Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Illinois Speech-Language Pathology and
Audiology Practice Act is amended by changing Sections 3.5,
8.5, and 8.6 as follows:

8 (Section scheduled to be repealed on January 1, 2028)
9 Sec. 3.5. Exemptions. This Act does not prohibit:

The practice of speech-language pathology or 10 (a) 11 audiology by students in their course of study in programs 12 approved by the Department, or the performance of speech-language pathology assistant services by graduates 13 14 who have obtained degrees as set forth in paragraph (2) of Section 8.5 of the Act, when acting under the direction 15 16 and supervision of licensed speech-language pathologists 17 or audiologists.

(b) The performance of any speech-language pathology
service by a speech-language pathology assistant or
<u>candidate for licensure as a speech-language pathology</u>
<u>assistant</u>, if such service is performed under the
supervision and full responsibility of a licensed
speech-language pathologist. A speech language pathology

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assistant <u>or candidate for speech-language pathology</u>
 <u>assistant licensure</u> may perform only those duties
 authorized by Section 8.7 under the supervision of a
 speech-language pathologist as provided in Section 8.8.

5 (b-5) The performance of an audiology service by an 6 appropriately trained person if that service is performed 7 under the supervision and full responsibility of a 8 licensed audiologist.

9 (c) The performance of audiometric testing for the 10 purpose of industrial hearing conservation by an 11 audiometric technician certified by the Council of 12 Accreditation for Occupational Hearing Conservation 13 (CAOHC).

14 (d) The performance of an audiometric screening by an
15 audiometric screenings technician certified by the
16 Department of Public Health.

(e) The selling or practice of fitting, dispensing, or
servicing hearing instruments by a hearing instrument
dispenser licensed under the Hearing Instrument Consumer
Protection Act.

(f) A person licensed in this State under any other Act from engaging in the practice for which he or she is licensed.

(g) The performance of vestibular function testing by
 an appropriately trained person under the supervision of a
 physician licensed to practice medicine in all its

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1 branches.

2 (h) The performance of neurophysiologic intraoperative monitoring of the seventh and eighth cranial nerve by an 3 individual certified by the American Board of Registration 4 5 of Electroencephalographic and Evoked Potential 6 Technologists as Certified in Neurophysiologic 7 Monitoring only if authorized Intraoperative and 8 supervised by the physician performing the surgical 9 procedure.

Sec. 8.5. Qualifications for licenses as a speech-language pathology assistant. A person is qualified to be licensed as a speech-language pathology assistant if that person has applied in writing or electronically on forms prescribed by the Department, has paid the required fees, and meets both of the following criteria:

(1) Is of good moral character. In determining moral
character, the Department may take into consideration any
felony conviction or plea of guilty or nolo contendere of
the applicant, but such a conviction or plea shall not
operate automatically as a complete bar to licensure.

(2) Has received either (i) an associate degree from a
 speech-language pathology assistant program that has been

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approved by the Department and that meets the minimum 1 2 requirements set forth in Section 8.6, (ii) a bachelor's 3 degree and has completed course work from an accredited college or university that meets the minimum requirements 4 5 set forth in Section 8.6, or (iii) a bachelor's degree in speech-language pathology or communication sciences and 6 7 disorders from a regionally or nationally accredited 8 institution approved by the Department that meets the 9 minimum requirements set forth in paragraph (2) of 10 subsection (a) in Section 8.6, and evidence of completion 11 of at least 100 hours of documented field work supervised 12 licensed speech-language pathologist that by a is 13 comparable to field work that completed in а 14 speech-language pathology assistant program in this State, and completion of requirements for certification as a 15 16 speech-language pathology assistant or completion of an 17 equivalent program as determined by the Department by 18 rule.

 Sec. 8.6. Minimum requirements for speech-language
 pathology assistant programs.

(a) An applicant for licensure as a speech-language
 pathology assistant must have earned 60 semester credit hours

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in a program of study that includes general education and the specific knowledge and skills for a speech-language pathology assistant. The curriculum of a speech-language pathology assistant program must include all of the following content, as further provided by rule promulgated by the Department:

6 (1) Twenty-four semester credit hours in general 7 education.

Thirty-six semester credit hours in technical 8 (2) 9 content areas designed to provide students with knowledge 10 and skills required for speech-language pathology 11 assistants, which must include (i) an introductory or 12 overview cours<u>e in</u> of normal processes of communication 13 disorders; (ii) phonetics an overview of communication 14 disorders; (iii) speech sound disorders instruction in 15 speech-language pathology assistant-level service 16 delivery practices; (iv) language development instruction 17 in workplace behaviors; (v) language disorders cultural 18 and linguistic factors in communication; and (vi) anatomy 19 and physiology of speech and hearing mechanisms 20 observation.

(3) Completion of at least 100 hours of supervised 21 22 field work experiences supervised by а licensed 23 speech-language pathologist at least 50% of the time when 24 the student is engaged in contact with the patient or 25 client. work experience, including a description of the setting in
 which the training was received and an assessment of the
 student's technical proficiency.

4 (b) The Department may promulgate rules that change the 5 curriculum requirements of subsection (a) in order to reflect 6 the guidelines for speech-language pathology assistant 7 programs recommended by the American Speech-Language Hearing 8 Association.

9 (c) Any applicant for licensure as a speech-language 10 pathology assistant who applies to the Department prior to the 11 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 96th General 12 Assembly or any person who holds a valid license as a 13 speech-language pathology assistant on the effective date of 14 this amendatory Act shall not be required to meet the new 15 minimum requirements for a speech language pathology assistant 16 program under subsection (a) of this Section 8.6 that are 17 established by this amendatory Act.
