Regional & Statewide Youth Advisory Boards

In FY23, Be Strong Families (BSF) partnered with the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services in ensuring compliance with the Youth Advisory Board Act (20 ILCS 527/) by:

- Supporting the convening and maintenance of:
 - a Statewide Youth Advisory Board; and
 - o regional youth advisory boards in the Cook and Northern regions of the state.
- Supporting each regional youth advisory board in working with the Department or its designee to determine how to best provide services to current and former youth in foster care living within their regions.
- Supporting the Statewide Youth Advisory Board in advising the Department and the General Assembly with respect to all matters involving or affecting current and former youth in foster care.

Through this program BSF partnered directly with the Statewide Youth Advisory Board members and DCFS to ensure the board met the responsibilities of the Youth Advisory Board act by:

- 1. Providing the Department and the General Assembly with the perspective of youth under the care of the Department:
- 2. Identifying, analyzing, and recommending solutions to any issues concerning adoption and guardianship and youth in foster care.
- 3. Reviewing and advising the Department on proposed or pending legislation, primarily as it concerns current and former youth in foster care; and
- 4. Reviewing and making recommendations on Department foster care and child welfare service delivery policies, guidelines, procedures, and training.

The Regional Youth Advisory boards and the Youth Advisory Affinity Groups each are scheduled to meet monthly, and the Statewide Youth Advisory Board meets five times throughout the year. The information below provides an overview of FY23 meetings convened:

Table A. Regional Youth Advisory Board Meeting Details

The Regional Youth Advisory Board is comprised of youth in care and former youth in care between the ages of 14 and 21. Youth come together to educate, advocate for, and empower all youth in care. Regional YAB meetings occur monthly across the state of Illinois. These meetings have uniformed agendas which includes welcome and introductions, an ice breaker, DCFS updates, youth issues and concerns, and youth leadership development trainings.

In FY23, a total of 98% of the convened meetings had youth participants in attendance. The chart below provides information on the number of youth attendees, the regions where the meetings took place, and the workshop topics covered each month. The RYAB meetings are also an opportunity for youth to focus on their identified initiatives and work to advance these efforts. This year, the board worked on permanency, contact with caseworker, and contact with siblings.

The purpose of the YAAG's is to organize and provide space, support, education, coaching and advocacy for Illinois youth in care that identify as or allies with the following communities: African American, Asian American, Latino, or LGBTQI+. YAAG meetings are statewide meetings and are held virtually using the online platform zoom.

In FY23, 71% of meetings convened had enthusiastic youth participants in attendance. The chart below highlights the engagement of young individuals in these meetings, providing valuable insights into the number of attendees and the overarching meeting objectives. While there is room for improvement in attendance rates among established groups, it is worth noting that the Asian American and Native American communities represent the smallest racial groups within the Illinois Child Welfare system.

FY23 Statewide Youth Advisory Board Accomplishments:

The Statewide Youth Advisory Board (SYAB) and the Youth Advisory Affinity Group (YAAG) have achieved significant accomplishments and highlights in FY23. Here are some of the noteworthy achievements:

- 1. Partnering with Florida's Youth Board: The SYAB collaborated with the Selfless Love Foundation from Florida to be a part of Foster Youth Voice Month, a campaign aimed at amplifying the voices of youth in care. Proclamation Signed by Governor Pritzker on October 14th, the official proclamation from Governor Pritzker was signed, officially declaring October as Foster Youth Voice Month in Illinois.
- 2. Youth Voice Panel: In celebration of Foster Youth Voice Month, SYAB organized a Foster Youth Voice Panel on October 19th via Zoom. This panel provided an opportunity for youth in care to

share their experiences and perspectives with child welfare staff, foster parents, and other youth.

- 3. Convening the Asian American Youth Advisory Affinity Group: The first official Asian American Youth Advisory Affinity Group was established, providing a platform for Asian American youth to address their unique needs and concerns in the child welfare system.
- 4. Successful Dual-Purpose Event: SYAB collaborated with the Statewide Foster Parent Advisory Council (SWFCAC) to host a dual-purpose event, celebrating foster parents during National Foster Parent Appreciation month, and addressing the needs of youth in care. Foster Change Foster Success Event (dual purpose event). The Youth Advisory Board successfully hosted the first Foster Change Foster Success event, aiming to tackle the lack of foster homes, break stigmas surrounding older youth placements, and address permanency concerns.
- 5. YAAG Ambassadors Projects: The first-ever YAAG Ambassadors completed three projects focused on tools to positively impact the child welfare system.

At the beginning of FY23, several officer positions were vacant across different regions. In Cook County, four out of five officer positions were filled, with the Secretary position being the only vacancy. The Northern and Southern regions had only one officer position filled, while Central Region had four vacancies, with only the Executive Team Leader position filled. During the second quarter, there were some changes in officer slates due to youth obtaining full-time jobs and relocating to new regions. Cook

County, Northern Region, and Southern Region each saw some officer positions being filled, but vacancies remained in Vice President, Secretary, and Executive Team Leader positions.

By the start of the third quarter, the officer vacancies remained largely the same, with slight progress in some regions. Cook County, Northern Region, Central Region, and Southern Region each had three officer positions filled, but key roles like Vice President, Secretary, and Executive Team Leader were still vacant in different regions.

In the fourth quarter, there was further progress in filling officer positions. Cook County ended with three positions filled, but vacancies in Vice President and Secretary positions persisted. The Northern Region also had three officer positions filled, with vacancies in Secretary and Executive Team Leader positions. Central Region had four positions filled, but the vacancy for Executive Team Leader remained. The Southern Region continued to have vacancies in all positions, except for Vice President.

Throughout the year, adult partners worked diligently on recruitment efforts, aiming to increase youth participation and fill regional officer vacancies. Additional youth expressed interest in filling officer positions, and more candidates ran for officer positions in different regions in FY24.

Overall, there were significant efforts made to address officer vacancies, and some regions saw improvements by the end of FY23. The adult partners will continue to work on publicizing the Youth Advisory Board (YAB) and expand recruitment efforts to ensure that the new fiscal year, FY24, starts with adequate officer slates.

Program Interns:

The Youth Advisory Board Program Interns are individuals who are gainfully employed or enrolled in college or a trade school, aimed at encouraging and supporting the active participation of youth in care. These interns assist board officers and members in developing essential skills like leadership, advocacy, and conflict resolution.

In September 2022, the Southern Regional Youth Advisory Board identified and approved two Program Interns: Aaliyah Tutwiler, a student at Southern Illinois Carbondale, and Orion Partington, a student at Southern Illinois Edwardsville, who also works part-time at Sam's Club.

In quarter 3, Aaliyaha informed the Youth Advisory Board that she could no longer serve in the Intern capacity. Orion continued to assist board officers and members, focusing on leadership and advocacy. At the end of FY23, Orion successfully completed his internship. As part of his final project, he presented a position paper advocating for better incentives for Foster Parents. This paper was later presented to the Director and his designees.

Youth Advisory Affinity Group Ambassadors:

The Youth Advisory Affinity Group has Ambassadors who collaborate with equity, diversity, and inclusion professionals and DCFS staff to improve services, programs, policies, and the experiences of youth in care. In Quarter 1, there were 3 Latino, 7 African American, and 7 LGBTQI+ ambassadors. Each group of ambassadors worked on projects related to their respective communities, focusing on education, support, and resources.

During quarter two, the number of ambassadors decreased due to transitions to different placements and changes in extracurricular activities. By the end of the quarter, there were 2 Latino, 4 African American, and 7 LGBTQI+ ambassadors. The ambassadors continued to work on their projects, aiming to complete them by the end of their one-year commitment in March 2023.

By the end of Q4, the Youth Advisory Affinity Groups had 3 LGBTQI+ ambassadors, 2 African American ambassadors, and 1 Latino ambassador. The ambassadors successfully completed their one-year commitments by presenting their final projects to the DCFS Director, aiming to promote diversity, equity, and inclusion in the child welfare system.

Statewide Youth Advisory Board:

In FY23, The Statewide Youth Advisory Board held a total of 5 meetings, as required by Public Act 098-0806. SYAB has been actively engaged and has participated in various activities and initiatives as they work towards fulfilling the board's initiatives. Below are some key takeaways from the Statewide Youth Advisory Board Meeting:

- 1. In-person Retreat:
 - a. The SYAB held its first in-person retreat in August 2022 after two years of meeting remotely due to the COVID-19 pandemic. During the retreat, participants learned about the SYAB's mission, accomplishments, and goals for the future.
 - b. Professional Etiquette Coaching: The board members received coaching on professional etiquette, including making first and lasting impressions, proper introductions, and standard courtesies for professional settings.
 - c. Foster Youth Voice (FYV) Month: The SYAB was invited to participate in FYV month by the Selfless Love Foundation. Youth leaders wrote a collective piece detailing how SYAB has made a difference in Illinois' child welfare system.
 - d. Team Building and Trust-Building Activities: The retreat included team-building exercises, such as a trust walk and an escape room, as well as other fun activities like hayrides, bonfires, and outdoor sports.
- Meetings and Workshops: The SYAB held regular meetings with standing agenda items like welcome and introductions, updates from the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS), and discussions on various topics like ethics, LGBTQI+ support, housing assistance, and more.
- 3. Collaboration with Loyola University of Chicago Legislation Clinic: SYAB collaborated with Loyola University to address concerns around contact with caseworkers and made progress on identifying next steps.
- 4. Permanency and Placement Concerns: SYAB worked on addressing permanency concerns by providing feedback on the DCFS Matching Placement Tool and developing a youth preference placement tool.
- 5. Foster Change, Foster Success Event: In partnership with foster parents and older youth, the SYAB hosted an event to connect foster families and older youth in care, addressing permanency concerns and promoting meaningful conversations and rapport-building.
- 6. Speaking Skills: Youth leaders had the opportunity to practice and improve their public speaking skills through presentations and self-critique exercises.

Quarterly Director's Meeting:

As outlined in Public Act 098-0806, Statewide Youth Advisory Board leaderships have met with Director Smith regularly to convey the concerns of our youth in care and to provide updates on projects and initiatives. Key highlights from FY23 Director's Meetings are as follows:

- 1. FY23 Q1: Youth discussed their partnership with the Selfless Love Foundation and October being declared Foster Youth Voice Month.
- 2. FY23 Q2: Postponed Director's Meeting: Due to scheduling conflicts and the holiday season, the meeting with the director was postponed and rescheduled for January 18, 2023. This meeting was cancelled due to scheduling conflicts.
- 3. FY23 Q3: Included discussions on accomplishments, SYAB and YAAG meeting updates, feedback, recommendations, and next steps. Some of the recommendations included hiring an LGBTQI+ clinical coordinator, ongoing foster parent recruitment, additional support for foster parents, and creating a computerized matching tool system to minimize placement disruptions.
- 4. FY23 Q4: The SYAB met with the Director of DCFS to present their annual projects. The meeting included an overview of the successful Foster Change Foster Success event, which aimed to break stigmas surrounding teens and young adults in care and encourage more foster homes to take in older youth.
 - 1. SYAB Intern Project: The SYAB Intern presented a position paper addressing the lack of foster homes and suggested additional incentives for foster parents to ease the financial strain of taking placements.
 - 2. YAAG End-of-Year Projects: The various YAAG groups presented their end-of-year projects, including an informative presentation about the LGBTQI+ community in care, a survey on challenges faced by the African American community in care regarding post-secondary education, and a welcome packet for newly entering Latino youth in care.

Recruitment Efforts:

The Statewide Youth Advisory board adult partners have worked relentlessly to beef up recruitment efforts as a means to increase youth participation in YAB and YAAG. Below are some of the efforts taken:

- 1. Informing Agency Staff: The YAB and YAAG staff attended the DCFS Monitoring All Staff meeting and the Office of Education and Transition Services webinar to present the purpose and work of the Youth Advisory Board and Affinity Group. The goal was to inform agencies and DCFS staff about the YAB and encourage them to identify youth to participate regularly in the meetings.
- 2. Call to Action for Recruitment: At the CWAC (Child Welfare Advisory Council) meeting, a call to action for recruitment was made, requesting agency staff to invite at least 5 youth to participate in the monthly YAB meetings.
- 3. The YAB and YAAG staff continue to conduct recruitment efforts through phone calls, emails, and social media to reach out to youth, caseworkers, contracted agencies, agency monitors, and foster parents.

- 4. Collaborating with Foster Parent Support Specialist: The YAB and YAAG staff attended the Statewide Foster Parent Support Specialist meeting to share information about their groups and seek support from the Foster Parent Support Specialists in encouraging youth participation.
- 5. In-Person Outreach Efforts: In the Central and Southern Regions, in-person outreach efforts directly with youth have been deployed to increase awareness and attendance of the YAB and YAAG meetings.

Metrics and Outcomes

- 1) Convene 48 Regional Youth Advisory Boards (48/48=100%)
- 2) Convene 5 Statewide Youth Advisory Meetings / Retreats (4 SYAB, 1 Retreat = 100%)
- 3) Convene a quarterly meeting between the Director's office and the Executive Board (3/4 = 75%)
 - SYAB members met with Director Smith the following: Q1 September 2022, Q2 December 2022 cancelled, Q3 March 2023, Q4 June 2023

Outcomes:

 100% of youth issues and concerns identified during Cook, Southern, Central, and Northern regional meetings and SYAB meetings will be submitted to DCFS Advocacy staff within 24 hours of the meetings adjournment.

100% youth issues have been submitted within the required time frames.

2) 100% of active DCFS policy transmittals that directly impact youth from the Office of Child and Family Policy will be shared and reviewed by RYAB members at regional meetings. Regional boards will suggest revisions or make recommendations when pertinent.

100% of Active DCFS policy transmittals relevant to youth were shared with youth; however, no formal recommendations were made.

3) The Statewide Youth Advisory Board demonstrates capacity to advocate for the needs of youth in care measured by reports, testimony, representation at meetings and events.

SYAB have advocated for youth at the following events: Director's meeting (September, March, June), Youth Voice Panel (October), Stakeholders Meeting (March), Foster Change, Foster Success (May)

4) The Cook, Central, Southern and Northern Regional Youth Advisory Boards demonstrates capacity to advocate for the needs of youth in care measured by reports, testimony, representation at meetings and events.

SYAB have advocated for youth at the following events: Director's meeting (September, March, June), Youth Voice Panel and proclamation (October), Stakeholders Meeting (March), Foster Change, Foster Success (May).

5) The Statewide Youth Advisory Board will have substantial links to divisions of DCFS and advisory councils associated with DCFS and advocates for youth in care as measured through a report on representation, meetings, reports, communications, and workshops that occur.

YAAG ambassadors have successfully completed 3 projects advocating for the needs of youth in specific groups:

Latino YAAG Project: Welcome Packet

Purpose: A comprehensive list of resources and information for new Latino youth entering care. This group of youth wanted to ensure incoming youth feel welcomed and are getting their needs met.

Audience: Youth

African American Project: African American Youth in Care Education Youth to Youth Survey *Purpose:* To better determine what resources are needed to help support African American youth in care and their educational needs. This group believes African American youth in care face significantly more challenges to becoming successful adults, than peers of other races; with one major barrier being educational attainment. The survey will help determine whether this is true or not. This project will be ongoing. *Audience:* Youth

LGBTQI+ YAAG Project: Educational PowerPoint

Purpose: Information about the LGBTQI+ community through the lens as a youth in care. This group felt as though "the people who they interact with should know more about their community and if they did, if people got to know more about the LGBTQI+ community, they would humanize the LGBTQI+ community and treat them with respect." *Audience:* Adults/Care Team/ Foster Parent Training
