1 AN ACT concerning schools.

- Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,represented in the General Assembly:
- 4 Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing
 5 Section 18-8.05 as follows:
- 6 (105 ILCS 5/18-8.05)

Sec. 18-8.05. Basis for apportionment of general State
financial aid and supplemental general State aid to the
common schools for the 1998-1999 and subsequent school years.

10 (A) General Provisions.

11 (1) The provisions of this Section apply to the 1998-1999 and subsequent school years. The system of general 12 State financial aid provided for in this Section is designed 13 to assure that, through a combination of State financial aid 14 15 and required local resources, the financial support provided 16 each pupil in Average Daily Attendance equals or exceeds a prescribed per pupil Foundation Level. This formula approach 17 18 imputes a level of per pupil Available Local Resources and provides for the basis to calculate a per pupil level of 19 20 general State financial aid that, when added to Available Local Resources, equals or exceeds the Foundation Level. The 21 amount of per pupil general State financial aid for school 22 23 districts, in general, varies in inverse relation to Available Local Resources. Per pupil amounts are based upon 24 25 each school district's Average Daily Attendance as that term is defined in this Section. 26

(2) In addition to general State financial aid, 27 school districts with specified levels or concentrations of pupils 28 low income households 29 from are eligible to receive 30 supplemental general State financial aid grants as provided pursuant to subsection (H). The supplemental State aid grants 31

provided for school districts under subsection (H) shall be appropriated for distribution to school districts as part of the same line item in which the general State financial aid of school districts is appropriated under this Section.

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5 (3) To receive financial assistance under this Section, 6 school districts are required to file claims with the State 7 Board of Education, subject to the following requirements:

8 (a) Any school district which fails for any given 9 school year to maintain school as required by law, or to maintain a recognized school is not eligible to file for 10 11 such school year any claim upon the Common School Fund. In case of nonrecognition of one or more attendance 12 centers in a school district otherwise 13 operating recognized schools, the claim of the district shall be 14 15 reduced in the proportion which the Average Daily 16 Attendance in the attendance center or centers bear to the Average Daily Attendance in the school district. 17 Α "recognized school" means any public school which meets 18 19 the standards as established for recognition by the State Board of Education. A school district or attendance 20 21 center not having recognition status at the end of a 22 school term is entitled to receive State aid payments due 23 upon a legal claim which was filed while it was recognized. 24

(b) School district claims filed under this Section
are subject to Sections 18-9, 18-10, and 18-12, except as
otherwise provided in this Section.

(c) If a school district operates a full year
school under Section 10-19.1, the general State aid to
the school district shall be determined by the State
Board of Education in accordance with this Section as
near as may be applicable.

33 (d) (Blank).

34 (4) Except as provided in subsections (H) and (L), the

board of any district receiving any of the grants provided for in this Section may apply those funds to any fund so received for which that board is authorized to make expenditures by law.

5 School districts are not required to exert a minimum 6 Operating Tax Rate in order to qualify for assistance under 7 this Section.

8 (5) As used in this Section the following terms, when9 capitalized, shall have the meaning ascribed herein:

10 (a) "Average Daily Attendance": A count of pupil
11 attendance in school, averaged as provided for in
12 subsection (C) and utilized in deriving per pupil
13 financial support levels.

14 (b) "Available Local Resources": A computation of
15 local financial support, calculated on the basis of
16 Average Daily Attendance and derived as provided pursuant
17 to subsection (D).

18 (c) "Corporate Personal Property Replacement
19 Taxes": Funds paid to local school districts pursuant to
20 "An Act in relation to the abolition of ad valorem
21 personal property tax and the replacement of revenues
22 lost thereby, and amending and repealing certain Acts and
23 parts of Acts in connection therewith", certified August
24 14, 1979, as amended (Public Act 81-1st S.S.-1).

25 (d) "Foundation Level": A prescribed level of per 26 pupil financial support as provided for in subsection 27 (B).

(e) "Operating Tax Rate": All school district
property taxes extended for all purposes, except Bond and
Interest, Summer School, Rent, Capital Improvement, and
Vocational Education Building purposes.

32 (B) Foundation Level.

33 (1) The Foundation Level is a figure established by the34 State representing the minimum level of per pupil financial

1 support that should be available to provide for the basic 2 education of each pupil in Average Daily Attendance. As set forth in this Section, each school district is assumed to 3 4 a sufficient local taxing effort such that, exert in 5 combination with the aggregate of general State financial aid б provided the district, an aggregate of State and local 7 resources are available to meet the basic education needs of 8 pupils in the district.

9 (2) For the 1998-1999 school year, the Foundation Level 10 of support is \$4,225. For the 1999-2000 school year, the 11 Foundation Level of support is \$4,325. For the 2000-2001 12 school year, the Foundation Level of support is \$4,425.

13 (3) For the 2001-2002 school year and each school year 14 thereafter, the Foundation Level of support is \$4,560 or such 15 greater amount as may be established by law by the General 16 Assembly.

17 (C) Average Daily Attendance.

18 (1)For purposes of calculating general State aid 19 pursuant to subsection (E), an Average Daily Attendance figure shall be utilized. The Average Daily Attendance 20 21 figure for formula calculation purposes shall be the monthly average of the actual number of pupils in attendance of each 22 23 school district, as further averaged for the best 3 months of pupil attendance for each school district. In compiling the 24 figures for the number of pupils in attendance, school 25 districts and the State Board of Education shall, for 26 purposes of general State aid funding, conform attendance 27 28 figures to the requirements of subsection (F).

(2) The Average Daily Attendance figures utilized in subsection (E) shall be the requisite attendance data for the school year immediately preceding the school year for which general State aid is being calculated or the average of the attendance data for the 3 preceding school years, whichever is greater. The Average Daily Attendance figures utilized in

subsection (H) shall be the requisite attendance data for the
 school year immediately preceding the school year for which
 general State aid is being calculated.

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4 (D) Available Local Resources.

5 (1) For purposes of calculating general State aid pursuant to subsection (E), a representation of Available 6 7 Local Resources per pupil, as that term is defined and determined in this subsection, shall be utilized. Available 8 Local Resources per pupil shall include a calculated dollar 9 amount representing local school district revenues from local 10 11 property taxes and from Corporate Personal Property 12 Replacement Taxes, expressed on the basis of pupils in Average Daily Attendance. 13

14 In determining a school district's revenue from (2) 15 local property taxes, the State Board of Education shall utilize the equalized assessed valuation of all taxable 16 property of each school district as of September 30 of 17 the 18 previous year. The equalized assessed valuation utilized 19 shall be obtained and determined as provided in subsection 20 (G).

21 (3) For school districts maintaining grades kindergarten 22 through 12, local property tax revenues per pupil shall be 23 calculated as the product of the applicable equalized assessed valuation for the district multiplied by 3.00%, and 24 25 divided by the district's Average Daily Attendance figure. For school districts maintaining grades kindergarten through 26 8, local property tax revenues per pupil shall be calculated 27 28 as the product of the applicable equalized assessed valuation for the district multiplied by 2.30%, and divided by the 29 district's Average Daily Attendance figure. For school 30 districts maintaining grades 9 through 12, local property tax 31 32 revenues per pupil shall be the applicable equalized assessed 33 valuation of the district multiplied by 1.05%, and divided by 34 the district's Average Daily Attendance figure.

1 (4) The Corporate Personal Property Replacement Taxes 2 paid to each school district during the calendar year 2 years before the calendar year in which a school year begins, 3 4 divided by the Average Daily Attendance figure for that 5 district, shall be added to the local property tax revenues 6 per pupil as derived by the application of the immediately 7 preceding paragraph (3). The sum of these per pupil figures for each school district shall constitute Available Local 8 9 Resources as that term is utilized in subsection (E) in the calculation of general State aid. 10

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11 (E) Computation of General State Aid.

12 (1) For each school year, the amount of general State
13 aid allotted to a school district shall be computed by the
14 State Board of Education as provided in this subsection.

15 (2) For any school district for which Available Local 16 Resources per pupil is less than the product of 0.93 times 17 the Foundation Level, general State aid for that district 18 shall be calculated as an amount equal to the Foundation 19 Level minus Available Local Resources, multiplied by the 20 Average Daily Attendance of the school district.

21 (3) For any school district for which Available Local Resources per pupil is equal to or greater than the product 22 23 of 0.93 times the Foundation Level and less than the product of 1.75 times the Foundation Level, the general State aid per 24 25 pupil shall be a decimal proportion of the Foundation Level derived using a linear algorithm. Under this linear 26 algorithm, the calculated general State aid per pupil shall 27 28 decline in direct linear fashion from 0.07 times the Foundation Level for a school district with Available Local 29 Resources equal to the product of 0.93 times the Foundation 30 Level, to 0.05 times the Foundation Level for a school 31 32 district with Available Local Resources equal to the product 33 of 1.75 times the Foundation Level. The allocation of general State aid for school districts subject to this 34

paragraph 3 shall be the calculated general State aid per pupil figure multiplied by the Average Daily Attendance of the school district.

4 (4) For any school district for which Available Local 5 Resources per pupil equals or exceeds the product of 1.75 6 times the Foundation Level, the general State aid for the 7 school district shall be calculated as the product of \$218 8 multiplied by the Average Daily Attendance of the school 9 district.

(5) The amount of general State aid allocated to a 10 11 school district for the 1999-2000 school year meeting the 12 requirements set forth in paragraph (4) of subsection (G) shall be increased by an amount equal to the general State 13 aid that would have been received by the district for the 14 1998-1999 school year by utilizing the Extension Limitation 15 16 Equalized Assessed Valuation as calculated in paragraph (4) of subsection (G) less the general State aid allotted for the 17 1998-1999 school year. This amount shall be deemed a one 18 19 time increase, and shall not affect any future general State aid allocations. 20

21 (F) Compilation of Average Daily Attendance.

22 Each school district shall, by July 1 of each year, (1)23 submit to the State Board of Education, on forms prescribed by the State Board of Education, attendance figures for 24 the 25 school year that began in the preceding calendar year. The attendance information so transmitted shall identify the 26 average daily attendance figures for each month of the school 27 28 year. Beginning with the general State aid claim form for 29 the 2002-2003 school year, districts shall calculate Average Daily Attendance as provided in subdivisions (a), (b), and 30 (c) of this paragraph (1). 31

32 (a) In districts that do not hold year-round
33 classes, days of attendance in August shall be added to
34 the month of September and any days of attendance in June

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shall be added to the month of May.

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(b) In districts in which all buildings hold year-round classes, days of attendance in July and August shall be added to the month of September and any days of attendance in June shall be added to the month of May.

(c) In districts in which some buildings, but not 6 7 all, hold year-round classes, for the non-year-round buildings, days of attendance in August shall be added to 8 9 the month of September and any days of attendance in June shall be added to the month of May. The average daily 10 11 attendance for the year-round buildings shall be computed as provided in subdivision (b) of this paragraph (1). To 12 calculate the Average Daily Attendance for the district, 13 the average daily attendance for the year-round buildings 14 15 shall be multiplied by the days in session for the 16 non-year-round buildings for each month and added to the monthly attendance of the non-year-round buildings. 17

Except as otherwise provided in this Section, days of 18 attendance by pupils shall be counted only for sessions of 19 not less than 5 clock hours of school work per day under 20 21 direct supervision of: (i) teachers, or (ii) non-teaching 22 personnel or volunteer personnel when engaging in 23 non-teaching duties and supervising in those instances specified in subsection (a) of Section 10-22.34 and paragraph 24 25 10 of Section 34-18, with pupils of legal school age and in kindergarten and grades 1 through 12. 26

Days of attendance by tuition pupils shall be accredited only to the districts that pay the tuition to a recognized school.

30 (2) Days of attendance by pupils of less than 5 clock
31 hours of school shall be subject to the following provisions
32 in the compilation of Average Daily Attendance.

33 (a) Pupils regularly enrolled in a public school34 for only a part of the school day may be counted on the

1 basis of 1/6 day for every class hour of instruction of 2 40 minutes or more attended pursuant to such enrollment, unless a pupil is enrolled in a block-schedule format of 3 4 80 minutes or more of instruction, in which case the pupil may be counted on the basis of the proportion of 5 minutes of school work completed each day to the minimum 6 7 number of minutes that school work is required to be held 8 that day.

9 (b) Days of attendance may be less than 5 clock 10 hours on the opening and closing of the school term, and 11 upon the first day of pupil attendance, if preceded by a 12 day or days utilized as an institute or teachers' 13 workshop.

14 (c) A session of 4 or more clock hours may be
15 counted as a day of attendance upon certification by the
16 regional superintendent, and approved by the State
17 Superintendent of Education to the extent that the
18 district has been forced to use daily multiple sessions.

(d) A session of 3 or more clock hours may be 19 counted as a day of attendance (1) when the remainder of 20 21 the school day or at least 2 hours in the evening of that 22 day is utilized for an in-service training program for 23 teachers, up to a maximum of 5 days per school year of which a maximum of 4 days of such 5 days may be used for 24 parent-teacher conferences, provided a district conducts 25 an in-service training program for teachers which has 26 been approved by the State Superintendent of Education; 27 in lieu of 4 such days, 2 full days may be used, in 28 or, 29 which event each such day may be counted as a day of attendance; and (2) when days in addition to those 30 provided in item (1) are scheduled by a school pursuant 31 to its school improvement plan adopted under Article 34 32 or its revised or amended school improvement plan adopted 33 under Article 2, provided that (i) such sessions of 3 or 34

1 more clock hours are scheduled to occur at regular 2 intervals, (ii) the remainder of the school days in which such sessions occur are utilized for in-service training 3 4 or other staff development activities for programs teachers, and (iii) a sufficient number of minutes of 5 school work under the direct supervision of teachers are 6 7 added to the school days between such regularly scheduled 8 sessions to accumulate not less than the number of 9 minutes by which such sessions of 3 or more clock hours fall short of 5 clock hours. Any full days used for 10 the 11 purposes of this paragraph shall not be considered for computing average daily attendance. Days scheduled for 12 13 in-service training programs, staff development parent-teacher conferences 14 activities, or may be scheduled separately for different grade levels 15 and 16 different attendance centers of the district.

(e) A session of not less than one clock hour of teaching hospitalized or homebound pupils on-site or by telephone to the classroom may be counted as 1/2 day of attendance, however these pupils must receive 4 or more clock hours of instruction to be counted for a full day of attendance.

(f) A session of at least 4 clock hours may be
counted as a day of attendance for first grade pupils,
and pupils in full day kindergartens, and a session of 2
or more hours may be counted as 1/2 day of attendance by
pupils in kindergartens which provide only 1/2 day of
attendance.

(g) For children with disabilities who are below the age of 6 years and who cannot attend 2 or more clock hours because of their disability or immaturity, a session of not less than one clock hour may be counted as 1/2 day of attendance; however for such children whose educational needs so require a session of 4 or more clock 1

hours may be counted as a full day of attendance.

2 (h) A recognized kindergarten which provides for only 1/2 day of attendance by each pupil shall not have 3 4 more than 1/2 day of attendance counted in any one day. However, kindergartens may count 2 1/2 days of attendance 5 in any 5 consecutive school days. When a pupil attends 6 7 such a kindergarten for 2 half days on any one school day, the pupil shall have the following day as a day 8 9 absent from school, unless the school district obtains permission in writing from the State Superintendent of 10 11 Education. Attendance at kindergartens which provide for a full day of attendance by each pupil shall be counted 12 the same as attendance by first grade pupils. Only the 13 first year of attendance in one kindergarten shall be 14 15 counted, except in case of children who entered the 16 kindergarten in their fifth year whose educational development requires a second year of kindergarten as 17 determined under the rules and regulations of the State 18 Board of Education. 19

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(G) Equalized Assessed Valuation Data.

21 (1) For purposes of the calculation of Available Local 22 Resources required pursuant to subsection (D), the State 23 Board of Education shall secure from the Department of Revenue the value as equalized or assessed by the Department 24 25 of Revenue of all taxable property of every school district, together with (i) the applicable tax rate used in extending 26 taxes for the funds of the district as of September 30 of the 27 28 previous year and (ii) the limiting rate for all school 29 districts subject to property tax extension limitations as imposed under the Property Tax Extension Limitation Law. 30

This equalized assessed valuation, as adjusted further by the requirements of this subsection, shall be utilized in the calculation of Available Local Resources.

34 (2) The equalized assessed valuation in paragraph (1)

1 shall be adjusted, as applicable, in the following manner:

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2 (a) For the purposes of calculating State aid under this Section, with respect to any part of a school 3 4 district within a redevelopment project area in respect which a municipality has adopted tax increment 5 to allocation financing pursuant to the Tax Increment 6 7 Allocation Redevelopment Act, Sections 11-74.4-1 through 8 11-74.4-11 of the Illinois Municipal Code or the 9 Industrial Jobs Recovery Law, Sections 11-74.6-1 through 11-74.6-50 of the Illinois Municipal Code, no part of the 10 11 current equalized assessed valuation of real property located in any such project area which is attributable to 12 increase above the total initial equalized assessed 13 an valuation of such property shall be used as part of 14 the equalized assessed valuation of the district, until such 15 16 time as all redevelopment project costs have been paid, as provided in Section 11-74.4-8 of the Tax Increment 17 Allocation Redevelopment Act or in Section 11-74.6-35 of 18 the Industrial Jobs Recovery Law. For the purpose of the 19 equalized assessed valuation of the district, the total 20 21 initial equalized assessed valuation or the current equalized assessed valuation, whichever is lower, shall 22 23 be used until such time as all redevelopment project costs have been paid. 24

The real property equalized assessed valuation 25 (b) for a school district shall be adjusted by subtracting 26 from the real property value as equalized or assessed by 27 Department of Revenue for the district an amount 28 the 29 computed by dividing the amount of any abatement of taxes 30 under Section 18-170 of the Property Tax Code by 3.00% for a district maintaining grades kindergarten through 31 12, by 2.30% for a district maintaining 32 grades kindergarten through 8, or by 1.05% for a district 33 maintaining grades 9 through 12 and adjusted by an amount 34

computed by dividing the amount of any abatement of taxes
 under subsection (a) of Section 18-165 of the Property
 Tax Code by the same percentage rates for district type
 as specified in this subparagraph (b).

5 (3) For the 1999-2000 school year and each school year 6 thereafter, if a school district meets all of the criteria of 7 this subsection (G)(3), the school district's Available Local 8 Resources shall be calculated under subsection (D) using the 9 district's Extension Limitation Equalized Assessed Valuation 10 as calculated under this subsection (G)(3).

For purposes of this subsection (G)(3) the following terms shall have the following meanings:

13 "Budget Year": The school year for which general 14 State aid is calculated and awarded under subsection (E). 15 "Base Tax Year": The property tax levy year used to 16 calculate the Budget Year allocation of general State

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aid.

18 "Preceding Tax Year": The property tax levy year
19 immediately preceding the Base Tax Year.

20 "Base Tax Year's Tax Extension": The product of the 21 equalized assessed valuation utilized by the County Clerk 22 in the Base Tax Year multiplied by the limiting rate as 23 calculated by the County Clerk and defined in the 24 Property Tax Extension Limitation Law.

25 "Preceding Tax Year's Tax Extension": The product of
26 the equalized assessed valuation utilized by the County
27 Clerk in the Preceding Tax Year multiplied by the
28 Operating Tax Rate as defined in subsection (A).

29 "Extension Limitation Ratio": A numerical ratio,
30 certified by the County Clerk, in which the numerator is
31 the Base Tax Year's Tax Extension and the denominator is
32 the Preceding Tax Year's Tax Extension.

33 "Operating Tax Rate": The operating tax rate as34 defined in subsection (A).

1 If a school district is subject to property tax extension 2 limitations as imposed under the Property Tax Extension Limitation Law, the State Board of Education shall calculate 3 4 the Extension Limitation Equalized Assessed Valuation of that 5 For the 1999-2000 school year, the Extension district. Limitation Equalized Assessed Valuation of a school district 6 7 as calculated by the State Board of Education shall be equal to the product of the district's 1996 Equalized Assessed 8 9 Valuation and the district's Extension Limitation Ratio. For the 2000-2001 school year and each school year thereafter, 10 11 the Extension Limitation Equalized Assessed Valuation of a school district as calculated by the State Board of Education 12 shall be equal to the product of the Equalized Assessed 13 Valuation last used in the calculation of general State 14 aid the district's Extension Limitation Ratio. 15 and Τf the 16 Extension Limitation Equalized Assessed Valuation of a school district as calculated under this subsection (G)(3) is less 17 than the district's equalized assessed valuation as 18 calculated pursuant to subsections (G)(1) and (G)(2), then 19 for purposes of calculating the district's general State aid 20 21 for the Budget Year pursuant to subsection (E), that 22 Extension Limitation Equalized Assessed Valuation shall be utilized to calculate the district's Available 23 Local Resources under subsection (D). 24

25 (4) For the purposes of calculating general State aid for the 1999-2000 school year only, if a school district 26 triennial reassessment on the equalized 27 experienced а assessed valuation used in calculating its general State 28 financial aid apportionment for the 1998-1999 school year, 29 30 the State Board of Education shall calculate the Extension Limitation Equalized Assessed Valuation that would have been 31 used to calculate the district's 1998-1999 general State aid. 32 This amount shall equal the product of the equalized assessed 33 34 valuation used to calculate general State aid for the

1 1997-1998 school year and the district's Extension Limitation 2 If the Extension Limitation Equalized Assessed Ratio. Valuation of the school district as calculated under this 3 paragraph (4) is less than the district's equalized assessed 4 5 valuation utilized in calculating the district's 1998-1999 б general State aid allocation, then for purposes of 7 calculating the district's general State aid pursuant to paragraph (5) of subsection (E), that Extension Limitation 8 9 Equalized Assessed Valuation shall be utilized to calculate 10 the district's Available Local Resources.

11 (5) For school districts having a majority of their equalized assessed valuation in any county except Cook, 12 DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry, or Will, if the amount of 13 general State aid allocated to the school district for the 14 1999-2000 school year under the provisions of subsection (E), 15 16 (H), and (J) of this Section is less than the amount of general State aid allocated to the district for the 1998-1999 17 18 school year under these subsections, then the general State 19 aid of the district for the 1999-2000 school year only shall be increased by the difference between these amounts. 20 The 21 total payments made under this paragraph (5) shall not exceed \$14,000,000. Claims shall be prorated if they 22 exceed 23 \$14,000,000.

24 (H) Supplemental General State Aid.

In addition to the general State aid a school 25 (1)district is allotted pursuant to subsection (E) of this 26 Section, qualifying school districts shall receive a grant, 27 28 paid in conjunction with a district's payments of general State aid, for supplemental general State aid based upon the 29 30 concentration level of children from low-income households within the school district. Supplemental State aid grants 31 provided for school districts under this subsection shall be 32 33 appropriated for distribution to school districts as part of the same line item in which the general State financial aid 34

1 of school districts is appropriated under this Section. For 2 of this subsection, the term purposes "Low-Income Concentration Level" shall be the low-income eligible pupil 3 4 count from the most recently available federal census divided by the Average Daily Attendance of the school district. If, 5 б however, (i) the percentage decrease from the 2 most recent 7 federal censuses in the low-income eligible pupil count of a high school district with fewer than 400 students exceeds by 8 9 75% or more the percentage change in the total low-income eligible pupil count of contiguous 10 elementary school 11 districts, whose boundaries are coterminous with the high school district, or (ii) a high school district within 2 12 counties and serving 5 elementary school districts, whose 13 boundaries are coterminous with the high school district, has 14 a percentage decrease from the 2 most recent federal censuses 15 16 in the low-income eligible pupil count and there is a percentage increase in the total low-income eligible pupil 17 count of a majority of the elementary school districts in 18 19 excess of 50% from the 2 most recent federal censuses, then the high school district's low-income eligible pupil count 20 21 from the earlier federal census shall be the number used as 22 the low-income eligible pupil count for the high school 23 district, for purposes of this subsection (H). The changes made to this paragraph (1) by Public Act 92-28 shall apply to 24 25 supplemental general State aid grants paid in fiscal year 1999 and in each fiscal year thereafter and to any State aid 26 payments made in fiscal year 1994 through fiscal year 27 1998 pursuant to subsection 1(n) of Section 18-8 of this Code 28 (which was repealed on July 1, 1998), and any high school 29 30 district that is affected by Public Act 92-28 is entitled to a recomputation of its supplemental general State aid grant 31 32 State aid paid in any of those fiscal years. or This 33 recomputation shall not be affected by any other funding. (2) Supplemental general State aid pursuant to this 34

subsection (H) shall be provided as follows for the
 1998-1999, 1999-2000, and 2000-2001 school years only:

3 (a) For any school district with a Low Income
4 Concentration Level of at least 20% and less than 35%,
5 the grant for any school year shall be \$800 multiplied by
6 the low income eligible pupil count.

8 Concentration Level of at least 35% and less than 50%,
9 the grant for the 1998-1999 school year shall be \$1,100
10 multiplied by the low income eligible pupil count.

11 (c) For any school district with a Low Income 12 Concentration Level of at least 50% and less than 60%, 13 the grant for the 1998-99 school year shall be \$1,500 14 multiplied by the low income eligible pupil count.

15 (d) For any school district with a Low Income
16 Concentration Level of 60% or more, the grant for the
17 1998-99 school year shall be \$1,900 multiplied by the low
18 income eligible pupil count.

19 (e) For the 1999-2000 school year, the per pupil 20 amount specified in subparagraphs (b), (c), and (d) 21 immediately above shall be increased to \$1,243, \$1,600, 22 and \$2,000, respectively.

(f) For the 2000-2001 school year, the per pupil amounts specified in subparagraphs (b), (c), and (d) immediately above shall be \$1,273, \$1,640, and \$2,050, respectively.

27 (2.5) Supplemental general State aid pursuant to this
28 subsection (H) shall be provided as follows for the 2002-2003
29 school year and each school year thereafter:

30 (a) For any school district with a Low Income
31 Concentration Level of less than 10%, the grant for each
32 school year shall be \$355 multiplied by the low income
33 eligible pupil count.

34 (b) For any school district with a Low Income

Concentration Level of at least 10% and less than 20%,
 the grant for each school year shall be \$675 multiplied
 by the low income eligible pupil count.

4 (c) For any school district with a Low Income
5 Concentration Level of at least 20% and less than 35%,
6 the grant for each school year shall be \$1,330 multiplied
7 by the low income eligible pupil count.

8 (d) For any school district with a Low Income 9 Concentration Level of at least 35% and less than 50%, 10 the grant for each school year shall be \$1,362 multiplied 11 by the low income eligible pupil count.

12 (e) For any school district with a Low Income
13 Concentration Level of at least 50% and less than 60%,
14 the grant for each school year shall be \$1,680 multiplied
15 by the low income eligible pupil count.

16 (f) For any school district with a Low Income 17 Concentration Level of 60% or more, the grant for each 18 school year shall be \$2,080 multiplied by the low income 19 eligible pupil count.

(3) School districts with an Average Daily Attendance of 20 21 more than 1,000 and less than 50,000 that qualify for 22 supplemental general State aid pursuant to this subsection 23 shall submit a plan to the State Board of Education prior to October 30 of each year for the use of the funds resulting 24 25 from this grant of supplemental general State aid for the improvement of instruction in which priority is given to 26 meeting the education needs of disadvantaged children. 27 Such shall be submitted in accordance with rules and 28 plan regulations promulgated by the State Board of Education. 29

30 (4) School districts with an Average Daily Attendance of 31 50,000 or more that qualify for supplemental general State 32 aid pursuant to this subsection shall be required to 33 distribute from funds available pursuant to this Section, no 34 less than \$261,000,000 in accordance with the following 1 requirements:

2 (a) The required amounts shall be distributed to 3 the attendance centers within the district in proportion 4 to the number of pupils enrolled at each attendance 5 center who are eligible to receive free or reduced-price 6 lunches or breakfasts under the federal Child Nutrition 7 Act of 1966 and under the National School Lunch Act 8 during the immediately preceding school year.

9 (b) The distribution of these portions of supplemental and general State aid among attendance 10 11 centers according to these requirements shall not be compensated for or contravened by adjustments of the 12 total of other funds appropriated to any attendance 13 centers, and the Board of Education shall utilize funding 14 15 from one or several sources in order to fully implement 16 this provision annually prior to the opening of school.

(c) Each attendance center shall be provided by the 17 school district a distribution of noncategorical funds 18 and other categorical funds to which an attendance center 19 is entitled under law in order that the general State aid 20 State aid provided by 21 and supplemental general 22 application of this subsection supplements rather than 23 supplants the noncategorical funds and other categorical funds provided by the school district to the attendance 24 25 centers.

(d) Any funds made available under this subsection
that by reason of the provisions of this subsection are
not required to be allocated and provided to attendance
centers may be used and appropriated by the board of the
district for any lawful school purpose.

31 (e) Funds received by an attendance center pursuant 32 to this subsection shall be used by the attendance center 33 at the discretion of the principal and local school 34 council for programs to improve educational opportunities 1 at qualifying schools through the following programs and 2 services: early childhood education, reduced class size or improved adult to student classroom ratio, enrichment 3 4 programs, remedial assistance, attendance improvement, and other educationally beneficial expenditures which 5 supplement the regular and basic programs as determined 6 7 by the State Board of Education. Funds provided shall not 8 be expended for any political or lobbying purposes as 9 defined by board rule.

(f) Each district subject to the provisions of this 10 11 subdivision (H)(4) shall submit an acceptable plan to meet the educational needs of disadvantaged children, in 12 compliance with the requirements of this paragraph, to 13 the State Board of Education prior to July 15 of each 14 15 year. This plan shall be consistent with the decisions of 16 local school councils concerning the school expenditure plans developed in accordance with part 4 of Section 17 34-2.3. The State Board shall approve or reject the plan 18 within 60 days after its submission. If the plan is 19 rejected, the district shall give written notice of 20 21 intent to modify the plan within 15 days of the 22 notification of rejection and then submit a modified plan within 30 days after the date of the written notice of 23 intent to modify. Districts may amend approved plans 24 pursuant to rules promulgated by the State Board of 25 Education. 26

Upon notification by the State Board of Education that the district has not submitted a plan prior to July for a modified plan within the time period specified herein, the State aid funds affected by that plan or modified plan shall be withheld by the State Board of Education until a plan or modified plan is submitted.

33 If the district fails to distribute State aid to34 attendance centers in accordance with an approved plan,

the plan for the following year shall allocate funds, in addition to the funds otherwise required by this subsection, to those attendance centers which were underfunded during the previous year in amounts equal to such underfunding.

For purposes of determining compliance with this 6 7 subsection in relation to the requirements of attendance center funding, each district subject to the provisions 8 9 of this subsection shall submit as a separate document by December 1 of each year a report of expenditure data for 10 11 the prior year in addition to any modification of its current plan. If it is determined that there has been a 12 failure to comply with the expenditure provisions of this 13 subsection regarding contravention or supplanting, 14 the 15 State Superintendent of Education shall, within 60 days 16 of receipt of the report, notify the district and any affected local school council. The district shall within 17 45 days of receipt of that notification inform the State 18 Superintendent of Education of the remedial or corrective 19 20 action to be taken, whether by amendment of the current 21 plan, if feasible, or by adjustment in the plan for the 22 following year. Failure to provide the expenditure 23 report or the notification of remedial or corrective action in a timely manner shall result in a withholding 24 of the affected funds. 25

The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules and regulations to implement the provisions of this subsection. No funds shall be released under this subdivision (H)(4) to any district that has not submitted a plan that has been approved by the State Board of Education.

(I) General State Aid for Newly Configured School Districts.
 (1) For a new school district formed by combining
 property included totally within 2 or more previously

1 existing school districts, for its first year of existence 2 the general State aid and supplemental general State aid calculated under this Section shall be computed for the new 3 4 district and for the previously existing districts for which property is totally included within the new district. 5 If the computation on the basis of the previously existing districts 6 7 is greater, a supplementary payment equal to the difference shall be made for the first 4 years of existence of the new 8 9 district.

(2) For a school district which annexes all of 10 the 11 territory of one or more entire other school districts, for the first year during which the change of 12 boundaries attributable to such annexation becomes effective for all 13 purposes as determined under Section 7-9 or 7A-8, the general 14 15 State aid and supplemental general State aid calculated under 16 this Section shall be computed for the annexing district as constituted after the annexation and for the annexing and 17 each annexed district as constituted prior to the annexation; 18 and if the computation on the basis of the annexing and 19 annexed districts as constituted prior to the annexation is 20 21 greater, a supplementary payment equal to the difference shall be made for the first 4 years of existence of the 22 23 annexing school district as constituted upon such annexation.

For 2 or more school districts which annex all 24 (3) of 25 the territory of one or more entire other school districts, and for 2 or more community unit districts which result upon 26 the division (pursuant to petition under Section 11A-2) of 27 one or more other unit school districts into 2 or more parts 28 and which together include all of the parts into which such 29 30 other unit school district or districts are so divided, for first year during which the change of boundaries 31 the attributable to such annexation or division becomes effective 32 for all purposes as determined under Section 7-9 or 11A-10, 33 34 the case may be, the general State aid and supplemental as

general State aid calculated under this Section shall 1 be for 2 each annexing or resulting district as computed constituted after the annexation or division and for each 3 4 annexing and annexed district, or for each resulting and divided district, as constituted prior to the annexation or 5 division; and if the aggregate of the general State aid and 6 7 supplemental general State aid as so computed for the 8 annexing or resulting districts as constituted after the 9 annexation or division is less than the aggregate of the 10 general State aid and supplemental general State aid as SO 11 computed for the annexing and annexed districts, or for the resulting and divided districts, as constituted prior to the 12 13 annexation or division, then a supplementary payment equal to the difference shall be made and allocated between or among 14 15 the annexing or resulting districts, as constituted upon such 16 annexation or division, for the first 4 years of their The total difference payment shall be allocated 17 existence. between or among the annexing or resulting districts 18 in the same ratio as the pupil enrollment from that portion of the 19 annexed or divided district or districts which is annexed to 20 21 or included in each such annexing or resulting district bears 22 to the total pupil enrollment from the entire annexed or 23 divided district or districts, as such pupil enrollment is determined for the school year last ending prior to the date 24 25 when the change of boundaries attributable to the annexation or division becomes effective for all purposes. The amount 26 27 of the total difference payment and the amount thereof to be allocated to the annexing or resulting districts shall be 28 29 computed by the State Board of Education on the basis of 30 pupil enrollment and other data which shall be certified to the State Board of Education, on forms which it shall provide 31 for that purpose, by the regional superintendent of schools 32 33 for each educational service region in which the annexing and 34 annexed districts, or resulting and divided districts are

1 located.

2 (3.5) Claims for financial assistance under this
3 subsection (I) shall not be recomputed except as expressly
4 provided under this Section.

5 (4) Any supplementary payment made under this subsection 6 (I) shall be treated as separate from all other payments made 7 pursuant to this Section.

8 (J) Supplementary Grants in Aid.

(1) Notwithstanding any other provisions 9 of this Section, the amount of the aggregate general State aid in 10 11 combination with supplemental general State aid under this 12 Section for which each school district is eligible shall be no less than the amount of the aggregate general State aid 13 14 entitlement that was received by the district under Section 18-8 (exclusive of amounts received under subsections 5(p) 15 and 5(p-5) of that Section) for the 1997-98 school year, 16 pursuant to the provisions of that Section as it was then in 17 18 effect. If a school district qualifies to receive a 19 supplementary payment made under this subsection (J), the amount of the aggregate general State aid in combination with 20 21 supplemental general State aid under this Section which that district is eligible to receive for each school year shall be 22 23 no less than the amount of the aggregate general State aid 24 entitlement that was received by the district under Section 18-8 (exclusive of amounts received under subsections 5(p) 25 and 5(p-5) of that Section) for the 1997-1998 school year, 26 pursuant to the provisions of that Section as it was then in 27 28 effect.

(2) If, as provided in paragraph (1) of this subsection (J), a school district is to receive aggregate general State aid in combination with supplemental general State aid under this Section for the 1998-99 school year and any subsequent school year that in any such school year is less than the amount of the aggregate general State aid entitlement that the district received for the 1997-98 school year, the school district shall also receive, from a separate appropriation made for purposes of this subsection (J), a supplementary payment that is equal to the amount of the difference in the aggregate State aid figures as described in paragraph (1).

7 (K) Grants to Laboratory and Alternative Schools.

8 In calculating the amount to be paid to the governing 9 board of a public university that operates a laboratory 10 school under this Section or to any alternative school that 11 is operated by a regional superintendent of schools, the 12 State Board of Education shall require by rule such reporting 13 requirements as it deems necessary.

14 As used in this Section, "laboratory school" means a public school which is created and operated by a public 15 university and approved by the State Board of Education. The 16 governing board of a public university which receives funds 17 18 from the State Board under this subsection (K) may not 19 increase the number of students enrolled in its laboratory school from a single district, if that district is already 20 21 sending 50 or more students, except under a mutual agreement between the school board of a student's district of residence 22 23 and the university which operates the laboratory school. A laboratory school may not have more than 1,000 students, 24 25 excluding students with disabilities in a special education 26 program.

As used in this Section, "alternative school" means 27 а 28 public school which is created and operated by a Regional Superintendent of Schools and approved by the State Board of 29 Education. Such alternative schools may offer courses of 30 instruction for which credit is given in regular 31 school 32 programs, courses to prepare students for the high school 33 equivalency testing program or vocational and occupational 34 training. A regional superintendent of schools may contract 1 with a school district or a public community college district 2 to operate an alternative school. An alternative school serving more than one educational service region may be 3 4 established by the regional superintendents of schools of the 5 affected educational service regions. An alternative school б serving more than one educational service region may be 7 operated under such terms as the regional superintendents of schools of those educational service regions may agree. 8

9 Each laboratory and alternative school shall file, on forms provided by the State Superintendent of Education, an 10 11 annual State aid claim which states the Average Daily Attendance of the school's students by month. 12 The best 3 months' Average Daily Attendance shall be computed for each 13 school. The general State aid entitlement shall be 14 computed 15 by multiplying the applicable Average Daily Attendance by the 16 Foundation Level as determined under this Section.

17 (L) Payments, Additional Grants in Aid and Other18 Requirements.

19 For a school district operating under the financial (1) supervision of an Authority created under Article 34A, 20 the 21 general State aid otherwise payable to that district under 22 this Section, but not the supplemental general State aid, 23 shall be reduced by an amount equal to the budget for the operations of the Authority as certified by the Authority to 24 the State Board of Education, and an amount equal to such 25 reduction shall be paid to the Authority created for such 26 district for its operating expenses in the manner provided in 27 28 Section 18-11. The remainder of general State school aid for any such district shall be paid in accordance with Article 29 34A when that Article provides for a disposition other than 30 that provided by this Article. 31

32 (2) (Blank).

33 (3) Summer school. Summer school payments shall be made34 as provided in Section 18-4.3.

(M) Education Funding Advisory Board.

2 The Education Funding Advisory Board, hereinafter in this subsection (M) referred to as the "Board", is hereby created. 3 4 The Board shall consist of 5 members who are appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. 5 б The members appointed shall include representatives of 7 education, business, and the general public. One of the members so appointed shall be designated by the Governor 8 at 9 the time the appointment is made as the chairperson of the Board. The initial members of the Board may be appointed any 10 11 time after the effective date of this amendatory Act of 1997. The regular term of each member of the Board shall be for 4 12 years from the third Monday of January of the year in which 13 the term of the member's appointment is to commence, except 14 15 that of the 5 initial members appointed to serve on the 16 Board, the member who is appointed as the chairperson shall serve for a term that commences on the date of his or her 17 appointment and expires on the third Monday of January, 2002, 18 19 and the remaining 4 members, by lots drawn at the first meeting of the Board that is held after all 5 members are 20 21 appointed, shall determine 2 of their number to serve for 22 terms that commence on the date of their respective 23 appointments and expire on the third Monday of January, 2001, and 2 of their number to serve for terms that commence on the 24 25 date of their respective appointments and expire on the third Monday of January, 2000. All members appointed to serve on 26 the Board shall serve until their respective successors are 27 appointed and confirmed. Vacancies shall be filled in the 28 29 same manner as original appointments. If a vacancy in 30 membership occurs at a time when the Senate is not in session, the Governor shall make a temporary appointment 31 32 until the next meeting of the Senate, when he or she shall appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a 33 person to fill that membership for the unexpired term. If 34

1 the Senate is not in session when the initial appointments 2 are made, those appointments shall be made as in the case of 3 vacancies.

4 The Education Funding Advisory Board shall be deemed and the initial members appointed by the 5 established, Governor to serve as members of the Board shall take office, 6 7 on the date that the Governor makes his or her appointment of the fifth initial member of the Board, whether those initial 8 9 members are then serving pursuant to appointment and confirmation or pursuant to temporary appointments that are 10 11 made by the Governor as in the case of vacancies.

12 The State Board of Education shall provide such staff 13 assistance to the Education Funding Advisory Board as is 14 reasonably required for the proper performance by the Board 15 of its responsibilities.

16 For school years after the 2000-2001 school year, the Education Funding Advisory Board, in consultation with the 17 State Board of Education, shall make recommendations as 18 19 provided in this subsection (M) to the General Assembly for the foundation level under subdivision (B)(3) of this Section 20 21 and for the supplemental general State aid grant level under 22 subsection (H) of this Section for districts with high 23 concentrations of children from poverty. The recommended foundation level shall be determined based on a methodology 24 25 incorporates the basic education expenditures of which low-spending schools exhibiting high academic performance. 26 27 The Education Funding Advisory Board shall make such recommendations to the General Assembly on January 1 of odd 28 29 numbered years, beginning January 1, 2001.
