

## 94TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY State of Illinois 2005 and 2006 HB0820

## SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

40 ILCS 5/6-127.5 new

40 ILCS 5/6-209.2 new

40 ILCS 5/14-105.8 new

30 ILCS 805/8.29 new

Amends the Chicago Firefighter Article of the Illinois Pension Code. Provides an alternative payment option, under which a qualifying member may convert up to 3 years of service credit into a lump sum payment at the time of retirement. Authorizes transfer of service credits earned for employment in the Office of the State Fire Marshal from the State Employee Retirement System to the Fund. Amends the State Mandates Act to require implementation without reimbursement. Effective immediately.

## Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Illinois Pension Code is amended by adding Sections 6-127.5, 6-209.2, and 14-105.8 as follows:
- 6 (40 ILCS 5/6-127.5 new)
- 7 Sec. 6-127.5. Alternative payment option.
- 8 (a) This Section applies only to a fireman who (i) has at
- 9 <u>least 23 years of creditable service</u>, (ii) has attained age 50,
- and (iii) withdraws from service on or after the effective date
- of this Section.
- 12 (b) A qualifying fireman may elect, at the time of applying
- for an age and service annuity under this Article, to receive a
- 14 <u>lump sum payment at the time of retirement, in exchange for</u>
- which he or she agrees to forfeit one, 2, or 3 years of service
- 16 <u>credit. The lump sum payment shall be an amount equal to 30% of</u>
- the average salary used in the calculation of the fireman's age
- and service annuity, multiplied by the number of years of
- 19 service credit that the fireman has elected to forfeit.
- 20 (c) Service credit forfeited under this Section shall not
- 21 <u>be included in the calculation of the fireman's age and service</u>
- 22 annuity, nor used for any other purpose. Contributions relating
- 23 to the forfeited service credit are not refundable.
- 24 (d) Election of the alternative payment option under this
- 25 <u>Section becomes irrevocable upon receipt of the lump sum</u>
- 26 payment.
- 27 (40 ILCS 5/6-209.2 new)
- Sec. 6-209.2. Credit for certain State Fire Marshal
- 29 Service. Service credits transferred to this Fund under Section
- 30 14-105.8 of this Code shall be included in the computation of
- 31 service for annuity purposes under this Article, provided that

1	the	sums	to	be	transferred	to	the	Fund	under	that	Section	have
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- been received by the Fund.
- 3 (40 ILCS 5/14-105.8 new)
- 4 Sec. 14-105.8. Transfer to Article 6 fund. A member of
- 5 this System who has at least 20 years of service credit in the
- 6 Article 6 fund may apply for transfer to the Article 6 fund of
- 7 <u>his or her creditable service in this System for service as an</u>
- 8 <u>employee of the Office of the State Fire Marshal. Such</u>
- 9 <u>creditable service shall be transferred forthwith. Payment by</u>
- 10 this System to the Article 6 fund shall be made at the same
- 11 <u>time and shall consist of:</u>
- 12 (1) the amounts accumulated to the credit of the
- applicant for that service, including regular interest, on
- the books of the System on the date of transfer; and
- 15 (2) an amount representing employer contributions,
- equal to the amount determined under item (1).
- 17 Participation in this System as to the credits transferred
- under this Section shall terminate on the date of transfer.
- 19 Section 90. The State Mandates Act is amended by adding
- 20 Section 8.29 as follows:
- 21 (30 ILCS 805/8.29 new)
- Sec. 8.29. Exempt mandate. Notwithstanding Sections 6 and 8
- of this Act, no reimbursement by the State is required for the
- 24 implementation of any mandate created by this amendatory Act of
- 25 <u>the 94th General Assembly.</u>
- Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon
- 27 becoming law.
