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SUMMARY

The Illinois Department of Agriculture remains highly focused on its core mission of developing a well-regulated and equitable industry. With now a second cohort of 100% social equity licensees, we're proud to say that we have taken the first steps toward fulfilling the vision of the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act passed by the Legislature. The Department looks forward to working with these licensees over the next weeks and months as the industry grows and matures.

The Illinois Department of Agriculture is the lead regulator for a substantial portion of the cannabis industry in Illinois. Beginning with the 21 Cultivation Centers originally licensed under the Compassionate Use of Marijuana Act in 2015, the role of the Department has grown with passage of the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act in 2019 to include Craft Grow, Infuser, and Transportation licenses, as well as oversight of the Community College Cannabis Vocational Pilot Program.

The Department reorganized its cannabis regulation unit in September of 2020. Previously the Bureau of Medicinal Plants, the unit was expanded to the Division of Cannabis Regulation. The new Division contains two new bureaus: the Bureau of Licensing and Administration, which is responsible for issuing licenses, administering the Hemp Program, Agent Registration Cards, and other programs, and the Bureau of Inspections, which is responsible for the inspectors charged with ensuring a safe and healthy cannabis market in Illinois. There are also Division-level administrative staff.

In the time since the FY21 Annual Report, the Department has issued 362 licenses under the CRTA. This includes: 88 Craft Growers, 54 Infusers ,189 Transporters, and 10 approved Cannabis Community College Vocational Pilot Program participants.

Of the 48 Craft Grow Licenses in 2022, 42% (20) are majority Black-owned, 36% (17) are majority White-owned, 8% (4) are majority Hispanic-Owned, and 8% are owned by a partnership group. Six percent of awardees did not provide that information. One hundred percent of new licenses were issued to Social Equity Applicants.

Among the 2021 licensee cohort, 67% total reported being non-white. Regarding majority ownership, 98 applicants reported being Black owned, 19 Latinx, and 34 Black woman owned. From 2021 to 2022, the percentage of Black and Brown majority owned licensees increased from 43 to 46% of all total IDOA licenses.

These licensees now join those licensed by the Department last year to form the foundation of the legal cannabis industry in Illinois, and together will generate thousands of well-paying jobs across the state as they come online. Our team has remained highly focused on its core mission of developing a well-regulated and equitable industry. 



Summary

The Division of Cannabis Regulation Fund receives appropriations from the Cannabis Regulation Fund 912 and the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Fund 075. For FY21 and FY22, the Division of Cannabis Regulation received \$10,961,200.00 which included \$500,000.00 appropriated from the Industrial Hemp Fund 862.


FY2022 Expenditures

For Fiscal Year 2022 the Department was appropriated \$ 10,961,200 for staff and operational costs for the Adult-Use Cannabis program. Spending to date for FY22 as of 08/05/22 is \$ 5,249,092.22. Of this amount, \$ 1,916,190.95 has been spent from the 0075 Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Fund and \$ 3,332,901.27 from 0912 Cannabis Regulation Fund.

Cannabis Regulation Fund 0912





LEGISLATION, UPDATES, AND INITIATIVES

Summary of FY2022 Legislation

No significant legislation impacting the IDOA Cannabis Program.

Summary of FY2022 Initiatives

2022 saw a number of IDOA initiatives have come to fruition. In April, the Agency's digital badging system came online. This system allows for much faster and less labor-intensive approval of Agent Badges, and also comes at a significant cost-savings to the state, with an average of 77% reduction in freight costs since implementation.

The Department also completed a full translation of the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, Compassionate Use Act, and Industrial Hemp Act, as well as the associated Administrative Rules, into Spanish and posted them on its website.

The Department has continued to add appropriate staff to aid in the efficient regulation of this new industry, and to serve the 362 new licensees in addition to the existing 21 Cultivation Centers.
