

103RD GENERAL ASSEMBLY State of Illinois 2023 and 2024 SB1807

Introduced 2/9/2023, by Sen. John F. Curran

SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

625 ILCS 5/11-204 from Ch. 95 1/2, par. 11-204 625 ILCS 5/11-204.1 from Ch. 95 1/2, par. 11-204.1

Amends the Illinois Vehicle Code. Provides that fleeing or attempting to elude a peace officer is a Class 4 felony instead of a Class A misdemeanor, and that a third or subsequent violation is a Class 3 felony instead of a Class 4 felony. Provides that aggravated fleeing or attempting to elude a peace officer is a Class 3 felony instead of a Class 4 felony, and that a second or subsequent violation is a Class 2 felony instead of a Class 3 felony. Effective immediately.

1 AN ACT concerning transportation.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Illinois Vehicle Code is amended by changing Sections 11-204 and 11-204.1 as follows:
- 6 (625 ILCS 5/11-204) (from Ch. 95 1/2, par. 11-204)
- Sec. 11-204. Fleeing or attempting to elude a peace officer.
- 9 (a) Any driver or operator of a motor vehicle who, having been given a visual or audible signal by a peace officer 10 directing such driver or operator to bring his vehicle to a 11 stop, wilfully fails or refuses to obey such direction, 12 increases his speed, extinguishes his lights, or otherwise 13 14 flees or attempts to elude the officer, is quilty of a Class 4 felony A misdemeanor. The signal given by the peace officer 15 may be by hand, voice, siren, red or blue light. Provided, the 16 officer giving such signal shall be in police uniform, and, if 17 driving a vehicle, such vehicle shall display illuminated 18 19 oscillating, rotating or flashing red or blue lights which when used in conjunction with an audible horn or siren would 20 21 indicate the vehicle to be an official police vehicle. Such requirement shall not preclude the use of amber or white 22 oscillating, rotating or flashing lights in conjunction with 23

- 1 red or blue oscillating, rotating or flashing lights as 2 required in Section 12-215 of Chapter 12.
- 3 (b) Upon receiving notice of such conviction the Secretary
- 4 of State shall suspend the drivers license of the person so
- 5 convicted for a period of not more than 6 months for a first
- 6 conviction and not more than 12 months for a second
- 7 conviction.
- 8 (c) A third or subsequent violation of this Section is a
- 9 Class 34 felony.

- 12 Sec. 11-204.1. Aggravated fleeing or attempting to elude a
- 13 peace officer.
- 14 (a) The offense of aggravated fleeing or attempting to
- 15 elude a peace officer is committed by any driver or operator of
- a motor vehicle who flees or attempts to elude a peace officer,
- 17 after being given a visual or audible signal by a peace officer
- in the manner prescribed in subsection (a) of Section 11-204
- 19 of this Code, and such flight or attempt to elude:
- 20 (1) is at a rate of speed at least 21 miles per hour
- 21 over the legal speed limit;
- 22 (2) causes bodily injury to any individual;
- 23 (3) causes damage in excess of \$300 to property;
- 24 (4) involves disobedience of 2 or more official
- 25 traffic control devices; or

- 1 (5) involves the concealing or altering of the 2 vehicle's registration plate or digital registration 3 plate.
 - (b) Any person convicted of a first violation of this Section shall be guilty of a Class $\underline{3}$ 4 felony. Upon notice of such a conviction the Secretary of State shall forthwith revoke the driver's license of the person so convicted, as provided in Section 6-205 of this Code. Any person convicted of a second or subsequent violation of this Section shall be guilty of a Class $\underline{2}$ 3 felony, and upon notice of such a conviction the Secretary of State shall forthwith revoke the driver's license of the person convicted, as provided in Section 6-205 of the Code.
- 14 (c) The motor vehicle used in a violation of this Section 15 is subject to seizure and forfeiture as provided in Sections 16 36-1 and 36-2 of the Criminal Code of 2012.
