AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,represented in the General Assembly:

4 Section 5. The School Code is amended by adding Article 5 21A as follows:

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(105 ILCS 5/Art. 21A heading new)

7 ARTICLE 21A. NEW TEACHER INDUCTION AND MENTORING

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(105 ILCS 5/21A-5 new)

9 <u>Sec. 21A-5. Findings and declarations. The General</u>
 10 <u>Assembly finds and declares all of the following:</u>

(1) The revised system of teacher certification 11 12 established under subsection (g) of Section 21-1a of this Code recognizes that the first years of teaching are 13 particularly critical to a teacher's professional 14 15 development and that teachers who hold Initial Teaching Certificates need to develop their knowledge, skills, and 16 abilities before being issued Standard Teaching 17 18 Certificates.

19 (2) When new teachers are provided with focused 20 professional development opportunities and support and 21 guidance from experienced teachers, a process known as 22 induction and mentoring, the new teachers more quickly 23 and effectively develop the knowledge, skills, and 24 abilities expected of teachers holding Standard Teaching 25 Certificates.

26 (3) To be effective, induction and mentoring
27 programs must be designed to enhance the knowledge,
28 skills, and abilities described in the Illinois
29 Professional Teaching Standards and content area
30 standards. These programs must be based on research and

best practices, targeted toward a set of clearly defined purposes, and must include mentoring, continuing support and professional development, and regular opportunities for formative assessment of a new teacher.

5 <u>(4) In authorizing induction and mentoring</u> 6 programs, it is the intent of the General Assembly to 7 create programs to maximize the development of the 8 knowledge, skills, and abilities of teachers who hold 9 Initial Teaching Certificates and to provide adequate 10 funding for these programs.

12 <u>Sec. 21A-10.</u> Definitions. In this Article:

13 <u>"New teacher" means the holder of an Initial Teaching</u> 14 <u>Certificate, as set forth in Section 21-2 of this Code, who</u> 15 <u>is employed by a public school and who has not previously</u> 16 <u>participated in a new teacher induction and mentoring program</u> 17 <u>required by this Article, except as provided in Section</u> 18 <u>21A-30 of this Code.</u>

19 <u>"Public school" means any school operating pursuant to</u> 20 <u>the authority of this Code, including without limitation a</u> 21 <u>school district, a charter school, a cooperative or joint</u> 22 <u>agreement with a governing body or board of control, and a</u> 23 <u>school operated by a regional office of education.</u>

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(105 ILCS 5/21A-15 new)

Sec. 21A-15. Development of program required. During 25 the 2003-2004 school year, each public school or 2 or more 26 27 public schools acting jointly shall develop, in conjunction with its exclusive representative or their exclusive 28 representatives, if any, a new teacher induction and 29 30 mentoring program to assist new teachers in developing the skills and strategies necessary for instructional excellence, 31 32 provided that funding is made available by the State Board of -3- LRB093 10796 NHT 11227 b

1 Education from an appropriation made for this purpose.

3	Sec. 21A-20. When program is to be established and
4	implemented. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this
5	<u>Code, by the beginning of the 2004-2005 school year, each</u>
б	public school or 2 or more public schools acting jointly
7	shall establish and implement, in conjunction with its
8	exclusive representative or their exclusive representatives,
9	if any, the new teacher induction and mentoring program as
10	set forth in this Article, provided that funding is made
11	available by the State Board of Education, from an
12	appropriation made for this purpose, as described in Section
13	21A-30 of this Code. A public school may contract with an
14	institution of higher education or other independent party to
15	assist in implementing the program.
16	(105 ILCS 5/21A-25 new)
17	Sec. 21A-25. Program requirements. Each new teacher
18	induction and mentoring program must be based on a plan that
19	at least does all of the following:
20	(1) Assigns a mentor teacher to each new teacher
21	for a period of time established by the public school,
22	which must be for a period of at least 2 school years.
23	(2) Aligns with the Illinois Professional Teaching
24	Standards, content area standards, and applicable local
25	school improvement and professional development plans, if
26	any.
27	(3) Addresses all of the following elements and how
28	they will be provided:
29	(A) Mentoring of the new teacher.
30	(B) Professional development specifically
31	designed to ensure the growth of the new teacher's
32	knowledge and skills.

1(C) Formative assessment designed to ensure2feedback and reflection, which must not be used in3any evaluation of the new teacher.4(4) Describes the role of mentor teachers, the5criteria and process for their selection, and how they6will be trained, provided that each mentor teacher shall7demonstrate the best practices in teaching his or her

8 respective field of practice. A mentor teacher may not 9 directly or indirectly participate in the evaluation of a 10 new teacher pursuant to Article 24A of this Code or the 11 evaluation procedure of the public school.

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(105 ILCS 5/21A-30 new)

Sec. 21A-30. Funding. From a separate appropriation made for the purposes of this Article, for each new teacher participating in a new teacher induction and mentoring program, the State Board of Education shall pay the public school \$1,200 annually for each of 2 school years for the purpose of providing one or more of the following:

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(1) Mentor teacher compensation.

(3) Release time.

20(2) Mentor teacher training or new teacher training21or both.

However, if a new teacher, after participating in the new 23 24 teacher induction and mentoring program for one school year, 25 becomes employed by another public school, the State Board of Education shall pay the teacher's new school \$1,200 for the 26 second school year and the teacher shall continue to be a 27 new teacher as defined in this Article. Each public school 28 shall determine, in conjunction with its exclusive 29 representative, if any, how the \$1,200 per school year for 30 each new teacher shall be used, provided that if a mentor 31 32 teacher receives additional release time to support a new teacher, the total workload of other teachers regularly 33

employed by the public school shall not increase in any substantial manner. The State Board of Education may retain up to \$1,000,000 of the appropriation for new teacher induction and mentoring programs to train mentor teachers, administrators, and other personnel, to provide best practices information, and to conduct an evaluation of these programs' impact and effectiveness.

8 (105 ILCS 5/21A-35 new)

9 Sec. 21A-35. Evaluation of programs. The State Board of 10 Education and the State Teacher Certification Board shall 11 jointly contract with an independent party to conduct a comprehensive evaluation of new teacher induction and 12 mentoring programs established pursuant to this Article. The 13 first report of this evaluation shall be presented to the 14 General Assembly on or before January 1, 2009. Subsequent 15 evaluations shall be conducted and reports presented to the 16 General Assembly on or before January 1 of every third year 17 thereafter. 18

20 <u>Sec. 21A-40. Rules. The State Board of Education, in</u> 21 <u>consultation with the State Teacher Certification Board,</u> 22 <u>shall adopt rules for the implementation of this Article.</u>
