- 12 Sec. 12-215. Oscillating, rotating or flashing lights on
- 13 motor vehicles. Except as otherwise provided in this Code:
- 14 (a) The use of red or white oscillating, rotating or
- 15 flashing lights, whether lighted or unlighted, is prohibited
- 16 except on:
- 17 1. Law enforcement vehicles of State, Federal or local
- 18 authorities;
- 19 2. A vehicle operated by a police officer or county
- coroner and designated or authorized by local authorities, 20
- 21 in writing, as a law enforcement vehicle; however, such
- 22 designation or authorization must be carried in the
- 23 vehicle;
- 24 2.1. A vehicle operated by a fire chief who has
- 25 completed an emergency vehicle operation training course

approved by the Office of the State Fire Marshal and					
designated or authorized by local authorities, in writing,

- 5. Tow trucks licensed in a state that requires such lights; furthermore, such lights shall not be lighted on any such tow truck while the tow truck is operating in the State of Illinois;
- 6. Vehicles of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency, vehicles of the Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal, vehicles of the Illinois Department of Public Health, and vehicles of the Illinois Department of Corrections, and vehicles of the Illinois Department of Juvenile Justice Nuclear Safety;
- 7. Vehicles operated by a local or county emergency management services agency as defined in the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act;

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- 8. School buses operating alternately flashing head lamps as permitted under Section 12-805 of this Code;
  - 9. Vehicles that are equipped and used exclusively as organ transplant vehicles when used in combination with oscillating, rotating, or flashing furthermore, these lights shall be lighted only when the transportation is declared an emergency by a member of the transplant team or а representative of the procurement organization; and
  - 10. Vehicles of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources that are used for mine rescue and explosives emergency response.
- (b) The use of amber oscillating, rotating or flashing lights, whether lighted or unlighted, is prohibited except on:
  - 1. Second division vehicles designed and used for towing or hoisting vehicles; furthermore, such lights shall not be lighted except as required in this paragraph 1; such lights shall be lighted when such vehicles are actually being used at the scene of an accident or disablement; if the towing vehicle is equipped with a flat bed that supports all wheels of the vehicle being transported, the lights shall not be lighted while the vehicle is engaged in towing on a highway; if the towing vehicle is not equipped with a flat bed that supports all wheels of a vehicle being transported, the lights shall be lighted while the towing vehicle is engaged in towing on a

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- 1 highway during all times when the use of headlights is required under Section 12-201 of this Code; 2
  - 2. Motor vehicles or equipment of the State of Illinois, local authorities and contractors; furthermore, such lights shall not be lighted except while such vehicles are engaged in maintenance or construction operations within the limits of construction projects;
  - 3. Vehicles or equipment used by engineering or survey crews; furthermore, such lights shall not be lighted except while such vehicles are actually engaged in work on a highway;
  - 4. Vehicles of public utilities, municipalities, or other construction, maintenance or automotive service vehicles except that such lights shall be lighted only as a means for indicating the presence of a vehicular traffic hazard requiring unusual care in approaching, overtaking or passing while such vehicles are engaged in maintenance, service or construction on a highway;
  - 5. Oversized vehicle or load; however, such lights shall only be lighted when moving under permit issued by the Department under Section 15-301 of this Code;
  - 6. The front and rear of motorized equipment owned and operated by the State of Illinois or any political subdivision thereof, which is designed and used for removal of snow and ice from highways;
    - (6.1) The front and rear of motorized equipment or

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vehicles that (i) are not owned by the State of Illinois or any political subdivision of the State, (ii) are designed and used for removal of snow and ice from highways and parking lots, and (iii) are equipped with a snow plow that is 12 feet in width; these lights may not be lighted except when the motorized equipment or vehicle is actually being used for those purposes on behalf of a unit of government;

- 7. Fleet safety vehicles registered in another state, furthermore, such lights shall not be lighted except as provided for in Section 12-212 of this Code;
- 8. Such other vehicles as may be authorized by local authorities;

- (c-1) In addition to the blue oscillating, rotating, or lights permitted under subsection flashing (c), notwithstanding subsection (a), a vehicle operated by a voluntary firefighter, a voluntary member of a rescue squad, or a member of a voluntary ambulance unit may be equipped with flashing white headlights and blue grill lights, which may be used only in responding to an emergency call or when parked or stationary at the scene of a fire, rescue call, ambulance call, or motor vehicle accident.

- 24 or other indicia of emergency vehicle authority within any

- wig-wags, red and blue LEDs, sirens, mounted or affixed devices 1
- or other equipment, markings or indicia of emergency vehicle 2

- 4 (b) A person found guilty of violating this Section is
- 5 quilty of a Class A misdemeanor.
- 6 (c) Oscillating, rotating, or flashing lights and any other
- equipment, markings, or indicia of emergency vehicle authority 7
- shall be seized by the law enforcement officer at the time of a 8
- 9 violation of this Section or of Section 12-215 or 12-609 of
- 10 this Code upon any legal search. The officer may seize the
- 11 vehicle containing the prohibited device or mechanism, and this
- device or mechanism shall be removed and held for evidentiary 12
- 13 purposes. When the device or mechanism is no longer needed for
- 14 evidence, the defendant may petition the court for the return

- Section 95. No acceleration or delay. Where this Act makes 18

- Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon 1
