HOUSE RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, After going 10 and 2 in the 2003 season and a bowl game invitation, the Northern Illinois University Huskies finished the 2004 season with an overall record of 9 and 3, including a "stormy" December 30, 2004, win over Troy University in the Silicon Valley Football Classic by the score of 34 to 21; during the game, which was one of the most complete team victories ever played, quarterback Josh Haldi passed for 146 yards and ran for two touchdowns, running back Garrett Wolfe rushed for his 21st touchdown, running back A.J. Harris rushed for an additional 120 yards and another touchdown, and kicker Chris Nendick added two field goals for insurance; furthermore, the Huskies defense was able to shut down the Troy offense so effectively after they had scored two touchdowns in the first quarter of play that the Trojans looked as if they were "stuck in the mud" as they were not able to score until there was only 10:55 remaining in the fourth quarter; and

WHEREAS, For the first time in school history, Northern Illinois University football has cracked the major-college Top 30 barrier in back-to-back seasons; in the 2003 season, the Huskies wound up at number 26 in the ESPN/USA Today ranking and 29th in the AP polls; at the conclusion of the 2004 season, the NIU Huskies finished 29th in both the final Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today national rankings that were released on January 6, 2005; by reaching the Silicon Valley Football Classic, NIU made its initial bowl appearance in 21 years since California Bowl III, a 20 to 13 Huskies success versus Cal State University Fullerton of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association in 1983; and

WHEREAS, During 2004, Northern Illinois received votes for 14 of the 17 weeks in the ESPN/USA Today poll, reaching as high as number 22 on the week of November 9 through 15, 2004; in the

- 1 AP balloting, the Huskies earned votes 10 times during the
- 2 17-week season, going as high as 26th during the week of
- 3 November 2 through 8, 2004; and
- 4 WHEREAS, As evidence of the outstanding athletic program 5 that has been established by head coach Joe Novak, the Northern 6 Illinois University Huskies won a share of its third 7 Mid-American Conference West Division title (2001, 2002, and 8 2004) in the last four years; defeated GMAC Bowl champion 9 Bowling Green State University with a score of 34 to 17; plus 10 led the league in all-conference selections (12), loop players 11 of the week (10), all-MAC academic picks (five), and home attendance (27,052 spectators per game average); and 12
 - WHEREAS, During the 2003 season, the unbeaten Huskies (7-0) soared into the national limelight with triumphs over the University of Maryland, University of Alabama, and Iowa State University; Coach Novak's contingent ranked an unprecedented 10th in the first Bowl Championship Series standings, 12th in the AP, and 14th in the ESPN/USA Today at mid-season; furthermore, during the 2002 season, Northern Illinois posted an 8 and 4 record and received votes in both major polls for the first time since 1989; on November 18, 2002, the Huskies reached the number 35 spot in the AP poll and number 38 in the ESPN/USA Today version; and
- 24 WHEREAS, For the first time since the mid-1960s, Northern 25 Illinois has strung together five winning grid seasons (6 and 5 in 2000 and 2001, 8 and 4 in 2002, 10 and 2 in 2003, and 9 and 3 26 27 in 2004); historically, one has to go back to the highly 28 successful Howard Fletcher era to match such a Huskies streak 29 when (then) College Division Northern Illinois went 8 and 2 (1962), 10 and 0 (1963), 7 and 2 (1964), 9 and 1 (1965), and 8 30 and 2 (1966); therefore, be it 31
