CHANGE Illinois! Testimony to the Illinois Senate Redistricting Committee Presented by Peter Bensinger, Co-Chair of CHANGE Illinois! April 19, 2011

On behalf of CHANGE Illinois! — an independent and non-partisan coalition of diverse interests including organizations that represent more than 2 million Illinoisans working for political reform — I thank you for the opportunity to present testimony today about the redistricting process.

CHANGE Illinois! advocates a redistricting system to advance the common good, ensure that voter voices are amplified, promote diversity, expand opportunities for representation, and create a transparent and fair system for mapmaking. While we believe that a constitutional amendment is necessary to accomplish all of these goals, it is possible for you to improve on past redistricting efforts.

Across America, the redrawing of legislative district boundaries is of utmost importance to state legislators and members of Congress. While the determination of where lines are drawn understandably is of concern to sitting legislators, it also is important to those of us not running for office.

We commend the Senate and the House for scheduling hearings throughout the state. It is important that you listen to voters about what they like and don't like about district boundaries from past elections. Because you are holding hearings in so many cities up and down Illinois, you must recognize it is important to voters, too.

In these early hearings, you'll hear a great deal about maps that reflect Illinois, that respect communities of interest, that are fair to minorities, that don't divide local governments unnecessarily and much more. But the public doesn't want to talk only about what makes a good map. The public wants to SEE what maps are proposed and have time to tell you what they think of those maps before you vote on them. The public wants to be able to tell you whether draft maps meet their expectations and to suggest how they can be improved.

Our message today is short and simple. Today's hearing establishes communications, but it is neither sufficient nor responsive enough to the public interest. We urge you to travel throughout the state and hear from the public <u>after</u> new maps are proposed and <u>before</u> a final vote in each chamber.

Instead of preparing Illinoisans for the possibility that there won't be much time to hold hearings after maps are drafted, we think the leaders should unveil their draft maps well in advance and explain the rationale for the district boundaries before a final vote. There should be hearings in several locations, and the public should have advance notice of the hearings. If you believe the public should have a role in redistricting, make certain it happens when it counts most, <u>after</u> the maps are drawn.
