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AN ACT regarding education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,represented in the General Assembly:

4 Section 5. The Critical Health Problems and 5 Comprehensive Health Education Act is amended by changing 6 Section 3 as follows:

7 (105 ILCS 110/3) (from Ch. 122, par. 863)

8 Sec. 3. Comprehensive Health Education Program. The program established under this Act shall include, but not be 9 limited to, the following major educational areas as a basis 10 for curricula in all elementary and secondary schools in this 11 12 State: human ecology and health, human growth and 13 development, the emotional, psychological, physiological, hygienic and social responsibilities 14 of family life, 15 including sexual abstinence until marriage, prevention and 16 control of disease, including instruction in grades 6 through 12 on the prevention, transmission and spread of HIV/AIDS 17 AIDS, public and environmental health, consumer health, 18 19 safety education and disaster and terrorism preparedness 20 survival, mental health and illness (including instruction in secondary schools on clinical depression and suicide 21 22 prevention), personal health habits, alcohol, drug use, and abuse including the medical and legal ramifications of 23 alcohol, drug, and tobacco use, abuse during pregnancy, 24 sexual abstinence until marriage, tobacco, nutrition, organ, 25 tissue, and blood donation, 26 and dental health. 27 Notwithstanding the above educational areas, the following areas may also be included as a basis for curricula in all 28 29 elementary and secondary schools in this State: basic first 30 aid (including, but not limited to, cardiopulmonary 31 resuscitation and the Heimlich maneuver), early prevention

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1 and detection of cancer, heart disease, diabetes, stroke, and 2 the prevention of child abuse, neglect, and suicide. The school board of each public elementary and secondary school 3 4 in the State shall encourage all teachers and other school personnel to acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge and 5 6 skills necessary to properly administer life-saving 7 including without limitation the Heimlich techniques, maneuver and rescue breathing. 8 The training shall be in 9 accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized 10 11 certifying organization. A school board may use the services of non-governmental entities whose personnel have expertise 12 13 in life-saving techniques to instruct teachers and other school personnel in these techniques. Each school board is 14 15 encouraged to have in its employ, or on its volunteer staff, 16 at least one person who is certified, by the American Red Cross or by another qualified certifying agency, as qualified 17 to administer first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. 18 19 In addition, each school board is authorized to allocate appropriate portions of its institute or inservice days to 20 21 conduct training programs for teachers and other school 22 personnel who have expressed an interest in becoming 23 qualified to administer emergency first aid or cardiopulmonary resuscitation. School boards are urged 24 to 25 encourage their teachers and other school personnel who coach school athletic programs and other extracurricular school 26 activities to acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge 27 and skills necessary to properly administer first aid and 28 cardiopulmonary resuscitation in accordance with standards 29 30 and requirements established by the American Red Cross or another qualified certifying agency. No pupil shall be 31 32 required to take or participate in any class or course on AIDS or family life instruction if his parent or guardian 33 submits written objection thereto, and refusal to take or 34

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participate in the course or program shall not be reason for
suspension or expulsion of the pupil.

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3 Curricula developed under programs established in 4 accordance with this Act in the major educational area of alcohol and drug use and abuse shall include classroom 5 6 instruction in grades 5 through 12. The instruction, which 7 shall include matters relating to both the physical and legal effects and ramifications of drug and substance abuse, shall 8 9 be integrated into existing curricula; and the State Board of Education shall develop and make available to all elementary 10 11 and secondary schools in this State instructional materials and guidelines which will assist the schools in incorporating 12 the instruction into their existing curricula. In addition, 13 school districts may offer, as part of existing curricula 14 during the school day or as part of an after school program, 15 16 support services and instruction for pupils or pupils whose parent, parents, or guardians are chemically dependent. 17
