educator employment 13 obligation fulfillment alternative if the nurse educator 14 scholarship recipient is unsuccessful in finding work as a 15 nurse educator. The Department shall maintain a database of 16 all available nurse educator positions in this State.

(e) Each person applying for a scholarship under this
Section must be provided with a copy of this Section at the
