| 3 | Today's hearing will focus on the |
| 4 | 2020 census, the redistricting of Illinois |
| 5 | congressional districts and redistricting of |
| 6 | judicial subcircuits in Cook County. |
| 7 | I want to thank Oakton Community |
| 8 | College for providing the committee with a great |
| 9 | hearing location. |
| 0 . | Staff has prepared a presentation on |
| 1 | census numbers related to Illinois congressional |
| _2 | districts and Cook County subcircuits. This |
| _3 | presentation will be posted later today on the |
| 4 | redistricting committee's page on the Illinois |
| _5 | General Assembly's website which is www.ilga.gov. |
| _6 | After the presentation we will be |
| _7 | moving to the following witnesses. We will be |
| _8 | having Cook County Clerk of the Circuit Court Iris |
| _9 | Martinez, Aviva Miriam Patt from Decalogue Society |
| 20 | of Lawyers, Madeleine Doubek from Change Illinois. |
| 21 | And I do believe we might have at |
| 22 | least one or two other witnesses that plan on |
| 23 | joining us a little later. And if they sign on, |
| 24 | we will go to them. |

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| 1 | I will now turn it over to the staff |
| 2 | for the presentation they prepared. |
| 3 | STAFFER RANDAZZO: Good morning, |
| 4 | Everyone. |
| 5 | This is a somewhat long presentation |
| 6 | so instead of taking everybody's time, we'll go |
| 7 | through it a little faster so that we can get to |
| 8 | witnesses, but it will be up on the redistricting |
| 9 | website later on today. |
| LO | So just, as a snapshot, back to our |
| L1 | population for the 2020 census we ended up with |
| L2 | 12,812,508. That was a decrease of .14 percent. |
| L3 | There were 15 counties that had population growth |
| L4 | while 87 counties had a population decrease. |
| L5 | What this resulted in is a loss of |
| L6 | one congressional district in Illinois. This is |
| L7 | the trend since 1910. We are now at 17 seats and |
| 18 | the average population per seat would be 753,677. |
| L9 | The following are the congressional |
| 20 | districts as they are today with the 2020 census. |
| 21 | In respect for our witnesses I won't go into great |
| 22 | detail. Again, this will be up on the web. |
| 23 | But the first congressional is |
| 24 | 705,949, the second congressional is at 679,628, |

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| 1 | the third congressional is at 725,625, the fourth |
| 2 | congressional is at 698,570, the fifth |
| 3 | congressional is at 743,449, the sixth |
| 4 | congressional is at 732,745, the seventh |
| 5 | congressional is at 767,663, the eighth |
| 6 | congressional is at 716,990, the ninth |
| 7 | congressional is at 742,156, the tenth |
| 8 | congressional is at 724,946, the eleventh is at |
| 9 | 706,376, the twelfth is at 674,870, the thirteenth |
| 10 | congressional is 695,583, the fourteenth |
| 11 | congressional is 753,195, the fifteenth |
| 12 | congressional is at 680,293, the sixteenth |
| 13 | congressional is at 692,552, the seventeenth |
| 14 | congressional is at 673,770, and the eighteenth |
| 15 | congressional is at 701,148. |
| 16 | Again, these numbers will be up |
| 17 | this presentation will be up this afternoon so |
| 18 | that I know I went through the numbers somewhat |
| 19 | quick. |
| 20 | The other topic for today is the |
| 21 | subcircuits in Cook County. The general assembly |
| 22 | did pass an act in the 101st requiring the GA to |
| 23 | redraw the subcircuits in 2021 and then a to |
| 24 | redraw them every decennial census thereafter. It |
| 24 | redraw them every decennial census thereafter. It |

wasn't a requirement that we had before that
public act.

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Today we have Cook County judicial subcircuits. These were created in 1991. The districts as they stand today were last drawn in 1991. There are 15 subcircuits. By statute there are 166 judgeships in these 15 subcircuits and the way they did that is as retirements from the bench happened, by lottery that the Supreme Court, I believe, held back in 1991, as those judges retired, their at-large, county-wide judgeships were moved to the subcircuits in a lottery The ideal population for a subcircuit fashion. would be 351,703.

I will go through the subcircuits here. There's the numbers for Cook County. There was a 1.6 increase in the 2010 to 2020 census.

The first judicial subcircuit south Chicago and south suburban Cook is at 278,725, second judicial subcircuit is at 269,362, the third subcircuit is currently at 367,094, fourth is 364,375, fifth is at 257,166, the sixth is at 333,430, the seventh is at 324,205, the eighth is at 449,055, the ninth is 366,973, the tenth which

Page 9 1 is the subcircuit we're currently -- you're 2 sitting in at Oakton Community College is at 3 356,857, the eleventh has a total population right now of 373,485, the twelfth has a population of 4 5 373,259, the thirteenth has a population of 6 400,535, the fourteenth subcircuit has a population of 369,413, and the last subcircuit has 7 8 a population of 391,607. 9 That concludes the presentation I 10 have. Again, this will be up on the ILGA website 11 as soon as I can get it to our good friends at 12 LIS. 13 Thank you. Our first CHAIR AQUINO: witness today is our Cook County Clerk of the 14 15 Circuit Court Iris Martinez, our good former 16 colleague. 17 I believe I saw her as a participant. Look here if the clerk could make sure to unmute 18 herself. 19 20 I know you've done this many times 21 before, but as a reminder if you can identify 22 yourself if you are speaking on behalf of yourself 23 or an organization and then you can begin your 24 testimony.

Madam Clerk, as I said before, welcome, I know you've done this many of times this side of the committee hearing, but I just wanted to remind if you can just introduce yourself if you are speaking on behalf of yourself or an organization and then you can begin your testimony.

Thank you.

THE WITNESS: Thank you so much, Senator Aquino and all my former colleagues. It's so great to see many of you. I'm doing fine. I'm surviving this job. I miss all of you. Thank you for having me. I'm speaking on behalf of myself as the former sponsor of the bill, of this bill.

I would like to begin by thanking
Chair Aquino for his invitation to address the
Senate Redistricting Committee, I would also like
to thank Minority Spokesperson Barickman, good to
see you too, and the members of this committee for
a chance to speak on how important this is in the
topic of diversity and representation within the
circuit courts.

Public Act 101-477 the law that

requires judicial subcircuit boundary
redistricting process that this committee and the
General Assembly has started, had a simple
purpose. The purpose was to enact a process that
ensured the judicial system reflect the diversity
of the population that it serves going forward.

(Brief interruption.)

CHAIR AQUINO: Madam Clerk, just we get every -- it seems you might be reading something if you can have your team make sure to submit the written -- so we can make sure we can get everything you're saying. Thank you.

THE WITNESS: Absolutely. Thank you so much for that. And I apologize. I know this mic goes in and out on me for some odd reason.

As some of you may remember, HB 2625 was a passion project of mine not long ago when I was a senate sponsor. But I was not the first legislator who saw the need to amend subcircuit boundaries to better reflect the latest census figures and the diversity of our communities.

Leader Aquino and Rep. Arroyo were the two of many members of the GA that sponsored legislation and worked tirelessly on this effort. I am happy to

join you today to see the GA moving forward and making progress that is long overdue.

The last time the GA redrew these maps was in 1991 as we heard prior. We all know that the population of Cook County has shifted dramatically over those 30 years. And just like in 1991 the diversity of the bench does not mirror the county. According to the data released for the Office of the Chief Judge of Cook County, only 20% of the sitting circuit court judges are Black, 9% are Latino and 3% are Asian. The remaining two-thirds of the judges are White. By comparison Cook County's population is one-quarter Black, one-quarter Latino 8% Asian and only 40% white.

Subcircuit boundaries are an important tool to increase the diversity of those sitting on the bench. But that tool is useless if the boundaries dilute the diversity of the community and do not reflect the residents of those subcircuits. As the population evolves, the judicial system must reflect that evolution.

Judges uphold the laws of the state and residents should have a voice in who is entrusted to do this important work. We know from studies

that a more diverse bench leads to outcomes that are fairer especially in a criminal justice systems where defendants are disproportionately black and Latino. We know that this is true in civil cases, as well.

Within the current 15 subcircuits there has been considerable demographic shifts captured by the 2020 census. But stop and consider the additional population changes seen in the since the 1990 and 2000 census. Since 1990, just in the City of Chicago, the Latino population has increased by 50% and the Asian population by 92%. This is just one example of the shift we're talking about. In addition, not only has the race and ethnicity of the city's and county's population changed, but where they live has also shifted in the past 3 decades.

In closing, the judiciary should reflect the population that it serves. It is wonderful that we now have a process to make sure that that's the case. It's great that the GA will revisit this issue after each decennial census. This process will amend the boundaries of subcircuits to ensure that they keep up with

changing demographics and address the need for greater diversity on the bench going forward.

And As the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Cook County and a lifelong resident of Chicago, I can personally attest to the need for the face of justice to mirror the community it serves.

Thank you so much and I'll be happy to take questions.

CHAIR AQUINO: Thank you, Madam Clerk.

I see no hands up here present at Oakton, but I'm going to look on the Zoom. I do see that Senator McClure has raised his hand. Senator McClure, if you'd like to ask your question...

MEMBER McCLURE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

I guess my first question is after the most recent legislative maps, we had a lot of groups of interest that were very upset with the map and just because the map changes does not necessarily mean it's going to reflect the demographic changes of the state. For example, we grew by 300,000 Latinos and yet Latinos lost a

seat in the General Assembly.

So I guess my question for the witness is just because there's a new map being drawn, it's not necessarily going to reflect these things and do you have concern -- because we don't see a map in front of us today before we're going to vote on it, do you have concerns of what this map is going to look like and would you like to see this map soon in order for you to be able to respond to what the demographics are of these maps?

THE WITNESS: Thank you so much, Senator.

And, again, I will say this, I think the

conversation that we're having is great. I think

it's great to reflect upon those numbers. And

really I believe that as we continue this process

moving forward, we're all going to get to a good

place when it comes to the representation we need.

You're right there's been increase of people in the state. The Latino population community has again -- the shift has been -- you can see it in the numbers. And, again, at the end of the day it's about making sure these maps are fair and that they're reflective of the population

that did actually -- and making sure the demographics are ensuring in all these boards and across the whole entire state that it reflects the population there.

I really trust that you all are going to do what needs to be done in making sure these maps are moving forward. Will they be perfect, I would hope so. But I know that sometimes trying to get to the numbers, making sure they're reflective and that the numbers are complete when it comes to the representation of that particular district, I think, you know -- I know you guys -- it's all in good hands. That's all I can say.

MEMBER McCLURE: So how much time would you need TO review any judicial changes to the maps, any congressional map? How much time would you need review -- is there a map? What map is that that's being shown in the background there?

THE WITNESS: That's the judicial -subcircuit map that -- the map I have here is the
map that Geo showed you earlier.

MEMBER McCLURE: Oh, okay. How much time would you need to review any proposed map in order to be able to assess whether or not it's going to

Page 17 1 be something you can support or something you 2 would like to be changed? Like how much time 3 would you need to review an actual map? I will leave that to my 4 THE WITNESS: 5 wonderful Chairman Aquino who I know is moving 6 this forward. Again, I think all of us just want to 7 8 make sure that these numbers are reflected with 9 the end product coming. So I will work -- I will 10 continue to work at the pace that the -- with 11 Chairman Aquino and the redistricting committee in 12 making sure -- and also working with the judges in this area looking to make sure we are increasing 13 our numbers. I leave it up to the chairman at his 14 pace and will work along side. 15 16 MEMBER McCLURE: So you don't need to see 17 You just absolutely trust the committee to 18 make the right map, whatever that map looks like? The conversations that 19 THE WITNESS: we're having are all good and I think that's the 20 most important thing right now, that we're 21 22 actively discussing this. 23 MEMBER McCLURE: Okay. Thank you. 24 THE WITNESS: Thank you so much.

As a former legislature, 7 THE WITNESS: 8 you know, again, I know how it is to work through 9 this process in the past and, again, it's really in the hands of the committee of redistricting. 10 11 And that's where, you know, I think 12 they've gone across -- I know they've gone across 13 the state when it came to having the meetings on redistricting. 14 15 Again, it's a process and I have to 16 respect the process as far as the committee doing 17 its job and whatever time that's needed out there, 18 I as a former legislature will go along -- will 19 have gone along in the past and will continue to 20 go along with all my colleagues, all of you, as 21 far as what needs to be done to get this map 22 passed. 23 MEMBER PLUMMER: Thank you. Good to see

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you again.

THE WITNESS: Good to see you too, thank you.

CHAIR AQUINO: Madam Clerk, I do not see any further hands up virtually nor here in person so once again it's always a pleasure to see you, glad you're doing well in your new role. And thank you again for your testimony here today.

THE WITNESS: Thank you so much and have a great weekend everyone. Thank you again for having me in front of you. Thank you so much.

So we'll be moving forward in the manner of how I stated that -- our witnesses earlier. So next up is Ms. Aviva Miriam Patt from the Decalogue Society of Lawyers.

Ms. Patt, you have done this as well before so, if you don't mind, just introduce yourself just stating for the record the organization that you are speaking on behalf of

and then begin your testimony.

Thank you.

THE WITNESS: Thank you. Good morning.

My name is Aviva Miriam Patt. I'm the executive

director of The Decalogue Society of Lawyers.

The Decalogue Society of Lawyers, founded in 1934, is the nation's oldest Jewish bar association. Decalogue's mission includes educating the public on legal and Jewish issues, maintaining vigilance against discriminatory public and private practices, particularly anti-Semitism, and working with other ethnic communities to combat hate and promote justice.

The society's earliest days during the rise of anti-Semitism in the 1930s, Decalogue often had to fight for equal opportunities for Jewish lawyers to advance in their professions. We challenged newspaper job listings that specified "gentile" or "non-Jew" as requirements for hiring and we worked to end the scheduling of the Bar exam on Jewish holidays. Sometimes we had to respond to anti-Semitism expressed in court by other attorneys and even by judges.

As the decades passed and discrimination

under the law and within the society receded,
Jewish attorneys were able to participate fully in
the profession and in public life, including
elevation to the bench. But remnants of prejudice
still remain and Jewish candidates for the bench
face an uphill battle to be elected countywide.

Few Jewish candidates have succeeded in recent years and mostly only those with very substantial campaign coffers. Multiple studies have shown that voters choose judicial candidates largely by gender and the perceived ethnicity of their name and Jewish names are not among the popular ones.

The legislature created judicial subcircuits in Cook County to enable racial and ethnic communities to elect judges that would increase the diversity of the bench and the 9th subcircuit met that need for the Jewish community. At the time it encompassed the greatest concentration of Jewish voters in Cook County. But our people have become much more dispersed in the past 30 years and Decalogue is asking for the subcircuit to be redrawn to include other areas which are now home to more Jewish residents.

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The Jewish population in Illinois is At no level of the government do we constitute a majority, but it is possible to draw districts in which we have sufficient concentration to have an influence in the political process. And when it comes to electing judges, that influence exists only at the subcircuit level. We have submitted a map identifying those areas that can be combined to create a Jewish-influence district in the far north side of Chicago and the northern suburbs. Decalogue asks that as the subcircuits are being redrawn, the 9th Subcircuit be redrawn to include these areas so that our community can have a strong voice in selecting those who will administer justice in our County. Thank you very much for hearing us today.

CHAIR AQUINO: Thank you, Ms. Patt. I just wanted to let the record show that we have received the map that you had described. It is on our redistricting website also on ilga.gov. So for those that are unable to see it now would like to see a copy of that map, it is again both on the redistricting committee's website and ilga.gov as

Page 25 next witness this -- I believe -- still morning, 1 2 this morning. 3 So moving on we have Madeleine Doubek from CHANGE Illinois. You as well have been a 4 5 part of this process. Just make sure if you can 6 announce yourself for the record and the 7 organization that you are here representing, thank 8 you. 9 THE WITNESS: Thank you, Chairman Aquino, Vice Chair Sims and all committee members for 10 11 providing our organization with the opportunity to come before you today to weigh in on the 12 13 congressional maps. My name is Madeleine Doubek and I am 14 15 the Executive Director of the CHANGE Illinois 16 Action Fund and CHANGE Illinois, both are 17 non-partisan non-profits championing ethics and 18 efficiency in government and elections. Our first recommendation to this 19 committee is to use the 2020 Census data as the 20 21 basis for congressional maps rather than American 22 Community Survey data. Ignoring advocates' 23 previous warnings against the negative

consequences of using ACS estimates as a

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replacement for the 2020 Census data led to for the first time since the state constitution was adopted in 1970 having two Illinois General Assembly redistricting maps signed into law within a matter of months.

Lawmakers revisiting the legislative maps for a second time created additional confusion and alienated community voices from the process to an even greater degree. People had even less time and opportunity to participate than was provided in the spring. Each time we come back for another remap, the process should be improved as lessons are learned from previous errors.

Our second recommendation is that the committee pay particular attention to the Federal Voting Rights Act and create a congressional map that honors and prioritizes that law. It would be in the best interest of the committee and the public for committee members to publicly announce the prioritization of all the redistricting criteria they are considering so that Illinoisans can better understand the committee's intentions in drawing the map. Those criteria should prioritize the federal Voting Rights Act first and

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foremost. It breeds unnecessary distrust amongst the people when they have no information to help them make heads or tails of why district lines end up where they do. This committee has the opportunity to create maps that empower communities of color through the federal Voting Rights Act by drafting maps that empower those communities to elect candidates of their choosing. In previous congressional redistricting cycles, that didn't happen, forcing communities of color to pursue lengthy and costly legal avenues to achieve the representation they richly deserve. We mustn't forget that Illinois' first majority-Latino congressional district was created as a result of a lawsuit. We can save our communities a lot of time and resources by ensuring that the next decade of congressional districts respect and prioritize the Federal Voting Rights Act ahead of any other considerations.

Our third and final recommendation is for this map to prioritize listening to community members and affording them a better opportunity to participate, particularly after a map proposal is

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released. Even advocacy organizations that track remapping had trouble providing meaningful feedback on the legislative maps that were released and voted on within a day earlier this year. There's absolutely no ability for everyday community members to have a meaningful say in their congressional maps if votes are again rushed right after a map is released in the coming weeks.

There needs to be a real and meaningful dialogue between lawmakers and community groups who come before this committee with recommendations for how their communities can best be reflected in the institutions that are here to represent them. We have not been able to find one group that participated in the state legislative remap hearings that has publicly endorsed those legislative maps, but there are many who have rejected them. How can we say a map is the best reflection of the interests of communities if almost every single community group that tries to engage says its members' voices were ignored and their communities were harmed? Their efforts should not be in vain. We encourage this committee to provide a much greater level of

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transparency, engagement, time and community involvement than was seen in the legislative remap process. We ask this committee to align its congressional remapping work more closely with the work of federal lawmakers who are pushing for the John Lewis Voting Rights and Freedom to Vote Act, making sure to prioritize communities of interest, removing partisan gerrymandering from the process, and not prioritizing incumbent protection.

Thank you, again, for the opportunity to offer these suggestions and I'm happy to answer any questions.

CHAIR AQUINO: Thank you for your testimony. Looking on to hands both here present and virtually, I see that Senator McClure has his hand up,

Page 32 the subcircuits that I drew. 1 2 And if you mind, I'll just go through 3 the presentation very quickly if I could screen share. 4 5 CHAIR AQUINO: Give us -- yeah, I am not 6 sure LIS is able to do that. 7 LIS, could you allow for 8 Mr. Calabrese to share his screen? 9 LIS: Senator Aquino, as long as he has 10 whatever he needs to present on his computer that's connected, he can share his screen. 11 12 CHAIR AQUINO: Excellent. 13 Thank you so much. So as you are aware, this was a 21 special law that was passed to redistrict the Cook 22 County subcircuits. It's been 30 years since the 23 subcircuit has been redistricted. 24 There are three primary problems with

Page 33 the subcircuits: the population is unbalanced, 1 2 there's a lacking of diversity -- Cook County is a 3 majority minority county but only a third of the districts are majority minority, and the 4 subcircuits, you know, they were gerrymandered to 5 6 reflect political alliances that existed in the 80s and they really don't reflect communities that 7 8 exist today. 9 So this kind of shows you the 10 population difference in kind of a visual aspect. So the 8th subcircuit is the largest with about 11 430,000. And then the 5th subcircuit, which is 12 13 Englewood, Hyde Park is the smallest set, about 14 240,000. And this is a bar graph, just kind of 15 shows you that difference. 16 I was actually surprised that the 17 differences were more stark over 30 years. the 8th subcircuit which is the lake front is 18 about a subcircuit and a half larger than other 19 subcircuits. 20 21 So one of the problems -- and this is 22 what Clerk Martinez spoke about -- there's only 23 one Latino subcircuit left out of the 15 and

that's the 14th subcircuit. And this might

24

Page 34 surprise you, but the 14th subcircuit elected 1 2 essentially no Latinos until two years ago because the 14th subcircuit was kind of controlled by 3 Alderman Burke. So even though the 14th 4 5 subcircuit is majority Latino, the 14th subcircuit 6 in 30 years has only elected 30 Latinos. The 6th subcircuit which was 7 8 initially created as a Latino majority subcircuit 9 is now a Latino minority subcircuit. And this 10 shows you the dominant racial group by the subcircuits. 11 So there are 4 black subcircuits, one 12 13 Latino subcircuit and 10 white subcircuits. And 14 the subcircuits, they're kind of ugly. 15 look at, you know, the 7th subcircuit, the 10th 16 and the 9th, there's a lot of squiggly lines that 17 really don't reflect community boundaries and 18 they're very confusing and people -- occasionally 19 I work in judge elections. It's very hard to 20 explain to people what subcircuit they live in. And so this is kind of a proposal I 21 22 drafted of just kind of squaring out the 23 subcircuits and making everything even. So some

circuits are just kind of squaring out; some more

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1 drastically change.

Like you probably have to take the current 10th subcircuit and move it to lakefront to alleviate the excess population of the 8th subcircuit and you also need to bring down some black subcircuits such as the 5th and the 1st and the 2nd further south.

30 years ago the south end of Cook County was farmland. Now it's largely black suburbs. And so the 16th subcircuit you can essentially split in half.

So this proposal solves diversity problems. It's essentially zero percent deviation and it's currently 22 percent deviation under the current proposal. So this just gives you a good idea of where to generally shift boundaries to get a zero percent deviation map.

The 6th subcircuit becomes a majority Latino subcircuit. And the 3rd subcircuit becomes a Latino-influenced district so this increases Latino representation within our subcircuit system and hence -- and will increase the likelihood of electing Latino judges in Cook County.

The 7th subcircuit, that's been the

subject of some media. So the 7th subcircuit includes the west side of Chicago currently with some white suburbs. And the Supreme Court last cycle, they appointed a white judge and a lot of black alderman in Chicago were complaining because it was created as a black subcircuit.

What I do is I remove River Forest and Berwyn from the 7th subcircuit. I also remove the West Loop. And I add some African American suburbs and the western suburbs. So I increase the black population by 10 percent in the 7th subcircuit and I clearly make it a black subcircuit so you don't get situations where the Supreme Court appoints non-black judges to that subcircuit.

And there's lots of -- as you're aware with the state map there's been significant population loss on the south side. So you have to extend a lot of these south side black subcircuits further south to catch in the necessary population to maintain equal population, but this proposal still maintains for majority black subcircuits.

And, again, the lines they're much cleaner. They respect municipal and township and

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| 1 | ward boundaries. They're much easier to explain |
| 2 | to normal people which subcircuit they live in. |
| 3 | This is a close up of a subcircuit. |
| 4 | This is supported by Clerk Martinez and Judge |
| 5 | Chevere. They spoke earlier. |
| 6 | Currently the 6th judicial subcircuit |
| 7 | is 43 percent Latino. This increases it to 56 |

And I made a lot of these figures with -- the last two slides of the 6th and 7th subcircuit, that uses census data, but, again, this is adjusted for the census. This was not made with the estimate data. This is -- I made all of this with the 2020 census.

And that concludes my brief presentation. And I'm out of screen share so if anyone has any questions.

I just want to thank the chairman for this special hearing on Cook County subcircuits.

Before we go to questions from the committee I actually have a couple of questions because you've several times have indicated that there's folks that testified today that are in support of some of the maps that you drew; however, when they provided testimony -- it's specifically one person -- you mentioned two people, but one person provided testimony today and that was Clerk

I was just trying -- I submitted a plan on the subcircuits, but then the chairman created a specific hearings for the subcircuits later on and I was requesting a revision of the board of review districts which did not happen.

And also I just offered a suggestion on how to create an extra Latino district, but I expect the committee to take into account some of these proposals.

from Illinoisans from multiple counties is what's
the point, the committee didn't listen to us last
time.

So I guess my specific question to

you as chairman of the committee is what are you or what are we doing to rehabilitate the reputation of the committee so that Illinoisans feel more willing to be engaged in this process.

As we all know, the last round of hearings were boycotted by numerous organizations because their input wasn't being listened to. So what are we doing to rehabilitate the committee so

this can be transparent and open process where the public has input?

CHAIR AQUINO: Senator, this has been a very transparent and open process so much so that we've had over -- at this point over 60 hearings throughout this year on redistricting alone where we have gone to multiple places throughout the state of Illinois, have also made sure that the -- every single hearing, every single one this year had a virtual component.

Because, as you all know, we are still living in a global pandemic unfortunately with COVID-19 so provided that for people's safety and also allow for folks to participate from the comfort of their own home or local library or so forth. We have always had a virtual component to that. We've also made announcements of when the public portals have been open so that people can submit testimony, maps and so forth directly to us.

And I'm glad that at a recent event you have encouraged people to participate in this process. I think that we have, especially on the democratic side, encouraged everyone from our

Page 49 communities and outside our communities to be a 1 2 part of this process. And so we've had 3 participation from folks and we always are open to that participation and appreciate the robust 4 5 discussions that we've been having. This is 6 nothing new. As you know as a member of this 7 8 committee, we've had a number of these hearings 9 this entire year to talk about a number of 10 redistricting that we had to complete this year. 11 As we know, we are now working on the congressional map and the subcircuit maps and we 12 13 are encouraging folks -- and I just announced the five different hearings that we are having in the 14 15 next week. I would hope that you and your 16 colleagues on your side as well as my colleagues 17 on our side would encourage folks to participate 18 in those hearings both virtually or in person. And so that's what we're doing to 19 20 once again show that we are trying to gather as 21 much information as possible to provide -- to have 22 a great outcome with these upcoming maps that 23 we're going to be voting on very soon.

MEMBER PLUMMER: And I appreciate that,

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Mr. Chairman, I really do. But, you know, the quantity of hearings is a bit irrelevant if the doors are locked to the building, the ability for people to log in doesn't work, if they're not getting the emails, they're not getting the log in access, if they can't participate.

It's nice that we have something that we call portal, but the portal is meaningless if zero maps are submitted because people can't use the portal. So all of that sounds good.

I guess what I'm asking right now for these next five hearings -- for example that you just mentioned on the congressional map -- because I think it's pretty unanimous by everyone across Illinois that the state map process was not transparent, was kind of train wreck.

Are we going to make sure that the doors are open and not locked to the buildings for the next hearings? Are we going to make sure that people that register online to participate are going to get the emails and are going to be able to access the hearings virtually? And are we going to make sure that maps submitted to the portal -- I am sorry -- the portal is set up so

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| 1 | that maps can be submitted through the portal in a |
| 2 | way that the average Illinoisan can use it, I |
| 3 | guess, would be my question? |

CHAIR AQUINO: Senator Plummer, we have 10 11 -- I've asked and answered your question and I am going do put an end point to this. 12 13 We've had over 60 hearings throughout the entire state of Illinois all that can be held 14 15 virtually and so forth. 16 The number of groups today alone that 17 have provided testimony are returning folks that 18 have decided to come once again to be a part of 19 this process because they choose to be a part of 20 this process and we encourage folks to do so. 21 I would hope that you and your 22 colleagues on your side to keep on encouraging 23 folks to be a part of this process. That's what we're trying do here and that's what we've done 24

MEMBER PLUMMER: So moving on to a different topic, Mr. Chairman. Has a map on the judicial subcircuit or a congressional map been drawn yet that you've aware of?

CHAIR AQUINO: Senator, there's no map today that I'm aware of. This is -- as we've done this before, we are gathering information from the public.

We've actually had two maps submitted already to the committee here today and that's what we're doing. We're gathering information, including maps, two of which because of this hearing being posted were submitted already, one from the Jewish community, from the Decalogue organization, and also from Mr. Calabrese as well.

MEMBER PLUMMER: So when the map is drawn, can you tell us, as members of the committee and the public, who will be drawing that map and what data they'll be using? Will that be only census data that they're using and who will be doing the drawing?

CHAIR AQUINO: What I can tell you is that we are gathering the information right now.

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| | And we will be there's going be we're going |
| 2 | to be voting on a map that is going to take into |
| 3 | account all of the testimony that has been |
| 4 | provided to this committee in the next few |

| 17 | senate hearing we've had on these maps so I don't |
| 18 | know how the question could have been asked in the |
| 19 | past but |
| 20 | So can you tell us, as chairman of |
| 21 | the committee, specifically the data that will be |
| 22 | used to draw the maps? |
| 23 | CHAIR AQUINO: We are going to use the |
| 24 | census data that's from the decennial census and |

also from testimony that has been provided and maps that have been submitted and things that are going to be submitted to our website and to the committee.

MEMBER PLUMMER: I think depending on your answer this is my last question, but obviously, I think the public should know who is drawing the map. I think us, as members of the committee, should know who is drawing the map.

But obviously after the disastrous series of maps and map revisions we went through in the spring, I would hope that the same people that drew those maps behind closed doors without public input are not the same people drawing these maps because we don't have time to go through a circus like that again.

So can you tell us, Mr. Chairman -Mr. Chairman, can you tell us when you will be
notifying us, the members of the committee and the
public, the names of the people that will be
drawing the map that we will be voting on in the
senate?

CHAIR AQUINO: Senator, as I mentioned already and asked and answered that, I do not know

What sort of time line are they 4 5 going to have this go around? 6 Obviously, you know, in the June hearings or the hearings before June, the last go 7 8 around, many witness were told that you're not 9 going to have that much time to review it because 10 it's got to be done before June 30th. 11 Well, that deadline came and went. I anticipate that 24

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So I would be happy to be engaged in the process, but we need to see what you guys have to work with first and then we can go from there.

But I would appreciate as much time as possible for these witnesses to be able to review these maps.

And I thank you for answering my questions.

CHAIR AQUINO: No problem. And just a reminder, Senator McClure, since you're very interested in maybe submitting a map, I just want to remind you that if -- you could go to our website at ilsenateredistricting.com to fill out a map.

Page 65 deadlines that were debated and talked about and 1 2 that was the argument used and that argument was 3 not viable now. That's exactly what I said. CHAIR AQUINO: I will certainly look back 4 5 to the -- we have the Court Reporter here so we'll 6 see what you exactly you said, but it did sound --MEMBER PLUMMER: Good. 7 8 CHAIR AQUINO: -- like, sir, that you 9 said that you understood that we had deadlines in 10 the past and I'm glad you agree that we did have those deadlines and so --11 12 MEMBER PLUMMER: -- talking about --13 CHAIR AQUINO: We certainly do have deadlines because -- and if you're not aware, 14 15 there's a voting cycle for people to make sure 16 that they can vote for their representation. 17 those elections are held in 2022 and so we want to 18 make sure that -- so that people can vote for, you 19 know, for their representatives as they see fit 20 and to sign both to -- on the bench to the general 21 assembly or to congress, we need to make sure 22 we're giving folks the appropriate time to be able 23 to vote for their representation.

And so those elections are happening

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very soon and so that's why, you know, we are moving forward to getting this work done for judicial maps as was discussed here in this testimony earlier today.

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In term of judicial maps we can't act sooner because of the fact that it's been over -it's been 30 years since the subcircuit maps have been worked on. And it was discussed at length of how there has been demographic shifts especially in Cook County with those -- in 30 years and so to ensure that all folks have equal representation and have a voice in who represents them either in the halls of congress or in the capitol of Illinois in Springfield or in their local courthouses, we need to make sure that we are moving forward with our work and, as I said, there's a scheduled veto session coming up. I presume that we would be finishing our work in that veto session as that is the schedule that we have in front of us.

MEMBER PLUMMER: I understand that and I would just remind you that it's your side that's controlled the map making for the last couple of decades so the fact that these judicial

subcircuits are out of whack right now is definitely not a good thing but every opportunity has been there for that to be addressed in the past.

Again, we've pushed all the deadlines back for filing, for petitions, for the primary election so it seems to me this rush to get maps filed for veto session and a vote during veto session is just another false deadline perpetuated by your side so that there's no public input and there's no transparency to the process. That's a shame.

You have every opportunity to make sure there's a block of time for a public review of these maps before a vote and I encourage you and encourage everyone on your side to give the public the opportunity to review these maps so we can receive true input on the maps, not what they would like, but their input on the specific maps we're going to vote on before the vote takes place. It's the only proper way to do this. I hope that you take that into consideration.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
