1	AMENDMENT TO SENATE BILL 3768
2	AMENDMENT NO Amend Senate Bill 3768 by replacing
3	everything after the enacting clause with the following:
4	"Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section
5	14-11.02 as follows:
6	(105 ILCS 5/14-11.02) (from Ch. 122, par. 14-11.02)
7	Sec. 14-11.02. The Philip J. Rock Center and School for
8	the Deafblind. Notwithstanding any other Sections of this
9	Article, the State Board of Education shall develop and
10	operate or contract for the operation of a service center for
11	persons who are deaf-blind.
12	<u>(a)</u> For the purpose of this Section, persons <u>who are</u>
13	<u>deafblind</u> with deaf-blindness are (i) individuals with
14	concomitant hearing and visual impairments, the combination of
15	which causes such severe communication and other developmental
16	and educational needs that they cannot be accommodated in

special education programs solely for children with deafness 1 or children with blindness, (ii) individuals with solely a 2 hearing impairment, or (iii) individuals with solely a visual 3 4 impairment persons who have both auditory and visual 5 impairments, the combination of which causes such severe communication and other developmental, educational, vocational 6 and rehabilitation problems that such persons cannot be 7 properly accommodated in special education or vocational 8 9 rehabilitation programs solely for persons with both hearing 10 and visual disabilities.

11 (b) To be eligible for deafblind deaf-blind services under this Section, a person must have (i) a visual impairment, a 12 13 hearing and an auditory impairment, or both or (ii) a condition in which there is a progressive loss of hearing, or 14 15 vision, or both that results in concomitant vision and hearing impairments and that adversely affects educational performance 16 determined by the multidisciplinary conference. For 17 as purposes of this paragraph and Section: 18

19 (1) (A) A visual impairment shall have the same 20 meaning as in the federal Individuals With Disabilities Education Act and its implementing regulations is defined 21 22 to mean one or more of the following: (i) corrected visual acuity poorer than 20/70 in the better eye; (ii) 23 24 restricted visual field of 20 degrees or less in the 25 better eye; (iii) cortical blindness; (iv) does not appear 26 to respond to visual stimulation, which adversely affects

1 educational performance as determined 2 multidisciplinary conference. 3 (2) A hearing (B) An auditory impairment shall have 4 the same meaning as in the federal Individuals With 5 Disabilities Education Act and its implementing regulations is defined to mean one or more of the 6 following: (i) a sensorineural or ongoing or chronic 7 conductive hearing loss with aided sensitivity of 30dB HL 8 9 or poorer; (ii) functional auditory behavior that is 10 significantly discrepant from the person's present 11 cognitive and/or developmental levels, which adversely affects educational performance as determined by the 12 13 multidisciplinary conference. 14 (c) Notwithstanding any other provision of Article 14, the 15 The State Board of Education shall is empowered to establish, 16 maintain and operate or contract for the operation of a permanent, statewide, residential education facility 17 state wide service center known as the Philip J. Rock Center 18 and School that services. The School serves eligible students 19 20 children between the ages of 3 and 21, unless a student's 22nd birthday occurs during the school year, in which case the 21 22 student is eligible for such services through the end of the school year. Subject to appropriation, the Philip J. Rock 23 24 Center and School may provide additional services to 21; the 25 Center serves eligible deafblind persons of all ages. The State Board of Education shall include a line item in its 26

budget to pay the costs of operating and maintaining the Philip J. Rock Center and School. If the Center and School receives appropriated funding to serve eligible deafblind persons of all ages, services Services provided by the Center and School shall include, but are not limited to:

6 (1) <u>identifying</u> Identifying and <u>providing</u> case 7 management of <u>individuals with combined vision and hearing</u> 8 <u>loss</u> persons who are auditorily and visually impaired;

9 (2) <u>providing</u> Providing families with appropriate 10 <u>information and dissemination of information</u> counseling;

11 (3) <u>providing information to</u> Referring persons who are 12 <u>deafblind about the</u> deaf-blind to appropriate agencies for 13 medical and diagnostic services;

14 (4) <u>referring</u> Referring persons who are <u>deafblind</u>
 15 <u>deaf blind</u> to appropriate agencies for educational,
 16 <u>rehabilitation, and support</u> training and care services;

17 (5) <u>developing</u> Developing and expanding services
18 throughout the State to persons who are <u>deafblind</u>
19 <u>deaf blind</u>. This <u>shall</u> will include ancillary services,
20 such as transportation, so that <u>these persons</u> the
21 <u>individuals</u> can take advantage of the expanded services;

(6) <u>maintaining</u> Maintaining a residential-educational
training facility, with or without a day program, in the
Chicago metropolitan area located <u>near</u> in an area
accessible to public transportation;

State and Federal funds to the School and Center designated for services to persons who are deaf-blind; (8) <u>coordinating</u> Coordinating services to persons who are <u>deafblind</u> deaf-blind through all appropriate agencies, including the Department of Children and Family Services and the Department of Human Services; (9) <u>entering</u> Entering into contracts with other agencies to provide services to persons who are <u>deafblind</u> deaf-blind; (10) (blank); <u>Operating on a no-reject basis. Any</u>

10 (10) (blank); Operating on a no-reject basis. Any 11 individual referred to the Center for service and 12 diagnosed as deaf-blind, as defined in this Act, shall 13 qualify for available services;

(11) <u>serving</u> Serving as the <u>information</u> referral
 clearinghouse for all persons who are <u>deafblind</u>
 deaf blind, age 21 and older; and

(12) (blank). Providing transition services for
 students of Philip J. Rock School who are deaf blind and
 between the ages of 14 1/2 and 21.

20 <u>Priority of services shall be given to students referred</u> 21 <u>to the Philip J. Rock Center and School who qualify as</u> 22 <u>individuals with concomitant hearing and visual impairments</u> 23 <u>under clause (i) of subsection (a) of this Section or who are</u> 24 <u>eliqible for special education services under the category of</u> 25 <u>deafblind. Such a student may not be denied enrollment unless</u> 26 the student's placement in the Center and School would 10300SB3768ham001

1	endanger the health or safety of any other student.
2	(d) For the purposes of employment, the Philip J. Rock
3	Center and School shall be considered its own employer. The
4	State Board of Education shall appoint a chief administrator
5	of the Philip J. Rock Center and School, who shall be employed
6	by the Center and School and shall manage the daily operations
7	of the Center and School. The chief administrator shall have
8	the authority on behalf of the Center and School to:
9	(1) hire, evaluate, discipline, and terminate staff of
10	the Center and School;
11	(2) determine wages, benefits, and other conditions of
12	employment for all Center and School employees;
13	(3) bargain with the exclusive bargaining
14	representative of the employees of the Center and School;
15	(4) develop a budget to be submitted to the State
16	Board of Education for review and approval;
17	(5) contract for any professional, legal, and
18	educational services necessary for the operation of the
19	Center and School;
20	(6) make all decisions regarding the daily operations
21	of the Center and School; and
22	(7) perform any other duties as set forth in the
23	employment contract for the chief administrator.
24	(e) If the State Board of Education contracts for the
25	fiscal administration of the Philip J. Rock Center and School,
26	then the contract shall be with a school district, special

1 education cooperative, or regional office of education that
2 can serve as the fiscal agent for the Center and School. To the
3 extent possible, the fiscal agent shall be in close geographic
4 proximity to the Center and School.

5 (f) Through the individualized education program process 6 with the student's resident school district, a student who resides at the Philip J. Rock Center and School may be placed 7 in an alternate educational program by the student's 8 9 individualized education program team. Educational placement 10 and services shall be provided free of charge to the student's resident school district, unless there is tuition associated 11 with the educational placement and services. If the Philip J. 12 Rock Center and School must pay tuition or provide 13 14 transportation for a student's educational placement and 15 services, such tuition or transportation shall be billed to 16 the student's resident school district.

(q) The Advisory Board for Services for Persons who are 17 deafblind Deaf Blind shall provide advice to the State 18 Superintendent of Education, the Governor, and the General 19 20 Assembly on all matters pertaining to policy concerning 21 persons who are deafblind deaf-blind, including the 22 implementation of legislation enacted on their behalf.

23 <u>The</u> Regarding the maintenance, operation and education 24 functions of the Philip J. Rock Center and School, the 25 Advisory Board shall also make recommendations pertaining to 26 but not limited to the following matters:

(1) existing Existing and proposed programs of all 1 State agencies that provide services for persons who are 2 3 deafblind deaf-blind; 4 (2) the The State program and financial plan for 5 deafblind deaf blind services and the system of priorities to be developed by the State Board of Education; 6 (3) standards Standards for services in facilities 7 8 serving persons who are deafblind deaf blind; 9 (4) standards Standards and rates for State payments 10 for any services purchased for persons who are deafblind deaf-blind; 11 (5) services Services and research activities in the 12 13 field of deafblindness deaf-blindness, including the 14 evaluation of services; and 15 (6) planning Planning for personnel or preparation personnel/preparation, both preservice and inservice. 16 The Advisory Board shall consist of 3 persons appointed by 17 the Governor; 2 persons appointed by the State Superintendent 18 of Education; 4 persons appointed by the Secretary of Human 19 20 Services; and 2 persons appointed by the Director of Children 21 and Family Services. The 3 appointments of the Governor shall 22 consist of a senior citizen 60 years of age or older, a 23 consumer who is deaf-blind, and a parent of a person who is 24 deaf-blind; provided that if any gubernatorial appointee 25 serving on the Advisory Board on the effective date of amendatory Act of 1991 is not either a senior citizen 60 years 26

of age or older or a consumer who is deaf-blind or a parent of 1 a person who is deaf-blind, then whenever that appointee's 2 term of office expires or a vacancy in that appointee's office 3 4 sooner occurs, the Governor shall make the appointment to fill 5 that office or vacancy in a manner that will result, at the earliest possible time, in the Governor's appointments to the 6 Advisory Board being comprised of one senior citizen 60 years 7 of age or older, one consumer who is deaf blind, and one parent 8 9 of a person who is deaf-blind. One person designated by each 10 agency other than the Department of Human Services may be an 11 employee of that agency. Two persons appointed by the Secretary of Human Services may be employees of the Department 12 13 of Human Services. The appointments of each appointing authority other than the Governor shall include at least one 14 15 parent of an individual who is deafblind deaf blind or a 16 person who is deafblind deaf blind.

Vacancies in terms shall be filled by the original appointing authority. After the original terms, all terms shall be for 3 years.

Except for those members of the Advisory Board who are compensated for State service on a full-time basis, members shall be reimbursed for all actual expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. Each member who is not compensated for State service on a full-time basis shall be compensated at a rate of \$50 per day which he spends on Advisory Board duties. 1	2 4 times per year and not more than 12 times per year.
2	The <u>State Board of Education</u> Advisory Board shall provide
3	support to the Advisory Board for its own organization.
4	Six members of the Advisory Board shall constitute a
5	quorum. The affirmative vote of a majority of all members of
6	the Advisory Board shall be necessary for any action taken by
7	the Advisory Board.
