- 2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,
- 3 represented in the General Assembly:
- 4 Section 5. The Juvenile Court Act of 1987 is amended by
- 5 adding Section 2-4.1 as follows:
- 6 (705 ILCS 405/2-4.1 new)
- 7 <u>Sec. 2-4.1. Special immigrant minor.</u>
- 8 (1) Any minor under 18 years of age who has been
- 9 <u>declared dependent by a juvenile court can be deemed eligible</u>
- 10 by that court for long-term foster care due to abuse,
- 11 <u>neglect</u>, or abandonment if that minor is otherwise eligible
- 12 for special immigrant juvenile status under 8 U.S.C.
- 13 <u>1101(a)(27)(J)</u>.
- 14 (a) For purposes of this Section, a juvenile court
- may make a determination that a minor is eligible for
- long-term foster care pursuant to 8 U.S.C. 1101(a)(27)(J)
- and corresponding federal regulations, provided that the
- court makes the following specific findings:
- 19 <u>(i) that a diligent search for the minor's</u>
- 20 <u>natural parents or prior adoptive parents has been</u>
- 21 <u>conducted both nationally and internationally;</u>
- 22 (ii) that all efforts at reunification with
- 23 <u>the minor's natural parents or prior adoptive</u>
- 24 <u>parents have been exhausted; and</u>

- (b) For purposes of this Section, "abandonment" is
- defined in subdivision D (b) of Section 1 of the Adoption
- 30 <u>Act as the failure to maintain a reasonable degree of</u>
- interest, concern, or responsibility as to the minor's
- 32 <u>welfare</u>.

- 1 (2) This Section does not apply to a minor who would be
- 2 <u>included in this Section solely for the purpose of qualifying</u>
- 3 for financial assistance for himself, herself, his or her
